BANCO CASES.

Calendar of banco cases for the special term of the Supreme Court to be held on Monday, March 30, 1891.

The King vs. J. R. Gaspar, liquor selling without license, on exceptions allowed by Dole, J., from 3d Circuit Court. Neumann for defendant appellant. This case went over from last term owing to the absence of counsel for defendant.

Hawaiian Hotel Stables vs. Eliz. K. Cummins, trespass; defendant's motion for a new trial was overruled by McCully, J. In this case the jury awarded damages of \$250 in favor of plaintiff, and the defendant excepts. Carter for plaintiff; Hatch for defendant appellant.

Kaheana vs. Naimu, ejectment. Plaintiff's motion to dismiss the appeal was overruled by McCully, J., and plaintiff excepts. Achi for plaintiff; Rosa for defendant.

Kaniku vs. J. M. Monsarrat, ejectment. Exceptions by the plaintiff, the same as the last case. The same counsel.

Emma M. Nakuina and husband vs. A. J. Lopes and another, ejectment, on exceptions from McCully, J. Magoon for plaintiffs, Rosa for defendants appellant. This was a jury waived case, and was heard by His Honor who gave judgment for plaintiffs for possession of the land and \$25 damages.

M. A. Gonsalves vs. C. L. Brito and others. This is an action for publishing a libel and in which a verdict was rendered for plaintiff for \$3,000 damages. Defendants' motion for a new trial was overruled by Chief Justice Judd. Hatch for plaintiff; Davidson and Rosa for defendants appellant.

Tin Hee vs. Ho Kum Kee. This is an appeal from the commissioner of water rights in the district of Ewa, Oahu, wherein judgment was given for the defendant. The parties in suit are cultivators or farmers, the defendant refusing to allow the water to run through his land. The commissioner decided that this being artesian water plaintiff could not set up the claim of ancient acquired rights. Davidson and Kaneakua for plaintiff appellant.

Kamakoaia, a woman, vs. Tom Choy, assignee in bankruptcy, suit in replevin for possession of three horses and one wagon valued \$383. Plaintiff's motion for a new trial overruled, on exceptions from McCully, J. Davidson for plaintiff; C. W. Ashford for defendant. This case will depend on construction of the law as to whether chattels of a wife were the husband's property after marriage, prior to the law of 1888.

In the matter of M. de Gouveia, involuntary bankrupt, appeal from order of Bickerton, J., refusing bankrupt's discharge from debts. C. W. Ashford for petitioner; C. L. Carter for certain opposing creditors.

Narcisse Perry vs. Olo Ludloff and brothers; assumpsit for rent of a dairy. Davidson for plaintiff; Magoon for defendants appellant. This suit was originally brought in the Police Court of Honolulu, and from there it was appealed to the Intermediate Court presided over by Mr. Justice Dole, who rendered judgment for plaintiff in the sum of \$180, affirming judgment of the Police Court.

DIVORCED PERSONS TABU D.

Rev. Dr. S. V. Leech of the Howard street Methodist Episcopal Church, recently from Troy, N. Y., has announced publicly that he will refuse to solemnize the re-marriage of any divorced person, regardless of the cause of divorce. Rev. Dr. John Gray of the Advent Protestant Episcopal Church has also taken the same stand. Dr. Leech gives as his reason for such stand, and believes the ministry is generally in accord with him, that marriage is a divine institution, and the sacred obligation cannot be assumed by any human being but once. The Bible expressly enjoins that no man shall put asunder what God has joined together; hence if the civil authorities assume the power to sever the bonds of wedlock let them also assume the burden of sealing subsequent bonds.—S. F. Call.

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NOT FOR LEPROSY

Hon. E. Muller Investigates Koch's Lymph

And Reports to the Minister of the Interior.

Findings of the Authorities do not Consider the Lymph a Specific for Leprosy.

The following letter has been received by the Minister of the Interior from Hon. E. Muller, member of the Hawaiian House of Nobles, who is in Germany:

His Excellency Chas. N. Spencer, H. H. M.'s Minister of Interior, Honolulu.

Sir:—Since the publication of Professor Koch's discovery a great deal has been said and written for and against it, and no doubt many reports about it have found their way to the Hawaiian Islands.

Feeling certain that it will be of great interest to Hawaii, I have made it my business to obtain from leading physicians some reliable information regarding it, and I herewith beg to submit to Your Excellency what I have been able to learn.

My informants all agree, that theoretically and practically it is a great step forward in the knowledge of infectious diseases and their possible cure by introducing organic chemical compounds, which are in some way connected with the different chemical and biological changes set up in a living body by such diseases.

The leading principle of Koch's discovery is that a glycerine extract of cultures of tubercle bacillus has the power of destroying tuberculous tissue, especially such of old standing. It requires but extremely minute quantities of the extract to set up this reaction where old tubercular tissue is present, is does, however, not set up this local reaction in any other tissue but tuberculous.

Introduced in large quantities into a healthy body, or into a body suffering from other diseases than tuberculosis, it likewise produces a feverish reaction, but this fever is simply due to the general action of the poison on the system, and not, like in tuberculosis proper, to absorption of tissue mortified by the specific action of the remedy.

This may account for the reports of reaction in other diseases than tuberculosis, more especially in leprosy.

Leprosy being closely akin to tuberculosis, it was quite natural to try Koch's remedy on leprosy patients. Thus far all reports as to a successful reaction setting in can be explained in the above way.

Even in those cases where such feverish reaction has set in the curative effects have been very slight, if any, and no greater than a spontaneous feverish attack in leprosy will sometimes bring about. In a large number of cases of leprosy not even a feverish reaction has followed the application of Koch's remedy, which positively shows that it has no real specific influence on this disease.

All my informants agree that Koch's remedy does not even benefit all cases of tuberculosis; in fact there are cases which are decidedly aggravated by its application. It will take months and years of patient study and observation to find out the exact limits of its beneficial influence and the correct indications for its use.

For comparison, in other infectious diseases, the microbes of which are known and can be cultivated outside of the human body, will have to be treated by reagents prepared in a similar manner as Koch's tubercle lymph. Amongst these diseases it will, of course, be most natural to turn renewed attention to leprosy from this point of view; but the difficulties which have beset this work are the same which have baffled science so far regarding leprosy, viz., that it has hitherto been found impossible to cultivate the bacillus of leprosy, as a pure culture. Time and continued study may ultimately achieve this desired object, and more especially so since the newly formed committee of the British National Leprosy Fund are sure to set the best men, in the very best laboratories, at this task, where they can carry on their work quietly and unbiased by any undue pressure.

There seems no question that even the full solution of the tubercle problem would have been achieved in a more satisfactory way, if it had not emerged rather too soon from the hand of its great discoverer.

The burst of excitement which immediately followed the publication of the discovery was too intense that it should not have been followed by a certain amount of disappointment; still the importance of the discovery will never be lost and the outlook it has opened into the working of parasites in the body will remain a mighty impetus to scientists to work in this direction. The nature of such a work forbids undue haste. As there are plenty of cases of leprosy in Europe and America, and as work in the above direction is being carried on extensively in many centres of medical science, there appears to be reasonable hope that our suffering Hawaiian countrymen will sooner or later be benefited by the results of such work. For the present, however, it must not be forgotten that Koch's lymph is not intended for leprosy.

imagine because the Aermotor is a new thing on these islands that it is not a good machine. The antique wood affair was new once and people looked upon it as being a fairly good mill but this is an age of improvements and new ideas are nearly always better than old ones.

There are two of these trees in the yard of Father Bailey's house. He set them out some years ago. No special care has been taken of them. They are sufficiently productive to afford ground for the hope that chocolate culture may some day be undertaken successfully in these islands.

A tourist told Mr. Westervelt that these trees were equal to any he had seen in South America. The wood is soft and spongy, almost identical with that of the linden, or American basswood.

It seems we are really to have a wharf. Of course we don't need the road to Paha, nor the coffee to Bouganville. When the road begins to be large enough to pick in Puna so that we can ship it direct to California then will be the time to talk about a road. People here, even cranks, are looking forward to the time when all lands that are suitable for coffee will be in demand and this island will have a greater name. We may then think of seedling and having a cabinet of our own choosing and not a crank in it. But cranks are useful sometimes. The prohibitionist is called a crank, as are also the missionaries. A man who has a hobby is called a crank. Reformers also have that name. Hilo is said by XX to be full of them. Would there were a few in Honolulu, where I know of but one and he is a mere youth. If he will come to Hilo the cranks will tender him the hospitality of the district and serenade him every night in the week. Our band instruments all tempered soft and play dulcet strains, and do not arouse the sleeping lion in any sweet tempered person. The two hotels, Hilo and Hitchcock, will feed him on the choicest viands, which with all the varieties of wines will cause him ever to remember his coming. XX can come with him to see how we cranks live. He can read our papers from the press—the Record and Journal. Our editors, D. Fule, A. Crank and Mr. Smarty will call on him in Wilson's wagonette with four horses and give him a ride on the splendid Volcano road built by the artist-Marlin, whom we all want to see build the balance of road. We all love Hilo with good reason. Very few tropical places so free from mosquitoes and so healthy. So we talk strongly and lovingly. One of our cranks is absent and we are lonely.

Miss Severance was agreeably surprised a few evenings since by many of her friends, who got up a party for her pleasure, and they had a good time, as is usually the case on such occasions.

Another surprise. Mrs. J. P. Sisson lately came home from a seven months visit to California in splendid health. She was delighted to receive an immense number of her friends on the evening of the 16th.

Arrived at Hilo March 10, big Lurline, Capt. Wm. Matson, 22 days from San Francisco. Passengers—Mrs. J. P. Sisson, Mr. Carpenter, Rained every day but one during passage; head winds.

NEW BRIDGES ON OAHU. Mr. H. McIntosh, Superintendent of Public Works, went to the other side of the island on Monday, returning Wednesday morning. His object was to decide on the Kanoeha and Waimea bridges, for which appropriations were made by the Legislature.

The Superintendent is having a bridge made for Kanoeha, consisting of two spans of 55 feet each. For Waimea a trestle bridge on piles, similar to that at Waikiki, will be built, as the appropriation of \$5000 would not be enough for a bridge of spans. The bridge will be 400 feet long.

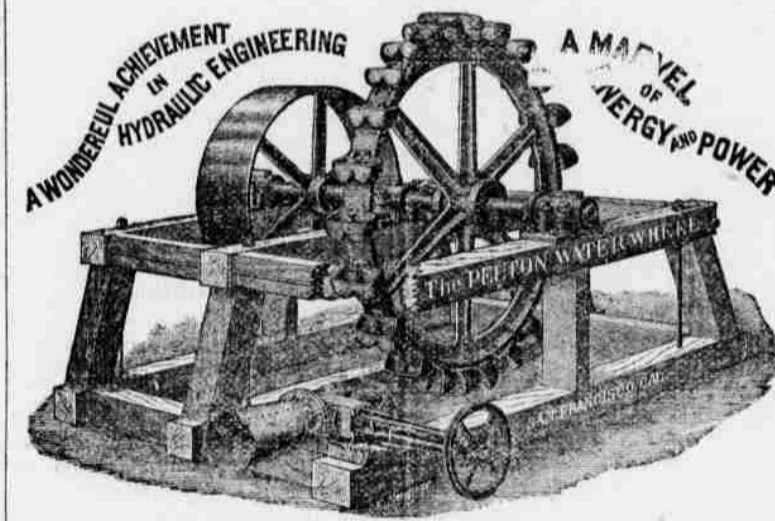
