New Steamship Route.
 Some weeks ago the BULLETIN obtained, and reproduced, information from a passenger just arrived from the South Seas, that the French government had granted terms to the Oceanic and Union joint steamship line, whereby its steamers would call at Tahiti instead of Samoa in the near future. No later information has been received, unless the following from the San Francisco Chronicle is a corroboration of that report. It will be noticed that the Chronicle only takes for granted, without definite knowledge, that the new route will be operated by the great French steamship line named. It is quite possible, however, that the notice received at Tahiti refers to the arrangement previously announced by the BULLETIN. The Chronicle's news and comment are given below:
 "The vice-president of the Paapeete Chamber of Commerce has received notice from the Ministry of Commerce at Paris that the project for a line of French mail steamers to run between Sydney, Australia, and San Francisco, touching at Noumea, New Caledonia, Tahiti and the Marquesas islands, has been approved by the French Government and that the details have been laid before the Chamber of Deputies for their sanction.
 "The great French steamship company, the Messageries Maritimes, will doubtless operate the line, and the route will thus become an alternate one to the existing line now running from this port to Australia."

Citizen's Attention.
 These are days of considerable anxiety and perplexity to all who have possessions or other interests in the Republic of Hawaii, and it is time that our citizens came to a mutual understanding on several important issues. The prospects for Annexation appear at present vague and indistinct, and our destiny cannot be foretold with certainty. PRESIDENT MCKINLEY.

Before Honolulu had done rubbing its eyes this morning William McKinley—barring the uncertainties of life—would have been inaugurated as the twenty-fifth President of the United States of America. It would be rash, especially for outsiders, to make predictions as to the record Mr. McKinley will leave behind him four years hence. Some idea of his lines of policy may be formed, however, from his career as a legislator and a State governor. There were circumstances about his election that ought to modify his application of doctrines with which he was identified most prominently. Although he has long been known as the apostle of high protection, nothing is more certain than that he was not elected on any such account. It was rather in spite of his prominence in that regard. Mr. McKinley would probably have been badly beaten if it were not for the stampeding of conservative men out of the Democratic party by the startling financial theories on which Mr. Bryan sought election. It is likely that the new administration will attempt no more with the tariff than to doctor it up a little bit, with an eye more to increasing the revenue than to making protection in general higher than it is now. When a candidate Mr. McKinley was confronted with former utterances of his own on the currency question, which made him appear not altogether "sound," as the Scotch sectaries express themselves. Sound or not, though, there is little fear that President McKinley will not be straight enough on that question, for the expression of the national voice thereon, while electing him, was loud enough to reverberate through four good years at least. Mr. McKinley as a legislator and a governor was strong and steady rather than brilliant, and the same may be expected of him as the chief magistrate of the nation. Nobody has been heard to suggest anything but a conservative foreign policy from him. It is the nature of the man, and should the country get into undesirable foreign complications it would be surprising if the blame were his. What Hawaii may get from the new administration would be of tremendous interest for the BULLETIN readers to get a horoscope of this afternoon. When Mr. McKinley's mind was attempted to be sounded on this question failure was the result. He simply became a Sphinx. There is no reason to doubt that the new President will be friendly toward this little sister republic, and ground of hope is not wanting that he may have in mind its adoption into the American commonwealth. He must certainly have brought his practical mind to bear with much deliberation upon the Hawaiian question.

It is proposed in California to pass a law directing the professor of agriculture of the University of California to begin experiments in the inoculation of disease among the animal and insect pests of the State, with a view to the spread of contagious diseases among them and their gradual extermination thereby. Professor Koebele, government entomologist of Hawaii, has begun experiments of the kind mentioned.

Judge Greene of Oakland sternly rebuked an insolvent female for describing a picture of the

Emancipation President as one of "Abe Lincoln" in an inventory of property she asked to have exempted. He ordered the title changed to "Abraham Lincoln." The Judge was right.

Cuban sympathy is warm in Washington State. At an outdoor mass meeting at Tacoma, the Premier of Spain was denounced, then the flag of Spain trailed in the mud and burned.

"OUIDA" ON IMMIGRATION.

Pleas for Illiterate Italians as Against "Youth Corrupted and Diseased by Cheap Journalism"

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.—Under date of January 30, Louise de la Ramee, the novelist, better known under her nom de plume of "Ouida," addressed the following letter to Secretary Olney relative to the immigration bill, the conference report on which will come before the Senate tomorrow: Sir: Will you pardon my addressing you concerning the bill which I see is before Congress in intent to bar immigrants who cannot read? If you exclude Italians who cannot read you will lose the best and most laborious part of the population and you will admit the trash of cities. It is not a question which cannot properly be applied to Italians, or, indeed, to any foreign people. Why should you suppose the power to spell out the crimes recorded in corrupt newspapers is any guarantee for either virtue or intelligence? In Italy the peasantry are entirely illiterate; yet they are the only class which can give immigrants of any value. I have had many men in my employ, and I have invariably found those who could not read ten times more industrious, temperate, intelligent and honest than those corrupted by the trumpery "education" of schools. I have had for twenty years an old man (who has been what is called the odd man in England), and he can be sent with fifty commissions to purchase objects detailed him only orally, and he will execute these commissions with no single error, either of oblivion or of payment. Such a man you would turn from your shores, while you would receive the youth corrupted, emasculated, diseased through cheap journalism, bad tobacco and the enforced physical idleness of the schools. I beg you to allow me to remain, obediently yours, "OUIDA."

THE INAUGURATION SUPPER.

A Philadelphia Caterer's Menu for Ten Thousand Guests.

A Washington dispatch states that Carl Essner of Philadelphia will furnish the supper at President McKinley's inaugural ball. Mr. Essner expects to serve 10,000 persons at this ball. Fully 50,000 pieces of china, 30,000 pieces of silver and 10,000 napkins will be needed for the service of the supper. The supper will cost \$1, wine extra. Here is the menu:

- Raw oysters in ice. Consomme in cups.
- Broiled oysters. Oysters a la poulette.
- Chicken cutlets. Sweetbread patties.
- Terrapin.
- Chicken salad. Lobster salad. Crab salad.
- Tongue. Smoked ham.
- Game pattie. Baked turkey.
- Pate de foie gras.
- Assorted sandwiches.
- Lemon ices. Roman punch.
- Vanilla and chocolate ice cream.
- Fruit. Assorted cakes. Coffee.

This menu was considered the best of twenty-one that were submitted by competing caterers from New York, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Washington, Cincinnati and Chicago.

Bill to Destroy Captured Opium.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 16.—A bill passed by the House today, granting authority to sell opium seized by collectors on the Pacific Coast, has been amended by the Senate Committee on Finance and a provision substituted, which compels revenue officers to destroy the opium whenever captured.

NEWS OF WHARF AND WAVE

ITEMS OF INTEREST CAPTURED THIS DAY.

Sealing Schooner in Distress—Barkentine Irngard Outward Bound—Along the City Front.

The British ship Semantha is loading Ewa sugar at the Railroad wharf.

The Kaala leaves at 4 p m for Kahuku and the Waialeale the same hour for Lahaina.

Tomorrow, high tide large 4:30 a m; high tide small 5:30 a m; low tide large 10:50 a m; low tide small 11:28 p m.

Mr Crowley, formerly chief mate on the missionary vessel Morning Star, came from the Coast in the steamer Helene.

Mr Morton of the Appraiser's department is acting as Port Surveyor while Mr Geo Stratemeyer is at Quarantine Island.

The American bark S C Allen began loading sugar for San Francisco today. She has been lying in this port for many weeks.

Captain Louis Everett has returned to the Kinau as first officer. Mr McDonald, formerly mate of the Hawaii, taking command of the Lehua.

A large amount of sugar and bananas awaits the S S Zealandia at the Pacific Mail wharf. The liner is now due from the Colonies on her way to the Coast.

The whaling vessel reported yesterday was the John Winthrop. The skipper was ashore to get mail brought by the S S Australia and to try to sell some oil.

This forenoon, the barkentine Irngard departed for San Francisco. Her cargo was as follows: 3396 bags sugar shipped by F A Schaefer & Co, 5400 bags by T H Davies & Co, 5724 bags by C Brewer & Co, and 4200 bags by Castle & Cooke. Total value of sugar: \$89,736.08.

There has been more or less trouble aboard the American ship May Flint since her arrival at this port, between the officers and sailors. Yesterday several seamen assaulted the first mate, using him rather roughly to say the least.

One of the fellows was arrested and landed in jail. Last night two men deserted, swimming up to Oceanic dock. They were "pulled in" by the police uptown this morning. For about a week past, several police have been stationed aboard the big vessel to keep the crew straight, and there will likely be need of reinforcements before the ship is ready to sail, as the "lars" are surely bent on making as much trouble as they can.

Though it is possible the officers are partly to blame for the row, it is well known that most seamen have an aversion for a trip round Cape Horn.

Schooner Agnes Macdonald

Yesterday afternoon the British sealing schooner Agnes Macdonald, hailing from Victoria, B. C., arrived at our port. Her genial skipper, Captain Cutler, reports some bad luck. He was 44 days from Victoria on arrival here.

About 600 miles off the American coast a great many seals were seen, but the weather was so very bad that the boats were not lowered. Fourteen days ago, the schooner sailed by these islands, bound for the Japan sealing waters. In Lat 21° N and Long 170° W the rudder carried away and other damage was done during stormy weather.

With the broken rudder a jury rudder was rigged, the anchor chains being used to operate it with. The Macdonald's nose was then headed for Honolulu.

While the vessel lay alongside the schooner Jessie Minor at Brewer's wharf this morning, a small army of customs officers made a thorough search for "dope," but got vary a small.

The Agnes Macdonald was built at Shelburne, N S, from a model of Burgess, the well known designer. She has the lines of a first class yacht, and looks like "a flyer." Her skipper says she can reel off fifteen knots in favorable weather. The usual sealing outfit, including six bogs, is carried. The crew numbers 25 men all told. Some of the best hunters in the Pacific are among the vessel's crew.

Captain Cutler is a "blue nose" or Nova Scotian, and has found a number of old acquaintances in this city. The schooner will be

hailed on the Marine Railway for repairs, after which she will continue her voyage.

In an interview in the Call, Colonel McLean is quoted as saying: "There is little immediate need now for the Hawaiian soldiery, as the old hostile feeling among the natives has abated and annexation to the United States is generally the most hoped-for and talked-of movement."
