THE NATURALIZATION PROBLEM SOLVED.

The number of inquiries concerning, and comments upon the probable result of taking the proposed oath to support the Constitution, as regards the existing citizenship of persons taking the oath, has shown that a deep interest pervades the community upon this question, promising well for the participation of the mass of foreigners in the forthcoming elections. But there are many who would probably decline to so participate while the probable effect upon their existing citizenship, of taking the preliminary oath, remained in doubt. There are hundreds of excellent men in Honolulu and the out districts, whose anxiety to participate in the coming election, and thus help sustain the new order of things, is second only to their desire to preserve, unimpaired, their rights as subjects or citizens of their home governments.

The degree of concern felt and expressed upon this point was fully anticipated by the framers of the new Constitution, whose purpose it was to impose no oath or other obligation that would interfere with existing rights of allegiance, and the result is that such was not only the purpose, but the understanding of the Cabinet upon this subject, and that this view has been already officially expressed in reply to an inquiry by the representative of a foreign State, accredited to this Kingdom.

But not all that has been done and said has been sufficient to entirely allay the apprehension existing upon this question, as some worthy gentlemen conjured up imaginary dangers to flow from voluntarily and expressly assuming an obligation that already existed, and always exists, namely, to support the Constitution and laws of the country in which they dwell.

In view of these doubts and apprehensions, it is peculiarly fortunate, not only to the Government, but to the foreign citizens here resident, that the form of oath permitted by the Constitution, and prescribed by the Cabinet, is such as to entirely relieve the popular anxiety upon this score. By Article 80 of the Constitution the Cabinet are empowered to make all rules and regulations for the administration of the oath in reference, and for the holding of elections, pending the passage, by the Legislature, of appropriate laws for that purpose. We are in a position to state that, after a period of most arduous labor on the part of the Cabinet, assisted by several of our most competent residents, those rules and regulations are completed and are now in type. The form of oath to support the Constitution, which has been adopted, is as follows:—

"I, _____, aged _____, a native of _____, residing on _____ street, in ward No. _____, in the city and District of Honolulu, do solemnly swear, in the presence of Almighty God, that I will support the Constitution of the Hawaiian Kingdom, promulgated and proclaimed on the 7th day of July, 1887, and the laws of said Kingdom, not hereby renouncing, but expressly reserving all allegiance and citizenship now owing or held by me."

The forms differ slightly to suit the different localities. It will thus be seen that the only effect of the oath is to assist in qualifying the person taking it, to make his voice heard in the government of himself and others, and in the disbursement of the taxes which he

pays, and inasmuch as the renunciation of all allegiance (called in law, expatriation) is a matter of fact, resting upon the act, and supported by the intent of the person so renouncing, it is a happy feature that the oath here prescribed does not leave such intent to implication, but expressly declares that no intent to so abjure allegiance exists on the part of the person taking the oath. With the last quoted clause inserted, no further doubt is possible.

An order appears elsewhere for every member of Co. A. of the Rifles to report at the armory this evening, in fatigue uniform and side arms.

Alex. Fraser, a bar tender at the Empire Saloon, had his arm dislocated yesterday by falling from a horse. Dr. McWayne set the bones, leaving the sufferer as comfortable as possible.

A report of the Hawaiian Rifle Association's semi-annual meeting on Saturday is deferred for want of space. The score book shows some of the crack shots having made bad breaks.

On Saturday, a Chinaman was sentenced for maintaining a nuisance. There will be another case come into court if the stench arising from the premises on Fort street near Kukui, is not done away with.

Complaint has been made to this paper of a bad smell from fifth at the "Narrow Gauge," Fort street. This court of inquiry would therefore commit the alleged offending locality to the Board of Health for trial.

Hon. P. Neumann, attorney for the bark Cerastes, on Saturday perfected the appeal against the decision of the Chief Justice in the admiralty suit for damages brought by Messrs. Geo. W. Macfarlane & Co. against that vessel.

Mr. Henry Smith, the Secretary of the Fire Department, is busy in off hours from Supreme Court clerical duties, in issuing certificates of membership to firemen who present him with certificates of their equipment as members of the different companies.

The committee appointed by acting Chief Wilson of the Fire Department to examine into and report on the membership of the different companies in the department, in pursuance of a rule passed by the last meeting of the Board, met Saturday, but adjourned until to-morrow night.

Mr. Henry Smith, Secretary of the Fire Department, gives notice to firemen regarding the opportunity remaining to them for perfecting their claim to exemption from personal taxation. They must report themselves during the month of July before Capt. Ross, the Assessor, or they cannot be exempted according to law.

Waiting first but in vain for the official notice to appear, this paper has hitherto overlooked the appointment of Mr. Alatau T. Atkinson as Inspector-General of Schools, which was made several days ago. An accomplished scholar, an experienced teacher, and a man of recognized judgment, Mr. Atkinson is likely to make a good record in the very important position. He is well known as Principal of St. Alban's College and editor of the Gazette.

The Y. M. C. A. hall was completely filled last Saturday evening with an expectant audience. The programme was the most interesting given by the Blue Ribbon League, and reflected favorably on the energy and diplomacy of Mr. Scrimgeour, who managed to get so much talent. Mr. Mather's appearance was received with a round of applause. He delivered several selections from Shakespeare, being accorded an encore. The jolly tars proved entertaining.

By a visit amongst the prominent Chinese merchants in Honolulu, it was learned that the mass meeting recently held on Fort street was without their support. If any movement was made by them it would be wholly an independent one. They are not desirous of the voting privilege as reported. Although considering it an injustice to withhold the franchise from them alone, if they cannot get the right by petition, the only way left was to submit to the law, as they had no intention of revolting against it.

Music in Honor of the Queen.

Mr. Chas. Michiels has been authorized by His Majesty King Kalakaua to compose a grand valse, entitled, "E Kipa Aloha," in honor of Her Majesty Queen Kapiolani. This piece of music has been placed in the hands of Mr. H. Berger, who will execute it on the happy return of our beloved Queen.

Fort Street School.

The Fort Street School held its closing exercises last Friday morning. Mr. M. M. Scott, the Principal, at the opening, in a few remarks, stated that the Board of Education had thought it judicious to leave the teachers decide what the examinations should be, and how held. The result was a higher standing and better work throughout than ever heretofore attained. He did not award prizes, as he considered the custom did not lead to the results expected. There was one regret he felt at the arrival of this day, and that was the leaving of some of his highest scholars, who had finished their studies. He should miss them, but he felt assured that if they continued in the same line of application and good conduct, when they are out of school as they did while in his class, happiness would certainly be theirs. Long as he has been teaching he never had met with more reliable and trustworthy pupils as there are in the Fort Street School. The following programme was then entered into by the opening choruses, Mr. Berger accompanying on the piano. The next number was a composition on "Evangelism," by Bessie Afong, the rendition being good; then singing by school; declamation, "Old Carlo, Jane and I," by Marion Scott, a little too whose self-possession immediately made her a favorite; singing, by classes; declamation, "Puzzled: Whose boy am I?" by Master Jamie King, the piece being highly amusing, so that Master Jamie received his share of applause; recitation, "Creeds of the Bells," by seven of the pupils, eliciting well-deserved recognition; composition on "Macbeth," by Mary Loftgren, a class study written from memory, showing a retentive capacity and much application; declamations—"Partnership," by Lida Camara, "Daisy and I," by Matilda Lillis, and "Kaiana," by Robie Dexter, all well spoken and deserving of praise; singing by school; composition, "George Eliot," by Agnes Walkner, and another "A View from a Boat," giving a vivid description of Waikiki and the different valleys as seen from a raft near the baths, by Alice Afong, like all their predecessors, very well written and rendered. "A Boy's Best Friend," sung by Master Willie Berger, delighted the audience by its sweet and correct delivery, and as an encore he sang "The Whip-poor-will's Song."

Although not on the programme Mr. Scott called on Arthur Wall for a piano solo, which was responded to with the variations of "Home Sweet Home." Mr. Scott remarked that he could rely upon the Wall pupils, as they were always prepared to contribute something towards entertainment. The Hon. C. R. Bishop addressed a few remarks, then introduced the Rev. Dr. Beckwith, who, thirty-six years ago, started a school close to where the Royal School building is. He also made several remarks. The day's entertainment closed by singing the National Hymn.

Through an oversight a declamation, "Truth," by Lizzie Gurney, was omitted, a fact to be much regretted. Mr. Scott stating it to be one of the best numbers on the programme. Too much praise cannot be given to Mr. Berger on his success with the school, making them all songsters. The singing was ahead of any yet given by the schools. Mr. Scott and his assistant teachers should also be congratulated upon the fine results of their labors during the last term, a hard earned and well deserved reward.

The closing exercises of the Lihue English school took place on Thursday. The programme comprised songs, recitations, and exemplifications of school work. A large crowd of spectators was present, and all seemed to be deeply interested in the doings of the young people. About 150 pupils were in attendance. The exercises closed with Hawaii Pono (English version) sung by the whole school, mustered in "Macedonian phalanx" on the platform.

Kauai Notes.

The Rev. J. B. Hanaike, native pastor, and a clerical friend present with him, addressed the school in Hawaiian, urging the importance of securing the key of knowledge and making the best use of it. The "hoike" of the native school was held in the English school building on Friday, exercises and spectators and all being wholly Hawaiian.

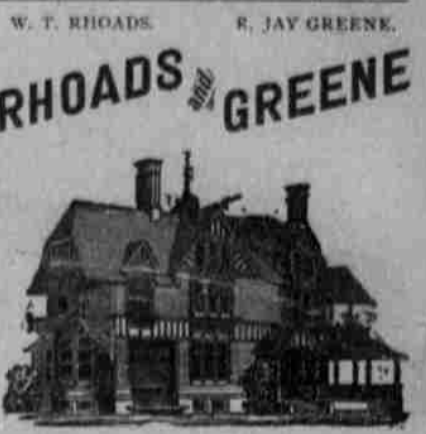

THE NATURALIZATION PROBLEM SOLVED.

The number of inquiries concerning, and comments upon the probable result of taking the proposed oath to support the Constitution, as regards the existing citizenship of persons taking the oath, has shown that a deep interest pervades the community upon this question, promising well for the participation of the mass of foreigners in the forthcoming elections.

The degree of concern felt and expressed upon this point was fully anticipated by the framers of the new Constitution, whose purpose it was to impose no oath or other obligation that would interfere with existing rights of allegiance.

But not all that has been done and said has been sufficient to entirely allay the apprehension existing upon this question, as some worthy gentlemen conjured up imaginary dangers to flow from voluntarily and expressly assuming an obligation that already existed, and always exists, namely, to support the Constitution and laws of the country in which they dwell.

In view of these doubts and apprehensions, it is peculiarly fortunate, not only to the Government, but to the foreign citizens here resident, that the form of oath permitted by the Constitution, and prescribed by the Cabinet, is such as to entirely relieve the popular anxiety upon this score.

"I, _____, aged _____, a native of _____, residing on _____ street, in ward No. _____, in the city and District of Honolulu, do solemnly swear, in the presence of Almighty God, that I will support the Constitution of the Hawaiian Kingdom, promulgated and proclaimed on the 7th day of July, 1887, and the laws of said Kingdom, not hereby renouncing, but expressly reserving all allegiance and citizenship now owing or held by me."

The forms differ slightly to suit the different localities. It will thus be seen that the only effect of the oath is to assist in qualifying the person taking it, to make his voice heard in the government of himself and others, and in the disbursement of the taxes which he

pays, and inasmuch as the renunciation of all allegiance (called in law, expatriation) is a matter of fact, resting upon the act, and supported by the intent of the person so renouncing, it is a happy feature that the oath here prescribed does not leave such intent to implication, but expressly declares that no intent to so abjure allegiance exists on the part of the person taking the oath.

THE GREAT SPHYNX OF GHIZEH.

The Most Astonishing Work Which Past Ages Have Requested Us. M. Renan publishes an earnest appeal on behalf of the excavations undertaken in Egypt by M. Maspero. The special object for which funds are just now needed is to clear away the sand which half buries the great Sphinx of Ghizeh. M. Renan says:

"The clearing of the great Sphinx was begun two months ago. Up to the present time the ordinary resources of the Boulak museum have sufficed for the work, which might be completed in sixty days if money did not fail. About 20,000 francs only are wanted. The appeal for the Longson excavations, which were addressed two years ago to the intellectual public was so fruitful that we are encouraged once more to ask the true connoisseurs in ancient things to contribute to one of the works, the most imperiously demanded by the present condition of Egyptology."

"The great sphinx of Ghizeh, at two stems from the pyramids, is, in my opinion, the most astonishing work of the hand of man which past ages have bequeathed to us. It is an immense bed of carved rock, about seventy metres in length. The light of the monstrous edifice, if it were cleared, would exceed that of the highest houses. No fashionable monument, either in the rest of Europe or the rest of the world, can be compared to this strange idol, the vestige of a stage of humanity which baffles all our ideas. The impression which such a spectacle must have produced on imaginative races, and who were dominated by the senses, may be understood from that experienced by the Egyptians of the present day when standing before that enormous head, emerging from the sand, and casting across the desert its and look. The Arab at this sight flies terrified, either throwing a stone or firing a gun at the strange being."

"The temple opposite the sphinx, if it is a temple, has also a character of its own. This fantastic construction resembles less the other temples of Egypt than the Pantheon resembles Notre Dame. But all this ensemble, which is unique in the world, must be of the remotest antiquity is indisputable, since the strata found there are those of king Chepron, thus taking us back to ages which, everywhere but in Egypt, would be called fabulous."

Mr. Renan, in concluding his appeal, points out that to lay bare the Sphinx will be to restore to the light of day the most ancient work which bears the trace of human thought, and he anticipates that "the descent which it will afford into a world now more than 6,000 years old will push still further back the limits of a historic past that seems to fly with each step taken to reach it."

Let Us Get to Our Journey's End.

"One of the kind wishes expressed for me is a long life. Let anything be asked for me except that. Let us live hard, work hard, go a good pace, get to our journey's end as soon as possible—then let the post-horse get his shoulder out of the collar. I have lived long enough to feel, like the old post-horse, very thankful that his end draws near. Long life is the last thing that I desire. It may be that as one grows older one acquires more and more the consciousness of the difference between what ought to be done and what can be done, and sits down more quietly when one gets the wrong side of 50 to let others start up and do for us things we can not do for ourselves. But it is the highest pleasure a man can have, who has (to his own exceeding comfort) turned down the hill at last, to believe that younger spirits will rise up after him and catch the lamp of truth—as in the old lamp-bearing race of Greece—out of his hand before it expires, and carry it on to the goal with swifter and more even steps."

Oil as a Preservative of Wood.

Wagon makers or repairers can save their stock from worms by oiling with linseed oil. Single trees, doubletrees, neck-yokes, spokes and cross bars that are of white hickory, and are kept in stock for a year or more, will be eaten by worms if not kept in a dark place or otherwise protected. Coal and kerosene oil are good also, and the expense of applying is but little. Linseed oil is preferable, as it acts to some extent as a wood filler, filling the pores and thus aiding the painting which follows in its proper place.—The Wheelwright.

Long-Lived Widows of Veterans.

The longevity of women who are fortunate enough to marry soldiers is shown in the fact that our pension rolls bear the names of about 20,000 widows of the veterans of 1812. The brides of 74 years ago are nearly centenarians now, and the number of them quite surpasses belief.—Chicago Herald.

What Is Said of Tea.

Dr. Burney Yeo, of London, reports the curious observation that there are persons who usually drink tea without injury, but in whom, when in a depressed mental condition, it occasions indigestion and palpitation of the heart.—Detroit Free Press.

The Debris of Flood Rock.

Dredging boats are now taking away 2,000 tons per week of the debris of Flood Rock. Dynamite surface blasts are used to break up the boulders left by the submarine mine.—New York Letter.
