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AUSTRALASIAN NEWS ITEMS.

(Per Steamship Zealandia.)

In addressing his constituents at St. Leonard's, Jan. 30th, Sir Henry Parkes met with a most enthusiastic reception.

The Victorian Government have taken steps for the appointment in London of an influential committee in connection with the Melbourne Centennial Exhibition.

A conference took place January 28th, between Mr. Gillies, Sir W. Griffiths, Premier of Queensland, and Mr. John Douglas, High Commissioner of New Guinea.

The condemned man Caffrey and Penn, have not yet been visited by their relatives.

The N. Z. Herald correspondent writes from the Thames goldfields:—I am pleased to be able to record that the new year opens with a brighter outlook in some of our mines.

New South Wales Parliament has been dissolved. Sir H. Parkes has issued an electoral address.

The Great Barrier Murders, Penn and Caffrey, have confessed their crime.

The Mount Rennie convicts were executed at Darlinghurst gaol on 7th Jan. About 150 persons were present.

The Queensland revenue for the past quarter was £262,713, being a decrease of £21,471 compared with the corresponding quarter of last year.

The new steamer Ormuz, belonging to the Orient Co., in her trial trips averaged nearly 18 knots.

THE QUEENSLAND FLOODS.

A BOAT SWAMPED—TWO LIVES LOST.

Brisbane, January 25th.—The police rescued hundreds of persons who were shut up by the floods, and did so despite the darkness and heavy gale blowing.

Several people are still missing. Communication with the suburbs is now chiefly by boats across the flood waters.

During the gale two steamers broke from their moorings. One went ashore at Warwick.

The river rose thirty feet, and there are four feet of water in the Government Offices.

Thousands of sheep have been drowned on the Canning Downs, Toolburra, and other stations.

Messrs. Howard, Smith & Son's S. S. Barrabool was washed ashore in the Brisbane River to-day.

A boat which was lowered from the vessel was swamped, and two of the occupants were drowned.

A WEALTHY JOCKEY CLUB.

By way of giving a little stimulus to the Hawaiian Jockey Club, the following figures are quoted from the N. Z. Herald:—The balance-sheet submitted at the annual meeting of the Australian Jockey Club showed that there was a balance to the credit of the profit and loss account at the end of the year of £38,119 7s 3d, as against £30,355 17s 11d on December, 1885.

The property covered by said Mortgage is:—The Lease of that certain piece of Land situate at Kahului, Koolau, Oahu, whereon is situated the Rice Mill belonging to Mortgages and described in a Lease from Ah Yau & Co. to Coache & Abing, dated September 9, 1880, for 15 years, and recorded in Reg. of Deeds in Book 65, on pages 366-377, and also all Buildings, Machinery, and appurtenances hereon situate and also 24 Head of Working Oxen, 2 Ox Carts, 1 Paddy Warehouse, storing capacity 400 tons, 1 Dwelling House, 1 small Warehouse at Kahului beach, 3 Horses.

The Mill is one of the very best on the Islands, and cleans 50 bags A No. 1 Rice in twelve hours, and is run by Waterpower in first class order; it was erected about 6 years ago at a cost of \$12,000. The ground rent for the Mill-site and Waterpower is \$200 per annum.

2nd—One undivided one fourth interest in the Waihole Rice Plantation known as Wing Cheong Fat Company, consisting of 10 leaseholds more or less and having 35 acres of Rice land more or less and being interest and leases and leasehold interest, described in Schedule C in said mortgage, also two Houses, one Rice Floor, 7 Horses, 8 working Oxen, 3 Plovers and utensils requisite for plantation. Mr. Osman Day lectures on Napoleon Bonaparte in the Club House dining room this evening.

The O. S. S. Mariposa, from Auckland (Jan 3), arrived at Sydney on the evening of the 22nd.

Our thanks are due to Purser Anderson, of S. S. Zealandia, for late files of New Zealand papers.

From Hawaii it is reported 74 acres of cane on the Wainaku Plantation, yielded 80 tons of sugar.

By a coincidence, the sister ships, Australia and Zealandia, were in the port of Honolulu together this day.

The usual temperance meeting, this evening, in Fowler's yard, under the auspices of the temperance committee of the Y. M. C. A.

Sheridan Sleight, an eminent English barrister who visited this country some years ago and remained here several weeks, is dead.

Mr. Booth would like to meet all the men who have signed the pledge during his mission, in the Y. M. C. A. Hall at 7:30, this evening.

A SALUTE was fired from the shore battery this noon in honor of the 13th anniversary of the accession of His Majesty the King to the Throne of Hawaii.

Mr. and Mrs. Arkman, Rev. F. O. Ellis and wife, T. S. Lea and G. A. M. Gordon, through passengers by the S. S. Zealandia, will remain here until the next steamer.

The proposed treaty between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands, ceding Pearl Harbor as a naval coaling station, was considered of sufficient importance to be telegraphed to New Zealand.

The proprietors of the "New Zealand Herald" have enlarged the "Herald," by making an addition of eight columns each day, and twelve columns on Saturday.

The S. S. Zealandia, after leaving Sydney for Auckland, ran aground in the harbor, in the vicinity of the rocks known as the Sow and Pigs.

The steamer Ewa's way, inside the reef to Ewa, being dotted with rocks, that threaten damage to the vessel, Mr. Robinson has decided to have them blasted out or removed by crowbars.

Yesterday, a No. 50 pane of plate glass, which was being cut at the Honolulu Planing Mill, for a large window at Goo Kim's, broke crocked, and was rendered useless for the purpose intended.

The first intimation the people of Mahukona had of the death of H. R. H. Princess Likellike, was on the arrival of the S. S. Kinau at that port on Tuesday last.

The next steamer from Australia, the Alameda, on March the 11th, will probably bring a theatrical company here. A lucrative engagement prevented their coming by the Zealandia.

The Post Office received, by the Australia, 27 bags of papers and 3 bags of letters, a few minutes before 1 o'clock, on Wednesday last.

The mail was distributed before 6 o'clock, same day. By the kindness of Messrs. Wilder & Co., the steamer Lehua was detained till 5 o'clock, and took with her the entire mail, papers and letters, for the islands of Maui and Hawaii, consisting of 13 bags.

Messrs. Wilder & Co. also ordered the steamer to land the mails at the several way ports. By this morning's mail, the Postmaster-General received a letter from Mr. G. C. Williams, of Spreckelsville, Maui, conveying his own and the thanks of the public for his kindness and promptness in forwarding the mails, by which they received their letters and papers a week earlier than they could have had them by the regular steamer and had the chance of answering San Francisco and other foreign correspondents by the return mail, per W. G. Hall.

ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE OF THE ZEALANDIA.

The S. S. Zealandia arrived this morning from the Colonies, en route for San Francisco, and brought five passengers for this port, and had 86 cabin and 60 steerage for San Francisco. The Zealandia left for the Coast this afternoon, at 2 o'clock, taking the following passengers from Honolulu: Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Macfarlane, Miss Allie Widemann, A. E. Imrli, Dr. Hendrickson, A. H. Smith, T. K. Moore, P. C. Jones and wife, A. Ascheim, H. McIntyre, W. T. Stedman, W. M. Welch, F. Davis, H. Koch and Master Oeding.

THE RAMIE MACHINE.

The Ramie Machine now being erected by Mr. Lycau, at Hilo, was so far completed, as to be run by steam on Wednesday last, and its working was highly satisfactory. The delay in the completion of the machine was owing to the castings from San Francisco only arriving by the last steamer. It is expected that about the middle of next week the machine will be completed, when the cleaning of the ramie will be commenced, large quantities being already on hand.

Mr. Lycau reports that some difficulty is experienced in getting the natives in and around Hilo to cultivate the ramie. Olona—or native ramie, grows in abundance around Hilo, and this, the natives are willing to supply in large quantities. The Olona was put through the machine and gave satisfactory results, the fibre being admitted to be stronger than that of the ramie. A sample of the Olona, after having been put through the machine, can be seen at the BULLETIN office.

J. E. BROWN & CO'S FORT-NIGHTLY LABOR REPORT.

The supply of almost all descriptions of labor during the past fortnight has been greater than the demand, and with the exception of Chinese, laborers of all classes are disposed to go to work on lower wages.

Portuguese are available in large numbers, either for plantations in the group or at Honolulu.

Chinese. Orders for this class are filled with less ease than for other nationalities, and a feeling of independence, caused no doubt by a system of mutual assistance that exists among them, is very noticeable. The demand which has been

active, appears to be confined chiefly to cooks and domestic servants. Engineers and Mechanics. A few are seeking work, but the supply of this class is extremely limited and not to be depended upon.

Carpenters, Blacksmiths, Painters, Masons. None offering, all being employed at good wages. White Laborers. Several English and Germans are offering at a very low rate of wages, for which class there has been a slight demand for Kilauea.

The tendency of most men seeking employment is to remain, if possible, at Honolulu, plantation work being accepted only as a last resource. Still, there are many unfortunate about town who are in such reduced circumstances, that they are glad of an opportunity to take, as an applicant for work recently remarked, "anything so that there is a living in it."

The Library consists at the present time of over Five Thousand Volumes. The Reading Room is supplied with about fifty of the leading newspapers and periodicals.

A Parlor is provided for conversation and games. Terms of membership, fifty cents a month, payable quarterly in advance. No formality required in joining except signing the roll.

Strangers from foreign countries and visitors from the other Islands are welcome to the rooms at all times as guests. This association having no regular means of support except the dues of members, it is expected that residents of Honolulu who desire to avail themselves of its privileges, and all who feel interest in maintaining an institution of this kind, will put down their names and become regular contributors.

A COVETOUS FAMILY.

Denver, Jan. 21st.—James M. Patrick, a wealthy ranchman near Denver, has brought suit in the courts of St. Louis to recover his infant child who is heir to an estate of \$1,000,000, and is supposed to have been abandoned by his wife's people in order to secure the property. Patrick in 1879 married the daughter of Mr. McManus, of a very wealthy family in St. Louis, on which occasion the present to the bride was \$50,000. The couple settled in Bradley County, Tenn., where a daughter was born. In 1884 the wife's health failed and the family moved to Colorado, where Mr. Patrick purchased a cattle ranch. According to Patrick's story, in the meantime dissension rose in Mr. McManus family, in which the child figured, it being the intention of McManus to get possession of the child, secure the divorce of the mother on the plea of desertion, and keep the property. While Mr. Patrick was fixing up the ranch he sent his wife and child to Canon City, where a sister Mrs. Patrick, from St. Louis, visited them. Soon after this the husband could receive no answers to his letters or telegrams to his wife, so he went to Canon City, only to discover that his wife, child and sister-in-law had suddenly departed, leaving no word behind. He immediately went to St. Louis, where he learned his wife was at her father's house, but he was not permitted to visit her. On the 9th of October last his wife died, leaving an estate of over a \$100,000, including the present of \$50,000, which fell into the hands of Mr. McManus family. Not only did they secure this, but they so influenced the wife that she disinherited her child and left her fortune to her brother Ward McManus. The child has been taken away and cannot be found. Mr. Patrick thinks that she is confined in some asylum in Canada. He has brought suit for her recovery, and also the \$50,000 dowry. —[S. F. Bulletin.

KING HUMBERT AND THE DENTIST.

Madre Orfenigo is renowned for his dexterity in extracting teeth without causing pain. His patients are numerous, for he makes no charge. Even Pope Leo XII once called him in to pull out a molar which had severely tried his patience. Some time afterward King Humbert, whose teeth are none of the best, went out for a day's shooting near Castel Porziano, had a violent attack of toothache and was advised to consult Padre Orfenigo. But they reckoned without their host. The worthy friar still lay under the papal interdiction and refused to cross its threshold before settling the point with his conscience. Leo XIII sent word to Orfenigo that he was in duty bound to obey the dictates of humanity, and the monk performed the operation with the same forceps that he had used when he had attended the Pope. Afterward, when showing the instrument to his friends, he used to remark: "This is the missing link between the temporal and spiritual powers." —[Independence Belge.

ASSISTING YOUNG WOMEN.

New York, Jan. 19.—The formal opening of the new building of the Young Women's Christian Association at No. 7 East Fifteenth street, was held last evening. Over 3,000 invitations were issued for the occasion and the large hall was filled early. The exercises of the evening included addresses by the Rev. Drs. William M. Taylor and William R. Huntington. The new structure is of brick with terra cotta trimmings and is six stories high. It cost \$125,000, and through the liberality of Mr. Astor, Mrs. Elliott T. Shepard and others, there is no indebtedness. The sixth, fifth and fourth floors are devoted to art, arithmetic, bookkeeping, writing, modelling in clay, applied designing, machine and hand sewing, cutting and fitting, and choir music. The library is on the second floor and contains 10,000 volumes. The parlors are exceedingly attractive. The Association has been in existence for fifteen years and its work has been devoted to enabling young women to support themselves. The number of applicants has of late been some 1,500 annually.

CANDOR OF A GOWARD.

The Colonel of a New York regiment tells a story of the battle of Winchester. In the thicket of the night, when the slaughter in the Union line had become perfectly frightful, he detected a stout Irishman of his regiment curled up behind a great tree. He rode up to the delinquent and savagely reprimanded him for his cowardice. But the man, with irresistibly Hibernian drollery, responded: "Now, Colonel, dear, don't be hard with a poor fellow like me. A coward is it? Faith, I think I am; but I'd rather be called that every day in the year than to be like that poor errayer yonder." The "poor errayer yonder," to whom the Colonel's attention was directed, was the mangled corpse of a soldier whose head had been entirely demolished by a shot. 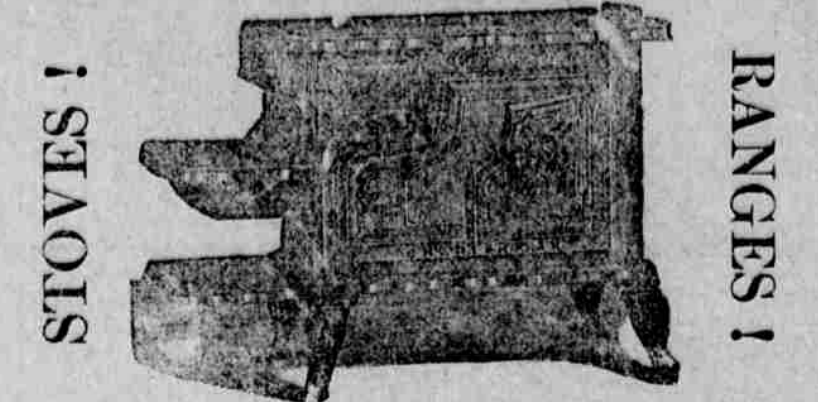

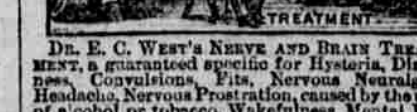
