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## HO, FOR THE MOTOR MAN!

Manager Pain Returns With Plans for Electric Road.

The Scheme Will be a Go if Concessions Can Be Secured—Particulars of the Much Mooted Deal.

Honolulu will have an electric street railway.

Manager Pain of the Hawaiian Tramways Company returned from London this morning with the plans in his pocket.

Before the project is inaugurated certain assistance will be asked of the Legislature at its approaching session. The first is that the company be treated as a new concern, or in other words that it be granted a new long time franchise dating from this year. The present franchise has about 22 years to run. In all probability a life of 50 years will be asked for the new right.

A second request will be for additional streets to connect with outlying districts of the town. The Bertonia street line will be extended around Kapiolani park and will connect with the Waikiki division at Makee Island.

"All we ask is fair treatment," said Mr. Pain this morning. "We have the money and are willing to give the people of Honolulu the best of service. Opposition to us in the past was very unfair and unreasonable. Let the Government and people regard us as friends, as we are. We will do the rest."

The Company will use power from the Hawaiian Electric Company's works. For the present the track now in service will be used. All of the large cars of the Company will be used on the electric line. The system will be a trolley arrangement, like the line of San Francisco. It is expected that the rails now down will last three years. They will then be replaced by something heavier.

Mr. Pain stated this morning that the change of the system would cost as much as the original outlay for the horse line. Better patronage is depended upon for proportionate dividends. Quicker and better service, it is believed, will insure this. Rates will not be increased. At least 200,000 more miles will be traversed by the cars in a year.

The prospect of an electric system is due to the personal efforts of Mr. Pain. He is a man of progress and development, but has been at the disadvantage of handling the money of other people. The investor looks only for dividends and hesitates a long time on expenditures for any purpose. Mr. Pain has worked hard to show the superior the increased revenues to be derived from an electric system, and is to be thanked for convincing them on the point.

Manager Pain is quite unwell. He took a severe cold in San Francisco which has clung to him ever since. Notwithstanding, he has been greatly benefited by the trip, weighing 20 pounds more than when he left. He has been away just seven months.

Mr. Pain is thanked for the following copy of a minute of a Hawaiian Tramways Company directors' meeting in London:

LONDON, Jan. 13, 1898.

At a meeting of the Directors held this day the following resolution was passed:

"That provided the Hawaiian Government grants an extension of the franchise and also further necessary concessions as to extensions, working, grading and upkeep of roadways, the Company will undertake the installation of mechanical traction in the place of the existing system."

## LATEST FROM WASHINGTON

Fifty-eight Votes Pledged Irrevocably for the Treaty.

Eight More on the Doubtful Column and Two Favorably Inclined—President Dole to Return.

The very latest news on the annexation situation at Washington is contained in private dispatches received by local firms.

One dated Washington, February 4, states that the prospect is more favorable than at any time previous and that the delay in voting has helped matters. Fifty eight votes are pledged for the treaty irrevocably, composed of 41 Republicans and 17 Democrats, Silver men and Populists. There were still eight doubtful Senators on whom influence was being brought to bear from every direction, and two others who have been all along favorably inclined but had not positively declared their position. Morrill and Thurston were the only Republican Senators adverse to the treaty and likely to remain so.

The presence of President Dole at Washington seems to have had a beneficial effect, says a private letter. He left Washington on February 7 and will take the Mariposa at San Francisco on the 23d, reaching here on March 2.

Another telegram says: Dole's visit has thus far had good effect, and we believe it will have still better effect next week. Friends determined to stand by the treaty and push it through. Delay great advantage to us. Some opponents in Senate weakened by criticism from their homes. Our friends hopeful that they can win.

It is understood that members of the Committee on Foreign Relations believe that when the vote is taken and it is found that ratification lacks but two votes, they will be forthcoming. But if they should not be, the program is to retain the treaty on the calendar and not to send it back to the President, thus still retaining two strings to the annexation bow.

Speaker Reed's opposition it is believed will not be excited to the extent of preventing a vote in the House. Gossip about adding the Cuban belligerency resolution and the Hawaiian annexation bill as riders has no foundation, except that of the imagination. These schemes are suggestions of enemies.

L. A. Thurston writes that the annexation fight makes Washington look like it does in the closing days of a political campaign. Both sides realize that the vote will be very close, one or two votes probably deciding the question. Neither side seems to know exactly where it stands, and there is a day and night pulling and hauling and attempting to score points against the opposition. Mr. Thurston says the Administration is using its powerful influence in favor of the treaty and annexationists have every reason to be hopeful.

The amendment proposed to the Annexation Treaty by Senator Bacon of Georgia is no new thing and has no importance. It is a revival of Senator Turpie's proposal that the question of annexation be referred to the Hawaiians, the acceptance of which he made a sine qua non for his support of the measure. It was rejected then by the Committee on Foreign Relations and has never been considered a possibility for a moment.

On January 28 members of the Foreign Relations Committee gave out that they saw the success of the treaty assured. Morrill was expected to refrain from voting.

## BRIGHT SIDE OF ANNEXATION

Two Sets of Estimates Make Annexation Treaty Safe.

With Republican Senators Morrill and Thurston Against, It's Hoped that Democrats Will Offset Them.

Washington, February 3.—Friends of the Hawaiian treaty are more confident as the debate on the treaty progresses, and there are no declarations of opposition from the doubtful list. The bill of the Senate made by the Evening Star puts its conclusions thus: As it stands today the friends of the treaty are counting upon the solid vote of the Republicans in the Senate with seventeen others, as follows:

Turner, Kenney, MacLauren, Hatfield, Morgan, Pettus, Kyle, Murphy, Harris, Feller, Cannon, Mantle, Stewart, Jones, Gorman, Rawlins and Mooney.

Adding Turpie this will give sixty-one votes in favor of the treaty and one or two more may be added when a vote is reached.

While this is taken by many friends of Hawaii as indicating the exact situation, other advocates of annexation cannot reach the result by the same route. As matters stand Thurston and Morrill are counted against the treaty. Thurston said he would stand by his declaration made in his utterances in Baltimore last night when he indicated his unalterable opposition to the treaty and Senator Morrill continues his opposition, though his friends say he will not go so far as the Nebraskan and vote against his party.

This would leave, on a basis of the remainder of the poll being correct, fifty-nine votes, which will carry the treaty if Morrill is silent, but there is still a doubtful list, the proportions of which no one can really tell. Senator Dole is said to have declared that his mind is open and will so continue until Senator Morgan has concluded his argument. Senator Tillman has not said that he will vote against the treaty, and friends of annexation have hopes of landing Senator Butler on their side. With this number from which to draw to fill the place of any man named who may change his mind, there is reason to believe there will be sufficient votes to carry the treaty when a vote is reached.

Senator White's proposition to have passed his resolution declaring "hands off" the island republic is not taken seriously, as it is believed there will surely be a debate upon the resolution.

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## NEWS FROM THE KLONDIKE

Honolulu Man Gets a Letter Direct from Dawson City.

Staking Gold Claims—Life in a Log Cabin—Passengers Arrangements for the Coming Spring Rush.

T. A. Young of Seattle, a man well known in Honolulu, sends a friend a long letter direct from the gold fields of Alaska, where he is now located. It is a long typewritten missive of seven pages. As it deals largely with details, only extracts are here given. Of his location Mr. Young says:

"We are well and safely settled in a log cabin, 14 by 16 feet, on the bank of the Yukon river in a suburb of Dawson City. We have Messrs. Simons and Cole of Portland with us, and have rented a cabin for six months for \$150. As yet we have done nothing to make money. It is early yet to go mining, in fact nothing is being done in the mines.

"We all got in on a stampede, as it is called here, on our way down Henderson creek and each got a 500 foot claim. Claims have since been cut down to 100 feet. I secured No. 52, and learned this morning that a half interest in No. 49 had been sold for \$500. Mine is a promising piece of property. It may mean a good deal, but may mean nothing at all. Henderson Creek is about 60 miles up the river on the right side of Stewart river.

"This is the greatest place for high prices you ever saw. Following are some of the quotations: Meat, \$1.25 a pound; flour, \$10 a small sack; beans, 50 cents a pound; sugar, 30 cents; brooms, \$1.50; fur cap, \$17; overalls, \$2. We wanted to buy a sled. An old one was offered us for \$18 and a new one for \$50. We made one for ourselves. Steel shoes cost \$4.

"We live on Government land which cost us nothing, and I believe we can sell it next fall for \$1000, if the expected rush comes. There is a stampede starting now to All Cold creek; we may get in on that also.

"Moose abound here. We killed a big one yesterday. When dressed it weighed nearly 700 pounds. It was a freezing night and I had no blanket, so I built a big bonfire and laid the hide flesh down beside it. Lying on one end I turned the other, head and all, over me. The odor of the skin was not agreeable, but it kept me warm all right."

The local recipient of this letter has another from a friend in Seattle giving some interesting particulars of the Klondike trip from that point. He says:

"I promised to write as soon as I could obtain satisfactory news. Think I now have what you want. The first Klondike vessel leaves here March 15. Rates for transportation will be as follows: Passenger, with allowance of 1000 pounds of baggage and supplies, to Dawson City, \$300. Freight in excess of 100 pounds will be 10 cents a pound or \$20 per ton. One half of charges must be paid when application for passage is made, and the balance ten days before sailing. The steamships will make about the same rates.

"I wish you could see the Klondikers in Seattle just now. It is a sight. You will have to secure passage four to six weeks ahead of the time you wish to sail."

In a list of names of Seattle men in the Klondike, furnished by Mr. Young, that of George W. Otterson does not appear. There are many people in Honolulu who doubt that that celebrity has ever visited Alaska.

**ANNEXATION RESOLUTIONS**

The Consideration of the Treaty Is Becoming More Complicated.

Senators Pettigrew and White Introduce Resolutions to Embarrass the Situation and Commence Talking Against Time.

Washington, Jan. 28. — In the Senate today Pettigrew introduced the following resolution: "Resolved, That it is contrary to the interest, policy and tradition of the people of the United States to acquire any territory so situated as to require a navy to protect it."

The object of this resolution is to take the direction of the ratification resolution out of the hands of the Foreign Relations Committee, and it may prove to be the opening wedge to a discussion of the whole subject in open session. The basis of the resolution is broad enough for the discussion of the whole subject, and it is understood to be Pettigrew's intention to enter very fully into the question of the condition of affairs in Hawaii.

On February 3 Pettigrew gave notice that he would tomorrow speak upon his resolution declaring it to be the policy of the United States not to acquire territory to defend which a navy would be required.

He anticipated, he said, that the proposed speech of the Senator from South Dakota would trench upon a matter properly being considered by the Senate in executive session. If it should so trench it would be a violation of the Senate rules, and he wanted it understood that the objection would be raised.

Pettigrew said he thought it would be time enough to object when it became evident that he was violating the Senate rules.

During the debate on the agricultural appropriation bill Culm yielded to White of California for the introduction of this joint resolution:

"Resolved, That of right it belongs wholly to the people of the Hawaiian Islands to establish and maintain their own form of government and domestic policy; that the United States ought in no wise to interfere therewith, and that any intervention in the political affairs of these islands by any other government will be regarded as an act unfriendly to the United States."

The resolution was passed by the Senate on May 31, 1894, having been reported by Turpie of the Committee on Foreign Relations. White asked that the resolution lie on the table.

On February 3 Senator White said, after introducing his resolution for non intervention in Hawaiian affairs by other powers, that he would call the resolution up the next day and ask the Senate to pass it without debate. He added that it was his opinion that our intention to defend the independence of the islands has been made sufficiently clear in the past, but that it would do no harm to reaffirm the doctrine by Congressional declaration at the present time.

Probably the most significant occurrence of the day was the fact that Senator Morrill, who has, during his entire career, been exceedingly conservative on the question of executive sessions of the Senate, took a position in favor of open sessions on the Pettigrew resolution. He gave as his reason the fact that the speeches for and against the treaty were liable to be unevenly reported with the press excluded from the session.

Mr. White did not conclude but was to continue his speech the following day.

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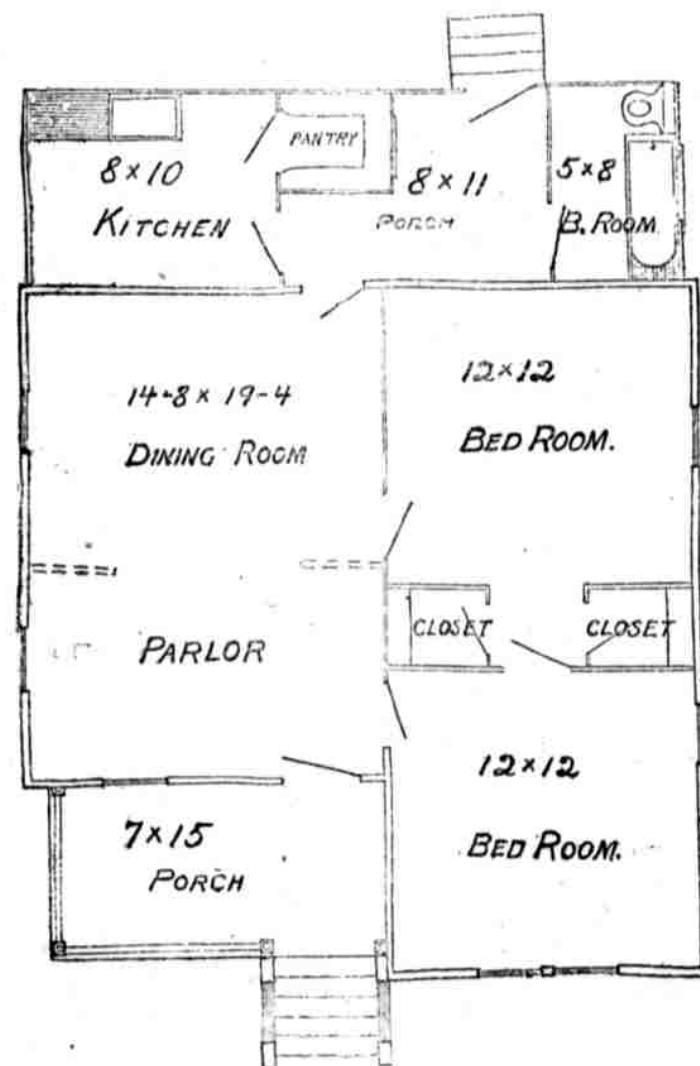

## MR. DOLE AT WASHINGTON

Received at the Depot by Secretaries Sherman and McAdee.

President McKinley's Private Secretary Calls First to Arrange for an Interview With the Hawaiian President.

President Dole arrived at Washington on January 26 at 2:10 p. m., and, in behalf of the Government, was welcomed by Secretary Sherman and Assistant Secretary Ade. The Presidential party was belated by storms along the way, and it was three hours after the schedule time that the train swung into the Baltimore and Ohio depot. A crowd of several hundred had assembled on North Capitol street, and three platoons of mounted police were on hand to act as an escort.

As the train came to a stop Mr. Sherman and Mr. Ade stepped on the rear platform, and were met by Assistant Secretary Criddle, who conducted them inside for the first greetings to President and Mrs. Dole and the party. There was a brief and informal exchange of compliments, and then the party filed out to the waiting carriages. As they alighted Secretary Sherman and President Dole, with Mrs. Dole standing between them, were photographed. Then Secretary Sherman offered his arm to Mrs. Dole and escorted her to President McKinley's carriage.

The platoons of officers wheeled about, the spirited bays of the White House stepped off at a lively gait, and the party proceeded to the Arlington, where the Hawaiian executive will be the nation's guest. In the second carriage were Minister Patch of Hawaii, Assistant Secretary Criddle and Mr. Dole's private secretary. Following this was the carriage of Assistant Secretary Ade and Dr. Day, the physician of Mr. Dole. The fourth carriage contained Major Heilandt, representing the army, and Lieutenant-Commander Phelps of the navy. There was no military display, simplicity being the order at Mr. Dole's request.

The Arlington was reached about 2:30. Secretary Sherman, with Mrs. Dole on his arm, escorted the party to their rooms and then took his official leave. Mr. Porter, private secretary to the President, accompanied by Colonel Bingham, was notified by telephone of the arrival and soon appeared, bearing the congratulations of President McKinley and requesting to be informed when it would be most convenient for the President of the Hawaiian Republic to receive him in person. It was arranged that, soon after the arrival of their baggage, President Dole would notify President McKinley of his readiness to receive him.

The apartments to which the distinguished guests were assigned are on the second floor, facing Vermont avenue and I street. The drawing room is in the corner, and next on the Vermont side are the bedroom of President and Mrs. Dole. The private dining room adjoins the drawing room on the I street front. The furnishings of the apartments are rich, but apparently there had been no effort at display. The decorations consisted almost entirely of American Beauty roses, which had been tastefully arranged on the mantels and tables.

FROM KAHUKU WITHOUT WATER.

Horse Driven to Death and His Mate Has Narrow Escape.

A \$200 horse died suddenly at the American stables, Richard-street, early last night and only by the constant attention of Dr. Shaw was its mate in a span saved. They had come from Kahuku during the day, and, it is said, were given no water during the entire drive of nearly 40 miles. On entering the stables one of the animals dropped, and died soon after. Dr. Shaw arrived in time to save the second one.

FROM THE UNITED STATES

The Mohican Ordered to Show the Flag at Samoa.

Admiral Beardslee Retired—More German Retaliation—Reception to President and Mrs. Dole at Washington.

News is confirmed that the Morgan firm has sold in London something like 6,000,000 of Reading railway general mortgage 4 per cent bonds.

The agricultural appropriation bill, carrying \$3,257,022, has passed the Senate. It contains \$2,000 for the irrigation of arid lands.

The Government will bid at the sale of the Kansas Pacific for the amount at least of the debt due the nation, which is about \$6,303,000.

President McKinley has nominated for promotion Commodore Charles S. Norton to be Rear Admiral.

The trial of Sheriff Martin and deputies for shooting strikers at Lattimer, Pa., has begun.

California representatives at Washington are indignant over Germany's further retaliatory act of excluding dried as well as fresh American fruits.

The ferry boats Garden City and Piedmont collided, bow to bow, off Oakland, Cal., in a fog. An elderly passenger, P. M. Partidge, was the only one injured, but he seriously.

The alleged fuel famine in San Francisco is declared by the Chronicle to be a flimsy device of the coal barons to extort exorbitant prices. There are four even cargoes on the way from Australia, aggregating 35,000 tons, and the coal bunkers are bulging with a supply on hand.

Orders have been sent to Commander Book, of the training ship Mohican, to stop at Apia a month on the cruise of eight months about to be taken. The intention is said to be the showing of the Stars and Strips, as indicating the continued interest of the United States in Samoa.

C. O. Brown's church in Chicago is liable to go to smash over his confession. There is a fighting party that wants to retain him as pastor.

Retired Justice Stephen J. Field's daughter Bessie heroically put out a fire in a house at Waterbury, Conn.

The Minister from Hawaii and Mrs. Hatch gave a very large reception at the Arlington on Thursday evening, from 9 to 11, when all official society was invited to meet President and Mrs. Dole. Some 600 visitors called in the course of the evening.

The battleship Kentucky, to be launched at Newport News this month, will be christened with water from a spring on the Laure farm, Kentucky, where Abraham Lincoln when a boy was wont to make his toilet.

A bill is before the Ohio Legislature requiring all persons applying for licenses to marry to pass a medical examination. Persons having dipsomania, any form of insanity, or editary tuberculosis or consumption are barred from marriage by the bill.

The Senate passed the Teller silver resolution by a vote of 47 to 32, but the House buried it under an adverse majority of fifty votes.

Captain Whitney of the schooner Jessie Minor was very badly injured by seas shipped crossing the bar at Eureka.

Attorney John D. Works, former Justice of the Supreme Court, was fined \$250 for contempt of court at San Diego, for introducing in an affidavit charges against Judge Torrance.

Miss Aurelia S. Henry, a graduate of the University of California, has been appointed professor of English and elocution in the University of Idaho.

Thomas L. Thompson, former U. S. Minister to Brazil, and a noted Democratic politician, committed suicide at Santa Rosa, Cal., in a fit of insanity on the 1st inst.

Lester A. Beardslee, Rear Admiral of the United States navy, was retired February 1 on account of old age.

The revenue cutter Corwin is to be sent to the relief of whaling ships in the Arctic.

PRINCES CUPID AND DAVID

Are Deeded Queen Kapiolani's Property of Every Description.

Large Annuity During Her Lifetime Provided for and All Her Liabilities Assumed by Her Nephews.

Queen Dowager Kapiolani last night consummated an act which she has long had under consideration. This was nothing more or less than deeding her entire estate to her two nephews, Princes David and Cupid.

The deeds and other documents required in transferring such a large estate were signed last night. The consideration named is love and affection, the assumption of all liabilities against her or her property and the payment to her of an annuity during her lifetime. Stamps to the amount of \$670 were required on the deed, this being on a valuation of \$134,000. The real value of the property transferred is probably double that amount.

Over two hundred separate pieces of property are included in the transfer, together with any amount of stocks, bonds, mortgages, promissory notes, jewelry, etc.

The object of the transfer is said to be the desire of the Queen Dowager to end her days in peace and quietness, without any of the cares incident to the management of her large estate, and to make certain the future welfare of her two nephews.

## FRANCHISE FOR JAPANESE

Startling Story Sent Out by the San Francisco Call.

Alleged Price to Be Paid by President McKinley for Japan's Consent to Hawaiian Annexation.

The following Washington correspondence appears in The San Francisco Call of February 4:

Japan has been removed as an element in the opposition to the consummation of the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands by the United States.

This result has been attained by the conclusion of an agreement between this Government and that of Japan, as represented by Minister Toru Hoshi, which, by practically settling the status of the Japanese in Hawaii, removes the only substantial difference that has existed between the two Governments.

The Japanese Government, for its part, announced some time ago that it no longer cared to interpose any objection to the annexation of Hawaii, based on principle. Since that time the correspondence between Mr. Hoshi and the State Department has been directed to a satisfactory settlement of the status of the resident Japanese in Hawaii, and this last point has now been adjusted, so far as the executive branch of the Government is capable of acting independently, the agreement being reduced to the shape of a written memorandum.

The document, which has not been generally taken into account in the consideration of means for adjusting the questions that have arisen over the status of Japanese in Hawaii, goes into effect in July next year, and among other things it confers upon Japanese within the territory of the United States all of the rights accorded to the citizens of the most favored nation, which, of course, carries with it rights of naturalization and the exercise of the rights of franchise. Presuming that annexation is effected the Japanese in Hawaii will, in 1899, have the same rights as those in the present limits of the United States. All that remains to be fixed is the status of the Japanese during the time that must elapse between the ratification of the annexation treaty and the beginning of the operations of the Japanese treaty of 1899. Inasmuch as the pending annexation treaty provides for the appointment of a commission to visit the islands and prepare such legislation as may be necessary to consummate the amalgamation of the territories, this last question can easily be adjusted along with other details in the bill to be reported to Congress.

### Applied a Little Seasoning.

When C. F. Herrick, Public Works office, went home yesterday he found the water in his house tank impregnated with salt. The air became blue as the investigation proceeded with no signs of a solution of the mystery. At last the Jap servant came up smiling with an explanation. He said that when the water came from the tap there was dirt in it, and he had applied the salt to settle the sediment. Herrick does not now know whether to discharge the servant or to raise his salary.

### Circus Goes to Kauai.

The circus will leave by the Mikahala this afternoon for Kauai. Programs will be put on at Lihue tomorrow, Monday and Tuesday night. On Wednesday the combination will go to Koloa, and will close the season at Waimea about a week later. Returning to Honolulu the show will open again near the market on the evening of the 24th.

### First Battalion Out.

There was an excellent turnout of the first battalion last night for drill. Companies A and G were particularly strong. Company B, Captain Kenske, paraded a full front. Adjutant Forster appeared for the first time and made an excellent impression. He has a strong, clear voice. Major Jones conducted the drill on Armory square for more than an hour.

### THE FAR EAST TROUBLE

Report that Britain is Ready with Three More Squadrons.

Excitement in England, Russia and United States Not Justified—Appeal May Be Made for American Support.

According to the China Gazette, Shanghai, the Indian, Australian and Pacific squadrons have been ordered to be ready to reinforce the British fleet in the East.

In the meantime the British claims in the Yang-tse-Kiang will be supported by a strong squadron stationed at Chusan, to which place two other war ships are en route.

In the event of Russia hoisting her flag over the forts at Port Arthur the British Admiral has been ordered to raise the British flag over Chusan and the Japanese will ascend the Yang-tse Kiang as soon as the river rises.

About 7500 Russian artillery and cavalry and quantities of stores and munitions have arrived at Kirin, the capital of the Manchurian province of Kirin.

It is denied in London that the Government has backed down on the question of opening Tientsin to British commerce. Great Britain has never put her desire regarding the question in the form of a demand, and the truth is the matter is still under negotiation. It bears on the proposed Chinese loan. Communications from the Russian Government do not display the heat characterizing the utterances of the Russian press.

Though Russia has protested and means to continue to protest in the stoutest manner against Tientsin being opened by British influence, she will not carry her protest to the point of making it a casus belli. Further, it is by no means Russia's intention to close China to other nations in any concessions made to Russia by China.

The irritation in Great Britain and the disappointment in the United States over the so-called "backing down" of the Marquis of Salisbury is, therefore, not yet justified. Great Britain is acting strenuously in favor of free ports in China and hopes sincerely to have the moral support of the United States in this policy. If events should push Great Britain from this position, at the prospect of defeat therein, she will ask for the support of the Washington Government.

It is asserted in St. Petersburg that, although M. de Witte, the Minister of Finance, has ordered a suspension of sales of stock on the market as preliminary to an issue of a Chinese loan, nothing has as yet been decided upon. China, it is rumored, now refuses the loan on the ground that Japan declines to vacate Wei-hai-wei before the stipulated time even if the indemnity is paid.

## STIRRING WORLD EVENTS

Cabinet Difficulties, Jew Baiting and Duelling in France.

British Cruisers Going to Peru—Poor Dr. Sun Yet Sen—Latest Klondike Notes.

Russia, France and Great Britain have agreed to insist upon the candidature of Prince George of Greece for the Governorship of Crete and are ready to enforce it should the Sultan prove obdurate. A Christiania paper believed the Hagerup Ministry would resign on the opening of the Norwegian Storting on February 10.

It is rumored in Hayti that two Italian ships are coming shortly to enforce a claim for indemnity. President Simon Sam proposes to make his first tour of the country, and if he start soon it is feared there will be trouble at Port au Prince in his absence.

The British have routed the enemy from the pass leading to Tibat.

Damodar, the Brahmin lawyer accused of connection with the murder of Lieutenant Averst and Plague Commissioner Ran last October, has been sentenced to death at Poona, Bombay residency. The men were shot from ambush while leaving a Jubilee reception of the Governor.

Twenty people were killed by a recent earthquake in Turkey.

Grain dealers on the Corn Exchange at Genoa, Italy, were violently attacked by other members for attempting to corner grain. Troops cleared the exchange. Bread riots took place at Castel-Mare, troops frequently charging the rioters.

The Dominion Parliament opened February 3, with the largest attendance in its history.

John L. Gibbons, Unionist, won a bye election in Wolverhampton, south.

German and British war vessels have arrived at Havana, and French are expected.

It is reported the United States will negotiate on a money basis with Cuban insurgents to secure peace.

The first-class Spanish cruiser Viscaya has been ordered to visit American ports.

Col. Benedicto surprised the insurgent camp of Gen. Aranguen, killing the general and four privates, capturing five rebels and wounding others who escaped.

The King of Corea has asked the United States minister at Seoul for protection against threatened revolution. Captain Wides of the cruiser Boston refuses to land a naval force, though strongly urged to do so by the King.

Dead in Great Britain are General Sir Frederick D. Middleton, keeper of the crown jewels, and the Earl of Clonmel.

A majority of the British engineers have voted to accept the terms of the employers.

Dr. Sun Yet Sen has been handed over to the Chinese, by the British authorities of Hongkong.

### British Cruisers Southering.

The British cruiser Pheasant arrived at San Diego on the way to Corinto on Jan. 26. Her officers declared all stories about British warships hunting treasure at Cocos Island as hoaxes. The cruiser Leander and torpedo destroyer Sparrowhawk were expected to follow the Leander from Esquimalt for the coast of Peru. It is thought there must be serious trouble expected by the British in that quarter, when these vessels are sent there so soon after their arrival from England at Esquimalt.

### Feverish France.

The Chamber of Deputies, on the 3d inst., voted 263 to 260 a reduction of 1000 francs in the naval credit for departmental inspection. This was a protest against alleged suppression of reports of the supervising committee, in spite of denial of the Minister of Marine, Admiral Besnard, and also implied want of confidence in that Minister.

Then, against the refusal of M. Meline the Premier, the Chamber passed a resolution for a judicial inquiry into charges of tampering with letters, the vote being 313 to

237, but the resolution carrying a vote of confidence in the Ministry.

Two deputies were to fight a duel the same day over one's calling the other "insolent" the day before.

The judge trying a libel suit against Henri Rochefort in Paris had to suspend court owing to cheers and cries of "Down with the Jews!" from the spectators, after the speech for the defense concluded.

### Klondike Items.

Western New York has the Klondike fever. Many people are giving up positions and homes to seek fortunes in the Arctic.

The Canadian Pacific Railway is making every preparation for handling the rush to the Klondike.

The U. S. Secretary of War has ordered out an expedition to explore the Copper river for a route to the Yukon.

The Chronicle claims the biggest Klondike companies are located in San Francisco.

Letters received in San Francisco assure the future of the Klondike from a mining point of view. Great profits can be made by persons bringing in supplies of provisions and clothing. "The man with the big grub pile is a big man in Dawson," one writer puts it. "The man with money is not in it."

Quartz assaying thousands to the ton is reported to have been struck in Washington State.

The steamer Corona was wrecked at the mouth of the Skeena river. She had more than 200 gold seekers aboard, but all were saved. The steamer Coquitlam is also reported stranded in the Fraser river.
