**WHALEBACK STEAMERS.**  
 It is freely admitted that the  
 of the Atlantic by a  
 steamer carrying a very  
 large cargo of grain marks a new  
 chapter in the annals of the mercantile  
 world. The steamer  
 W. Wetmore carried 90,  
 tons of wheat to Liverpool  
 and it out in perfect order  
 and in coal consumption  
 about one-twenty-fifth part  
 of a steamer like the Teutonic  
 and carrying a crew of only  
 two men. On her return  
 in ballast, the whaleback  
 carried twelve tons of coal.  
 Direct result of this success-  
 ful voyage a number of new orders  
 have been given for the construc-  
 tion of carriers of this class,  
 many much larger than any  
 yet built and it is  
 expected that this kind  
 of revolutionize the car-  
 rying of the world.  
 Congress has yielded  
 to the solicitations of the Free  
 traders in this country, and had  
 the restrictions upon the  
 import and enrollment of foreign  
 steamships where would these steamers  
 be? The policy of protec-  
 tion in this case, as in hundreds  
 of others, has been a direct stimulus  
 to ingenuity and invention  
 and now we see the result.  
 Great Britain nearly all the  
 steamships in marine architec-  
 ture these years have been in the  
 line of higher speed, and cer-  
 tainly wonderful results have been  
 achieved, but the carrying of mer-  
 chandise safely and economically  
 is as important a branch of  
 transportation as the carry-  
 ing of passengers across the At-  
 lantic, twenty miles or more an  
 hour. The whaleback is a genuine  
 invention, while the Ma-  
 rauder and Teutonic are only in-  
 ventions of development on lines  
 already laid down.  
 The British tramp steamer can-  
 not compete with the American  
 whaleback, in spite of the fact that  
 it pays a much lower rate of  
 freight than the American seamen get.  
 The whaleback exceeds the Britisher  
 in every way of construction, econ-  
 omy of navigation, carrying ca-  
 pacity in proportion to draught,  
 and in all weathers when  
 it is in the water. Why may we not argue  
 that the new law providing protec-  
 tion to the American steamships may  
 be as successful in creating  
 a new and useful in pas-  
 senger carriers as the general law  
 providing protection has been in evolving  
 freight carriers? Give Am-  
 erican inventive ability an even  
 chance and it will be heard from.—  
 Chronicle.

Be just and fear not: Let all the ends thou aim'st at be Thy Country's, thy God's, and Truth's. THURSDAY, OCT. 15, 1891.

On Sunday last a most villainous attempt was made to wreck the steam plant of the new electric light and motor company by putting obstructions in the steam pump. Fortunately they were discovered before any damage was done other than that of temporarily hindering the work. Owing to this mishap, the printing of our edition yesterday morning was delayed several hours, which made the distribution of the papers much later than usual.

"It is understood on the basis of unofficial reports from Washington," says Bradstreet, "that among other things the administration has under consideration the acquisition of the island of St. Thomas, in the West Indies, which now belongs to Denmark, as a naval station. Naval officers appear to be agreed as to the importance of the United States having a naval station in the group of islands which command the entry to the Gulf of Mexico and the approaches to the mouth of the Mississippi and the Isthmus, whether it be the Island of St. Thomas or some other. The question as to the necessity of such an acquisition is one to be determined by the naval and military authorities, and it is one about which there should be no controversy on party grounds."

THE PRICE OF A PRINCIPLE.

Ka Leo of October 9 reported a meeting of the self-styled National League, at which, we are informed, remarkable unanimity prevailed, so that we may be justified in supposing that the sentiments there expressed by representative men did really represent the sentiments of the League.

Mr. R. W. Wilcox appears to have been the principal speaker, and he certainly made public most unreservedly, indeed cynically, his political creed, past and present, and the value of the considerations which led him to change from the former to the latter, a change no less indeed than from the standpoint of a Monarchist to that of a Republican. "I had been a Royalist," he said, "on account of having been favored by King Kalakaua, and had been educated in a Monarchical military establishment in Italy." In truth Mr. Wilcox had been educated, at the public expense, for about the period of seven years. Here is the price, and a pretty stiff price too, for the people to pay for this gentleman's Monarchical preferences.

But, he says, that on returning here he found everything under a different regime. The King had been stripped of some of his rights and privileges, and he was unable to do anything for him! Was not this enough to turn any Monarchist of the Wilcox calibre into a Republican? The Right of which the King had been stripped was a wrong, if it be wrong for the King to divert an appropriation of the Legislature from a certain public purpose to a private pocket perquisite for the advantage of his own friends.

So, as those then in power would not give him any kind of employment or work, he was worse off than any stranger just coming in. Why so? Does every stranger just come into the Kingdom expect the Government to give him work or employment or take the consequences? The truth is that if Mr. Wilcox was unable to get work or employment it was because Mr. Wilcox was unfit for any. The stranger would most probably have found employment, and so saved himself from the obligation of political apostasy. This little episode shows the true principles of the Leaguers—Government place or opposition.

Not everyone has been so fortunate as to be maintained in Sunny Italy for a long period of years by his less favored countrymen. To find a different regime established when he returned must have been a bitter disappointment. There was no army; not even a battery created to give him employment. There was nothing to be done but to abjure Monarchical principles in disgust.

Never have we seen anyone so accurately explain the price of his political convictions. "Ex uno disce omnes."

OUR SAN FRANCISCO LETTER.

San Francisco News.

The Pacific Insurance Union is on the verge of dissolution again. William Martinke, a mason working on the new Crocker building, fell nine stories to the sidewalk, recently. His body was just a bruised mass of flesh when picked up.

Evidence in favor of Sydney Bell, the supposed murderer of Jacobson, has been discovered. Bell is now under sentence of death.

The power-house of the new San Francisco and San Mateo electric road is under way.

Colonel William Harney, the victim of the latest Tehachipe Pass railway disaster, was awarded with appropriate honors on the 20th ultimo.

W. Q. Judge, one of the leaders of the Theosophical Society of America, is here on a special mission from New York. He is the head of the Order, practically, since the death of Madame Blavatsky.

The weapons secreted by the seven convicts who expected to make a rush from San Quentin prison, have been given up after a twenty-four days diet of bread and water.

There is to be a contest over the estate of the late Judge Heydenfeldt, valued at \$107,000. Sol Heydenfeldt, Jr., has entered a monastery.

P. Grumwaldt, the furrier of the Czar, is here to look after that portion of the business of handling the Copper Island sealskins, transacted in San Francisco.

Grattan Dalton, the stage robber and outlaw, has escaped from the Visalia jail. He was soon to go to San Quentin prison.

John Gularte, a Portuguese sheepherder, is under arrest at San Luis Obispo for murdering two men and picking the body of one. It is charged that the flesh was served to others.

A most remarkable charge of conspiracy is made against W. F. Whittier, the millionaire head of the house of Whittier, Fuller & Co. He is accused with Judge Denson, a well-known lawyer, with trying to ruin W. P. Fuller, Jr., by connecting his name with a Miss Kenfull, to compel him (Fuller) to sell out his interest in the business for less than it was worth. The case will make a great sensation in court.

On August 31st, Mrs. Emily Maillard, a daughter of M. M. Tompkins, one of the wealthiest men in California, disappeared from her home in Marin county. She has been found through a reward of \$1000 failed to find her. She ran away with her hired man, and is now in a logger's cabin in Humboldt county.

The recent Immigration Convention has passed resolutions favoring a competing railroad. A railroad convention is to be held here on the 17th inst.

Neuburger, Reiss & Co., a San Francisco importing firm, have been detected in an extensive smuggling plot. Certain Custom House officers are also implicated.

A lone highwayman is operating in Shasta county. Three stages have been held up.

American News.

Large sections of Minnesota and Dakota have been devastated by prairie fires; crops have been destroyed and many families made homeless.

The city of Santa Cruz, this State, celebrated its 100th birthday on September 25th.

Land speculators who invested in stocks in the company of President Harrison's son Russell is president, allege that they were swindled, and propose to have young Harrison indicted in Texas.

Experiments have been tried in the city of Boston to test the feasibility of trans-oceanic telephones. Gorman Gray, inventor of the wire on which these experiments have been made, said: "It is practicable to telephone across and through the Atlantic at a cost far less than the present cables and of a tenth of the weight, and consequently breaking the strain on the cables. The use of copper, it has been found, is not necessary, for iron wire, properly shaped, has been proved to be as reliable a conductor, and its tensile strength is greater. The plan is under consideration for laying cables to London, and the subject is now being figured on by capitalists."

The Clearfield First National Bank and the Hontzdale Bank of Pennsylvania, failed on September 30th, owing to an unexpected run.

Sporting News.

Nancy Hanks trotted a mile in 2:09 at Richmond, Ind., on the 1st inst. It is thought that she will lower Mand S's record of 2:08 1/2 before the season is over. Robert Bonner thinks that Sunol will trot under 2:08 1/2 at the coming speed trials on the new kite-shaped track at Stockton.

Allerton, the speedy son of Jay Bird, trotted a mile in 2:09 1/2 at Independence, Iowa, on the kite track recently. This reduces the world's stallion record again. Allerton and Nancy Hanks are matched to trot at Richmond, Ind.

Nelson, the Maine stallion, and Stamboul, the California stallion, are both to be driven against Allerton's new stallion record before December. Nelson will trot in Michigan, and Stamboul on the kite track in Stockton.

The only John L. is expected from Australia on the Alameda. The news of his utter failure in the Colonies is "Honest Hearts and Willing Hands." It is now believed that financial reasons will compel Sullivan to fight Slavin.

Charles Dutch and Henry Peterson will row their race for \$1,000 a side, over the Alameda course, on the 18th. Peterson is the favorite.

Hanlan lowered the world's record for rowing three miles at New Westminster, B. C., on the 21st ult. On the 24th there was a race in which Hanlan, O'Connor, Dutch and Stephenson were entered. O'Connor won by half a length with Hanlan second. O'Connor's time was 20 minutes and 55 seconds. The others were nowhere.

John Teemer, the oarsman, has challenged Stansbury, the Australian, to row for \$1,000 and the championship of the world. He also wants to take Stansbury as a partner in a double scull and row any two men in the world over any fair course in America, Hanlan and O'Connor preferred.

Shipping News.

The initial steamer Kelweena of the Atlantic and Pacific Steamship Company, and was towed into Coronel for repairs. She was en route to San Francisco.

Reports from Behring Sea are to the effect that all the poachers have made big catches of seals. J. D. Spreckels & Bros. sued to recover

\$10,000 salvage for towing off the bark Don Carlos, which went ashore below the Cliff House and was badly damaged, but was successfully towed off and brought into port by the firm's tugboats. The Court has awarded the firm \$5,500 salvage and \$225 for services in pumping out the vessel.

The British ship Cardiganshire has arrived, from Hamburg, with five cases of scurvy on board.

The Belt Railroad on the water front is nearly completed and will be ready for business shortly.

Heavy weather has prevailed on the Coast for the past few days and numerous small accidents have occurred.

The San Francisco sealing steamer Hattie Gage has been seized in Behring Sea for having false clearance papers.

SUPREME COURT.

WEDNESDAY, Oct. 14. LAW DIVISION—BEFORE JUDGE, C. J.

Bankruptcy of John Cook. Petitioner is adjudged bankrupt on his own petition, and October 20th is appointed for proof of claims and election of assignee. W. O. Smith, attorney for petitioner.

PROBATE DIVISION—BEFORE DOLE, J. In re estate of Emily Baldwin Atwater. Petition for probate of will. The Court ordered that letters testamentary be issued to W. O. Smith without bond. W. O. Smith for petitioner.

OCTOBER TERM. Robert Parker, who was called for the prosecution in rebuttal in the Queen vs. Wm. Hoopii, sworn, testified that he acted as interpreter in the Marshal's office when Hoopii was questioned by Capt. Hopkins, and that Hoopii then said to Capt. Hopkins that he had two white men as accomplices. When the examination was through, Capt. Parker conducted Hoopii to his cell, and on the way said "Is it true what you told Capt. Hopkins, that two white men were implicated with you, Hoopii?" Hoopii replied, "No, it is not." "What did you say so for then?" "I thought they would be more lenient with me if I said that."

Hoopii was sentenced to four years' imprisonment at hard labor.

The Queen vs. Kaahuna and Keliikewa. Maintaining lottery. Found guilty, and fined \$500 each. Appeal from Police Court. Sentence confirmed. Deputy Marshal Wilder for prosecution; Nawahi for defendants.

The Queen vs. Kaaemoku and Keikakai. Practicing medicine without license. The jury acquitted the defendants, two dissenting. Makahala for defendant; Kaula for prosecution.

Hawaiian jury cases will be finished this week. Cases 59 and 60, foreign jury, will be tried upstairs this week. Next week the foreign jury will sit down stairs and the mixed jury upstairs, beginning with case 45.

CRIMINAL DIVISION—BEFORE RICKERTON, J. The Queen vs. Yung Quai. Assault and battery. Foreign jury. The case occupied the whole day and was continued until this morning.

In Reg. vs. Aseu. Further argument was made before Mr. Justice Dole yesterday on the question of law whether the alleged false representations made in China by the defendant and his agents, as to the wages which the laborers could get in Hawaii, constitute the offense of false pretenses under our statute.

Mr. Hartwell, for the prosecution, frankly admitted that the profits did not carry out the position, as he was instructed, namely, that the misrepresentations were not only made in China, but also that the contracts were not fully translated and explained to the laborers on board the Paetolus at Hawaii; but he claimed that if there were misrepresentations made in China and concealment of the requirements of the law of 1890, it was a false pretense as to existing conditions and circumstances in Hawaii, which was consummated by obtaining the contracts under the circumstances shown by the evidence.

Mr. Hatch claimed that all that was shown by the prosecution was a promise, an assurance of future benefits, and that on that evidence the offense charged could not be shown.

The Court took this question under advisement.

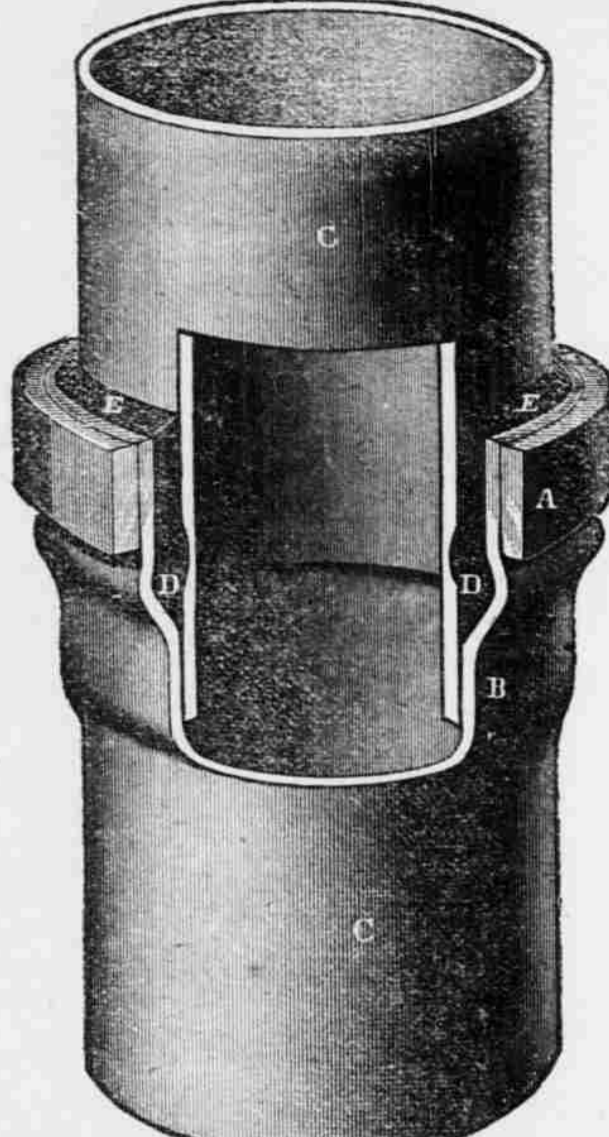
