What is wanted is an honest book, honestly made. If the book be by a living writer, whether native or foreign, remuneration for his work should be, of course, the first great sine qua non.

Why Railroad Ties Rot. The subject of the introduction of metallic railway ties as an imperishable and economical substitute for the present article has led an authority in this line to write that, after much track walking and general observation of the condition of wooden cross ties in various stages of decay, he concludes that the principal cause of their short life is not natural decay, but a decay hastened by frequent laceration and breaking of the wood fiber by the rail spikes, the breaking in every instance being from the surface, which is unsheltered from weather and subjected to constant strain from passing trains.

THE NEWS.

The Mariposa arrived yesterday, having made remarkably good time from San Francisco, as she sailed last Friday afternoon.

The news does not contain many striking features. War in Europe is probable in spring.

Austria and Russia are also certain to be involved on account of the Balkan difficulty, and Pesth newspapers are calling upon Austria to attack Russia before the latter is prepared for action.

England and France are not agreed regarding Egypt. There is a proposal to neutralize the Suez Canal under joint control of the Powers.

The British steamer Wells City collided in the Hudson river with the Lone Star, of the Morgan line, and sunk. She was worth \$150,000, and her cargo was valued at \$140,000.

Nineteen persons were executed at Peking recently. Admiral Chang, who commanded the Chinese fleet at Poochow when the French destroyed it, was required. His services may again be required.

A volcano has broken out in the Baku petroleum district of Russia. Verde's new opera "Otello" has been pronounced a decided success at Milan.

Italy and Abyssinia. The defeat of the Italians at Massowah, in two days' fighting, January 23th and 27th, was very decisive, although it is claimed that in the action to Abyssinians lost 5,000 men.

There has been an unusually severe winter all over the United States. A foot of snow fell in and around San Francisco on the 5th, and the population appear to have devoted themselves to sport and enjoyment.

LATE NEWS. Items From All Points to February 17th, Inclusive.

The William H. Macy, from Cardiff, a wooden American ship of 2,000 tons burden, Captain Harkness, master, consigned to Balfour Guthrie & Co., San Francisco, by her owners, Calderon & Norwood of Camden, Me., went on the rocks near Fort Point, February 12th, but was towed off by three tugs.

A fireman was killed and several were injured during a building on Post street falling during a fire. The fire originated in a Chinese laundry in the basement.

Throughout Chile the appearance of cholera on the Atlantic slope has caused consternation, and all the papers are filled with articles advising the hygienic measures which should be adopted to prevent its spread to the Pacific.

Bolivia has stationed troops to prevent communication with the Argentine Republic. Cattle and mules have been stopped on the frontier, and will probably all perish in attempting to return.

Sixty lives were lost by a railroad accident in Vermont. The wrecked train was the Boston night express, consisting of locomotive, baggage and postal cars, two passenger cars and two sleepers.

The cold has been intense throughout Montana. The loss of cattle has been great, and an appalling loss of human life from the same cause was imminent February 13th.

Secretary Manning has tendered his resignation to the President to take the management of a National Bank at New York City. Speaker Carlisle is spoken of as his successor at the Treasury.

Ex-Alderman O'Neill of New York has been sentenced to four and a half years in Sing Sing and to pay a fine of \$2,000.

The snow storm was very heavy in Oregon and Northern California. Francis Laurant, historian and publicist, is dead.

There has been a tornado in the Alleghenies. The weather in the Eastern States has been unusually stormy. Heavy falls of snow and drifts are recorded, accompanied by loss of life in many places.

The Pope, in response to friendly overtures from China, has instructed Cardinal Simeoni to prepare a convention securing complete liberty of mission and Catholic residents in the Chinese Empire.

Princess Louise, it is rumored, will apply for a divorce from Lord Lorne. President Cleveland is opposed to retaliatory legislation on the Canadian fishery question.

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German and French Affairs. The Munich "Allgemeine Zeitung" publishes Cardinal Jacobini's letter to the Nuncio at Munich. It is dated January 30th. The Cardinal says that in view of the impending revision of the Church laws the Pope desires the center to support the Septennate bill in every possible way.

Warlike rumors continue. There is constant movement of troops between Metz and the posts on the frontier of Luxembourg. Constant practice in the repating rifle is going on. Orders have been issued to use it only when the enemy is between 300 and 800 meters distant.

The Emperor William's health is failing. There are to be no noisy demonstrations on his birthday. An easy victory for the Government is anticipated in the general elections.

The Balkan States. A London cable special to the "Star" says: Russian agents in the Balkan States have been discovered by Bulgarian authorities in the act of organizing the Slav population for a simultaneous rising against the Governments of Bulgaria, Eastern Roumelia and Servia.

The sugar market appears to have been devoid of all interesting features in the United States since our last advices. Cuban has advanced 1-16 cent, which will be pleasant news for our planters whose sugars had reached the Coast.

A fair amount of business in spot stock has transpired, and there has been no very heavy disposition to buy for forward delivery, the decline in beet having brought the European markets within buyers' limits, and the offerings afloat and for shipment from the East Indies and South America have received some attention.

News About the Hawaiian Treaty. WASHINGTON, February 6th.—It is understood that King Kalakaua does not approve of the amendment adopted by the Senate to the Hawaiian Treaty.

Four Lepers at San Francisco. There are four cases of leprosy in the Twenty-sixth Street Hospital. One of these patients is James Legayi, a colored man, a native of Florida, and has been in the hospital since 1880.

House. The concurrence of the Senate would be sufficient, but if this amendment should be agreed to it is claimed that legislation would be required by the House to make the treaty operative.

WASHINGTON, February 12th.—Claus Spreckels arrived here on Thursday to look after the Hawaiian Reciprocity Treaty. The proposed new treaty extends the period of reciprocity for a period of seven years.

There has been no doubt here for some time that the whole scheme of the Pearl River cession was originally suggested by the sugar ring, and that His Majesty will gladly accept it as a condition of the extension of the Treaty; but the House must give its assent to the Treaty before it can become a law.

WASHINGTON, February 14th (special).—Various reports have been circulated since the Senate ratified the Hawaiian Treaty with an amendment providing for the cession of Pearl River Harbor to the United States, as to what action the President would take in the matter.

Secretary Bayard does not think that Senator Edmunds of the Foreign Relations Committee has any right under the constitution to make treaties. That power, he holds, rests exclusively with President, and it is not likely that any attention will be paid to the new treaty as changed by the Pearl River amendment.

WASHINGTON, February 14th.—Claus Spreckels had two hours' conversation with the President to-day. The interview was a pleasant one, and Colonel Spreckels says that President Cleveland is thoroughly a business man who can comprehend business propositions.

R. M. S. S. Mariposa. The Oceanic Company's Royal Mail steamer Mariposa arrived shortly before ten o'clock yesterday morning from San Francisco, after a fine run of 6 days 4 hours 35 minutes.

Death of Mrs. E. O. White. By the Mariposa the sad news was received of the death of the wife of Mr. Edwin Oscar White, of the firm of E. O. Hall & Son, which took place at the residence of her mother, Mrs. Street, San Francisco, on Sunday, February 6th.

Our Hawaiian Trade. [S. F. Merchant, Feb. 4th.] The returns of our export trade to the Hawaiian Islands show a total of over \$3,000,000 for last year.

Her cargo was valued at \$71,064, divided as follows: Australia, \$40,881; Honolulu, \$23,880; New Zealand, \$5,134; Fiji, \$1,151.

The Mariposa brought forty-one cabin and twenty-eight steerage passengers for this port, and had quite a number in transit.

After taking on passengers and the mails, the Mariposa left for the Colonies at half-past six o'clock last evening.

The Julia Foard. The San Francisco "Chronicle" of February 15th has the following: The bark Julia Foard, fifty-seven days from Departure Bay, put into port yesterday in distress. The Captain reports that the left Departure Bay on December 19th or Honolulu. The crew was shipped at Esquimaux on the 23d of the same month.

While within fourteen miles of Cape Flat-tary the vessel sprang a leak and lost a suit of sails. Returning to Esquimaux on the 24th she was repaired, and afterwards discharged 357 tons of coal at Port Townsend, sailing again for this port on the 5th inst. Only 320 tons of coal were brought here.

By the last steamer from Kauai we learn that some short time since a member of the Survey Department took quite an extended rest in a hoo tree, carefully guarded by the celebrated Holstein bull Hercules.
