EDITORIAL CORRESPONDENCE. MAKAWAO, MAUI, APRIL 24, 1878.

From Waikuku to this place, on the slope of Mauna Haleakala--the House of the Sun,--the journey of some fifteen miles was performed on horseback, and as we proceeded, occupied three hours. About three miles from the Waikuku mill we came to Kahului, the port of this district, when there is a collection of storehouses on the sand beach and a landing stage. There is a good anchorage here, protected in ordinary weather from breakers by a line of reef to the windward. As we were going to call at Haiku on the way, our road from Kahului lay for several miles along a sand-beach of dazzling brightness and among sand-hills blown up by the wind. At Hamakua, on a bit of plain skirted by the sea beach we came upon a fine field of young cane, 60 acres in extent, belonging to Mr. Jas. M. Alexander, and irrigated by a stream of water all the way from the heights of Mt. Haleakala, twenty miles away. This was our first introduction to the results of the "BIG DITCH".

Of East Maui, the pioneer enterprise in irrigation on a large scale, on these islands. It was a very gratifying sight to observe the sparkling mountain water, brought by human enterprise, skill and industry so many miles from the heights of Mt. Haleakala, to the mission of enriching and beautifying the hitherto barren plain. From this point to where the gulch or ravine of Maliko debouches on to the sea-shore, the road ascends over apparently fertile lands capable of bearing all the crops now used for grazing only. The cattle we saw appeared to be in fair order, though they were mostly working oxen turned out to graze. We here saw the result upon forests of a pride. Near the roadside other kinds--had been planted some years ago, in long straight lines, and had grown to a pretty even height of twelve to fifteen feet. But now the broad plains, and see the result. Over half the trees are withered and dead, and the remainder, stripped of bark by the cattle, are fast going the same way.

A couple of miles this side of the mill building of Haiku Plantation we came to the HARBOR OF MALIKO, where the sugar is shipped to Honolulu and where supplies are landed. It is formed by the great gulch of Maliko, which, starting away up on the side of Haleakala, deeply indents the district to the seashore. The scene from the top of the gulch, as we suddenly came upon it along the table land, was very fine. The sides were precipitous, say three hundred feet to the narrow strip of level ground at the bottom, reached by a winding road, up which which ox-teams were slowly wending their way. A storehouse, a few dwellings, and a few trees were under the bluffs on each side, and through the centre ran a rivulet, like the water-marks, becomes quite a stream in many places. There is a landing stage with a crane for loading and unloading merchandise. The harbor is formed by a reef that runs a short distance from the eastern bluff, inside which is a bay for vessels to tie up to. The anchorage is safe in moderate weather, but it is open to the trades, and when these were to the Northward and blow strong, it is not very safe for a vessel to lie here.

Fields of waving cane beyond stages of growth, we come to the buildings of the MAUI PLANTATION, where Mr. S. T. Alexander, the energetic and enterprising manager, receives us hospitably and politely. This gentleman is one who has enlightened planters who believe in tree-planting, and we see the evidences of this around Haiku. There are thousands of the different varieties of Eucalyptus, planted in rows, and in some eight of the mill-building, planted in rows on each side of the road. The tree appears to thrive well here, and stands the strong trades like the sturdy pine. We will not undertake to say that the presence of groves of trees had anything to do with it,--but they had the water of showers of rain at Haiku all this spring, and on the day of our visit the mud on the roads was ankle deep. And the country all about here was clothed in emerald green, while long stretches of a lighter color indicated the curbed fields--mines of gold, and all surface diggings. Haiku has one thousand acres of cane planted, which ought to turn out over a half a million dollars worth of sugar for 1878-9. It must be remembered that here they have the water from the mountain for irrigation. Mr. Alexander very obligingly accompanied us a mile or two above the mill to inspect the water ditch where it crosses the big gulch. This was an ENGINEERING FEAT of no small magnitude, when the fact is considered that all the materials for the work had to be brought long distances over the gulch at a heavy cost. The ditch across the gulch is three feet wide and five deep, and when we saw it was full within a few inches and flowing rapidly. There was, in fact, more water than was needed at the time, and the surplus was running to waste down the gulch. We could but speculate what would be the drought-stricken plantations of Kau give for such a stream as is here thrown away!
