FOREIGN NEWS.

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia, April 13.—The officials at Port Arthur report a loss today which is a crushing blow to the Russian navy. Admiral Makaroff was drowned and the Grand Duke Cyril wounded.

The battleship Petropavlovsk during the attack by the Japanese fleet at Port Arthur struck a mine and turned turtle. The splendid battleship went down before any of those on board had an opportunity to save themselves. Eight hundred and six of the ship's officers and men, including Admiral Makaroff, went down with the ship to a watery grave.

The Grand Duke Cyril, on board at the time, was wounded. Only five officers and thirty-five men of the ship's complement were saved. The battle between the Russian squadron and forty Japanese vessels is progressing. The loss of the battleship and Admiral Makaroff has spread consternation in the Russian forces and complete disaster to the fleet is feared. The Japanese are following their advantage with vigor.

The Petropavlovsk was a battleship of 10,950 tons and one of the best fighting ships remaining in the Russian squadron at Port Arthur.

It is probable that Admiral Rjosvensky will succeed Makaroff. Prince Outkomy is temporarily in command of the fleet.

TELEGRAPHIC ITEMS

An epidemic is feared at Harbin because of bad water.

Many Circassians are volunteering for service in the Russian army.

King Christian of Denmark celebrated his 80th birthday last Saturday.

Marquis Ito has returned from Korea, and reports his mission a success.

Port Arthur is reported quiet, with no signs of attack by the Japanese.

The main Japanese army is near Wiju. Frequent skirmishes are reported.

Ex-Queen Isabella of Spain died at Paris, April 9, from an attack of influenza.

Thirteen thousand riflemen hold Vladivostok against attack by the Japanese.

It is reported from St. Petersburg that the Black Sea reserves are being mobilized.

General Jiminiz, the defeated San Domingo revolutionist has returned to New York.

British refiners are anticipating a possible duty on sugar in the forthcoming budget.

It is rumored that Russia expresses satisfaction with the new Anglo-French Colonial treaty.

Major General Wood has sent out an expedition of 1500 men to compel the allegiance of Sultan Taraca.

Montreal, Canada, is in danger from floods, the water now standing six feet deep in the streets of the city.

It is believed at Tokio that fighting has begun on the Yalu. Japan's army is ready for the advance movement.

There have been twenty-two deaths from bubonic plague Anatagosta, Chili, and fifty-one new cases are reported.

The appointment of A. N. Repokai as Circuit Judge of Maui was sent to the Senate for confirmation last Saturday.

An attempt was made last week to assassinate King Alfonso of Spain by a bomb which exploded prematurely and he escaped unhurt.

The steamer Colon, from San Francisco to Panama with passengers and freight struck on a rock and was beached with no loss of life.

A strike on the Panama railroad stopped the running of trains for a few days. The strike ended on Tuesday and traffic was resumed.

The Cabinet at Washington considered the Chinese Exclusion Law last Saturday, with a view to the possibility of securing a new treaty.

Mrs. Botkin, recently sentenced to imprisonment for life for poisoning Mrs. Dunning, has been arrested on the charge of poisoning Mrs. Dean.

There is universal approval of the signing of the Anglo-French Colonial treaty, which is regarded as another diplomatic success of King Edward.

Paul Jessar, Russia's Minister to China demanded the dismissal of the Japanese military instructors from the Chinese army, fearing hostile influences.

On account of Russia's unpreparedness, it has been decided to operate wholly on the defensive. It is believed that the Japanese cannot pass Mukden.

By the terms of the Anglo-French Colonial treaty, the British protectorate over Egypt and the French protectorate over Morocco are made permanent.

The Washington administration is convinced that it can continue the enforcement of Chinese exclusion notwithstanding the expiration of the treaty in December.

Premier Combes' order for the removal of crucifixes and other religious emblems from court houses in France is causing demonstrations. At Amiens a mob of 2000 was dispersed by the troops and many wounded.

Improvement League Meeting.

On Thursday evening the regular monthly meeting of the Improvement Association of Wailuku District was held at Wailuku Courthouse, with a good attendance. SHIPPING NEWS

Berlin, April 12.—Russia continues her purchases of German ocean liners, and will form a flying squadron of cruisers.

Nuchwang, Manchuria, April 11.—Russian gunners in the forts at this port today fired on the pilot-boats of merchant ships by mistake. Two Chinese were killed.

Tokio, April 11.—It is believed that the Russian Baltic fleet will not attempt to reach the east.

Washington, April 9.—The House has passed the Philippine Shipping Bill.

Victoria, April 8.—Wreckage found in Bercley Sound indicates the destruction of the ship Lamorna, running between Puget Sound and Queenstown, with a loss of thirty lives.

The returning officers report that the Hongkong Maru is now known as the Hongkong Maru Kan; and the Nippon Maru as the Nippon Maru Kan, the addition to the names signifying that they are now men-of-war. Both have been fitted with guns on deck, both have had all the cabins and woodwork on the main deck between the purses' rooms and the chief engineers' rooms removed to make room for hammocks, and both of the liners are to be used as dispatch boats by the Japanese navy. They are to be fitted with torpedo tubes.—Shanghai Times.

A Washington dispatch reports the departure of the Pacific squadron for Panama, from which place it will sail to Honolulu. The dispatch says:

The Navy Department had a telegram today from Rear Admiral Glass reporting the departure from Callao for Panama of the Pacific squadron, consisting of the armored cruiser New York, the cruiser Boston and the gunboats Beunington and Concord. The squadron went to Callao to give the officers and men a chance for recreation ashore after their trying duties in Isthmian waters. It is supposed that the presence of the plague at Callao caused the departure of the vessels.—Advertiser.
