HARBOR WORK EXPLAINED

FULL ANSWERS GIVEN TO THE LEGISLATURE.

The Dredging and Filling Now in Progress is in Accordance With a Deed to Property.

The position of the Government as to the harbor improvements now going on and those contemplated, was presented in both House and Senate this morning, with more fulness than it has heretofore been presented to the public.

In the Senate in reply to Senator Brown's question as to why work was proceeding when the whole harbor matter was in the hands of a special committee, the reply was:

"The filling now being done by the dredger from the slip adjacent to the Mauna Kea street wharf, is in accordance with a deed upon condition, made with the heirs of the Youman estate, a copy of which is enclosed with this answer."

In the House the reply to Representative Wilder's questions on the same subject were very much fuller, the questions themselves going more specifically into the matter. The answers were as follows:

"The Government is filling in for wharf purposes an area of 22,000 feet square, being a portion of a lot of land conveyed to the Government upon condition that a certain other area belonging to the Youman estate and amounting to 37,000 square feet, be filled in by the Government. This is all the Government is prepared to fill in in the immediate future.

"It is understood that the area which it was contended should be dug out is the area between the wharves of the Pacific Advertiser map, then about 65,000 square feet of this area is being filled, and a portion of that covered by the wharf in the map is being dug out.

"The wharf frontage to be used by filling already staked out, is 850 feet, with a possibility of increasing it about 700 feet with less than one-half the excavation required by the plan published in the Pacific Advertiser.

"The cost of excavating to give the 850 feet wharf frontage will be \$172,000.

"The amount spent in dredging the Pacific Mail slip, so called, would probably excavate an area of 170,000 square feet, considerably more than that being filled in and would give a wharf frontage of 18,000 feet. This, however, could not be done without acquiring property not now owned by the Government.

"I am not aware that the propriety of filling in of this land is in issue except so far as it is covered by the item in the appropriation bill for the dredging of Honolulu harbor.

"I am not aware that any member of the Cabinet has made any public declaration of the intention to make the fillings in question."

EPIDEMIC IN THE SCHOOLS

A DISEASE AKIN TO CHOLERA INFANTUM.

Many Children Kept at Home by Their Parents—Dr. Herbert Attributes It to Malaria in the Air.

An epidemic of disease akin to the cholera infantum is raging so seriously throughout the city as to interfere with the work in the public schools. So far it has not been found necessary to close any of the schools, but there has been an unusual amount of absenteeism.

The disease takes the form among quite young children of cholera infantum of a very severe type. Among children a little older the symptoms are modified somewhat but still indicate a disorder of the stomach and bowels. The matter has been brought to the attention of the school authorities from almost every school, by the reports of truant officers and the teachers. But while such investigation as was possible has been made no satisfactory conclusion has been reached as to the cause. It was at first thought it was probably due to the heavy rains of a few weeks ago effecting the drinking water, but the prevalence of the disease among all classes and in all parts of the city made this hypothesis untenable.

Dr. Herbert says it cannot be the water, for it has appeared in families where artesian, distilled and filtered waters were used, as well as among those who used reservoir water, and has attacked children at the breast and those being brought up on cow's milk, both fresh and condensed. He attributes it to a malaria in the atmosphere, due to the continued south winds which seemed to have carried it to higher as well as lower altitudes and held it there.

The epidemic is confined to no part of the city, the best residence portions suffering from it as much as the poorest.

Among adults, the disease, if it is from the same source, takes the form of grippe, which prevails to a considerable extent.

A NEW BLIGHT.

Suspicious Parasitic Growth Being Investigated by Prof. Koebele.

What may prove to be a new fungus blight or insect pest has been discovered. Senator Holstein yesterday found the leaves of an Hina shrub in his brother's yard on Vineyard street, covered with a reddish, globular substance, each about the size of a pin head. He took a number of the leaves thus effected to Professor Koebele, for examination. Professor Koebele has not yet concluded his research in the matter and may not be able to without an examination of the different stages of the growth, whatever it is. At present, however, he is inclined to think it is a parasitic blight of vegetable character and not an insect pest. Whether it shall prove extensively injurious or not remains still to be seen.

The specimens brought in by Senator Holstein were first Professor Koebele has seen, so it is probable that whatever it is has not yet become extensively diffused.

THE MONEY IS UP.

The race between Hollinger's Margaret M., and Norton's Directress, which has been arranged for May 14, at Kapiolani park, will be for a stake of \$500. The money is already in the hands of the stakeholder.

ELECTRIC LIGHT TROUBLES.

The main shaft of the Honolulu electric light works broke down again Sunday night, and the company was obliged to cut off all the outside circuits. Temporary repairs enabled the company to keep the lights going on the main circuits, but last night there was another break down which further embarrassed the operation of the company. Skillful repairs however it is hoped will enable the company to meet most of the requirements made of it until the new machinery now on its way from the Coast arrives here and can be put in place.

THE LIGHT WINE ISSUE

IS CLEARLY PRESENTED IN THE SENATE.

Majority and Minority Committee Reports on the Bill to License Sale of Beer and Wine.

Senator Holstein for the Judiciary Committee made an elaborate report on Senate Bill No. 28, authorizing licenses for the retail of wines, beers and ales of low alcoholic strength. A number of amendments were recommended which do not change the principles of the bill but are intended to safeguard its operation. In conclusion the committee says: "With these amendments to the bill we recommend its passage, feeling that in its adoption it would be a step in the right direction and will be for the advantage of the tax payers of the outer districts who now have to evade the law to procure a commodity which prohibition cannot check or keep out of this Republic. It must also be remembered that this act is not a hastily composed one, but it is the result of the patient and careful study since the issue that was presented in the Legislature of 1890. It follows therefore, that with such a law as this in operation, the revenue of the country would be increased, besides remedying the evils which we now deplore, when as it is hoped the control of such licenses are placed in the hands of responsible residents who have the moral and financial support of the better element of the district."

Senator Lyman presented a minority report. He said that the bill seemed to be so carefully drawn that if the principle of licensing the sale of light wines and beers was to be adopted the subject seemed to be as carefully guarded in the bill as it was possible to do, "and is much to be preferred to full spirit licenses. Yet at the same time I do not have faith in the good results that are claimed for the bill to control the sale of spirituous liquors, and to stop the illicit sale of the same in the country. I do not believe it will stop the illicit sale of spirituous liquors, and the liquor dealers of Honolulu say it will not stop any of the illicit sales, and I greatly fear that this act will have the same effect as the grocers' license to sell wines and beers, introduced as a temperance measure in England by Mr. Gladstone a few years ago, which proved to be an utter failure. It greatly increased drunkenness, especially among women. Section 7 points out what is expected to be the result of the drink habit, and feeling that these licenses will increase drunkenness as a whole, I do not wish to uphold any measure that tends to increase the evil rather than to lessen it. I cannot recommend the passage of the bill."

The bill provides for not more than three licenses of this character to be issued in each judicial district, and only on the endorsement of a majority of the electors of the district. The annual license fee is to be \$200.

The majority of the committee reported favorably with some slight amendments on Senator McCandless' plumbing bill. Senator Waterhouse did not join in the report because he was not present when the committee considered the bill. He may bring in a minority report.

The House bill making S. M. Ballou's compilation of the penal code a reference book in all judicial proceedings was read by title and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The House bill allowing alcohol to be withdrawn free of duty for use in the Queen's Hospital was also read a second time and referred to the committee on commerce.

Minister Cooper presented his answer to Senator Brown's inquiry as to the harbor work now going on and the answer was referred to the special committee having the matter under consideration.

IN THE HOUSE.

Minister Cooper presented the answers of the Minister of Interior to questions propounded by Representative Achi. It was stated that the death rate since the odorless excavator had been working nights had not increased; the scheme of working it nights was merely experimental, and the matter of its continuance was in abeyance.

ANOTHER BIG REALTY DEAL

BRUCE CARTWRIGHT BUYS FORT STREET PROPERTY.

Will Build the Addition to the Progress Block—Some Other Contemplated Improvements.

Bruce Cartwright will now identify himself with the development of "upper" Fort street. Yesterday he closed a deal with C. S. Desky for the purchase of the property just makai of the Progress block, and within ten days he will, it is stated, break ground for a three story stone and brick building, similar in construction and appearance to the Progress block. In fact the plans already prepared by Mr. Desky for an extension of his building will be used, with a few changes.

The property in question has been in the market for some time, and is considered a very desirable tract. One prospective purchaser had planned to put up a hotel there, but finally backed out because he thought that annexation would not go through. Mr. Cartwright has more faith in the Islands. He paid \$12,000 for the property, and the estimated cost of the building he will erect is close to \$30,000. The new building will likely be connected with the Progress block, and contain elevators so arranged that they can be utilized by the patrons of both buildings.

It is now understood that, having disposed of this property, Mr. Desky will turn his attention to the improvement of the monkey basin corner of Beretania and Fort streets, where the old Bruce Waring building now stands. It has been Mr. Desky's intention to put up a handsome building on the corner as soon as the times would warrant it. It is not unlikely that the corner diagonally opposite where a lodging house now stands, will also fall into the hands of Mr. Desky. With the streets properly widened and stone front buildings on the four corners, that vicinity would naturally become the center of the retail trade which it is Mr. Desky's ambition to make it.

PRAYER ON THE TRIQUOIS.

The Y. M. C. A. Inaugurates the Floating Mission Work.

A committee from the Young Men's Christian Association held a short gospel service aboard the Triquois last night, previous to her departure around the Horn. The ship's boats were sent to take the party aboard and bring them back. They took a small organ with them as an aid in the singing. A quantity of reading matter, magazines, books and papers were also taken on board for the sailors during their long trip. Captain Taylor welcomed the workers in a cordial speech, and the sailors seemed to enjoy the meeting.

This is the first effort in the direction of establishing a "floating mission" for the benefit of the sailors who come to this port. In nearly all the seaports of the states these floating missions, as they are called, are maintained in some places by the Christian Endeavor, in others by the Epworth League or the Young Men's Christian Association, and in still others by societies organized for this special purpose.

Secretary Coleman feels that it is a work that ought to be done here and proposes to make it one of the features of the coming year's work.

JAPAN PROTESTS.

YOKOHAMA, April 5.—At an important meeting of members of the upper and lower houses of the Japanese Parliament today, a resolution was adopted, calling upon the Cabinet to protest against the action of the manufacturers of Sterling bicycles. While these wheels cost double that of Japanese made wheels, the sales are three-fold more.

WHAT SAILOR MEN TALK OF

BARK ANDREW WELCH ARRIVES FROM 'FRISCO.

Two Steamships Due Tomorrow—A Jam on Brewer's Wharf—News and Gossip of the Front.

The S. S. Mogul got away this forenoon for Portland. The schooner Aloha will sail for San Francisco today, with about 1,400 tons of sugar.

The steamer Mauna Loa was late getting away this morning, owing to heavy freight shipments. The barkentine S. N. Castle will have her cargo out today some time. She goes on the berth for sugar after the barkentine Dimond. The Dimond will likely get away this week.

The Hawaiian bark Andrew Welch arrived this morning from San Francisco, after a tedious voyage of 20 days. She brings 1,000 tons of general merchandise to Brewer & Co., 1 horse and 1 cow.

The S. S. Alameda may arrive tonight, although not due until tomorrow. There is small chance of her being delayed on account of the English mails, from stress of weather, at this season of the year.

The ship Iriquois is all ready for sea, but Captain Taylor is waiting for tomorrow's mail, because if war has been declared it is more than likely that he will be ordered to San Francisco, instead of New York.

The bark Marthe Davis is still at the Pacific Mail wharf, where sugar left on the Likelike wharf by the steamer Maun is being trucked to her. Next she will go to Brewer's wharf to get sugar left there by the steamer Iwalani.

There was a jam on Brewer's wharf this morning, owing to the docking and discharging of too many vessels there. The wharf is already pretty well crowded with cord wood from the steamer Morning Star, general merchandise from the ship A. J. Fuller and sugar, and when the harbor master tied the Andrew Welch up there there was a general roar.

GOLD FROM A GLACIER

FABULOUS FIND ON THE COPPER RIVER.

Another Report Which Will Doubtless Start Anew the Exodus to the Northern Gold Fields.

SEATTLE, April 16.—A gold discovery of fabulous richness rivaling the wildest day dream of a modern Argonaut, has been made at the very foot of the Valdes glacier, on an obscure creek, within three miles of Copper City, by W. A. Conover of Red Bank, N. J., according to the story as told by him to a Post-Intelligencer reporter last night. Conover came down from Port Valdes Thursday on the steamer Excelsior. He has in his possession six nuggets of virgin gold, weighing from \$1.50 to \$2.50 each, and he claims to have taken them out in four hours with a shovel and a gold pan, from the surface dirt, and under the most unfavorable circumstances.

Conover says he went to Port Valdes on the schooner General Siglin, on February 14th, and was at Copper Creek but six days, during which period he prospected in the creek from which he partly obtained drinking water, with the result stated. The creek, he thinks, was Elmo creek, but he was not certain of this.

"I had never done any prospecting, and had only a few lessons in handling a gold pan when I arrived at Copper City," said Conover last night, "and while the rest of the boys were fooling around the camp I went out to where we got our supply of drinking water and commenced to prospect. The boys laughed at me, but I stayed with it. I hadn't any idea of finding anything, to tell the truth, but I wanted to practice using the pan. I found a place under the ice at the edge of the stream where the ground was not frozen, and from which the water had seeped, and taking out some of the gravel, washed it out in the water hole out in the ice. In almost the first pan I found one of the nuggets. For four hours I worked like mad and the result was those six nuggets.

Conover has also specimens of heavily mineralized quartz, which he claims to have found in the same locality. The quartz however does not appear to be of much value, the mineral contained in it being apparently crystals of "looking glass" iron ore.

Conover's find, if actually made, is of unparalleled richness, for, according to his statement he never was anywhere near bedrock, and, as a general rule, little gold is found in surface dirt.

PLAIN PATH FOR SPAIN.

STRIKING KLONDIKE BOTTOM

The Klondike craze is already abating. People headed that way are no longer so anxious to get through that they will take any chances on an unseaworthy craft and a large party has disembarked from a vessel because it was unsafe to travel in. The direful result of the trip of the Nevada has undoubtedly alarmed those bound to the gold fields by way of the Coast trip.—Minneapolis Tribune.

A WOMAN HONORED.

The King of Sweden has bestowed on the Scandinavian authoress Clara Tschudi the medal for art and science, it being the first time that a Scandinavian authoress has received this honor. Clara Tschudi's works have already been translated into the German language. They are mostly on historical subjects.

USEFULNESS OF NEWSPAPERS.

A woman who has been attempting to assist a poor family during the winter finally contributed one day a parcel which proved to contain much more comfort than was supposed. This was a large pile of clean newspapers. She instructed the mother to tuck two or three thicknesses in the back and front of the husband's very threadbare overcoat, replacing them as they frayed out; to interline with them the all too thin coverlets of her own and the two children's beds; to put them in thick layers beneath the thin carpet which was stretched on the floor of their tenement room; to stuff them well crumpled around the cracks of the loose windows, and to wear one herself as a chest protector, and also between the shoulders when she went out in the bitter weather; and, finally, when they were absolutely without coal, as more than once had happened, to twist two or three into a thick light twist and light it for the purpose of heat. It is a fact that such a twist will burn nearly as long as a stick of soft wood. The woman was told to come for more as the supply gave out, and the suggestion was regularly complied with, proving that the uses of the newspapers were not only appreciated, but were of value.—New York Post.

SEVENTEEN MILES.

It is curious to note how in every advance made by the United States there has ever been the short sighted party which would have things stay as they are. The "Pacific" has an able article upon the point. Starting with the history of New England, the story is told that the selectment of a colonial town were directed to lay out a road into the Uwilderness "such as would meet the needs of the people." They laid out a road just seventeen miles west, stating "that was as far as it ever would be needed." There have been generations upon generations of the same kind since then, and they still exist. Men cannot understand that a nation must either grow or stagnate, and stagnation means national death.

When the Louisiana purchase was made the followers of the selectment said that it was unwise, it was too extensive, it was more than the Republic could govern. Moreover, the inhabitants were wholly alien and could not be assimilated. One hears the ring of these arguments down to the present.

Later the question of Oregon was under consideration and it was declared it was not worth saving to the United States. Thomas H. Benton said: "The Rocky Mountains may be named without offense as presenting a convenient natural and everlasting boundary. Along the back of the ridge the western limits of the Republic should be drawn." He had only got his road seventeen miles west. When Seward made his purchase of Alaska the descendants of the selectment howled "Seward's folly," the "New National Refrigerator" and "America's Polar Bear Reserve." And so it has been all along the line. There has never been an extension of territory but those selectmen have called out, "hold on now, the seventeenth milestone has been reached. We must stop now."

The favorite phrase at the present time is, not the Rocky Mountains, but the Pacific is the natural boundary. If the United States steps beyond the shores of California, her pretty feet will get wet, and so the descendants of the selectmen have become the anti-annexationists of today. The arguments used against the annexation of the Islands today are absurdly alike those at every stage of the history of the expansion of the United States. There is the same talk of natural boundaries. There is the same talk of alien people to govern, than which no argument can be more absurd, for an ever increasing army of aliens pours into the United States through Castle Garden, beside which our 100,000 is but a drop in the bucket. And then again our so-called aliens are at least half of them accustomed to American civilization, which the Croats, Bohemians, Slavonians, Hungarians, Finns, Italians, Russians, and others who flock in there in tens and twenties of thousands, are not and never will be.

There is also the same argument about the impossibility of giving protection in time of war. It was the argument used in reference to the Oregon land. It was too isolated—the seventeen miles road would never reach it, and how would you get soldiers there? So now Hawaii is too far off, the seventeen mile road can never serve across the water. How are you going to get soldiers there. Yet Oregon would be protected, Alaska would be protected, who can doubt it, and why should not Hawaii be just as well protected?

According to the advices by last mail another effort was to be made to pass the treaty through the Senate. If this is so, it is very evident that the arguments of the selectmen have been shown to be fallacious and that more than two thirds of the Senate have decided to put a few feet more on to that seventeen-mile road, which has been lengthening gradually as the centuries roll by. Let us hope that we may hear good news tomorrow.

The Senate did some good work good work yesterday, and passed a number of bills which have now fought their way through both houses. Bill No. 5, from the House, in its maternal home, was revised three times and then backed about so that its parents could not recognize it. It has since gone through a similar process in the Senate, so that what its appearance may be now is more than any one knows. It is the bill revising the licenses, and is an in-

stance in point of the viciousness of the license system. Do what one will, one must do wrong to some one under that system. It is to be hoped that the object lesson supplied by that bill will have its effect upon both houses and show them the necessity of having some rational and scientific method of taxation instead of the crude methods which we are using at the present time.

POOR CHINA.

The full French demands upon China were by no means modest, and show how the various powers of Europe were intriguing one against the other. They ran as follows:

1. An undertaking that the three Southern provinces, Yunnan, Kuangsi and Kuangtung, shall not be alienated to any other power.

2. A lease of Kuangchow Bay (on the south coast of China, about 200 miles W. S. W. of Hongkong) on the same terms as those on which Germany has acquired Kiaochow Bay.

3. The right to build a railway from Laokai (in Tongking) to Yunnanfu.

4. An undertaking that the head of the Imperial Chinese Post shall be a Frenchman.

Is it to be wondered at that with demands such as these pouring into the government and that government powerless to refuse them, the young Chinese party of the South is ripe for revolt? The position of the Chinese Emperor is most extraordinary. The despised among the nations, he lives in a sort of fool's paradise, not knowing what is really going on in the other world, only hearing garbled accounts of what happens, amid an atmosphere of flattery and adulation to which the court of the most exclusive European monarch is as the air of heaven, and believing himself the very greatest man upon this globe. What an awakening there will be one day, at the court of Peking.

Senator Schmidt of the Senate Commerce Committee shows in his report the necessity of protecting our home industries. In the matter of Hawaiian soap quite a trade has been built up by the soap works, and the article was considered satisfactory by a very large clientele. But its success caused other dealers to have an inferior article made abroad and put up in exactly the same style of packages. As there is no law against this, the inferior and consequently cheaper article almost destroyed the home made trade. With the passage of Bill No. 59, this work will become a misdemeanor. Both this bill and the bill against the adulteration of food and drugs are in the line of benefitting and protecting the consumer, and are among the bits of legislation which appeal most readily to the general public.

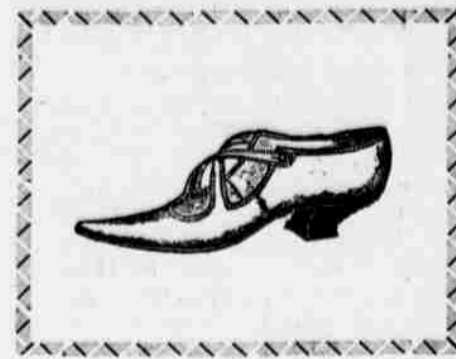

(Continued from Page One.)

"Does the Government claim to own all lands below high tide mark throughout the country?"

"Does the title of the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company in the land upon which it is erecting the wharf differ in its nature from the title of the Youman estate in the land in the neighborhood of Lime Kiln Point and now being filled in?"

"Has the Government at any time heretofore interfered with or objected to the erection of wharves or landings by private parties."

"Does the government now object to the maintenance of any wharf or landing heretofore erected by private parties, other than the wharf of the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company? If so, upon what grounds, and what action does the Government intend to take with reference to the matter?"

Consideration of House Bill No. 52, land act, was deferred to Friday. Senate Bill No. 4, appropriations, passed first reading.

Adjourned.

COSMOPOLITAN CITIES.

In cosmopolitan features New York City once and for many years stood unrivaled in America and throughout the world, and today it is still, as of old, the gathering place of the peoples of all kindreds and from under all skies; but Chicago in these later years has been robbing New York of its former unique position in this, and in certain points is taking the emphasis of distinction in this particular to itself. Chief Justice Fuller is reported to have declared that Chicago "contained more Poles than any city in Poland, more Bohemians than any city in Bohemia, more Germans than any city in Germany, save Berlin, more Irish than any city in Ireland, save Dublin, and more Italians than any city in Italy, save Rome and Naples." What Associate Justice Brewer is noted as having said more recently, in the same type of phrasing, "about saints and sinners," and "heaven and hell," is perhaps, altogether apocryphal, though it is to be noticed that the report has been so well circulated as to appear as a veritable utterance of his in the London newspapers.

LONDON'S FAMOUS CHAIR

ITS SEAT THE STONE ON WHICH JACOB SLEPT.

For Eight Hundred Years It has Been the Coronation Throne of All the English Sovereigns.

The most precious relic in all England and to the English in all Europe is an old gothic chair which stands in the chapel of St. Edward's, in old Westminster Abbey, beside the sword and shield of Edward III. It is made of black oak in the gothic style, and the back is covered with carved inscriptions, including the initials of a great many famous men. The feet are four lions, that look like poodle dogs, with their tails curved up over their backs. The seat is a large stone about thirty inches long by eighteen wide and twelve inches thick, and all the sovereigns of England for the past 800 years have sat upon it when they were crowned. The chair is known as the coronation chair, and the stone is claimed to be the same which Jacob the son of Isaac, the son of Abraham, used as a pillow when he lay down to sleep on the starlit plains of Judah that memorable night as he was on his way from Beersheba to Haran, in search of a wife, says the Chicago Record. It was then that he had his dream and saw angels and archangels ascending and descending a ladder that reached to Heaven, and Jehovah came to him and made the great promise which is being fulfilled to the Jews this very day. And Jacob took the stone and set it up for a pillar, and poured oil upon it, and vowed a vow, and called the name of the place Bethel.

The kings of Israel were crowned upon this stone from the time that they ruled a nation. David and Saul and Solomon and all the rest.

The story goes that 580 years before Christ, at the time of the Babylonian captivity, Circa, daughter of Zedekiah, the last king of Judea, arrived in Ireland, and was married at Tara to Heremon, a prince of the Tuatha de Danan—which is said to be the Celtic name of the tribe of Dan. The traditions relate that this princess originally went to Egypt in charge of the prophet, Jeremiah, her guardian, and the palace of Taghbanes, in which they resided there, was discovered in 1881, by Dr. Petrie, the archaeologist. After some years they went back to Ireland, and from Circa and Heremon Queen Victoria traces her descent, through James I, who placed the lion of the tribe of Judah upon the British standard.

Jeremiah is said to have concealed this sacred stone at the time of the destruction of Jerusalem and the captivity of the Jews and to have brought it, "the stone of the testimony," Bethel, the only witness of the compact between Jehovah and Israel, to Ireland, whence it was known as Iia phail (the stone wonderful). It was carried to Scotland by Fergus I, and thence to London in the year 1296, and has now been used at the coronation of every king and queen of England from Edward I down to Victoria. It is thus the most priceless historical object in the British Empire, as it was the palladium of Israel. It is a curious fact that the altars of Ireland were called Bethel, houses of God.

WOULD BE FORMIDABLE.

We should be careful how we accept the offer of the Colorado women who want to organize a female cavalry troop for service against Spain, says the St. Louis Globe Democrat. The mere sight of such a troop in Cuba would not only paralyze the Spaniards but it might also stampede the Cubans off the face of the earth into the sea.

LABOR PROBLEMS IN JAPAN.

Japan has advanced rapidly and is now discovering that industrial development brings with it the usual accompaniment of a labor problem, says the Westminster Gazette. The first number of the Japanese labor newspaper, the Labor World, has just been issued. "To encourage the progress of the laborer and the formation of the trades unions." We have heard a good deal lately about Japanese cheap labor, perhaps we shall hear something now of the revolt of the Japanese laborers against their being held so cheap. By all accounts the standard of wages and subsistence in the land of the rising sun has not been so high hitherto that the new unions will find nothing to do.

A NEW COMBUSTIBLE.

In the Island of Barkados large quantities of a mineral have been found which the natives call "manjak." It is of a bright black color and occurs at a very slight depth, sometimes on the surface, in beds one to two feet thick. It generally appears under an angle of about forty degrees and in the immediate vicinity of rock. It is presumed to be solidified petroleum, which is often seen there exuding from the earth of floating on the water. In its composition this mineral is similar to the pitch of Trinidad, to the gilsonite of Utah and the Canadian albertite, but it is of a much better quality. The best varieties of "manjak" contained 2 per cent of water, 70.85 per cent of volatile organic substances, 26.97 per cent of ditto solid ones, and 0.18 per cent of mineral parts.

JAPAN BECOMING RESTIVE
 CANNOT UNDERSTAND POLICY OF ENGLAND.

Popular Feeling Wrought to the Highest Pitch by the Partition of China—An Outburst Imminent.

Japan is becoming restive. For the first time since the spoliation of China commenced in earnest, the politicians and the press are exhibiting symptoms of uneasiness which may soon develop into a national outburst that may force the hands of her statesmen. That is not surprising. Indeed, it has been matter for wonderment that the people have, under the circumstance so exasperating for so long a period preserved their equanimity. When we remember that Japan conquered the Liaotung Peninsula and Wei-hai-wei, not by diplomacy, but by the sword, and that she withdrew, under pressure, that the peace of the Far East might not be further disturbed, it is but natural that she should be indignant at what is now occurring.

How popular excitement has been so far curbed and restrained it is unnecessary to inquire, but Japan has certainly shown remarkable self-control. Now, however, the barriers are giving way and soon the populace will be at a white heat. Members of the Upper House and Members of the Lower are already giving vent to their feelings. The Yomiuri, the Hochi, the Jiji and the Nippon, have, with their wide circulations, voiced the nation's anger, and we may be sure the public will soon be responsive. Unless the signs are entirely misleading we are about to witness a state of excitement unequalled since the China-Japanese war.

Against whom the agitation will be mainly directed it is difficult to ascertain. There is much indignation against Russia, but England also has come in for her share of censure. From a Japanese point of view we have no doubt the latter's actions seem unjust. She has desisted by the months of her most responsible Ministers that she will neither take part in the partition of China nor allow others to carve up the moribund Empire. Russia seizes Manchuria, and England so far from attempting to make performance the sequel of the promise, rejoins by taking Wei-hai-wei. In reply France renews her demands and Germany like Oliver Twist clamors for more. A Japanese may be pardoned if he finds this conduct inconsistent. The China Association at Shanghai certainly does not regard the taking of Wei-hai-wei as in any sense the fitting method to uphold England's treaty rights in Manchuria.

SOCIAL SCIENCE CLUB.
 The meeting of the Social Science Club at the residence of Rev. and Mrs. D. P. Birnie last evening was well attended and an interesting and profitable gathering. The principal address of the evening was made by President Frank A. Hosmer of Oahu College. His subject was "Early Civilization in the Valleys of the Tigris and Euphrates." Preceding this address, Dr. Walter Maxwell spoke briefly on the subject of the Kaolin and iron ores found in these Islands. Rev. Dr. M. L. Berger of Ohio gave some personal reminiscences of a visit to the upper Nile.

CONSUMPTION OF TOBACCO.
 A French scientific journal publishes some particulars as to the late consumption of tobacco, which is decreasing in that country, being at the present time about two pounds per head of the population annually, whereas in Holland it is seven pounds, in the United States, five pounds; in Belgium and Germany, three pounds; in Austro-Hungary, two and one-half pounds, and in Canada, about two and one-fourth pounds. The consumption in Sweden and Russia is about the same as in France (two pounds), while in Great Britain it is not quite one and one-half pounds. The same statistician is also responsible for the calculation that the consumption of matches in Europe is 2,000,000,000 in the course of twenty-four hours, being on the average, twelve per head of the population in Germany, nine in Belgium, eight in England, and only six in France, where they are of such bad quality that one would have supposed the consumption must be proportionately greater than in any other country.—London Times.
