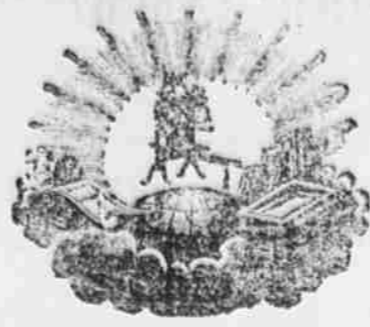

CHRISTMAS.

Though without some of the accessories that give a peculiar spice of enjoyment to the festival in other climes, Hawaii yet observes Christmas, religiously and socially, with an enthusiasm and intensity not falling short of the countries where the day owns its history.

ISLAND OF HAWAII.

Nomination of Nobles.

Official Report of the Reform Convention.

The Central Convention of Hawaii met in Hilo, according to the call of the Central Committee, on the 20th of December, for the purpose of electing a "Noble ticket" for the island of Hawaii.

The Convention then proceeded to the election of officers, which resulted as follows: James Renton, Chairman; C. C. Kennedy, Vice; Stevens, Secretary.

Saturday, Dec. 21.—The Convention met pursuant to adjournment. The committee on resolutions presented their report which was freely discussed. The report, which was passed, is as follows:

progressive administration of public affairs this kingdom has been able to assure its prosperity at home, and to secure and maintain the best wishes of all the friendly foreign Governments;

And whereas, in any constitutional monarchy the Ministry are held directly responsible to the people, and should publicly state their policy on certain issues, we should further introduce and advocate such legislation as may be required, to carry such policy into effect.

And whereas, primaries have been held in the several election districts of the Island of Hawaii for the purpose of placing a Noble ticket in the field, at which primaries certain resolutions were submitted and adopted, calling upon the Ministry to make known their views and policy on the following questions, viz:

1. The Chinese question; 2. Cable communication; 3. Immigration and labor supply; 4. Government receipts and expenditures; 5. The public debt; 6. Political relations with the United States; 7. Internal improvements; 8. The Leper question; 9. Education; 10. Local self-government.

And whereas, said policy, as enunciated by the Ministry, is such as to materially develop the resources, promote the welfare, and increase the prosperity of the Kingdom; Therefore be it, and it is hereby resolved,—That we co-operate to sustain the present Administration, promising it our firm adherence and cordial support, in matters of general policy, and herewith adopt the general policy of the Government for the coming two years as outlined by the Ministry, as the platform of the Reform party of Hawaii, for the coming campaign.

The committee on nominations then presented the following ticket: Messrs. J. M. Horner and J. Kaulane for six years, R. R. Hind and J. Wight for four years, and C. H. Wetmore and S. Parker for two years. The chair appointed Messrs. Loebenstein and Kynnersley, tellers. On motion to adopt the report of the committee, a ballot for the Noble ticket was taken, which resulted as follows: Horner 18, Kaulane 18, R. R. Hind 17, Dr. Wight 12, Samuel Parker 17, C. H. Wetmore 16, besides scattering votes for Messrs. Burchardt, Purvis and Marsden.

POLITICS ON MAUI.

Opponents in Opposition--Criticizing the Constitution--W. H. Halstead the Candidate for Makawao.

Agreeable to notice the first meeting to discuss the political situation and canvass for a candidate to represent the district of Makawao was held at Paia on Monday night last. Mr. J. W. Kalua was elected chairman and upon taking the chair introduced Mr. R. W. Wilcox, who in a few words told, what it was desired to do at the next session of the legislature, for the natives, and briefly explained the political situation as viewed from his standpoint; he also told of his connection with the late unpleasantness in Honolulu, and urged the natives to unite in sending a good man to the legislature.

Mr. W. H. Halstead was next introduced, who spoke as follows: I present myself as a candidate for the legislature, and in a few words will explain my position. There are five parties in the field, each representing different interests, and it is for you to choose which one of these you wish to support. I am in favor of Chinese restriction and the planters are in favor of a restrictive act, but what that act shall be remains to be seen. We want the planters to have their rights and we must uphold them or we sink. When there are so many factions some one must be elected who can conciliate all these conflicting interests and bring harmony out of all this. The natives want two native Cabinet ministers to represent them, and I think they should have them; then if they don't get their rights it will be their fault, and they should go under. I can't say that the Reform party has done everything to injure the country, it would be false if I did; but I do say they have done a great deal to put down the natives and elevate the foreigner. Foreigners are preferred for offices, are enfranchised where natives are not, and many other things have been done that have incensed the natives against the government. We don't want to go back to the old regime where all was corrupt and rotten, but we do want to have something to say about our own government, and will strive hard to preserve its autonomy. If you don't elect proper men to represent you at this term of the legislature, you will lose your country, there will no longer be an Hawaiian flag. We must send intelligent, independent men to the house to enact laws beneficial to all. I advocate certain restrictions on immigration, but in making those restrictions we must not hamper the planter, if we do, we will be biting off our noses. I want to see a good government and the Hawaiian nation perpetuated forever.

Mr. John Kalama was next called. He opened by saying that he wished all hands to stand up and give three cheers for Mr. R. W. Wilcox (which they did with a will). Continuing, the speaker said that from Kamehameha I. to Kalakaua there has been no such man as we look at now and see for ourselves. We have no King now, for by the new Constitution he is only an anomaly. The revolutionists of '87 appointed a committee to wait on the King with a new Constitution which they demanded him to sign within 24 hours or else he would be dethroned. This act was traitorous, and had they not succeeded in their undertaking would have been liable to the severest penalty the law could inflict. What sort of a Constitution have we got? One for the planters and capitalists but not for the natives. We have no King but four haoles who compose the Cabinet are our King; if they like to give the King only poi and salt to eat, he can say nothing, his "Ministers are responsible." Now, I am a lawyer by profession and am enjoying a lucrative practice, but am willing to give that up to serve you in the legislature for four or five months for the paltry sum of \$300. You all know my record as Judge and none can say but that my decisions were just and

right, and I am willing to place myself in your hands. He then went on in a humorous strain to tell about the feast he proposed to give on Friday next at Makawao and concluded by inviting all people of every nationality to be there and partake of his hospitality.

Mr. J. W. Kalua was next called and addressed the meeting in his most felicitous manner. He said I represented you in the legislature from 1880 to '86 and was an independent candidate, opposed to the administration because I knew that it would eventually bring the country to trouble and perhaps ruin. This administration was still in power in 1887 when the crisis came and the haoles usurped the power. At that time they went from house to house, met on the street corners, in halls and other places, and called the King all sorts of vile names, and said the constitution was rotten, and that it must be replaced by a new one, which they forced at the point of the bayonet on the country, and what sort of a Constitution is it? I will tell you, it has made you slaves, by restricting your rights, and giving the power into the hands of haoles. I care nothing for Baldwin and his millions or any other sugar planter who wants to bring in Chinese to the detriment of the natives, and will oppose them with all my strength. The planters tried Portuguese labor, but find that, as they made a mistake by enfranchising them, they want no more of them, and are now flooding the country with cheap Japanese labor. This is a kingdom ruled by sugar planters, and they have enslaved the natives. Other countries have passed through the same ordeal. The United States had four years of bitter war and much blood was shed for the same thing that is now so prevalent here. The native is a slave to be sent to prison if he don't work and if he has no money to pay his line then he has to work for the government. Let us change this, and give the native a chance, stop this wholesale importation of Asiatic labor; make those who are now here work on plantations and, when their time expires, if they don't contract again, kick them out of the country. Don't have them here, to pound poi, cultivate taro, do the mechanical work of the country, or anything else but just plantation laborers' work. At the Lahaina mill they employ one skilled mechanic and the others are Japanese and Chinese; what is the consequence? They are continually having trouble and breakdowns and all on account of cheap labor. Not long ago Mr. Marques went to Portugal as the full-fledged representative of this country, his papers from the King in his pocket; his mission was to secure laborers, but when he got there he was asked in what kind of money the men were paid. He said, in U. S. gold coin; they said, Go to England and get your money changed to English coin and we will go. He went to England but could not obtain the money, as the Englishmen said, "Go away, we want nothing to do with you or your country, it is overrun with Japanese." A great deal has been said about what has been done for the Hawaiian by the old missionaries; we acknowledge that they have done a great deal, but there is a great deal that they have not done. On the Island of Molokai there once lived a missionary by the name of Hitchcock, he, as well as all other missionaries, told the natives that they must marry the women they were living with, and that they must read their Bibles and live good, virtuous lives. The natives listened to these teachings, gave up their old customs, and married the women with whom they were living. Now, in the last Legislature, there was a son of this missionary who brought in a bill, that, if it had passed, would have been the means of breaking up many a Hawaiian home, and that was, if the husband or wife deserted one another that they could not, without the consent of the offending party, be brought

together again. I call that bill perfidious, and that is a specimen of many other bills that this missionary party introduced into the House. He spoke at length about the coming elections, and eulogised the new election law, as it would check wholesale intimidation at the polls. He explained the law as it was on the statute book, and cautioned all voters to abide by it. He also explained the manner of registration and the importance of every voter seeing that his name was on the register. He then urged them to select a good man to represent them, one who had an aloha for them and the land, and not a mere adventurer. He said, if you don't send the proper man to this Legislature you may as well go and fill up with poi and sleep the sleep of the dead. In conclusion he said: I don't advise you to vote for any particular one, but select someone who has the courage to express his opinion and stand by it let come what may. There are some haoles who want the Hawaiians to have their rights, those are with us, let us all pull together and assert those rights and stand by them through anything. He wanted the Chinese coolie confined to work on the plantations, and when that was over, to be sent to his own country.

Mr. Kapule then mounted the rostrum and, after a few remarks upon the object of the meeting, called for a choice of candidates. His choice was Kalama, and he desired all who were in favor of him to make it manifest by standing up. Only one or two stood up and Mr. Kapule, seeing that he could not enthruse the audience, gracefully retired.

Among the haoles present were Capt. Heimemann, Dr. Crane, and Mr. Noble, all of whom addressed the meeting, after which it was dismissed.

On Friday another meeting was held at Makawao, where the same people spoke. Upon a call for votes for choice of candidates, Mr. Halstead received 30, Mr. Kalama 18, Mr. Kamakele 26, Mr. Kala 0. Mr. Halstead being the choice by ballot he will run as a candidate to represent the district.

It is rumored that Mr. Dickey will be run as the Reform candidate, but nothing definite is known about it yet.

There will be a called meeting of the voters for Nobles at Kahului next week and then candidates will be regularly nominated. N. Hamakuapoko, Dec. 21, 1889.

A SIMPLE PROMISE TO PAY.

[From the NEW YORK TIMES, June 22, 1889.]

The Equitable Life Assurance Society has adopted a new form of policy which, like a bank draft, is a simple promise to pay without conditions on the back.

[From the CHICAGO INVESTIGATOR.]
