PINKHAM ASKS WALLACH MEN TO PROVE THEIR INTEGRITY

Kona Tobacco Lands Of Bishop Estate Are To Be Opened

The Bishop Estate intends to open up large tracts of its immense holdings in the Kona districts to tobacco planters in the near future. Jared Smith has reported that great areas of these holdings are splendidly adapted to the cultivation of the fragrant weed, having been sent there to investigate the matter by the Bishop Estate.

"Yes; Jared Smith and Mr. Blacow of the Hamakua tobacco experiment station made an investigation of our lands in Kona with regard to their suitability for tobacco culture," said Superintendent Frank S. Dodge of the Bishop Estate this morning. "Mr. Smith has made only a preliminary report so far, but in this he states that there are several thousand acres of our holdings which are suitable to tobacco culture. As a matter of fact, he says that they are the finest tobacco lands in the Islands. He will not make his full report on the matter until after he has completed his annual report which is to be sent to Washington.

"Have you decided on the manner in which these lands are to be opened?" asked the reporter.

"We are going to open them," answered Dodge. "But we will not make any arrangements for that until after we have received Mr. Smith's next report, which will give full details as to the location of the lands in question and other matters connected therewith."

CALCUTTA CONSUL WANTS FARM HERE Secretary Wood Tells Of Promotion Work

The Promotion Committee will hold its regular meeting this afternoon. Secretary Wood has prepared the following report which will be submitted at the meeting:

DEMANDS PROOF Of Cures To SAVE INNOCENT GUIDED BY PEOPLE AT SETTLEMENT

The Board of Health met this afternoon promptly at 3 o'clock with all members present. Nottley and Wallach were at the meeting. President Pinkham's outline of the Wallach proposition was read as follows:

Thursday, October 24, 1907.
Resolves of the Board of Health:

In behalf of the proposition that the privileges of Section 1127 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii relative to the medical treatment of leprosy be extended in a limited degree to one J. Lor Wallach you have the petitions of ten members, representative of the Hawaiians, one of Mrs. Makawellwell et al of Kalaupapa, lepers, and one of five hundred and twenty-seven lepers residing at the Molokai Settlement.

The impropriety of political parties taking part in action on the problem of the cure of disease is so obvious these petitions should not be considered except to be courteously returned.

The petition of the Committee of Ten representing the Hawaiians deserves and I believe will at the proper time receive the serious consideration of the Board.

Mrs. Makawellwell's petition has been already granted as she simply requests the special services of Dr. Goodhue, he to exercise his judgment as to Wallach's remedies provided they are secured.

The Settlement petition now before you is the only one ever received from lepers asking the direct services of J. Lor Wallach.

I am not aware that J. Lor Wallach or his unlawful practices, or his threats of criminal deeds and political and social anarchy has the approval of a single Hawaiian. I know the people of the Settlement indignantly repudiate the imputations fixed on them by Mr. Wallach.

At the meeting of lepers held at Kalaupapa, October 15th, those present appointed a committee of seven of their ablest representative men, men of character, intelligence and sound judgment and placed the matter in their hands, where it now remains.

At ten o'clock on the 16th inst. this committee held a long conference with the President of the Board of Health. Every phase of the subject was quietly and deliberately considered.

The conclusion of the committee, as to the alleged cure of leprosy by J. Lor Wallach can be best given in the words of two of its members.

Mr. J. S. Wilmington said: "We are like drowning men catching at straws. This cure may be only a straw, but do not refuse us even this slight chance."

Mr. Wm. Nottley said: "We are like men going to the Klondike hoping to find gold. We know the chance of finding it are very small, yet we wish the chance to try."

The balance of the committee concurred in these sentiments.

The President of the Board pronounced the following question: "On what grounds do you base your belief that there is a possibility of a cure by J. Lor Wallach?"

The reply was: "Because our friends have written us they have seen cures of leprosy by Mr. Wallach."

I stated the Board was absolutely without evidence of such cures—that from the beginning the Board had asked for evidence, but had been repeatedly refused although claimed to exist;—that the Board had never demanded the possession of any secret; that the use of Wallach's remedies had never been refused provided information and evidence was furnished in any degree that could justify their trial, legal conditions being complied with.

I promised to further their wishes before the Board of Health so far as sound judgment and the law would permit.

The Board of Health is composed of conscientious and intelligent men, whose integrity and devotion to public health and the best welfare of every person under their care and control cannot be questioned, and is a body of men to whom any person, afflicted or

Mouritz Authorized By Wealthy Men To Buy Out Wallach

Certain wealthy men have placed a sum of money in the hands of Dr. Mouritz to buy out Wallach in case he, after a thorough investigation, saw fit to do so. Dr. Mouritz was seen about the matter this morning, and in answer to the reporter's questions he prepared the following written statement:

"Dr. A. Mouritz—I am not anxious for any publicity. I will say that some members of the State and House approached me after the turn-down of Wallach by the Board of Health, and requested me to look into the Wallach treatment.

"I have seen some of the cases treated by Wallach, and am satisfied he can restore crippled hands and feet, and feeling in unsensitive spots returns. Whether the effects are permanent I am not prepared to say.

"Furthermore, money has been placed at my disposal by certain wealthy citizens to buy Wallach's remedies if I saw fit. I do not care to say anything further at present."

In this connection Dr. Mouritz explained that he had been engaged in investigating the Wallachian treatments, but had not as yet finished this. He was satisfied that Wallach could do the things mentioned above, but they were nothing more than most physicians could do. The reason that that had not been done in Hawaii was that whenever a leper had applied to a physician for treatment he had been immediately turned over to the Board of Health.

HART BEFORE TERRITORIAL GRAND JURY

The Territorial Grand Jury is in session today and is still working on the warehouse fire investigation. Loyal Hart and Expert Accountant Davis were before the inquisitors today and it is believed the investigation is nearing a close. The Grand Jury will probably make its report tomorrow. It was thought that a report might be made this morning, but nothing was done, and the plea of Hart again went over, this time until Monday morning.

**BOARD OF TRADE

**GOV'R WILL REVIEW
AT AALA PARK
N.G.H. ON SUNDAY**

The review of the National Guard of Hawaii will be held next Sunday afternoon at Aala Park and will be at that time reviewed by Governor Frear. The majority of the men composing the N. G. H. are employed at various trades throughout the city and a number are engaged on the fortifications now under way at Diamond Head. A Saturday afternoon review would cause considerable inconvenience to a large number of the Guard and in some instances an actual loss in wages.

Governor Frear is desirous of making the review before he goes east and it has been determined to hold the review on Sunday afternoon as above stated.
There will be four companies of infantry in heavy marching order, a signal corps and hospital corps.

**BIG REWARD FOR
GOOD SUBMARINE**

Washington, October 8.—Hoping that some company or individual will enter the field and build a satisfactory submarine Secretary Metcalf has withheld about \$500,000 of the appropriation made by the last Congress for such boats. Seven have been contracted for, and of those some will be assigned to the Pacific Coast, but how many has not been determined. But one type of boat proved satisfactory in the tests held last spring at New York. One other builder whose boat did not come up to the requirements may decide to build one which may do so.
At present the Government faces a virtual monopoly in submarine torpedo craft. The Government, however, is in no position to advance expenses to experimenters, who must go ahead on their own responsibility. For a practical boat, equal to the type now in use, there is a chance of a rich government reward.

BEING PROPOSED

During the rush season the canneries now in operation are not near equal to the demands made upon them by the daily receipts of fruit from the western end of this island. There are many new pineapple plantations being developed around the Wahiawa and Waimea districts, and in a short time will be adding large quantities of fruit to the already heavy shipments for canning purposes. A movement is on foot at the present time looking toward the establishment of a new cannery in the Pupukea district, and if indications count there will be a first class plant in operation there before long.

It is probable that the propeller was injured. A diver will be engaged today to make a thorough examination into her condition.

DECISION REVERSED

San Francisco, Oct. 15.—The Appellate Court, sitting in Sacramento yesterday, reversed the decision of the Superior Court of Santa Clara county in the suit brought by three of the children of the late James Campbell of Honolulu against their mother, Abigail K. Campbell-Parker and their sister, Alice K. Campbell. The action was brought to set aside the sale of certain valuable real property in San Jose on the ground that the defendants used fraud in the administration of Campbell's estate.
The property involved includes the St. James Hotel in San Jose and is valued at \$250,000.

Captain Otwell has received no bids for the hauling of the material for the Diamond Head fortifications. The contractors claim that the road will soon be rendered impassible by the hauling, and that it will be practically impossible to haul the entire 20,000 tons which will be required, over it even if it were put in some sort of shape, as is now being done by the Corps; which, however, has not sufficient funds to make the road sufficiently 'lasting' to withstand the heavy traffic which the building of the fortifications will necessitate.

The next boxing contest that will be held in Maysville will be between Kyle Whitney and Dick Sullivan, who have signed articles to fight there on the 25th of this month. The weight will be 150 pounds at 7 o'clock, and each has posted \$250 for weight and appearance. This will give Sullivan a big advantage from a weight standpoint, as the colored bruiser can train as low as 140, although he will be around 145 when he enters the ring. Sullivan is by far the best man he has been pitted against, and as the Honolulu champion is a pretty shifty boxer, he may be able to outpoint Whitney.

Will Challenge YACHTSMEN OF SWEDEN ARE PREPARED TO HAVE A TRY FOR AMERICA'S CUP

Stockholm, Oct. 14.—William Olsson and Goesta Kyhlberger, who are at the head of the movement here to build a challenger for the America's cup, say that a large portion of the money required to construct and sail a 90 footer, estimated at about \$189,000, has been subscribed. Many large manufacturers have offered to furnish material gratis and the captain and three mates of the yacht will sail her without any pay; the designer will accept no compensation for his work and the builder will charge only the net cost of construction. Messrs. Olsson and Kyhlberger think they will now be able to guarantee funds even for a 95 footer if required.

LIPTON MAY HAVE CHANCE

New York, Oct. 13.—Commodore William C. Towne of the Brooklyn Yacht Club, one of the oldest in America, having been organized in 1857, has taken up the question of international yacht racing in a manner that many believe will meet with popular approval, and if his plans are carried out Sir Thomas Lipton may still have an opportunity to race in these waters in 1908 for a trophy which, while it may not have the historical value of the America Cup, will be of more than treble its intrinsic value.

At a recent meeting of the Brooklyn Yacht Club Commodore Towne proposed that the club offer a cup valued at from \$2500 to \$3000 for international competition by vessels of a seaworthy type built under the rating rule now in use by the principal clubs of America and England. Accordingly a committee of three, consisting of Colonel David C. Austin, Victor H. Koehler and C. B. Schock, was appointed to consider the best means of bringing about such a contest and to frame the rules that shall govern the races for the new trophy. 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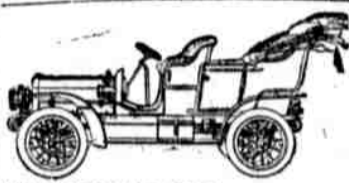
