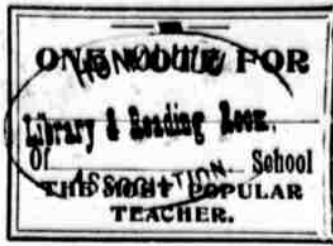

Big Deals in Hilo Railroad and Government Bonds

Two hundred thousand dollars' worth of Hilo Railroad Company's six per cent bonds were sold at par today. H. Waterhouse & Co. effected the transaction, selling \$170,000 to the Robinson Estate and retaining \$30,000 for themselves.

In order to negotiate the deal it was necessary to sell \$170,000 of Hawaiian Government 6 per cent bonds, which were purchased by the Bank of Hawaii. The meaning of the entire transaction is that cash from outside is obtained for Hawaiian bonds in anticipation of their being paid by the United States Government, which cash immediately goes into large local development enterprises. In this case \$170,000 goes to the island of Hawaii for distribution in liquidating contracts, labor and supply bills, etc.

H. Waterhouse & Co. are negotiating for the sale of \$200,000 more of Government bonds, the proceeds of which will go into Hawaiian enterprises.

CORNER ON STAMPS.

Someone went to the Post Office this forenoon and bought all the 12 cent Hawaiian stamps left in the safe, the sum paid in being in the neighborhood of \$5000. Postmaster General Out, was asked as to the identity of the buyer, stated that he could not divulge it just now.

It is stated on good authority that the value of the 12 cent stamps has advanced to 20 cents. There has been quite a run on this particular denomination for some time past.

Poor Little Doggie.

Another afternoon paper announced a couple of days ago the rescue of a poor little doggie many miles off the shore of Kaula, swimming for dear life and just on the point of going down "the third time." Somebody evidently played a trick on the reporter, for the little doggie was picked up in the harbor.

HOGAN CASE GOES TO JURY

William Eston Pleads Not Guilty to Charge of Murder.

Large Batch of Nolle Prosequis Entered—Fine for Heedless Driving—Matters in Probate.

William Eston, charged with the murder of Toyo Jackson, pleaded not guilty before Judge Stanley. Charles Downing, charged with the murder of Geo. Poal, was given trial tomorrow to plead, on the application of his counsel, Mr. Creighton.

Piggott and Hausler's trial for larceny went over this morning until the afternoon on account of the illness of Mr. Henshall, attorney for defendants. F. M. Brooks is assisting the Deputy Attorney General in prosecuting this case.

Judge Stanley this morning disposed of the following cases as stated: Lal Fu, assault and battery, nolle prosequi. Deputy Attorney General Dole and P. Neumann for prosecution; Humphreys & Andrews for defendant. Lau Wai Suck and Kim Soon, assault with dangerous weapons, nolle prosequi. Deputy Attorney General and Humphreys & Andrews for prosecution; Neumann for defendant. F. J. McGettigan, larceny second degree, nolle prosequi. Deputy Attorney General and J. W. Cathcart for prosecution; S. F. Chillingworth for defendant. Philip J. Kerch and N. Hill, larceny second degree, nolle prosequi. Same counsel as in previous case. Mike Castello, heedless driving, changes plea to guilty and is fined \$10. Defendant in person. R. A. Faulkenberg, larceny second degree, continued until August term, defendant allowed to go on his own recognizance, at request of Deputy Attorney General. H. R. Hitchcock for defendant. George Miller, larceny second degree, nolle prosequi. Cathcart assisting prosecution; Hitchcock for defendant. Tai Cheong, violating building regulations, transferred to jury, waived calendar. Neumann for defendant.

Both sides had rested at noon in the Hogan damage case against the Canadian-Australian Steamship Co. Judge Davis passed upon the requested instructions to the jury, and then declared recess only till 1 o'clock. The closing addresses of counsel to the jury would then begin.

The ship E. B. Sutton, Carver master, sailed for San Francisco this forenoon with a cargo of 47,348 bags of sugar, weighing 5,860,965 pounds, valued at \$251,496.50 and shipped by the following: 6707 bags by C. Brewer & Co., and 40,641 by Castle & Cooke to Welch & Co.

To Molokai on Business.

H. R. Hitchcock and F. H. Foster, both of whom are interested in the Kamalo plantation situation, left for Molokai in the Kinau this forenoon, for the purpose of obtaining certain facts and figures. The situation has arrived at such a stage that the presence here of the manager, P. Mc Lane, will very probably be necessary, and he may accompany Messrs. Hitchcock and Foster back to Honolulu.

Vacant Circuit Judgeship.

President Dole announced to the Executive Council this morning that he had received Gardner K. Wilder's resignation as Circuit Judge of the Third and Fourth Judicial Circuits. These are the two circuits of the island of Hawaii. The filling of the vacancies—for each of the circuits is to have a separate Judge—is the prerogative of the President of the United States.

FAMILY TROUBLES AIRED.

Mr. Markel, the Punahou dairyman, and his wife, figured quite prominently in the Police Court this morning, the charge against the former being assault and battery on the latter.

Mrs. Markel stated on the witness stand that on last Friday her husband told her to wash certain milk pails. She refused to do this and asked him if he thought her a servant. At this, he insisted that she wash the pails and upon refusing again, he chased her and threw a big stick at her. This struck her in the leg, causing severe bruises.

Mr. Markel, taking the stand, stated that his wife had not attended to her duties at home, that she was abusive and had taken to drinking heavily of late. He chased after her because she told him three times in rapid succession to go to the infernal regions. While turning around to look at him, she ran against a tree and bruised herself in the leg.

Just here it became necessary for Judge Wilcox and Mr. Markel to go into the former's private room to examine the bruises on Mrs. Markel. Marshal Brown insisting that these had been made with something thrown from behind and not by contact with a tree.

Judge Wilcox suspended sentence on Mr. Markel for three months and tried to patch up the row but the two parties refused to come to terms.

When Mr. Markel was bewailing certain unfortunate happenings in the family, Judge Wilcox made the very apropos remark of "There is no use crying over spilt milk."

The Oahu jail team of ten men shot a score at the Iwilei butts this morning. That the men are improving is proved by the following scores: Leialoha, 4; Kamana, 43; Kawai, 43, and Cockett, 43. The next lowest scores were 39 and 36.

DEMOCRATS ARE SIZING UP

Wednesday Night Mass Meeting to Find Out Who's Who.

Dr. McGrew and C. J. McCarthy the Active Leaders—Speakers Scheduled for the Preliminary Work—Public Invited.

The Democrats of Honolulu have issued a call by general consent for a mass meeting to be held on next Wednesday evening. The use of the Drill Shed has been secured for the occasion and the arrangements are in the hands of Dr. J. S. McGrew and C. J. McCarthy.

Dr. McGrew said this morning that the main object of the meeting tomorrow evening would be to take steps for a preliminary organization of the Democratic Party in Hawaii, and to allow Democrats to get acquainted with one another. They wanted nobody except Democrats on the roll and they intended to find out "who were who," before appointments were made and delegates elected. The island and Honolulu would be divided into districts and precincts, but this work might be deferred until a future meeting. There was no slate prepared and would be none unless it was discovered by the Advertiser. The doctor said that he was himself uncertain who many of the Democrats were, but he was very certain there were a good many in Honolulu and the Islands, as the future elections would show. The Democrats did not intend to make the blunder of drawing the color line and they believed a portion of the natives would vote with them.

It is the intention to have a number of prominent Democrats address the meeting and others will be called upon from the audience. Among those mentioned to speak are Dr. J. S. McGrew, Chas. J. McCarthy and E. P. McClanahan. It was the original intention to have elected W. C. Wilder as chairman of the meeting, but owing to illness that gentleman will not be able to be present and another man for the position has not yet been selected.

The meeting will be held in the Drill Shed tomorrow evening at 7:30 o'clock.

Prepare for Sale

of the Royal Relics

R. J. Green is in charge of arrangements for displaying the relics of the late monarchy to be sold at auction on next Thursday at 10 o'clock. The articles are now being invoiced and labeled, and the display will be made in the Drill Shed immediately after the Democratic meeting on Wednesday evening. There are many pieces of furniture and some valuable pieces in the collection, among which was noticed the fine case of silverware, containing several hundred pieces, which was the gift of the French Government about the time of the coronation. Seven years ago when the invoice was taken of the present property and placed in Mr. Green's hands, a prominent gentleman in Honolulu, now dead, offered a handsome price for this particular case of silver, but was refused. The articles of the set will now probably be sold separately; they are all of the finest quality and in the best condition.

Mr. Wichman is at work today, at the request of the Minister of Finance, placing a value upon each article of silver ware, and it is probable that an upset price will be arranged for before the sale begins.

Since the arrangement and invoicing of the articles began E. K. Lillikalani, with a native assistant, has been present for the purpose of seeing that there are not any further articles belonging to the Kapiolani estate or to Lillikalani among the lot. Nothing of importance has thus far been discovered. Several old native women were also present during the morning for the same purpose, and, if their story had been listened to they had a claim through some member of the former royal family upon every article in the room. Mr. Jas. Boyd of the Interior office succeeded in convincing the women that it was all "pau" and they finally left.

Kaahumanu Schoolhouse.

The Executive Council has recommended to the Commissioners of Public Instruction that the name of the new Beretania street school house be changed to be Kaahumanu school.

\$176,000 LAND TRANSFER

Beautiful Town Homestead of Dr. McGrew Is Sold.

Hon. Alex. Young and Bishop Estate Purchasers—Magnificent New Business Block—Sixty Foot Street

The old homestead of Dr. J. S. McGrew on Hotel street has been sold to Hon. Alexander Young and the Bishop Estate for a sum aggregating \$175,000; of this amount Dr. McGrew will receive \$150,000. This means the passing of the old social landmarks of old Honolulu made famous in the local and political history of the past three decades. The march of improvements following annexation will soon be seen in the block bounded by Hotel, Alakea, King and Fort streets, as will be seen by the following brief interviews given the Bulletin by Hon. Mr. Young and Mr. Dodge:

Hon. Alexander Young was seen today about the intended improvements on the McGrew property just purchased. He said: "The Bishop Estate and myself will put a street through from Hotel to King streets. The new street will be sixty feet wide. I will build on the East side of the new street, to be named hereafter, a row of buildings of the very best class, both fire and earthquake proof, with all the latest modern improvements. The buildings to be erected will have steel frames, and all the floor will be either of concrete or of tiling; they will be four stories in height and fitted with improved elevators and the block will have an electric plant of its own. The length of the street to be occupied by these buildings will be 458 feet frontage on the new street, with a frontage of 61 feet on King street and 151 feet on Hotel street.

"As yet I have made no definite arrangements as to plans or style of architecture; but while at the Coast I will look into these matters very closely and prepare for the immediate erection of the buildings. Wm. Mutch will have the control and superintendence of construction and will probably visit the Coast with me in two months from now for the purpose investigating the latest methods of construction adopted on the Mainland."

Mr. Dodge of the Bishop Estate said: "The Bishop estate retains control of the entire frontage on the Ewa side of the new street, amounting to 439 feet, the frontage on King street of 195 feet, and that on Hotel street of 82 feet; this land the estate proposes to subdivide in the near future. The Arlington House property will be vacated on the 31st of next August with the view to the erection of new buildings. A new hotel project is being considered, and, if proper terms can be secured, a new hotel building will be erected upon the north corner of King and the new street.

Administrator Removed.

Judge Gardner K. Wilder has ordered the removal of C. R. Collins as administrator of the estate of A. F. Collins, deceased, and has ordered that all money, property and effects of the estate be delivered to Daniel Porter, clerk of the Third and Fourth Circuit Courts. The motion was made by the Hilo Mercantile Company, Ltd., and the order, received in the Kinau, was filed May 4.

Injunction Suit.

The Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Co. H. N. Lanford, Manuel Jose and John Pereira Rieo have brought in the Circuit Court of the Second Circuit suit for injunction and to cancel lease against the Maui Sugar Co., Ltd., and twenty-nine natives and Chinese.

On a Health Trip.

J. M. Vivas, the well known Portuguese attorney, left for Hilo in the Kinau today. He will spend a couple of weeks at the Volcano and will then go into the mountains of the Kona district.

Mr. Vivas has been in very poor health for several months past and his doctor has advised a change. His stay on Hawaii is indefinite.

U. S. S. Iroquois.

It is expected that the Iroquois will leave for Midway Island Thursday or thereabouts. She is being fitted up anew and all the coal possible will be crowded into her bunkers. Seventy bags will also be placed on deck. Arriving at Midway Island, the Iroquois will very probably come to an anchor in some secluded spot and use her boats for the work which she goes to perform.

New Notaries Public.

W. O. Aiken of Paia, Maui, and J. S. Lenhart of Kalaoa, North Kona, Hawaii, have been made notaries public by the Executive Council.

Make Gravel Fly.

By vote of the Executive Council today, the Minister of the Interior is authorized, until further notice, to draw from the appropriations for Honolulu roads and bridges at the rate of \$10,000 a month. This liberal expenditure ought to make road work lively in the city.

PUBLIC WORK HUSTLES.

Inquiries at the office of the Minister of Interior disclose that all the payrolls, under the appropriations passed by the Council of State and approved by President McKinley, are immediately available and work will be pushed in various directions at once. The pumping plant for Kalihi can now be paid for and the work thereon will be pushed to a finish. The work on the new Diamond Head reservoir, under the direction of the Superintendent of Public Works, will also go forward and the new harbor work provided for will probably begin as soon as Minister Young returns from his three weeks' vacation, beginning today.

Assault With a Knife.

Kanakaunui was arrested yesterday on the charge of assault with a knife on his wife. The case came up in the Police Court this forenoon and, when asked what he had to say, stated that he was drunk and knew nothing of his actions. The case was set for tomorrow to give defendant time to employ counsel.

The wife is cut in seven or eight different places in the face and her hands are also badly cut. She made a special appeal that Kanakaunui be kept in jail no matter how much money his relatives might put up to get her out. She was afraid the man would kill her.

BARCKHAUSEN FOR LAHAINA.

Wailuku, May 11.—Manager Ahlborn is reported to have decided to withdraw from the management of Pioneer mill. Mr. Barckhausen of Kipahulu is said to be scheduled for the position at Lahaina.

Charles Lennox, formerly at Ewa and with Mr. Lowrie at Spreckelsville, is to be the manager of the new Labor Bureau to be established by the Maui planters.

At the Orpheum.

Hogan's new play "A Country Coon" was presented for the first time last evening to a large audience and was received most favorably. The piece is of the musical-comedy order and contains many humorous situations, some clever dialogue and many new songs and choruses for which Hogan has furnished the music. "A Country Coon" bids fair to be a success both in Honolulu and in the States. New scenery has been painted for the production and the play is well mounted.

American Ship Ashore.

Lourenzo Marques, May 3.—The American ship William H. Macey, Captain Groth, from Vancouver, is ashore at Cocksburn Shoal. The British warship Forte has gone to her assistance. The William H. Macey is of 2,092 tons. She is 254 feet 9 inches long, 43 feet 2 inches wide and 28 feet 3 inches deep. She is owned by J. C. Eschon & Co., and hails from San Francisco.

The troubles of the English war office serve to show what a small amount of provocation the critics of our War Department had.

Porto Rico may and indeed has its troubles, but the citizens of that island are glad that they do not live either in Kentucky or Nebraska.

The evening contemporary laboring under the delusion that the Governor appoints the commissioner of labor will do well to peruse the Territorial law a little more closely.

Minister Youn gis to be congratulated on the prompt business like manner in which he is taking up the public work for which the Council of State provided ample funds. With Mr. Young's business administration there is no blockading of the purpose of legislative activity by dilatory tactics.

Not the least of the blessings conferred upon the community by Mr. Young's activity is his securing the expenditure of \$10,000 a month for Honolulu streets. Road Supervisor Campbell may be depended upon to place our streets in condition to once more give prominent mention from taxpayers and tourists.

The official organ blandly admits that it prefers a \$75 job to a fair minded administration by the Executive Council. For an additional \$25 the Advertiser would doubtless come out under the colors of the Democracy for whose success it has devoted much space by seeking through misrepresentation to knife the Republican party at its inception.

It is really amusing to note the hopeful spirit in which some of our good citizens cling to the old "Our Party" idea. It will not be surprising after the Republican and Democratic parties are organized to have Our Party, which arrogates to itself all the "intelligence" of the Territory organizing a "peace club" "for good government" and the usual spoils from the winner.

With straight American parties in full swing when Hawaii's first elections occur the chances of corruption or incompetent men being put to the front is reduced to a minimum. The progressive citizens of the Territory will carry out the spirit of annexation to its least and most complete detail. Those who want to hang on to past politics are free to do so and become political nonentities.

Progress, as interpreted by the history of the last two years, will be a slow coach when compared with the solid development and universal prosperity that will make memorable the first years of the Territory. Republican prosperity makes mighty poor working material for the Democrats, but there is always honest admiration to the men whose loyalty to party principle leads them to make the fight, though defeat at the polls is assured.

How's this for expansion? Last year, 1899, the exports of American farm products and manufactures to Cuba, Porto Rico, Hawaiian, Philippine and Samoan Islands increased by more than 100 per cent. Besides this, nearly \$6,000,000 worth of American flour went to the Orient last year, an increase of \$2,000,000 since 1898, most of it for China, Japan, and Asiatic Russia. Uncle Sam has two good stepping stones to Oriental trade, one at Honolulu and the other at Manila.

If the group of anniversary celebrations is to be followed with two elections during the present year, Hawaii will have no necessity for rain making experiments, nor will there be any lack of excitement. Chances favor that the first election will be as good a show to attract tourist traffic as a four ringed circus. Certainly the people cannot be taken to task if after having been indifferent to politics for six years, they let loose with a friendly enthusiasm that will put stirring events of past history in the shade.

VOTERS SHOULD ACT NOW.

In view of the fact that certain elements in the local political field are at their happiest when condemning American politics as corrupt and parties as organizations to be shunned, it is not strange that Hawaiian citizens unacquainted with the facts of American government are disposed to play a waiting game and hesitate to take up political work on straight American lines. Almost without exception those charging American parties with being hotbeds of corruption and machine rule are prominent among theoretical jobbers who sneer at patriotism and can accept no opinions but their own. Appreciating that they cannot get votes they condemn with great eclat the foundation principles of the nation and the majority who support them and upon whom the nation depends in its hour of need.

Hawaiian citizens entering upon the privileges and responsibility of American citizenship have their future political fate in their own hands. They have to decide whether they will accept the misleading say so of pessimistic theorists or will immediately exercise their full rights, and boldly, honestly and actively ally themselves with the American parties and make their fight for popular government upon American lines. Leaders represent the voice of the majority. Citizens of this Territory who are standing back, because they do not know American politics, while the parties or forming are merely losing their best opportunity to shape party principle and political action and placing popular leaders at the front. By withholding now, voters are playing into the hands of men who will lose no opportunity to restrict the franchise and force class legislation upon the Territory. They are also lessening their influence in the councils of the national Congress, casting their voting power to the winds where their enemies would like to see it go.

Mugwumps may howl as they please that citizens of the Territory have nothing to do with the national parties or politics, the fact remains that the citizens of Hawaii cannot reform or improve national politics of the American people. If our people desire to exert any influence for the furtherance of the best interests of the Territory they must act through and with the American parties formed on American methods. Selfish interests of the Territory, loyalty to the party that gave the people manhood suffrage demand that every voters of this city shall attend the primaries, and attending shall vote for those men in whose broad minded integrity the people from the waterfront to Tantalus, Diamond Head to Barber's Point, have confidence.

TRADE WITH ORIENTAL GROWS

Washington, May 3.—That our sales to the Orient are rapidly growing is shown by the latest export figures of the Bureau of Statistics. While there has been a continued growth in our exports during the past fiscal year, by far the largest percentage of gain has been in our trade with the Orient. To Europe, our exports during the eight months ending with February, increased 5.4 per cent, as compared with the corresponding months of the preceding fiscal year; to South America, 8 per cent; to Asia, 35 per cent; to Oceania, 51 per cent, or to Asia and Oceania combined, 44 per cent; while to Africa there was a slight reduction, owing to the disarrangement of commercial conditions there by reason of hostilities. Taking our exports as a whole, it is found that the increase during the eight months has been 9 per cent, while the increase to Asia and Oceania has been 44 per cent.

The Treasury Department has ordered a special agent to proceed to the Pacific Coast to investigate the matter of the large influx of Japanese coolies to this country within the last few months. The question is still troubling the immigration officials. Until two or three months ago the immigration of Japanese to the United States was small. It has been increased so as to excite suspicion that the men are coming here as contract laborers. The Treasury has also requested the State Department to ask American consuls to investigate the matter and make reports.

The Buffalo Strikes.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 3.—The striking car repairers of the New York Central, will return to work in a body tomorrow morning. This was agreed upon at a joint meeting of the Car Repairers' Association, held at East Buffalo tonight. The other roads did not adjust the difficulties with the car repairers today, and while amicable negotiations are pending, that may be concluded tomorrow, the situation on these lines is unchanged. There were no positive developments in the strike of the freight handlers today.

Spion Kop Despatches Subjected to Post Mortem

London, May 4.—The telegraphic correspondence relating to the Spion Kop despatches, was issued to Parliament just before midnight on Thursday.

Lord Lansdowne, Secretary of State for War, wired on March 28th, asking the advice of Lord Roberts about publishing the despatches, saying: "We cannot publish all the documents enclosed with your despatches of February 13th," and suggesting certain despatches, which, in Lord Lansdowne's opinion, might be published.

Lord Roberts replied to Lord Lansdowne, in a despatch dated Bloemfontein, March 31st, that he had suggested to Sir Redvers Buller to prepare a full narrative, but that Sir Redvers Buller had answered as follows: "I do not at all like the idea of rewriting a despatch for publication. I much prefer to leave it in the hands of the Commander-in-Chief. Let him select for publication whatever he thinks proper."

To this Lord Roberts appended that he would not himself object to the publication of a paper edited as Lord Lansdowne had suggested, but that it might, perhaps, be better to over-ride General Buller's objection, and to adopt the alternative course suggested by Lord Lansdowne. He asked Lord Lansdowne to wire a reply.

This reply from Lord Lansdowne, dated April 2d, said: "In view of Buller's objection, I abandon the proposal that the despatch should be rewritten, and I propose to publish the selection described in my despatch of March 28th."

Lord Roberts answered under date of April 6th: "I agree to my despatch of February 13th being published." The correspondence also contains two despatches referred to in Lord Lansdowne's despatch of March 28th. The first is from Lord Lansdowne to General Buller, dated January 5th, representing the impossibility of publishing his despatches, which "contain views of the situation and forecasts of his intentions," and emphasizing the advisability of sending despatches descriptive of the operations for presentation to Parliament.

The second is from Lord Wolseley to Lord Roberts, dated February 6th, and saying: "You will, I fell sure, agree with me that Methuen's despatch, regarding Magersfontein, could not be published as sent. There are passages in it inappropriate to such documents, and it also gives information of importance to the army. If he likes I will revise the despatch, but I prefer not to undertake this responsibility. I suggest that you should ask him to cancel this despatch, and to write another."

The correspondence does not indicate whether Lord Methuen re-wrote the despatch as suggested. The Spion Kop despatches as published were exactly the selections suggested in Lord Lansdowne's despatch of March 28th. REFORMATION IN CHINA

[From the Celestial Empire.] There is every reason to believe that not a few of the officials who hailed with delight the eclipse of the former party are beginning to change their tune somewhat. They were quite pleased to have the party that believes in "squeezing" in power, and to heartily practice that Celestial art without let or hindrance. They, however, did not bargain for the atmosphere of restlessness and suspicion which now pervades the palace, causing its inhabitants to take fright at almost anything. Downright bad officials who are able to diagnose accurately the present temper of their superiors are not averse to taking advantage of it to wreck the careers of men who stand in their way. The accusing and counter-accusing which is going on is doubtless making many apprehensive as to their future, so that honest magistrates—and there are such—and bad ones are alike to be pitted at present. Some who have sought to protect and indemnify native Christians who had suffered loss at the hands of the Boxers had some good stiff adjectives thrown at them, while some who did nothing have met with similar treatment. After all, the lot of a Chinese mandarin is not an enviable one.

Frequently, of late, our northern correspondent has heard that the Emperor has given up all thought of reforming his country, and has once more settled quietly down, under the domination of the clever Empress-Dowager. If all reports be true, till quite lately he had maintained a vigorous protest against the doings of his aunt, and denounced the retrogression carried on in his name. It may be that he has found out the uselessness, under present circumstances, of openly opposing the current of conservatism which flows so strongly. Besides, he may not fully relish the way in which his death is spoken of, nor the pleasure with which the near prospect of that event is contemplated by those around him.

Kipling and British Public.

London, May 3.—The Daily Chronicle publishes an interview with Rudyard Kipling. When asked to what he attributed the British military unpreparedness, he replied: "Mainly to the great British public, who have never taken the army seriously, and who have thus unconsciously encouraged the system of playing at soldiers; to people who have objected to rifle-ranges, because they made a noise, or were dangerous to individuals who got in the way; to people who have made so much fuss about a dozen soldiers going through a farmyard as if a field-day were a bean feast, and consequently helped to make proper maneuvers for many years an impossibility; and to people who think an officer a cad if he wears the Queen's uniform when not on actual duty. These have been preparing the way for Stormberg, Magersfontein and the rest. The result has been the loss of thousands of lives."

Fighting Ship Subsidy.

Washington, May 3.—The foreign shipping interests opposing the shipping bill are chiefly those engaged in the trans-Atlantic trade, and they are centering their opposition upon the only American line in competition with them in the European trade, by alleging that the Standard Oil Company controls that line, which statement is absolutely untrue; by alleging that one-third of the money available will go to that one line, which is also untrue; by alleging that slow freight carriers are more useful to the nation in time of war than are fast steamships, which our war with Spain demonstrated to be untrue. It is the consuming fear of these foreign steamship lines that the bill will strengthen the American line and cause large additions to its fleet from American shipyards, and they have the best of reasons for just that fear.
