Piles of paper await judges of land cases

A stack of documents four feet high wait in the office of Associate Judge Ramon G. Villagomez. Also patiently waiting are the disputed land owners of 21,000 sq. meters of property in San Roque, and island landowners in general.

What they are waiting for is the decision of Villagomez in a case involving whether there is any way persons of non-Marianas descent can purchase property in Saipan.

The attorney for Diana C. Ferreria, Traylor Mercer, claims Ferreria has title to the land and it is hers. But, Theodore R. Mitchell the attorney for Isidoria M. Salas, Felisa M. Babauta, Carmen M. Guerrero, William M. Borja, Luna M. Borja and Patricia B. Robert, claims Ferreria was only used as an agent because she is of NMI descent, and the real persons who acquired the land, Frank F. Ferreira and Mr. and Mrs. James H. Grizzard are not of NMI descent. Continues on page 39

Bishop says church needs much work

The first of seven phases in the renovation of the Mount Carmel Cathedral in Chalan Kanoa has been completed, Bishop Tomas A. Camacho of the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa said in a recent release.

"Although renovation of the roof was completed recently, renovation

work on most areas of the church is far from done," Bishop Camacho said, adding, "we expect work on the ceiling to be completed by the end of this week.

The next phase in our renovation effort is the electrical system for both the interior and exterior of the church," he said, "This phase alone is a major undertaking and we are appealing to our people and friends from within and without the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa to assist us foot the cost of this and other phases of our renovation effort over the next 10 to 12 months."



Representatives of the CNMI and U.S. governments were all smiles Wednesday afternoon as they walked out from an extended final session of 'pre-902' talks. Lt. governor Pedro A. Tenorio and U.S. 902 negotiator Becky Norton Dunlop said the conversations were fruitful, and a tentative date of October 17 has been set for the next

But, the two declined to say what they talked about, or if any concrete negotiations had been culminated. Tenorio said that productive progress has been made on many issues, including resolving the questions surrounding granting of citizenship and U.S. passports to CNMI citizens.

Neither negotiator wanted to reveal what had been discussed in the five days of tours and talks, but Tenorio and Dunlop said that there were still "ironing out a firm agenda" for the next meeting on Oct. 17. Dunlop told the media that she had asked the next meeting be held in Washington D.C., and Tenorio had suggested the 'neutral ground' of Hawaii.

"Classification" of private sector is questionable

Legislators are now deciding whether a "worker classification" system should be implemented in the Commonwealth. We question if such a law is enacted, how would it be enforced? Also, will the government's personnel office decide who is "classified" into what job?

Parts of the bill which basically set up a clearing house to match resident worker skills with employers who need them is also a good idea. But, wouldn't an employment agency do the same thing? Such an agency would in turn create more

The free marketplace is the arena in which salaries and hourly wages are set - not the legislature. Merchants decide who they want to hire and how much they will pay. If the solons want to do what should be done, then they should enact a fair minimum wage law and be done with it. While many of them are businessmen in their own right, they do not have the expertise or experience to say what a reporter, accountant, cook, barber, etc. should be earning.

The Variety feels that certain provisions of the proposed law which would allow the CNMI personnel department to to create a classification system " . . . consistent with the job classification system presently being implemented by the Civil Service Commission for Civil Service Employees of the Commonwealth Government . . " goes far beyond the scope and authority given the representatives of the people.

We feel that like a few other laws which have been passed - or suggested - there is a lot of righteous talk about "this needs to be done . . " and then they pass legislation which says it SHOULD be done. But, no money is appropriated to the correct agency to make sure that it happens.

In effect, they pass a law that looks good on paper, and most of all to the voters. But in actuality, the law has no teeth.

If such a law is passed, then enforcement and complaint procedures would fall on the busiest department of the government - Commerce and Labor - to investigate in their "spare time." We all know what would happen then. Complaints of wage violations would be reported and investigators would have to make choices of looking into labor permits, commerce violations, or the NEW paperwork thought up on Capitol Hill.

How long has it taken you to get a labor permit lately? That's about how long - or longer it would take to get a "classification" problem ironed out.

We respectfully suggest that the legislature let the free market place seek its own level. There is no such thing as a classification of workers in the United States. Frankly, we think the idea is a little too paternalistic for a free society, and may also fail a constitutional test of discrimination.


The government should not impose its crony system of personnel management on the private sector. To do sowould be the kiss of death for development here.

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Educator's workshops will help 1988 classes learn

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PSS - Public school students in Kindergarten, Headstart and first grade throughout the Northern Marianas will learn more when school starts on September 6 because of the two workshops their teachers

attended August 15 - 19 in Saipan, PSS officials said.

The two workshops were "Teaching Aids and Strategies and "English as a Second Language in the Content Area." Some 37 teachers from Rota, Tinian and Saipan attended both workshops. Six of them were Headstart teachers, two for each of the three islands; and the rest were from Kindergarten and first grade.

Dixie Thompson, a Hawaii Pacific College Instructor, taught the "Teaching Aids and Strategies" workshop in the morning, and Doris Calkum of the Honolulu-based Center for Advancement of pacific Education (CAPE) instructed the "ESL in the Content Area" workshop in the afternoon.

"You have all the creativity. All you need is time and the materials provided to you," Ms. Thompson told the participants on the last day of the workshops, held at W.S. Reyes Elementary library.

In the morning workshop, the teachers made visual aids for use in language instruction. Among the visual aids were charts, games,

"This workshop was a practical hands-on kind of thing, and the teachers say this is what they need," said Margo Vitarelli, who coordinates the PSS Bilingual Transitional Program, which funded the morning workshop. She said the teachers took their visual aids with them and will use them in the classroom this fall.

The Bilingual Transitional Program's goals, Ms. Vitarelli said, are to support both the local languages and English, and to help kindergarten, Headstart, and first grade students learn their own languages first so they can transfer the skills they learned in their own languages to English. The ultimate goal is to be proficient in English, she said.

Vitarelli said the afternoon workshop, funded by CAPE, was related to the morning session because it focused on how children learn language, what is the right age and method for children to learn language, how the brain functions, and different theories on the best way to introduce a second language.

"These workshops are fruitful, and they will help me in my work," said Carmen Atalig of Rota Elementary. Carmen Pangelinan of San Vicente Kindergarten Program shared the same feeling, saying: "I got a lot of good ideas from the workshops."

PSS Staff Development Coordinator Joseph M. Diaz said the workshops were sanctioned by the CNMI Personnel Office as he handed out certificates of completion to the participants. The certificates were signed by Board of Education Chairman Luis Limes, Education Commissioner Henry I. Sablan, and the two instructors.

Marcos' must stand trial in U.S. for murder of union officials

SEATTLE (AP) - Former Philippines President Ferdinand Marcos and his wife, Imelda, must stand trial to determine whether they had a part in the slaying of two union leaders in 1981, a federal judge ruled.

In a decision she said was certain to be appealed, U.S. District Judge Barbara Rothstein denied a request Monday by the deposed leader and his ife to be dismissed from a wrongful death suit filed by relatives of the slain unionists. The case is scheduled to go to trial next year.

Silme Domingo and Gene Viernes, anti-Marcos reform leaders in the overwhelmingly Filipino Alaska Cannery Workers Union, were gunned down at the union hall on June 1, 1981.

Their survivors filed suit the next year, claiming in part that the Marcos regime ordered the shootings. The Marcoses claimed

A second federal judge dismissed the Marcoses as defendants in the lawsuit in December 1982, while Marcos was still president. In 1987, after the Marcoses fled the Philippines, Ms. Rothstein ruled they had to stand trial, and her decision

Monday reaffirmed that ruling. "Head-of-state immunity serves to safeguard the relations among foreign governments and their leaders - not as the Marcoses assert, to protect former heads of state regardless of their lack of official status," the judge

"This court believes it is neither inequitable nor disturbing that a foreign official who takes refuge in the United States must defend the legality of private acts committed in the United States,' she added.

Other defendants in the case

paid for the slayings. The Marcoses fled the Philippines for the United States in February 1986 when Corazon Aquino was sworn in as president. They now live in Hawaii.

In an interview Monday, Malabed said he and Marcos have been close friends.

"I have no doubt even if he stood trial in Seattle that he would win the case because there is no evidence," Malabed said.

George Greer, a local attorney representing the Philippines in the case, said he had yet to see evidence linking Marcos or the Philippine government to the



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
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
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
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












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Ogumoro is perhaps first Carolinian to be a Deacon

After the Sunday ceremony Ogomuro will be returning to Guam where he presently stays.



Sablan remembered when the bill for funding was first passed in 1984. He called the process,







Chinese workers attacked by thug

Police say they have not had a great deal of time to do substantial investigation into a recent beating of two Chinese garment factory workers because of recent

But, these two Chinese young people still recovering from the bumps and bruises of that night about two weeks ago, want to know who attacked them and

Liu Da Wei, 21, and Li Pei Yi, also 21, are from Guan Dong Province in Mainland China. They knew each other in school and when they contracted to become factory workers at the Eurotex plant in San Vincente their acquaintance grew into more than just friendship. As all young people do when they like each other they try to find places to be alone and talk, and to do other things people in love like to do.

Speaking through an interpreter who asked not to be identified, the two told their tale of terror on that night. Both said they had found a "small house" near the basketball/baseball complex in San Vincente. It wasn't far from their barracks at Eurotex and they could walk their together hand-in-hand. Despite repeated warnings from the plant's management that they wouldn't be responsible for anyone who went past the plant's gates after 11 p.m., they decided to 'sneak off' to be together for a while because the barracks were crowded and offered little or no

"We were just sitting there talking," the interpreted said for the young people. "We weren't doing anything wrong," the young lady said through a split lip and with a obviously-swollen

Suddenly they noticed a large man approach the little building they were in. He walked around

the building and then they decided the time had come to leave. But, when they tried to leave the man attacked the young man, hitting him in the back of the neck with what he described as a limb. "I could feel the wetness on the stick," he said.

The young man was knocked to the ground and as he lay there the girl started to run away. The man chased her and caught her by the hair throwing her to the ground. She then passed out, the interpreter said.

As all this was happening the young man came to his senses and then ran to his lady's assistance whereupon he was hit again by the bigger man. The girl came out of her swoon, tried to run away again and fell in her haste, passing out again.

Finally the commotion apparently alerted neighbors across the street because the attacker ran between two houses and disappeared.

The young man was taken to the hospital and treated for head injuries and the young girl for scratches and bruises. Police then came and interviewed them, promising a thorough investiga-

Although Eurotex has been the scene of problems involving Chinese workers in the past few weeks, both the young man and his girlfriend said they did not believe that the incident was related to the differences. Asked if both wanted to stay in

the Commonwealth and continue working, they shook their heads, saying that they had been through enough here and wanted to return to their home province.

They also declined to discuss the labor problems at Eurotex, saying that they felt it was better left to the people trained to do

"All we want is to fins out who did this to us - and why .. " the

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
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Pete A. upset with 902 press

Before Wednesday's 902 meeting was held lt.gov. Pedro A. Tenorio made clear some of his 11 of the Commonwealth's feelings about how the area's media have covered the 902 meeting with Becky Norton

"There are several important issues that have been raised in the press during the last week or two.I would like to comment on those issues and correct a couple of misconceptions,"Tenorio said in a press release issued Tuesday from his office.

Misconception number one, according to Tenorio's statement, was the participation of members of the legislature in the consultations with Dunlop.

"As far as I'm concerned, the acceptance of this appointment is a public service by members of the legislative branch and is above constitutional reproach," said Tenorio.

Questions had been raised in the legislature by several of its

members and by legal counsel over who should be seated on the 902 committee. With some saying it violated Article 2, Section

Tenorio added that he saw no conflict of interest over members of the legislature serving with members of the executive branch. "I see no possibility of any conflict of interest raised by this service to the people of the Commonwealth,"said Tenorio.

Next the lt. gov. went on to attack "one editorial in the local

That editorial, said Tenorio, "suggested that, on the eve of the talks, I have brashly asked the President of the United States to rescind an Executive Order issued more than 22 months ago. He was referring to Executive Order 12572, which treats the Commonwealth as a territory or possession of the United States.

executive order was first lodged

back in Nov. 1986 less than three weeks after it was first released. He also defended his desire to

have substantial progress made during the visit of Dunlop.

"It has been suggested that the Commonwealth delegation has unfairly rigged these consultations by trying to force the President's Special Representative into substantive discussions during this Fourth Round of Consultations,"Tenorio said.

"We believe that further delay on many of these issues will be to the detriment of the Commonwealth," said Tenorio.

In support of his argument, Tenorio cited the ruling of the Internal Revenue Service that bonds issued by the Mariana Islands Housing Authority are tax-"This finding alone may cost

the Commonwealth up to an estimated \$20 million. Our desire to Tenorio said that protest on the get to work on this and other issues is proper," he said.

Corps will allow the dredging of channel

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers issued a federal permit on Aug. 23 for dredging of the boat channel and construction of boat ramp protection and other improvements at Sugar Dock in Susupe, Saipan, Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.

According to Col. Chip Wanner, Honolulu District Engineer, the Commonwealth's Division of Fish and Wildlife will perform dredging and construction to improve the facilities at Sugar Dock. The existing 40-foot long boat channel will be dredged to a depth of three feet. The 800 cubic vards of dredged sand and gravel will be dewatered landward of the dock before disposal at an upland

Protective revetment will be constructed adjacent to the boat ramp, using about 100 cubic yards of rock. Eight concrete piles with navigational markers will be installed on each side of the channel.


Project plans also provide for shoreside improvements consisting of a parking lot, resurfacing of a portion of the dock, brush clear- > fencing and lighting.

The application for this permit was publicized in March 1988 for public review and comments. "The concerns and issues raised during the ensuing evaluation period for this application have been resolved satisfactorily, leading to the decision to grant the permit," Wanner said.














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Tinian Scouts attend Summer Camp fun



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
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
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ARCHITECTS, ENGINEERS AND SURVEYORS

Public Law 4-53 (4 CMC, Div. 3, Ch. 1) requires that all individuals practicing architecture, engineering, surveying and landscape architecture in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands hold a current and valid professional license issued by the CNMI Board of Professional Licensing. This licensing requirement is in addition to the business license issued by the Department of Commerce and

P.L. 4-53 is both a practice and title law. As such, anyone who practices one of the above professions or offers to provide such services must be licensed in the CNMI before practice begins or before such services are offered.

Failure to comply with the requirements of the Law or willful and knowing violation of the Law is punishable by a penalty of up to \$5,000 or imprisonment for up to one year or both.

Applications to Practice and copies of the Law can be picked up at the Board of Professional Licensing Office, 2nd floor Administration Building, Capitol Hill, Saipan or can be received by mail by calling (670) 322-4316/17.

NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC

Effective August 26, 1988 the Commonwealth Utilities Corporation Water System Regulation duly recorded in the Commonwealth Register is in full force and effect.

The Public is advised to familiarize themselves with the documents which can be obtained from CUC. Lower Base.

The Public is further advised that the below stated Article of the CUC Water Regulations is immediately enforced.

ARTICLE XIV CUSTOMER'S PUMPING INSTALLATION

- 1. Customers shall not be permitted to install or operate pumps that pump water directly from or into the mains of CUC.
- 2. If a customer would like to have a pumping system in his own premises, such pumping should be done from his own storage tanks. Such storage tanks should be constructed after the meter and there should be a 6" air gap between the inlet pipe to the tank and the maximum level of the tank.
- 3. All existing customer pumps after the effective date of these regulations shall cease to operate until approval is given by CUC. Failure on the part of the customer to comply with this regulation shall be subject to disconnection of the water services until requirements have been made.
- 4. A written approval from the Chief Engineer shall be obtained for construction of such storage tanks.

Any person(s) found to be in violation of Article XIV CUSTOMER'S PUMPING for installation will be subject to immediate disconnection without further notice.

Sablan goes on to say that he believes a "special interest group" is trying to push the federal government out of the Commonwealth.


"I maintain that we need the assistance of these federal agencies,"said Sablan.


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
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

But, he said when the Commonwealth had trouble getting money from federal agencies to start building the homes then "CDA-through MIHA advanced \$10 million dollars to the contractor (OCK)." The release then said that when the CDA and MIHA officials borrowed and advanced the money "before securing required approval from federal officials, this was bad judgement."

Repeating old charges against MIHS that they did not even obtain competitive bids for the project, Guerrero said the project was begun before there was even a determination of need for the homes themselves.

But, he said theblame is not with the contractor, OCK, but with the Republican administration and the government. He said that OCK was "an easy target ... We are blaming them for all of the problems. Some of the problems we are encountering are creatures of our local decisions: Not FmHA, not OCK, not GAO."

AIR CRASHES:

Nine Die In Dallas

GRAPEVINE, Texas (AP) -A Delta Air Lines jetliner carrying more than 100 people crashed and burned on takeoff Wednesday at Dallas-Fort Worth Airport, killing at least nine and injuring more than 30, officials said.

The Boeing 727 en route to Salt Lake City went down in hazy sunshine, broke in two and burst into flames on a flat, grassy field near the runway.

Many passengers climbed to safety through a blackened hole in the top of the cabin, burning themselves on the red-hot wing. Passengers aboard another flight who watched in horror as the plane went down chanted "Get up! Get up!," a witness said.

Delta spokesman Bill Berry said at least nine people were killed and that about 60 survivors were healthy enough to continue on their way. The three pilots survived, although one suffered a severe backinjury, he said.

At least 32 people were admitted to seven hospitals, hospital officials said, but their condition was not immediately known. Other passengers were treated

"The plane had slid sideways about the last 100 yards on the ground. It wasn't a violent crash. It wasn't cartwheeling or anything like that," said Jerry Weeks, who works for an airport shuttle bus service and talked to some of

"They had no idea what happened," Weeks said.

The fire was brought under control quickly, but the partially blackened, split-open fuselage smoldered more than an hour after the 9:03 a.m. accident.

Flight 1141, which originated in Jackson, Miss., carried more than 97 passengers and seven crew members, but the exact number was not known because infants are not on passenger lists,

"The important thing is that the airplane was 1,000 feet from the end of the runway," Berry said. "his had to aid rescue efforts."

Investigators had no immediate indication of the cause of the crash, said Michael Benson, a spokesman for the National Transportation Safety Board.

However, a source involved in the federal investigation said early indications were that the jet took an unusually long time to become airborne, that it climbed to only about 80 feet, and that the left wing struck the runway first. The source spoke on condition of

An NTSB team of investigators was sent to the scene. The Boeing 727 is one of the most popular commercial jetliners ever made, flown by more than 170 carriers.

A Chinese jetliner with 89 people aboard skidded off a runway while landing in heavy rain today and broke apart in the sea. Officials said seven people were killed, including six crew members trapped in the submerged

Fifteen people were reported injured, and 13 of them were hospitalized in fair or satisfactory condition. The airline said two of 12 Americans on board were in-

A rescue operation at Hong Kong's airport involving divers, a flotilla of boats and five helicopters began after Flight 301 plunged into Victoria Harbor at 9:19 a.m. Later in the day, a huge floating crane lifted the crumpled jetliner from the water, and an investigation into the crash began.

The bodies of the six crew members were found in the front part of the plane, according to Tui Hin-cheuk, divisional commander of the fire services department.




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Japanese protest U.S. ships in their harbors with nukes

YOKOSUKA, Japan (AP) — As many citizens of the Commonwealth know, the CNMI is considered a fall-back site for the big Subic bay naval base in the Philippines. Many of these ships contain nuclear weapons, and one island nation - Palau has already said they don't want them.

Hundreds of protesters demonstrated from hilltops and in a flotilla of small boats Wednesday as two U.S. warships capable of launching nuclear missiles arrived at the home port of the U.S. 7th Fleet.

The two ships are the first to be stationed in Japan with launchers for Tomahawk missiles, which are made in both nuclear and non-nuclear versions.

"Get out from Yokosuka!" 100 people shouted in English at the gates of the naval base as the Ticonderoga-class, guided mis-sile cruiser USS Bunker Hill and the destroyer USS Fife arrived in the port, 30 miles southwest of

A coast guard official said the warships arrived without inci-

Forty-two coast guard patrol boats escorted the ships into the port to prevent the approach of 28 small boats carrying protesters andbanners reading "No Tomahawks," the official said. He spoke on condition of anonymity.

Japan forbids the production, possession, or introduction into the country of nuclear weapons. Nearly 200,000 people died in the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in the world's only atomic attacks, during World

After the arrival of the ships, more protesters from civic and peace groups, labor unions and the Japan Communist Party staged separate rallies at a park overlooking the port, outside the naval base and elsewhere. Police reported no arrests.

Protesters said the biggest rally, sponsored by the communists, drew an estimated 1,000

On Tuesday, Yokosuka's 48member city assembly unanimously passed a resolution calling on the government to cancel the arrival of the U.S. warships.

The mayor and governor lodged official protests Monday with the Japanese government, saying it had not done enough to ensure that the ships were not carrying nuclear weapons.

Local oficials and civic groups have charged the ships may be carrying nuclear-tipped Tomahawk missiles, in violation of Japan's anti-nuclear policy.

'We hope our grassroot struggles will spread to a national movement," said Yoshiko Saito. a leader of a citizens' group staging a sit-in near the Yokosuka city

Both the 9,600-ton Bunker Hill and the 7,810-ton Fife are capable of deploying Tomahawk missiles. Under a security agreement, the United States has pledged to notify Japan if it plans to bring nuclear arms into the

However, critics charge the Japanese government uses the agreement as a way of avoiding the question of whether U.S. ships dock in the country with nuclear weapons aboard.

Prime Minister Noboru Takeshita told reporters that the government would not ask the United States to confirm whether the ships were carrying nuclear missiles, because "we trust each other in such matters," Kyodo News Service reported.

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
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
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

Bordallo wins big in Ninth Circuit BY BOB EGELKO two other convictions: tampering

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) _ A federal appeals court Tuesday overturned the nine-year sentence and most of the criminal convictions of former Guam Gov. Ricardo Bordallo, who allegedly exchanged political favors for payoffs.

In a 3-0 decision, the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals said four bribery-related convictions had to be reversed because the federal crime of bribery applies only to state officials and Guam is a territory, not a state.

The court also reversed four extortion-related convictions because the jury was not told that it must find Bordallo demanded or otherwise induced the payoffs, totaling \$79,600 in cash.

The court ruled recently in another Guam case that extortion does not cover payments that an official accepted without either a request or an understanding that the donor would get benefits in exchange. The ruling, if it stands, would entitle Bordallo to a retrial on those charges.

The court upheld Bordallo's

with a witness, for asking a supporter to lie to the grand jury, and a related charge of conspiracy to obstruct justice.

But according to Bordallo's lawyer, the entire nine-year prison sentence was for the extortion convictions. He was given suspended sentences on the other

Bordallo, a Democrat elected in 1982, was indicted a few days before the 1986 Democratic primary. He won the primary but was defeated in November 1986 by Republican Joseph Ada. He has been free on bail during his ap-

Prosecutors said Bordallo approved government contracts and permits for various firms in exchange for payments, mostly delivered to him in unmarked enve-

The money was described by the donors as campaign contributions or gifts, but never was reported by Bordallo in his campaign statements, authorities said. He also was accused of approving a \$103,000 government contract for a company that agreed to hire his campaign manager.

U.S. Attorney K. William O'Connor was on-island Wednesday and Thursday, but was not available for comment Thursday. However, he said in a Pacific Daily New article that he will ask the solicitor general's office in Washington D.C. to appeal the case to the Supreme Court . Bordallo was convicted of allegedly receiving over \$70,000 in

exchanged for allegedly giving political favors.

This new ruling from the appeals court now could place a heavier burden on the Commonwealth's Attorney General's office to investigate and prosecute so-called "white-collar crime" in the CNMI. In the past attorney general Alexandro Castro has said that he felt his office should not become involved in prosecuting such crimes because the United States has a bigger budget and more manpower.

The attorney general has become embroiled in a controversy stemming from a speech he made before the Saipan Chamber of Commerce in which he said that he would NOT prosecute those either given light sentences, plea bargained sentences, or probation under CNMI law.

Now, it appears - unless the Ninth Circuit Court is over-ruled, that the only legal entity which can prosecute those accused of bribery or like charges in the CNMI is the AG's office.



Ninth Circuit ruling may affect feds here

Editor's note: A news analysis is composed of fact, as well as the observations and theories of the author. It differs from a 'regular' news story which contains only fact or quotes from sources.

A Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling which overturned eight of 10 convictions against former Guam Governor Richardo J. Bordallo could also have a serious impact on future trials and possible federal indictments in the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas.

The decision was unanimous

This is the second Ninth Circuit decision which has affected the the way United States laws are interpreted here. The first was the Ninth Circuit's ruling which reversed a bribery conviction against that Territory's former head of schools.

That decision had a profound effect in the Commonwealth because the court ruled that she could not be convicted of receiving money under the official color of office; in other words, bribery.

At that time the United States was planning to re-file charges conspiracy to commit extortion and extortion charges against Commonwealth personnel director Jesus P. Mafnas. Also, like charges were pending against other former and present Commonwealth officials for allegedly taking hundreds of thousands in kickbacks from construction companies.

Before all those trials could occur, the U.S. Attorney's office dropped all charges against Mafnas and the others because the U.S. said the jury plan from which the petit juries would be formed was defective.

Former Assistant U.S. Attorney George Proctor and his boss,

K. William O'Connor said the cases against all of those who had charges dropped would be brought before the grand jury for possible re-indictment.

Speculation in the Commonwealth was that the new charges would deal with bribery, as well as possible extortion. However, the Bordallo decision - if allowed to stand - would hobble the U.S.' ability to bring "bribery" charges against public servants. The Ninth Circuit ruled that the bribery statutes do not apply in Guam - as they do the 50 states - thus those convictions are void.

Local political activist Larry Hillblom said in a Thursday discussion that since the bribery statutes do not apply in Guam, that also can not apply here. Under the Covenant, laws which are applicable to the Commonwealth are those laws which were in effect on that date BOTH in the several states AND Guam.

Since the court has ruled the statutes do not apply to Guam, they now do not apply to the Commonwealth. "All they have left now is extortion - something hard to prove," Hillblom said.

"Breach the contract..." is one answer: Juan Pan

Senator Juan (Pan) T. Guerrero is turning up the heat under the Mariana Islands Housing Authority's debacle with OCK Construction Company - Sugar King housing project. He has filed a press release that says continuing with the project "... no longer makes financial, or political, sense to continue with..."

He is also suggesting that MIHA and CDA should back out of the deal and take the financial loss.

Guerrero's press release filed late Thursday says that "What started out as an attractive housing opportunity for Commonwealth residents has instead turned out to be an inhibitingly expensive housing project.

He outline the "nightmare," as he called it, saying the \$80 million bond issue had to salaged to retain its tax-exempt status by using a certain percentage of the money for public projects. Juan Pan said the initial idea of building 300 homes on improved sites for \$15 million was a good idea.

DUI bill would soften jail terms

A bill which would call for possible community service in lieu of jail time should the presiding judge decide instead of a jail term for first conviction on DUI charges is now being considered by the House.

The bill would make first offenders subject to imprisonment for not less than 72 hours nor more than one year and a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1,000 and suspension of driving privileges for at 30 days and not more than six months. With the court having the discretion of saying whether or not the 72 mandatory hours be served in jail or in community service.

The bill has already passed through the Senate in late August and has been commented on by various agencies.

Edward Hayden, assistant attorney general, said," I am sure the court will exercise its discretion wisely. The community will be served by first offenders instead of Commonwealth footing the bill for incarceration. I also believe seventy two hours of community service is a continues on page 24

Work begins on \$4.1 million water project to serve villages

Shovels dipped into sand at the Susupe basketball court Wednesday as government officials, members of CUC and others symbolicly broke the ground for construction of the long-awaited\$4.1 million dollar water improvement project to serve Chalan Kanoa, Susupe,San Vincente and Kagman.

The project will be divided into two phases, one being the re-

placement of pipes and the installation of meters on the waterlines in Chalan Kanoa and Susupe.

The second part of the project involves the construction of a second water reservoir tank in San Vincente. That tank will hold a half-million gallons.

Also water distribution lines and transmission lines will be put in from Kagman to San Vincente.

Completion dates for the two phases were estimated at one year

for the San Vincente phase and 540 days for the Susupe and Chalan Kanoa phase by OCK Construction officials in charge of actual construction.

However, the lt. gov. Pedro A. Tenorio urged that the project be completed as soon as possible. "I urge you to expedite this project," Tenorio said during his ground-breaking address.
