## Reorganize the Police.

EDITOR PRESS:—Reorganization of that very important body of public servants has become a generally recognized necessity throughout the Kingdom. Not a week passes without complaints from various localities on the other islands of the inefficiency of the police; in fact, the inefficiency is so notorious and is so conspicuously a subject of unfavorable comment, or perhaps I should say scandalous remark, throughout all the islands of the group, Oahu not excepted, that there is nothing doubtful about the expediency of thorough reorganization. This is no new subject for criticism; much has been written and said about it; communications and complaints from citizens whose interests are jeopardized appear in almost every issue of the weekly papers, but apparently without effect. It would seem that those officials who are at the head of this branch of the public service, and therefore responsible for the incapacity of their subordinates, are secure in their positions, the public weal to the contrary notwithstanding. Why this should be is difficult to understand. There should be nothing mealy-mouthed or tender-footed about attacking this abuse of official patronage; it is a question that directly affects the welfare of the people and society, and in which all are interested.

If the Marshal of this Kingdom were qualified for his office twenty years ago when crime of any description was of exceedingly rare occurrence here and he has not kept pace with the changed conditions of society and is not now qualified for the present requirements of his office, he should step down and out and give place to some one who can better protect the interests of the people, their lives and property. If he retains inefficient subordinates in office he is responsible for their incapacity and should be held strictly accountable; no political, religious, or social affinities should protect him. A discriminating public, though appreciating his long service, will be unkind enough to expect results—ability instead of pretence. If he is a man to whom nothing new can be told, who always knows just what is going to happen etc., his great wisdom should be directed with effect toward the suppression of the illegal liquor traffic among the Chinese; or perhaps he might capture a few of the burglars who have been experimenting around Honolulu so much of late; in fact, there are many duties pertaining to his office that a man of such wisdom should surely be able to perform successfully.

If the corpulent and incompetent Sheriff of Maui must necessarily be led on government pay and cannot possibly be relegated to the quietude of private life; if it is against State policy to remove him and give some more deserving servant a show; or if the influence of relationship or otherwise is powerful enough to retain him as a public servant against the public interests, perhaps it would be well to make diligent search down the list of government positions for some place that he is qualified to fill, and transfer him and give the people of Maui what they much need, an able Sheriff. If the people of the district of Makawao wish to retain an able officer in whom they have confidence and with whom they are satisfied, why are they not allowed to do so? If the Sheriff of Hawaii does not suit the people whose interests he is supposed to serve and does not fulfill the demands of his position, the influence of relatives should not have power to retain him in office; and why, if he must needs be maintained in his position, should his incapable deputies at Hamakua and Kau retain their places against the loudly proclaimed protests of the people most interested who live in those districts? In criticising the conduct of public servants it is proper in most cases to embody specific allegations in order to give weight to argument, but in this case the proofs of incapacity are so abundant and the subject is so well understood by the people that the general charge of incompetency will be accepted and the necessity for reorganization be admitted without dispute.

However, in this connection, a few of the demoralizing effects of the incapacity in this branch of the public service may well be considered. The illicit traffic in liquor and opium is most pernicious in its effects upon society and the welfare of the people. Statistics prove that this traffic is largely on the increase. At the late Planters' Convention it was stated that upwards of 10,000 gallons of intoxicating liquor were either imported by, or sold to, Chinamen during the last year. They do not drink it themselves; the law, when enforced, prohibits them selling it; what is the inference? The question of labor is now admitted to be most important as affecting the country's prosperity and how does this illegal traffic affect that? It is asserted by interested planters, and I have no doubt their assertions are true, that if the laws were properly enforced in various localities where the scarcity of labor is severely felt, laborers would clamor for employment, but when they can make an easier living peddling gin and opium unmolested and unrestrained by the officers of the law, the inducement to go into the cane fields and work is wanting. Now any local influence operating against supplying the demand for labor is a direct paralytic stroke upon the country's industries and should receive the severest condemnation. Yet this failure to do their duty on the part of the police of the Kingdom has this effect, as well as encouraging the increase of vice and crime. This is strong language, but the evidence fully supports the assertion. The degrading and immoral effects of this unsuppressed criminal traffic are incalculable, especially upon a people whose civilization is so incomplete, making doubly hard the Christian's work.

And where can the responsibility be placed but upon those to whom is intrusted the execution of the laws. The interest of every wholesale merchant in Honolulu (not a liquor dealer) is injured by this violation of law; it is ruinous to their customers on the other islands and therefore injurious to them. There is no excuse possible for the conduct of the police in this matter. In a country of such limited extent, where all branches of trade and means of transportation can easily be reached and inspected, it should be impossible for crime of this nature to escape the eye of a vigilant and able police. They see original packages of liquors by the dozens put on board the inter-island steamers every week consigned to Chinamen in different parts of the Kingdom, besides the large quantities known to be shipped in a disguised form; they see it landed on the other islands and conveyed to the Chinamen's places of business with scarcely any attempt at concealment; they know that the Chinamen do not drink it themselves or destroy it; they know that it is sold in violation of law, and yet they stand by like a set of helpless imbeciles and allow this criminal trade to grow and thrive under their very noses; it is either a shameless confession of incapacity or an admitted collusion with the criminals. No

other logical deduction can be drawn from the evidence. It is asserted, and I think truthfully, that in many parts of the Kingdom the police are owned body and soul by the Chinese liquor dealers and opium smugglers. The subordinates are responsible to their superiors, but the official heads of this branch of the public service are responsible to the people, and with them the change should begin. On the island of Oahu there is said to be about 200 policemen, in Honolulu about 70; they are very fine specimens physically, are respectably uninformed, recline gracefully on boxes on the street corners, and are said to be reasonably regular in their duties—though I have heard that some of the night watch unaccountably disappear from their posts about 11 p. m. and do not find it convenient to reappear until 4 a. m.; this may not be true however. They are also said to be excellent and reliable voters. Yet burglaries and other crimes are of very frequent occurrence and no burglars are caught. There are also rumors of rings and corruption which, had the late Chief Justice lived, would perhaps have been exposed and corrected and which no doubt will be properly treated by the present authorities ere long. Data on this phase of the question is being secured and will, if necessary, be ventilated. The legislature Assembly will soon convene and probably a thorough investigation and reorganization, which is so generally admitted to be a necessity, will be had, and those who are "weighed in the balance and found wanting" will have to give place to more worthy and able persons.

## April Term of the Supreme Court.

8th inst. (Saturday.) Little business was transacted, the time being mostly occupied in arranging business for the ensuing week.

10th (Monday.) This being mail day, the Court met and adjourned until Tuesday.

11th (Tuesday.) Before the foreign jury was heard the case of the Minister of the Interior versus the Waihee Sugar Company—E. Preston for plaintiff, and F. M. Hatch for defendants. Mr. Dole appeared in behalf of the Lunaliilo Estate of which he is one of the executors, and as such, stood in the relation of landlord to his tenant. After considerable sparring between counsel the case was given to the jury. A verdict was returned for the plaintiff.

12th (Wednesday.) The case of the Crown vs. A. B. Rowe, for selling liquor without a license, was heard before a jury on appeal from the Police Court. In this case, the evidence for the Crown seemed to be very strong and well connected, and the witnesses stood their cross-examinations well. But the evidence in favor of the prisoner was such as tended to show a conspiracy among the Crown witnesses to convict Rowe, and was so strong that a verdict of acquittal was rendered with little delay. W. O. Smith appeared for the Crown, and J. M. Davidson for the prisoner. On the same day was tried the case of the Crown vs. Lee Ping, larceny of a goldwatch. After hearing some of the testimony, a *nolle prosequi* was entered; W. O. Smith for the prosecution, J. Russell for the prisoner.
