Reminiscences of Honolulu. No 32.

In October (23rd) 1851, occurred a brief insurrection of the prisoners confined in the Fort for various crimes and misdemeanors. In those days great use was made of coral blocks from the reef for building purposes. They cost from 25 cents to 374 cents each, and were vastly chesper than bricks or lumber brought round the Horn. The prisoners were mostly employed in cutting and transporting these stones from the beach. On the occasion referred to, some sixty were thus employed, and for some reason when the day's work was done it was concluded to odge the men in some native tenements on Fisherman's point, instead of marching them to the Fort to be locked up for the night. About midnight, the quiet of the town was disturbed and everybody alarmed by the beating of drums calling out the military. It soon was understood that the prisoners had revolted, and the larger part had marched off, declaring their intention to kill the Governor, the Marshal and Government officers generally, to burn the town and have a good time over the plunder. Of course there was great alarm among residents for a time. Marshal Parke, with Sheriff Wood, got together the police and the few soldiers that were to be found, and in the darkness got on the track of the convicts, who it was found had gone on to Punchbowl, and taken charge of the battery and powder magazine. They had loaded three of the guns to the muzzles, and trained them upon particular parts of the town where the shot would be supposed to do the most mischief. But it appeared they had no fire, and so could not discharge the guns. Arriving near enough to the top public mind." to see the forms of men, two shots were fired by the assailing party, one through a convict's shirt, and the other grazing one's head, whereupon the entire party of convicts broke and ran in all directions. They were pursued hotly over the bills and among the ravines by the police, and by 9 o'clock in the morning the ringleaders were in irons and all but two of those who escaped were either captured or voluntarily surrendered. And so ended the first and

last revolt of prisoners in Honolulu.

For six whole months, previous to the 19th of October, 1851, scarcely a drop of rain fell in Honolulu. Of course everything was dreadfully dry and dusty; but we had scarcely any carriages or drays in those days to cut up the roads.

November 25th, died at Kawaikae, Hawaii, William French, for many years a well-known and highly respected merchant of this city. He was at one time largely interested in the China trade, and sent many cargoes of sandal-wood thither. His children and grandchildren (the latter bearing the names of Kenway, Poor and Bush) are at Hawaii and in Honolulu, and one son, William, has long resided in China. Mr. French was a native of Vermont, where his relatives still reside.

On January 3rd, 1852, arrived the British bark Thetis, from Hong Kong, bringing the first cargo of Chinese coolies ever imported here. The suggestion of bringing them originated with the Royal Hawaiian Agricultural Society, which, at its annual meeting in the preceding month of August, had discussed the labor question and taken measures to procure this importation. There were 180 of the coolies, engaged in Hong Kong on five years contracts by a Mr. Graves, a Salem, Mass., man. He had no difficulty in finding engagements for the lot, at from \$4 to \$6 per mouth. There were some bad fellows among them, and some exceptionally good, -of the latter could be mentioned several individuals who accumulated property and became good citizens.

January 24th, arrived the steamer Comstitution, from San Francisco, which was the first of a line of steamers that was to run regularly between the Islands, under a five years contract for a monopoly, con-ceded by this Government to one Howard. But the boat was too large and unwieldy for the inter-island trade, being a six hundred ton propeller. She came at a bad time too, one of unprecedented stagnation in all kinds of business at the Islands. After making one trip to Lahaina and back, she returned to San Francisco.

It is well understood that the Hawaiian Government worked for some years at the problem of reciprocity with the United States before success was achieved, but it is not generally known that the first bona fide step was made in that direction so far back as thirty years ago. On the 28th of February, 1852, the following memorial was addressed by the Board of Managers of the R. H. Agricultural Society to King Kamehameha III.:

"To His Majesty the King of the Ha-waiian Islands, in Privy Council. "May it please Your Majesty: The Board of Managers of the R. H. Agricultural Society, believing that the independence and welfare of Your Majesty's Kingdom depends upon the prosperity of its agriculture; that the unequal bearing of the Treaty between Your Majesty and the United States in regard to duties, is highly injurious to the planting, commercial and other great interests of Your Islands; and that the United States are sincerely desirous of upholding Your Majesty's independence and of promoting the prosperity and happiness of the Hawaiian people, beg leave respectfully to petition Your Majesty to open a negotiation with the Government of the United States or with their Commissioner at Your Majesty's Court, for the admission of the sugar, syrup of sugar, molasses and coffee, produced on Your Islands, in all the ports of the United States free of duty; and to be pleased to enact that, in consideration thereof, the flour, fish, coal, lumber, staves and heading, of the United States shall be admitted free of

duty in all the ports of Your Kingdom open for trade."

This was signed by Wm. L. Lee, Presi-

dent, and a copy sent to the Hon. Luther Severance, U. S. Commissioner. On the 1st of March, an Act in accordance with the foregoing memorial, was passed "By the King, the Premier and

The new Constitution, which had been prepared by Judge Lee and Dr. Judd, Sugar Factors and Commission Agents Commissioners appointed by the King, was submitted to the Legislature at the session of 1852, and after thorough revision and amendment was finally adopted and signed by the King and Premier on the 14th of June. After having been the fundamental law of the land for twelve years, it was abrogated in 1864 by Kamehameha V. and the present Constitution substituted.

It bears N, E, ½ N, (magnetic) from the Lightship, from which it is distant 1½ cables length. The shallowest water now found on this knoll is 14 feet 4 inches at low-water springs. Kohala Correspondence

It would naturally be supposed that improved methods of communication such as railroads, steamers etc., mean cheaper rates and greater facilities for travel and traffic. Such however does not appear to be the case in this region. Before the advent of the railroad a considerable number of expresses connected regularly with the steamer at Mahukona and charged a fare that was at least within the bounds of reason, and delivered small

within the bounds of reason, and delivered small parcels promptly.

Now we have a railroad which charges a high tariif, followed by the express which continues its original fare to Mahukona for a distance of two or three miles, and then frequently refuses to take baggage, so that it costs now just about twice what it did formerly, and is very little quicker. The same may be said of small freight as the original express charge is now increased by the railroad charge, and it many cases the charges are all that come to hand. Through fare and freight from Honolulu to Kohala would be a great improvement.

All that part of Kohala which is known as the extreme estsede, and is now occupied by the Planters, is one vast hay field, green with tall waving grass in which the sleep, contented cattle feed knee deep, chewing the cud of thankfulness to the traction engine which has released them from the heat and burden of the day.

CULTIVATION OF CINCHONA

Several months ago we made editorial mention of the advisability of attempting the cultivation of the cinchona tree in these Islands, as there is much land particularly adapted to its growth that is not available for sugar cane or coffee. The Sugar Cane for March 1st, has an excellent article on "Cinchona Cultivation in Jamaica," a portion of which we republish:

"Three kinds of cinchona are now wellestablished in Jamaica, viz., C. officinalis, C. succirubra, and a variety called C, calisaya, supposed to be a hybrid between the other two. The ledgeriana is a variety of calisaya, Seeds or the C. officinalis for cultivation at elevations above 1,000 feet are supplied by the Government at \$1,20 per ounce, of C The PMSS City of Sydney arrived early last Monday morning, from the Colonies full of passengers, with no accommodations for flonointu passengers; however a number succeeded in getting passage by paying a bonns to some of the officers for their rooms, and by taking accommodations in different parts of the saleon. The steamer sailed again for San Francisco about 2 p. m. The Am bk Forest (queen is at Jund's wharf londing or San Francisco, and promises to get away early in trees are planted at 31% by 31% feet in rows, giving 3,500 plants to the acre. The outlay per acre up to the fourth or fifth year is about \$150. The earliest crop of bark may be yielded by thinnings or uprooting of weakly trees at the end of the fourth year. Taking these at 25 per cent, of trees planted, and yielding six ounces of bark per tree, we have, say, 320 lbs. of bark at 75 cents per lb. (less 20 cents per lb. expense of barking, etc.) yielding a net return of say \$175 per acre. This, it will be noticed, will more than cover expenses of the plantation up to the end of the fourth or fifth year. There will then be left some 2,400 trees to the acre, well established, and capable of yielding regular crops of bark, at the rate of \$150 to \$300 per acre, up to the time when the plantation is cropped.

"The total yield of the plantations (deducting costs of barking, curing and shipping, up to the end of the ninth year) will probably be not less than \$875 per acre, against a total outlay for planting operations for that period of about \$200 to \$225 per acre. The estimates in all these cases are based on the price of Creole labor in Jamaica-25 cents

a day for men and 18 cents for women." Mr. Morris, Director of Public Gardens writes: "On one acre 15,000 trees may be planted. With an average yield of 1 lb. of bark per year, (not a large yield,) each tree would be worth \$1.20; and the value of an acre of ground planted with trees even at onehalf the above rate, would amount to more than \$9,450. With the ledgeriana bark the yield per acre is estimated from actual sales at \$10,000."

From the above it will be seen that if it can be grown successfully here it would be a most valuable addition to our products. It requires moist land, generally at an altitude above 2,000 feet, of which there are thousands of acres on the windward side of these Islands which are now of little or no value. The cinchona will flourish on rocky but moist ground that is too rough for the cultivation of cane, and it repuires comparatively little care. We would like to see it tried here. There are many other products that might be grown here with profit, if there was some one to take the lead. Perhaps it would not be out of place here to suggest that the recently organized Planters' Labor and Supply Company and the Government select a Commislook practicable, and assist in a thorough and small outlay that would promise a greater re-

There were other lecturesses in this wonderful university; the prefessors of mathmatics, physical science, anatomy and Greek, were women; inasmuch as it is not stated whether a curtain screened them also it is probable that they belonged to the order of unwomanly women. Even Margaret Fuller, the cleverest woman America has produced, who depreciated yet fascinated her own sex and was an exceptionally brilliant conversationalist, was unable to attract men to her conversations in Boston, though your Bosto-

EDITOR PRESS: -Reorganization of that very important body of public servants has become generally recognized necessity throughout the Kingdom. Not a week passes without complaints from various localities on the other islands of the inefficiency of the police; in fact, the inefficiency is so notorious and is so conspicuously a subject of unfavorable comment, or perhaps I should say scandalous remark, throughout all the islands of the group, Oahn not excepted, that there is nothing doubtful about the expediency of thorough reorganization. This is no new subject for criticism; much has been written and said about it; communications and complaints from citizens whose interests are jeopardized appear in almost every issue of the weekly papers, but apparently without effect. It would seem that those officials

who are at the head of this branch of the public service, and therefore responsible for the meapurity of their subordinates, are secure in their positions, the public weal to the contrary notwithstanding. Why this should be is difficult to understand. There should be nothing meaymonthed or tender-footed about attacking this abuse of official patronage; it is a question that directly effects the welfare of the people and society, and in which all are interested.

If the Marshal of this Kingdom were qualified for his office twenty years ago when crime of any description was of exceedingly are coccurrence here and he has not kept pace with the changed conditions of society and is not now qualified for the present requirements of his office, he should step down and out and give place to some one who can better protect the interests of the people, their lives and property. If he retains medicent subordinates in office he is responsible for their inexpectly and should be held strictly accountable; no political, religious, or social affinities should protect him. A descriminating public, though appreciating his long service, will be unkind enough to expect results—ability instead of pretence. If he is a man to whom nothing new can be told, who always knows just what is going to happen etc., his great wisdom should surely be able to perform successfully.

If the carpulent and incompetent Sheriif of Mani most necessarily be feed on government pap and cannot possibly be relegated to the quietude of private hier; if it is against State policy to remove him and give some more deserving servant a showt or if the influence of relationship or otherwise is powerful enough to retain him as a public servant against the public interests, perhaps it would be well to make diligent search down the list of government positions for some piace that he is qualified to lill, and transfer him and give the people of Maui what they much necessity in this branch of the people of Maui what they much necessity in this branch of the people of t

nation. Yet this failure to do their duty on the part of the police of the Kingdom has this effect, as well as encouraging the increase of vice and crime. This is strong language, but the evidence fully supports the assertion. The degrading and immoral effects of this unsuppressed criminal traffic are incalcualable, especially upon a people whose civilization is so incomplete, making doubly hard the Christian's work.

And where can the responsibility be placed but upon those to whom is intrusted the execution of the laws. The interest of every wholesale merchant in Honolulu (not a liquor dealer) is injured by this violation of law; it is ruinous to their enstomers on the other Islands and therefore injurious to them. There is no excuse possible for the conduct of the police in this matter. In a country of such limited extent, where all branches of trade and means of transportation can easily be reached and inspected, it should be impossible for crime of this nature to escape the eye of a vigilant and able police. They see original packages of liquors by the dozens put on board the inter-island steamers every week consigned to Chinamen in different parts of the Kingdom, besides the large quantities known to be shipped in a disguised form; they see it landed on the other Islands and conveyed to the Chinamen's places of business with searcely any attempt at concealment; they know that the Chinamen do not drink it themselves or destroy it; they know that it is sold in violation of law, and yet they stand by like a set of helpless inbeciles and allow this criminal trade to grow and thrive under their very noses; it is either a shameless confession of incapacity or an admitted collusion with the criminals. No

other logical deduction can be drawn from the evidence. It is asserted, and I think truthfully, that in many parts of the Kingdom the police are owned body and send by the Chinese liquor dealers and oppum samgglers. The subordinates are responsible to their superiors, but the official heads of this branch of the public service are responsible to the people, and with them the change should begin. On the Island of Oahn there is said to be about 200 poticemen, in Honolulu about 70; they are very fine specimens physically, are respectably uninformed, racline gracefully on boxes on the street corners, and are said to be reasonably regular in their duties—though I have heard that some of the night watch unaccountably disappear from their posts about II p. m. and do not lind it convenient to reappear until 4 a. m.; this may not be true however. They are also said to be excellent and reliable voters. Yet burglaries and other crimes are of very frequent occurrence and no burglars are caught. There are also rumors of rings and corruption which, had the late Chief Justice lived, would perhaps have been exposed and corrected and which no doubt will be properly treated by the present anthorities ere long. Data on this phase of the question is being secured and will, if necessary, be ventilated. The legislature Assembly will soon convene and probably a thorough investigation and reorganization, which is so generally admitted to be a necessity, will be had, and those who are "weighted in the balance and found wanting" will have to give place to more worthy and able persons.

In this case, the evidence for the Crown seemed to be very strong and well connected, and the witnesses stood their cross-examinations well. But the evilence in favor of the prisoner was such as tended to show a conspiracy among the Crown witnesses to convict Rowe, and was so strong that a verdict of acquittal was rendered with little delay. W. O. Smith appeared for the Crown, and J. M. Davidson for the prisoner. On the same day was tried the case of the Crown vs. Lee Ping, larceny of a goldwatch. After hearing some of the testimony, a notle prosequi was entered; W. O. Smith for the presecution, J. Russell for the prisoner.

This is proved by figures from the both kept by the Agent of the Board of Health in which a correct record is kept of all deaths in this district. When our readers will remember that it was during the last biennial period that the smallpox epidemic prevailed here, they will understand that the general health of the district has been very satisfactory. Including the deaths from small-pox with those from all other causes, the small-pox with those from all other causes, the total number is less than that for the previous two years. And if we deduct the number who died from that epidemic, the total of deaths will be found to fall far below the previous corresponding period's for, as has been said, the total number from all causes is less. Those are facts, the knowledge of which must be gratifying to all, and exposes the fallacies of those evil prophets who ridiculed and opposed the measures that were taken for the care of the public health.

We have become cognizant of a movement in progress among certain young native Hawaiians of this city, whereby they have entered into a mutual agreement, or association, the main purpose of which, as we are informed is, to lay aside a certain amount of their earnings and deposit the same in the Bank of Bishop & Co., on interest. This is certainly a good plan for our young folks, and we heartily wish to each one engaged in this praiseworthy undertaking, success, prosperity and unity of plan and purpose, and that they will show themselves to be men.

substance of that upon which I am to dwell.

The deceased lady died and was buried. Upon the refusal of the physician who attended from the incipiency to the fatal termination of her disease, to grant a certificate as to the cause of death, coupled with the latent suspicions of interested parties suggested by callateral circumstances, a demand for the exhumation and expert examination of her body was made. A grant in accordance therewith was made by the authorities, and an autopsy duly held. Evisceration of the codaver, according to the testimony of Drs. Hutchimson and Cummings, disclosed pathological appearances uncommon to fever or other natural disease, and were strongly indicative of irritant poisoning; and therefore corroborative of the lady's prior disclosures to Dr. Cummings. Upon his first visit the doctor had been told by the patient that she had been poisoned; and according to his testimony, the symptoms of the disease were strongly corroborative of her assertions, and pointed in his opinion to arsenic as their cause. So far as any evidence to the contary appears, the patient was allowed to die and be interred without a suspicion having been uttered to the authorities, or to any one else. And not only this; but further opportunity was conceded to the party accused—supposing a criminal intent—by making him the medium by which medicines were to be dispansed and through whom knowledge of the consistion of the patient was to be received. The existion maturally arises: Could the patient, by precautions and proper attendance have been saved—supposing her to have been poisoned? I attempt no answer.

Again, relative to the discovery of crime; let me premise by saying that many deaths, have demonstrably resulted from the administration of irritant poisons, where the most refined post-mortem analyses have failed to detect their presence, even in cases where enormous doses have demonstrably resulted from the administration of irritant poisons, where the most refined postmortem analyses have failed to detect their presence, even in cases where enormous doses have been taken; and more especially has this been so with arsenic (vide, Horsley, Taylor, and Beck.)

"On the other hand; mineral poisons, as antimony, arsenic, etc., have been readily detected in the urine and fæcts before death, but none in the body afterwards."—Horsley. Dr. Taylor speaks of a girl who took one ounce of arsenic and died in seventeen hours, and another who took two ouncess and died in eight hours; but in neither case could the poison be detected. In consideration of such facts as these, known to all educated practitioners, would it not—to say the least—have been advisable that the appropriate excretions of the patient, while living, should have been subjected to analysis—especially in a case where suspicion lay so strongly from the first? An analysis of the excreta of the patient, it seems to noe was imperatively called for under the circumstances, as developments resultant therefrom might have relieved an innocent party from an impust imputation, and the authorities from unnecessary annoyance and expense; or, have established the fact of poisoning (which now may never be and affixed the guilt upon the prisoner. The questions involved in this case are I believe vital, and cannot be ignored or laughed away, inasmuch as like cases finay have occurred, before unnoticed, or may occur again. Says a sage author: "A low degree of civilization places a low estimate on individual human life;" and white we pretend to a high state of civilization we cannot afford to ignore anything that will lend to its better preservation. I speak without animaes or ill will to any; but from a sense of the needs of community justice. I might say more; but under the circumstances, refrain. A trial may depend, and I wish to periadices involved are varied, and grave, and will not fail to suggest themselves to any one of a thinking whish.

Dispersing the Cloud.

Special Correspondence of the Saturday Press, There are abundant indications perceptible to those fairly versed in English social matters that the recent visit of His Majesty, King Kalakana, to England, Eastended to largely awaken the curiosity of and a people of which they have heard so much and know so little. Perhaps the C. R. BISHOP, Walters, Master, most frequent mention of Honolulu has been made by theatrical performers visiting Hawaii during their voyages to and from Australia. They have generally spoken in the kindliest terms of the city and its inhabitants, but their stay has invariably been too limited to admit of their becoming acquainted with much of life outside the walls of the play-house or Merinos, black and colored, 4 qualities "Duke of Abercorn" the hotel. Moreover, an actor or actress rarely produces a good descriptive work treating of matters outside the Thespean profession. It has, however, long been evident to those who have heard the knights and ladies of the sock and buskin recount their Hawaiian experiences, that the play goers in Honolulu form an extremely intelligent class, evincing a keen appreciation of good acting and good dramatic writing. Judged by this test it needed not a voyage to Honolulu to ascertain the fact that the Hawaiian community occupied a place in the foremost ranks modern civilization; that their polit- TAILORS' GOODS ical and social's institutions were such as the greatest and most powerful European nation might experience a pride in posses-sing. The recent visit of His Majesty to England has given greater prominence to this, and it is clear from the tone of the comments of several of the provincial papers, when alluding to his presence on English soil, that all with whom he came in contact were strongly impressed by his intelligent observation of everything which attracted his attention. The ordinary reporters of English papers rarely possess anch power of discrimination. They are generally mere reporting machines, and in nuticing the movements of His Majesty they were content with simply chronicling each little fact, but the higher class of English pressmen, the regular contributors of leading or descriptive articles, on several occasions found in these journeyings of His Majesty matter for thoughtful remark. " Are we not acting unwisely." asked one writer, "considering our enormous interests in the Pacific, in not cultivating closer relations with such able and sagacious rulers as King Kalakaua? We know not the character of the motives which have induced him to leave his distant island-kingdom, and make a temporary residence in our midst, but considering the important strategical position of the Hawaiian Kingdom in the event of our becoming engaged in hostilities in the Southern Hemisphere, by no meansi mprobable contingency, the English Government might do worse than award him a reception becoming his rank and real political importance."

This expression of English newspaper opinion is thoroughly in harmony with the sentiments of many educated and observant English travelers, who have become familiar with the countries and peoples of the Southern Hemisphere, but it is not often that an excuse can be found for giving utterance to them. The English press is represented only at Sydney and Melbourne, while the Australian papers rarely display much interest in events transpiring beyond the limits of the colonies respectively represented by them. Hence the name of Hawaii seldom finds its way into the columns of English newspapers, save in the shape of transcripts from American journals. The immediate result of His Majesty's visit to England was to occasion a run at all the great public libraries on works treating of Hawaii, its people, man-ners and customs, but of such books there are few really deserving of perusal. Still a little information is often better than none at all, and it is not improbable that London publishers will be found more ready than heretofore to accept good works on Hawaii. In America it is different. American authors have written much about "the island-kingdom," and in a fashion which has tempted readers who care little for narratives of travel, but these articles have rarely found their way to England or Australia, where, despite the mass of enlightened public opinion, there is yet to be found a considerable amount of ignorance and prejudice concerning a country which is apparently destined to play an important part in the history of the future.

To the people of Hawaii it may perhaps be a matter of indifference whether they are understood or not by Englishmen or Australians, but those who have studied the past history of the leading nations of the world will not share any apathetic sentiments on this point. If the civilization of the Southern Hemisphere is to be spared, the many calamaties which have tarnished that of the Northern Hemisphere, the infant nations of the broad Pacific must learn to become better acquainted with each other, and to weave the links of mutual friendship, the best security against the murderous disputes engendered by the blind passions of ignoraance. It is not improbable that something of the kind suggested itself to the mind of Sir Henry Parkes, the Premier of New South Wales, during his recent brief stay in the Hawaiian capital. The Gladstone of Australia, he is most anxious to secure the cultivation of friendly relations between the England of the South and the islands of the Pacific, and his hasty peep at Hawaii and its resources may yet bear good fruits after his return to the country in which he is such a distinguished and powerful leader. Increased intimacy on the part of England and her colonies with Hawaii cannot be viewed with disfavor by the United States, for it means, not dreams of future annexation, but the development of kindly and cordial feelings on the part of each towards the others and the creation of another guarantee of Hawaiian independence. Whether it would be possible to induce British capital to find its way more largely into the Hawaiian dominions has been discussed in the columns of the has been discussed in the columns of several English papers, but the conclusions arrived at were not of a very encouraging nature, it being pointed out that the field was in full possession of the Americans, who were described as being indefatigable in their efforts to develop and extend the commercial resources and interests of the kingdom. At the same time the necessity for cultivating friendly relations between the British and Hawaiian courts was emphatically insisted upon. This argues well for the future. 


