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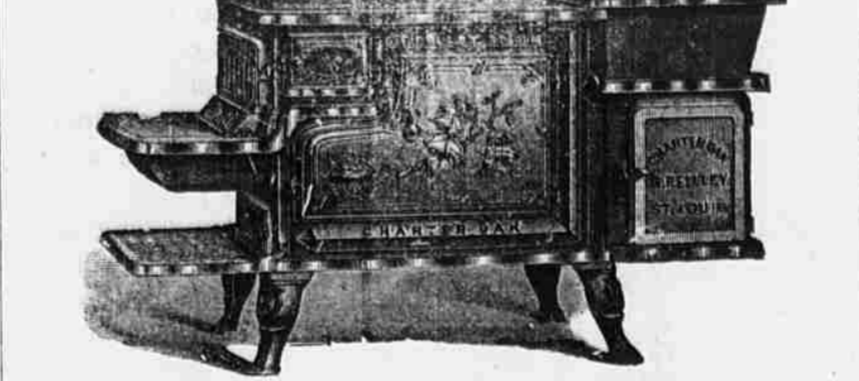

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST CHOLERA.

So long as cholera is kept away from the United States there will be no need for any quarantine, with its losses and vexations, against that country.

Broken Bargain.

Peter High brought a civil suit for \$65 damages in the Police Court on Friday of last week against the Ving Fat Company. The complaint alleges that on Nov. 12 Oy Wing, supposed partner in the firm, came to him and asked him to figure on some window frames. He asked \$21, but finally compromised on \$20, defendant was to send sample in a week.

His Honor held that the suit was properly brought but that no proof of such agreement had been given. An appeal was noted. The case as it stands is a caution against accepting every Chinaman for what he claims to be.

DRAWING THE LINE.

Business Men Protest Against the Heir to a Quarter of a Million Getting Clear of His Debts.

The following petition to Chief Justice Judd has been filed in the Clerk's office of the Supreme Court: We the undersigned merchants of Honolulu respectfully beg to petition your honorable Court, in the matter of the application of W. H. Aldrich, that he be not adjudged a voluntary bankrupt, and in support of our petition beg to set forth the following reasons and facts in connection therewith:

First—That the said W. H. Aldrich has once before taken advantage of the bankruptcy law of this kingdom, to wit in the year 1885, to the loss and detriment of the creditors. Second—That the credit which he has since obtained is all of very recent date, and under specific promises to pay as soon as the large inheritance to which he fell heir, on the demise of his late father, became available. That such credit would not have been extended by your petitioners to the said W. H. Aldrich, were his promises not made, and accepted in good faith by your petitioners, in the full and confident knowledge that his prospective income warranted such credit.

Third—Your petitioners, in further support of their position, beg to annex for your perusal a letter addressed to one of the undersigned by A. A. Smith, the trustee of the estate of W. A. Aldrich, the father of the petitioner in bankruptcy W. H. Aldrich, wherein it is stated that he would be in a position to pay all of his just debts.

Fourth—Your petitioners have reason to believe, from reliable sources of information, that the said W. H. Aldrich will come into the enjoyment of the first instalment of his interest in an estate probated at San Francisco, Cal., of one million dollars, divided equally between the four children, the sole devisees of the late W. A. Aldrich, somewhere in or during the month of February, 1893.

Fifth and lastly—Your petitioners, having full confidence in the wisdom and equity of your honorable Court, appeal against the law in bankruptcy of this kingdom being available to private individuals, as the channel whereby such persons can by fraud manifestly premeditated distress the mercantile portion of our community.

For relief from which and protection against, your petitioners continually pray.

WEALTHY IN MIND.

A Man With Fifty Thousand Dollars in the Bank.

A native named Papa, claiming to be a descendant of the Alis, was seen on horseback yesterday morning riding toward the King street entrance of Iolani Palace. He asked the guard if Her Majesty was at home. The guard answered in the affirmative and requested him to go round to the other gate on Palace Walk. He did so, riding on the sidewalk and nearly running over several people. Being covered with leis people thought he was under the influence of liquor. Papa was refused admittance and he rode away. Previous to going to the Palace he told Captain Kamana at the Station of his intentions. He was not seen again until late in the afternoon when he went to the Fish-market. One bundle of fish was tied up for him, when he told the fishman to wait until he came back. After five minutes he returned and purchased another stack of fish, saying he had \$50,000 with him. Bishop & Co. A third time he went away and came back ordering more fish, when the vendor became angry and ordered Papa to dig up. Then it was that the latter said that he had given him an order, payable on sight. The controversy wangled long and loud and finally Naanao, who owned the stand, sent for a policeman and had the man arrested, under the impression that he was intoxicated. Papa was taken to the Station and locked in a cell. He was thought to be demented because toward midnight he began to strip. He was seen by the turnkey, who entered the cell, whereupon the prisoner rushed out, and it took no little trouble to catch him again. He crouches in the corners of his cell as if listening. When not being watched he pushes his clothes out through the bars. Last week he visited the Station and gave a history of the fact and how he accumulated \$50,000.

THE LEGISLATURE.

153RD DAY.

THURSDAY, Dec. 22, 1892.

Afternoon Session.

Although roll was called at 1:30 o'clock business was not commenced until 1:48, a quorum being unobtainable up to that time.

The consideration of the Opium Bill was continued and the remaining sections were after but little discussion all passed. One of the sections provides for the license portion of the bill going into effect April 1, 1893.

The bill was passed in its entirety to engrossment, and ordered for third reading on Thursday next.

Bill 229, to amend sections of the Act to Re-organize the Judiciary, came up on second reading and was passed to engrossment and for third reading on Friday.

Bill 219, to regulate and control the production and furnishing of electricity in Honolulu. The various sections of the bill passed with but slight amendments, down to Section 14, when on motion of Rep. Ashford the following list of monthly rates were inserted and passed, viz: Saloons, billiard rooms, etc., \$1.25 per month for each 16 candle-power lamp; stores, \$1 per month for each 16 c. p. lamp; dwelling houses, first five lamps, 90c. per month each 16 c. p. lamp; second five, 60c.; all over ten, 35c. Hotels, hospitals, halls, churches, etc., special rates; all-night lamps, for each 16 c. p. lamp, \$1.25 per month.

While Section 15 was being discussed, Rep. Kapahu obtained the floor and made an earnest complaint to the President against being made the mark for paper balls of various sizes and manufactures. He hoped the chair would assist him in preserving his dignity. (Laughter.)

Section 15 passed and pending action on an amendment offered by Noble Eua to Section 16, the Assembly at 4:16 adjourned.

Notice to the Public.

The Shirt Question is still in the minds of the public and I wish to make a standing statement in regard to the Luning-Johnson matter. On or about the 21 day of December, a lot of old shirts was left in my office with instructions to repair them by one signed Luning. I did repair the shirts, and a few days later this man Luning, accompanied by his wife, called and brought another shirt to be repaired, and also asking to see the first lot of shirts. I showed them and they were both well pleased and said the job was well done, and told me that the Chinaman would call on Monday and take them to be re-laundried. This was on Saturday previous to Monday mentioned, and when I finished the last shirt I brought the bill to Luning at his office. He got excited but I did not scare, and I simply told him I would like to collect money for my work. He used some very hot words and said I had a cheek to ask for my money then, and he said he would ruin me, but still I did not scare. I told Luning in presence of a witness that he was welcome to call at my place of business, where I have a room enclosed, and he could try on the shirts there, but he would not do it. No doubt Mr. Luning thought he had had easy game, but he was like the man that fell out of the balloon—he was simply not in it. I will say this, that in any case I make new shirts and if they do not give entire satisfaction I will alter them, make new shirts, or refund the money. Can any person do more? I will also keep in repair all shirts made by me for two years free of charge, for I am as quiet as a lamb.

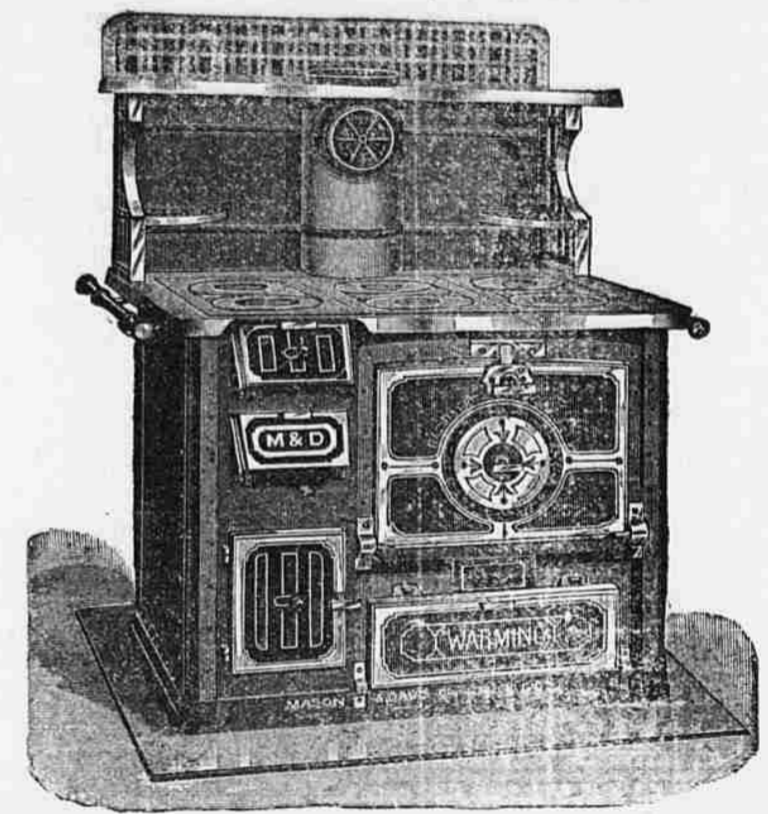

LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

BRITISH AFFAIRS.

LONDON, December 2.—The opening of Parliament is still eight weeks distant, but the Conservative party is already on the scene with three amendments to the address in reply to the speech from the throne. The evident object is to test the strength of the Government. A prominent Liberal member said to-day: "We expect the warmest time any Parliament has seen since the discussion of the reform bill in 1832." The Ministerialists, however, continue to be confident of weathering divisions on the address, and even hopeful of passing the home rule bill.

Another trouble before the Government is the renewed agitation of Irish tenant farmers for an abatement of the judicial rents fixed four years ago. The tenants declare that the fall in the prices of live stock and farm products generally makes a revision of rents imperative. The temporary clause act of 1887 empowered the Land Commission to reduce rents in the ratio of the decline in agricultural prices. The clause was operative for only three years and expired at a time when it would have done the most good. The Government will ask Parliament to restore the clause exactly as it was.

Dr. Collingridge reports to the London port sanitary committee that there is almost an absolute certainty of an outbreak of cholera in the spring, when all precautions now adopted will be far more severely strained than hitherto.

WHOLESALE BURGLARY IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, December 2.—Six "burglar-proof" vaults and safes in as many offices in the Equitable building, at Washington and Dearborn streets, one of the principal business corners in Chicago, were forced open some time during last night. Every dollar in the entire building of five stories was taken.

The exact amount of the cash stolen was \$145,533. Jewelry was also taken in every office. The burglars examined all the valuable papers in the vaults, but were careful to take nothing but jewelry by which they could be identified.

The work was the boldest yet attempted and was committed by expert safe-openers. The burglars knew the building perfectly. They knew just what parts of the place to enter and what to leave untouched. They lighted the gas in the office on the ground floor with the great windows opening on Dearborn street and commenced their robbery in what seems to have been in plain view of the opposite side of the street. Tenants are indignant that such bold defiance of police has been possible in such a public place, in the heart of the city and within one block of the central station.

They are also indignant that the owner of the building had left it utterly without the protection even of a janitor or private watchman. Their indignation in this direction may result in as interesting an affair as the robbery itself. This afternoon, hopeless that the burglars would be captured or their property recovered, the tenants decided to sue the owner of the building, Hurlbert Levy, to recover what they had lost.

THE PANAMA CANAL SCANDAL.

The Panama canal commission is still worried and continues to stir up mud. A Paris correspondent gives the list of the sums of money paid to newspapers by the Panama Canal Company by Rossignol, former Auditor in Bankruptcy, as follows: Le Petit Journal, 300,000 francs; La Telegraphe, 120,000 francs; Jozienki, director of the Telegraphe, 120,000 francs; Le Matin, 30,000 francs; Le Gaulois, 15,000 francs; Meyer, director of the Gaulois, 30,000 francs; Le Radical, 100,000 francs; Senator Magnier, director of L'Evenement, 50,000 francs, and Patinot, director of Le Journal des Debats, 40,000 francs. The last-named denies hav-

ing received any money. The other papers make no reference to the exposures.

PRECAUTIONS AGAINST CHOLERA.

The United States Government is taking extraordinary precautions against the admission of cholera next year. Instead of fighting the pest alone at quarantine stations on this side of the Atlantic they have sent a corps of physicians to Europe to survey the field and inaugurate protective measures there. Three doctors have been commissioned by the Marine Hospital Service for this undertaking. They are: Dr. Fairfax Irwin, formerly surgeon at the Marine Hospital, Chelsea, and latterly examining surgeon of the Marine Hospital Service dispensary in the Boston Custom-house; Dr. Rosenow and Dr. William A. Wheeler of New York. They will remain in Europe for two months. Dr. Rosenow is in England and his territory will be British ports. Dr. Irwin will have charge of France and Dr. Wheeler will go to Germany and the free ports.

Their duties are to investigate thoroughly cases of spread of cholera, the sanitary conditions of various towns and cities which they visit and particularly note the accommodations made for emigrants destined for the United States and the precautions taken for their disinfection and isolation. They will be in close consultation with American Consuls, who are instructed to cooperate with the surgeons in every possible way.

They are empowered to examine cargoes of vessels consigned to the United States, and to demand the disinfection of vessels and freight where they deem it necessary. Of course, they will have no authority to order such a course, but upon their recommendations the detention of such vessels in quarantine in American ports will largely depend. The surgeons will not communicate with the authorities of the places which they will visit; in fact, they will maintain as complete an incognito as possible. Their duty is to ascertain all the facts possible, leaks where cholera has penetrated, to observe the failures and successes of cholera wars and to keep the department at home constantly advised of their findings.

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TO SUCCEED ADMIRAL BROWN.

Commodore Skerrett Will Get the Pacific Station.

WASHINGTON, November 25. — A decision was finally reached to-day in regard to the command of the Pacific station. Commodore Joseph Skerrett, at present in command of the Washington navy yard, will succeed Acting Rear-Admiral Brown in command of that squadron on January 1st.

Commodore Skerrett receives an acting rear-admiral's appointment, with all the rights and privileges attached to the grade. He will leave here with his family for the Pacific coast about December 15th, and upon his arrival there will formally relieve Admiral Brown, hoisting his flag on the Mohican, which will become the temporary flagship of the Pacific squadron pending the return of one of the new vessels.

Admiral Brown will return East and go on waiting orders until about the middle of January, when it is expected that he will be assigned to the command of the Norfolk Navy Yard.

Commander Harris, who goes to Madrid, will have authority to investigate the indemnity claims of the missionaries who suffered outrages at the hands of Spanish subjects on the Caroline islands a year or more ago.

Commander Harris is entirely familiar with these claims, having visited the islands at the time of the trouble in command of the Alliance. It was through his efforts that peace was restored among the natives there.
