TO ADVANCE ON MALOLOS IMMEDIATELY.

General Lawton Will Lead the Americans to Aguinaldo's Capital. Otis to Give His Attention to Civil Government and the Outside Islands.

Special Dispatch to The Call.

New York, March 19.—The Washington correspondent of the Herald telegraphs: The arrival at Manila to-day of General Lawton with reinforcements, as cabled to the War Department, means the beginning of an active campaign against the Filipinos. General Lawton will have, under General Otis, command of all military operations in Luzon, while Otis, as Governor General, will direct the conduct of civil affairs and the military operations in other islands.

It was thought the advance of General Hale's brigade several days ago was the beginning of a forward movement, but it is supposed that General Otis decided to await the arrival of Lawton. Now it is expected that offensive operations will begin at once and directed toward Malolos, the seat of the insurgent government, which the officials say will soon be occupied by American troops.

Instructions were cabled to General Otis to-day directing him to detach Brigadier General M. P. Miller from the command of troops at Iloilo and order him home for retirement. General Otis will choose General Miller's successor, who will probably be General Anderson or General McArthur.

General Miller's retirement on March 27, will create a vacancy in the grade of brigadier general of the regular army, which in all probability will be filled by the appointment of General Sumner. The latter is likely to be retired at once and General Anderson made brigadier of the regular service so that that officer will not be given a volunteer commission as major general, as originally determined.

The cablegram received at the War Department to-day dated Manila, March 10, says the transport Grant arrived with the troops in good condition. The Arizona and Newport leave to-day for San Francisco, the Arizona via Hongkong and the Newport via Nagasaki. The Grant carried to Manila the Fourth Infantry and four companies of the Seventeenth Infantry.

This adds to the troops under the command of General Otis 42 officers and 1,716 enlisted men. The Grant, with General W. B. Lawton in command, sailed from New York, January 19.

GERMANY BUYS THE CAROLINE LINES.

Rios Ordered to Turn Over Spain's Remaining Asiatic Possessions. Special Cable to the Call and New York Herald.

MANILA, Mar. 9.—Gen. Rios, commander of the Spanish forces, has resigned, owing to the fact that the Government at Madrid consulted with the Archbishop of Manila as to the best means of liberating the Spanish prisoners. On receiving satisfaction he resumed his office.

Spain now requires him to occupy the Caroline, Marianne and Pelew Islands before handing them over to Germany, which is apparently their purchaser.

The steamships Saturnus and Gloria, which left Manila under the American flag on February 1, returned to-day. They report that on their arrival at Curimec, province of Ilocos, the native crews deserted. After a few days they returned armed, seized the stores and cargoes on the vessels and then abandoned the steamships.

The Spaniards on both steamships united, got up steam on the Saturnus and towed the Gloria to Manila.

The steamship San Joaquin reports that on her arrival at the same the native crew murdered the Spanish captain and engineer and even the Chinese passengers.

WHO WILL REGISTER?

We have substantial grounds for believing that in about ten days the registration of voters for a general election in September next will begin. This being so it will not be amiss to refer to the law guiding such registration and election before making contemplated comments.

"Section 2. No person shall be eligible to be an officer, Senator or Representative under the Republic, or an elector of Senators or Representatives, until he shall have taken and subscribed the following oath or affirmation, viz: 'I do solemnly swear (or affirm), in the presence of Almighty God that I will support the Constitution, Laws and Government of the Republic of Hawaii; and will not, either directly or indirectly, encourage or assist in the restoration or establishment of a Monarchical form of government in the Hawaiian Islands.'"

"Section 22. In order to be eligible to vote for Representatives a person shall:

1. Be a male citizen of the Republic; and, if naturalized prior to Jan. 17, 1893, be a native of a country having, or having had, treaty relations with Hawaii; or

Have received letters of denization entitling him to all the privileges of Hawaiian citizenship; or,

Have received from the Minister of Interior the Certificate of Service provided for by Article 17 of the Constitution;

"2. Have resided in the Representative District in which he offers to register, not less than one month immediately preceding the time, at which he offers to register.

"3. Have attained the age of twenty years;

"4. Have taken and subscribed the oath set forth in Section 2 of this Act;

"5. (Have duly registered).

"6. Prior to such registration have paid, on or before the first day of January next preceding the date of registration, all taxes due by him to the Government;

"7. (Speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian language and the Constitution.)"

The qualifications for voters for Senators are the same but with the following additional ones:

"He shall own and be possessed in his own right, of real property in the Republic of the value of not less than fifteen hundred dollars over and above all encumbrances; and upon which legal taxes shall have been paid on that valuation of the year next preceding the one in which such person offers to register; or personal property in the Republic of the value of not less than three thousand dollars over and above all encumbrances; or shall have actually received a money income of not less than six hundred dollars during the year next preceding the first day of April next preceding the date of each registration; for the proof of which he may be required to produce original accounts of the receipt of such income."

"Section 31. The Boards (of Registration) shall meet within their respective Districts at such time between the first day of April and the thirtieth day of June in the year 1897, and between such days in each second year thereafter, as many times as may be necessary to enable them to register all persons entitled to register."

"Section 66. The first general election hereunder shall be held on the last Wednesday of September, 1897, and general elections shall be held

on the last Wednesday of September every two years thereafter."

"Section 67. At least sixty days before a general election, and at least forty days before a special election, the Minister of the Interior shall issue an election proclamation and transmit copies of the same to the several Boards of Inspectors throughout the Republic or where such elections to be held."

It is very evident that there are two essential prerequisites paramount to all others in the above extracts; the first, an oath of allegiance to the Republic of Hawaii, now nesting under the protection of the Republic of the United States, and the payment of 1898 taxes on or before the 31st of December of that year.

What shall be said and what can be done about that practically defunct and useless oath? It may be said that it is meaningless, as our allegiance is due to the United States, as the Suzerain power, and not to Hawaii, and that we cannot serve two masters, or three in some instances perhaps in the case of duly recognized denizens, or hold to a dual allegiance. And yet, as we are still living under the Hawaiian Constitution, and preparing to vote under it, we presume we shall have to accept it as a necessity.

But shall we have to as Attorney-General Cooper did the other morning, take an oath to support the Constitution of the United States first, and the Constitution and laws of Hawaii as well?

If so, in whom does the power abide to change our Hawaiian Constitution so as to enforce the American oath? If in the President of the United States, then, forsooth and perchance, he probably has the right under the almost absolute power temporarily delegated to him by Congress to say, "Stop that election humbug and never mind your legislature. You have enough municipal legislation for a while, and I'll attend to your affairs." Or, perhaps, he will let us "gang our gait" and pay out \$7 and \$10 a day for the election officers in order to put a little more of the Government's money into circulation for the benefit of the promoters and dealers in sugar plantations.

Let us have an election, however, before we are turned into a semi-British colony, or a Territory. It will be good practice for the time when we shall all be full-fledged American citizens and voters able and willing to run the entire political machinery of the United States from Honolulu and Hilo.

A COLONIAL GOVERNMENT.

Will Hawaii have a colonial form of government? The following remarks on that subject from the pen of Daniel Dorchester, D.D., in the American Monthly, may be of interest:

"We are not ready to admit these new outlying sections as States of the Union, but we may borrow wisdom from the colonial policy of Great Britain. Under our constitutional provision for organizing territorial governments these new acquisitions can be formed into line under one of the three following provisions, and then advanced from step to step as the people become prepared.

"1. As colonies entirely controlled and protected by the home government. This is the lowest stage.

"2. Or, organized with representative institutions, in which the home government shall have a veto on legislation and the control of the offices.

"3. Or, organized as responsible governments, in which the home government shall have no control over any public officers except the appointment of the governor, and shall hold a veto power on legislation under certain specified restrictions.

"There are crude, tentative suggestions, but some such modified form of government would enable the United States to hold and beneficently administer her civilizing influence among these new people."

To this we would add that our Governor should be allowed an Executive Council in order to afford him a loop-hole to escape from the persecutions of the men of influence and wealth ever anxious to procure favors, legitimate or illegitimate, and couched in such a manner and with such force that "frail humanity" symbolized in one man's body would find it almost impossible to resist.

And we would still further add that we believe that the preponderating masses of the people do not care one iota under what form of government they like so that it is honestly and capably administered and they are peaceful, happy and prosperous. The main contenders after certain specific forms of government are the politicians and would be office holders, who either wish to retain their present places, or if they are "outs" they pant and rave to be "ins" while the people sing "a plague on both your houses."

Up to Date.

Losses in the War.

WASHINGTON, March 10.—The following statement has been issued showing the total number of deaths reported to the adjutant general's office between May 1, 1898, and February 28, 1899: Killed in action, 329; died of wounds, 125; died of disease, 5277; total, 5731.

Hundreds of Persons Perished

LONDON, March 11.—According to a dispatch to the Times from Sydney, N. S. W., no fewer than 200 persons perished in the hurricane that just swept the north-east coast of Queensland.

The annual report of the Collector-General shows that Mr. Sewall was absolutely unauthorized in the statement alleged to have been made by him to the effect that certain importers of European goods were rushing cargoes to this port before the tariff laws of the United States could take effect here. According to the report there has been a slight increase in the import of European goods which naturally is due simply to the increase of European and Asiatic laborers. Mr. Sewall evidently talked through his hat.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Mr. Cooper Elected President—Watered Stock in Milk—Chinese en Route to Samoa.

Mr. Geo. W. Smith, presided over yesterday's meeting of the Board of Health. Attorney-General Cooper was duly elected President but owing to important duties in the Supreme Court was unable to preside.

It was reported that the beef arriving from California was duly inspected and tagged.

Food inspector Johnstone reported that milk was being heavily adulterated with water and he asked authority to destroy the "sky-blue." Ex President W. O. Smith said the authority could not lawfully be given as the Board could only confiscate products menacing public health.

The fish inspector reported 175,092 fish inspected during the month.

Sheriff Andrews was authorized to make necessary repairs and additions to the Hilo Hospital.

Dr. Milton Rice was recommended to practice medicine.

A communication was read from Hackfeld & Co. in regard to the importation of Chinese. They intend to import Chinese labor for client in Samoa and asked for the privilege of having those imported quarantined at the Quarantine station during the time between their arrival here and the arrival of steamers to take them to Samoa.

Motion carried that the matter be referred to the port physician and executive officers of the Board, they to report to the Executive Council.

On motion of Sheriff Andrews policeman J. C. Brown of Hilo was appointed fish inspector for that town.

Mr. John Grace's appointment as consulting hospital physician at Hilo was approved, and Dr. Herbert Wood was appointed Government physician at Waialua and Koolauloa.

NEW YORK, March 9.—To Daniel Frawley has gone to Washington to pave the way for opening his stock company at the Columbia Theater there on April 3. The opening attraction will be "Tribby." HOW CHINA WILL BLOCK ITALY'S GAME.

San Mun is to be made free to all the Nations—Italy Not So Much Inclined to Mix in the Far Eastern Question.

Special Dispatch to The Call.

LONDON, March 11.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says the government has ordered three more cruisers to get in readiness to proceed to Chinese waters in connection with the demand of Italy for a concession of San Mun, province of Cheh-kiang.

NEW YORK, March 10.—The Herald's Washington correspondent sends the following: Information has been received by the State Department showing that serious consideration is being given by the Chinese Government to a proposition to make San Mun a free port. By this action China hopes to checkmate Italy's plan for the seizure of that port and the creation of a sphere of influence in its immediate vicinity.

Since China's refusal to cede the territory of Italy the Rome Government has not pressed its demand and in its failure to act the authorities believe they see evidence that Great Britain and Japan have taken such measures as to show Italy the inadvisability of continuing her efforts to acquire Chinese territory.

In throwing open San Mun to the trade of the world China will take a step which will be entirely satisfactory to Great Britain and Japan and pleasing to the United States.

Because of the important effect which the granting of the Italian demand would have had on the partition of China, the United States authorities have been closely following the developments in the Far East, and they now appear to be satisfied that in the face of the opposition of Great Britain and Japan Italy's request will not be granted. Italy did not make this move without consultation with the powers, and she had good reasons to believe that she would be supported by them, but it is now evident they have considered their promise fulfilled in supporting her claim with diplomatic representations.

I was told today that the matter is not being vigorously pressed by the Italian Government, and it is not believed it will be.

No information has been cabled to the State Department by Minister Conger relative to the Niuchwang loan crisis, because it apparently has had no effect upon the affairs of this Government. The newspaper reports showing that it has been settled, however, are accepted as true and both in administration and diplomatic circles an easier feeling regarding the Far Eastern situation is apparent.

AGREE WITH POPE LEO'S TEACHINGS.

Paulist Fathers Say They Are in Spirit With the Letter.—In a Communication to Rome They Declare That They Entirely Acquiesce in His Views.

NEW YORK, March 9.—The following official statement as to the action of the Paulist fathers upon the publication of the recent letter of the Pope on Americanism, which touched upon the teachings of the late Father Hecker, the founder of the congregation of missionary priests of St. Paul the Apostle, as interpreted in Abbe Klein's French translation of his life, was issued today:

"As soon as the Pope's letter to Cardinal Gibbons had been published in the daily papers the Paulist fathers sent a telegram to Cardinal Rampolla assuring him that they entirely acquiesced in the teachings of the holy father and that they would shortly send a letter expressing this more fully. This was immediately prepared and sent. It makes a detailed statement of the absolute obedience of the Paulist fathers to the letter and spirit of the Pope's teachings, quoting their rule as to the thorough spirit of obedience and loyalty to Rome prescribed for the fathers.

"When a new edition of the 'Life of Father Hecker' is prepared it will emphasize the Pope's teaching and conform to his judgment in every respect."

None of the members of the Paulist community would give any further details concerning the letter sent to the Pope, preferring that any further publication regarding it should be made from Rome. Following is a copy of the cablegram referred to above, which was sent to Cardinal Rampolla immediately upon the publication of the Pope's encyclical by the Rev. George Deshon, superior general:

"The Paulist fathers are about to dispatch a letter of adherence; fully embrace the teachings of Leo XIII."
