ASYLUM VS. CRUSHER.

The Board of Health is again endeavoring to have the rock crusher removed from the vicinity of the Halepupule. The Board has of course no right to "demand" the removal of the crusher or to quarrel with a government department of which it is or should be a subordinate. The question is for the voters to decide on and not for a "board" which very likely will be relegated shortly to privacy and we hope oblivion. There are no money available in the Treasury to pay the expenses of removing at the present time either the Asylum or the crusher, and if Governor Dole, who has called at the Asylum, from which he never should have escaped, would call an extra session of the Legislature there would be no reason, why present conditions complained of should not be removed.

The Board of Health met yesterday and certain letters from medical men were read. We have the highest regard for the physicians who have been heard from, but we do object to the language used in expressing an idea or opinion by some of the learned physicians. Why does Dr. C. B. Wood write, as follows:

"Honolulu, October 10, 1901.

"Dr. H. C. Sloggett,

"President Board of Health.

"Dear Sir:—In response to your request for an opinion regarding the advisability from a medical standpoint of continuing the operation of the stone quarry and crusher adjoining the Insane Asylum, I would state that in my opinion the inadvisability of it is so evident as to leave no room for argument.

"There can be but one opinion about the effect of continuous noise, alarm and excitement upon patients suffering from nervous and mental diseases.

"The question of whether or not the Asylum and quarry should both continue to do business at the old stand is hardly debatable. The only room for difference of opinion is as to which should move.

"Very respectfully,

Is he assured that there is but one opinion on the matter and there is no room for argument?

Dr. George Herbert and Dr. S. D. G. Walters, who have had great experience at the Halepupule write as follows:

"Dear Sir:—At your request, we venture to make the following remarks in regard to the presence of

the 'stone crushing plant' on the asylum property.

"The first principle in the treatment of the insane is to place them in some quiet location, where they can rest undisturbed and unmolested.

"The exciting effect of the rock blasting is distinctly noticeable in the more aggravated cases of acute mania, though we believe it would be hard to prove its deleterious influence on individual cases of other forms of insanity.

"The fact remains, plainly evident to those of ordinary intelligence, that any recent case of insanity, taken to the asylum and placed alongside of the rock crusher, there subjected to the disturbing noise, would suffer a serious detriment in its progress to recovery; and, on the other hand, might have its little remaining reason hopelessly dispelled.

"We believe the presence of the rock crusher alongside the asylum wards to be an injustice, as well as a menace, to the inmates of that institution.

But why do they presume to know what the opinion of "anyone of ordinary intelligence," may be? There are people who claim to have "ordinary intelligence," who have visited the greatest asylums in Europe, and although not practicing medicine, have made insanity a study and who do not agree with the learned doctors quoted.

We should be very sorry to hear that any inmate of the Asylum should unnecessarily suffer, but we say that Superintendent Boyd of the Public Works would not do his duty to those who pay the taxes if he discontinued the work of the rock crusher, if thereby a delay or neglect of road work should occur.

The Board of Health has got the swelled head, and while it declines to permit experiments for a possible cure of leprosy, and allow a doctor to resign instead of being dismissed for a heinous offence, it is unfit to wield the power it has now usurped.

Of course the lepers are "only kanakas;" of course the afflicted children are "only kanakas," but yet the "kanakas" have a vote and will show the Board of Health a trick or two after the next election.

In regard to the Asylum, the following report was presented by Mr. E. A. Mott Smith:

"Oct. 10, 1901.

"J. H. Boyd, Esq., Supt. Public Works:

"Sir:—The Board of Health desires to again call your attention to the serious condition of affairs at the Insane Asylum due to the noise from blasting and the operation of the rock crusher of your department at that place.

"In bringing this matter again to your attention the Board does not desire to discuss nor in any manner bring into issue the removal of the rock crusher or of the Insane Asylum.

"The absence of an appropriation to remove either is a plain fact.

"The sole question in issue is raised by the resumption of operation of the crusher by your department. Are the operations of the crusher and quarry of such a nature as to be deleterious to the health and welfare of the patients at the Insane Asylum?

"As long as the crusher and quarry are in operation this question is in serious issue. The Board feel that the care of the inmates of the Asylum is a public trust of a delicate nature requiring constant vigilance and unusual care, and one in which the public and the government are deeply interested and concerned through natural feelings of sympathy and charity toward the unfortunate condition of the inmates of this institution.

"The Board therefore is convinced that anything which is deleterious to their welfare should receive immediate attention.

"The crusher, as you are aware, is situated but about fifty yards from the wards on the mauka side of the Asylum grounds.

"The noise from it in operation is therefore constant and loud. The same is true only more so of the blasts which in this kind of work are usually very heavy. Flying stones, occasionally of large size, fall in considerable numbers within the Asylum wall. The concussion from the blasts has broken the windows in ward No. 3, and so shaken the foundation of the same building that constant care has to be exercised to keep the building doors, and apparatus in condition and repair. The roofs of the buildings have also suffered and in February last, a large stone went through the roof of ward 6.

"When a blast is about to be fired a whistle is blown at the quarry, and the inmates of the Asylum are immediately hurried away to another part of the grounds to a place of less danger.

"The members of the Board are of the unanimous opinion that the noise of the crusher is plainly detrimental to the health and welfare of the inmates of the Asylum, in some cases making cure impossible.

"To the average citizen, continuous and uninterrupted noise of this sort is in itself a source of annoyance and irritation; to the inmates of the Asylum, it is apparently much more so.

"It is undoubtedly a cause of exaggeration of symptoms already existing in many, if not all of the cases.

"The members of the Board are also of the unanimous opinion that the noise and concussion of the blasts are even more harmful than the noise of the crusher, for the reason just stated. Also that the hurried moving of the patients about the grounds to diminish danger from falling stones excites and irritates them.

"From a medical standpoint, and as plainly appears from medical opinion herewith enclosed, the continuation of operation at the rock crusher and of blasting should not continue.

"The Board feels that such a discontinuance is absolutely necessary, and therefore again so requests."

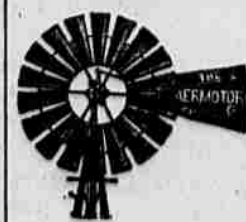

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS

The Hogans may play a season at Orpheum commencing next month.

Tomorrow the news will reach us that the Shamrock took the American Cup.

Commissioners A. N. Kepoiki and F. J. Testa are expected to return from Maui on Sunday morning.

Mrs. E. P. Low of Puuwaawaa will go to Kauai next week on a visit to her sister Mrs. Albert S. Wilcox.

Federal officials will send a resolution of condolence to Washington, in regard to the assassination of President McKinley.

The Dole Republicans are getting ready for work and a meeting has been called by chairman H. P. Baldwin of the Executive Committee.

Counterfeit dollars are reported as being circulated here lately. We haven't even seen the real thing, but Pinkerton Kaapa is working on a clue.

Mr. and Mrs. Ahlo have issued invitations to a reception to be held on the 19th inst. in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Ahlo, at the Ahlo residence on Upper Liliha street.

Attorney-General W. Cathcart is sitting with the Supreme Court this morning in the place of the Chief Justice, who is in Washington with General Hartwell trying to save his official scalp.

The Advertiser made an error this morning in stating that Miss Mutch, the principle of Waihole school had been arrested. The arrested teacher's name is Miss Mudge, and in no way connected with the highly esteemed family here of Wm. Mutch.

A handsome painting in oil of the late President McKinley is on exhibition in Marshal Hendry's office, pending its removal to the Republican headquarters. It is the work of Beale of San Francisco, and was presented by George C. Stratemeyer.

Mr. C. A. Brown, who is paying a flying trip to the Islands in regard to his interests in Ford Islands, is in excellent health, but says he is no longer a millionaire, but simply a watermelonair, until Uncle Sam digs up for Ford Island and the water front of that fine property.

Mr. John Eas, the President of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, has not resigned as reported. The return to Honolulu of Mr. W. O. Smith, who was prominently mentioned as the successor of Mr. Eas, may cause the proposed consolidation of the Wilder and the I. I. S. N. companies.

Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth left for Koolauloa this morning this morning to bring up the witnesses in the case against Dr Winslow and Miss Mudge, a school teacher, who were arrested yesterday on a charge of a criminal assault on a young girl named Rose Lui. The case will be tried here tomorrow.

A New Firm.

Captain John A. Schaefer has severed his connection with the firm of the W. C. Peacock Company, Ltd., and will on Monday next, assume the management of the Brooklyn Saloon on Alakea street, between Queen and Merchant streets. The building which has been fixed up very nicely, is the property of Fred Harrison, and has recently been used by the Hawaiian Electric Works for offices and store rooms.

The business is owned by Schaefer and Cunningham, who are well and favorably known in the community. Captain Schaefer is a prominent member and officer of the National Guard of Hawaii, and Mr. W. M. Cunningham is the owner of the Mint and Wela Ka Hao saloons, and is specially a good fellow in sporting circles. The new emporium for Primo beer has been called the Brooklyn, in honor of Admiral Dewey's flagship, and under command of Captain Schaefer many "schooners" will be sunk. Monday next is the opening day.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Honolulu is at last to have a Blue Book, which is to contain the names of those who are considered society people here, by Emmett May, Farwell and Joche. The press work will be done under the special supervision of W. M. Langton, which is a guarantee that the book will be artistic and splendid from a mechanical point of view. The Blue Book should be found on the table of all members of Society. We hope a copy will reach us in time to write a proper history of the selected 300 before New Year. How the aristocrats would like it.

We regret to learn from the Pacific Commercial Advertiser of the death of the widow of the late J. L. Stevens, whose career in Hawaii in 1893 has been properly recorded by the public documents, signed by Cleveland and Blount. The Advertiser is wrong in calling the late John L. Stevens "the most famous American Minister to Hawaii." We have no quarrel with a man who is dead, but we object to the Advertiser's proof-reader who dropped the "in" in front of the word "famous."

Mr. Thurston's organ states this morning that the circumstances under which Dr Winslow, formerly Government physician for Koolau on this Island and Miss Mudge, the principal of Waihole school, were arrested and charge with assault on a young Hawaiian school girl, are "entirely unfit for publication." We do not wish to comment on the case until it has been tried, but if the circumstances are correctly reported in town, full publication should be given to the alleged outrage, and the newspaper which refuses to do so is not doing its duty. It is of course another case of white officials vs. only kauka children.

We are surprised to see an opposition to any reputable physician's offer to go to the leper settlement and experiment if there are patients willing to try a remedy which may cure them of the loathsome disease. The people at the settlement are not prisoners for any offenses against the law of the Territory. Every effort should be made to alleviate the sufferings of these poor people, who have been sinned against but who have not sinned. The argument of the Star, that, because heretofore no remedy for the dread-d malady has been found, no remedy can be found, is puerile. The congress at Berlin has not given up the hope of finding a serum against the leprosy bacillae. If our esteemed contemporary could read the Irish language, we should with pleasure furnish it with some of the most intelligent publications recently issued from physicians of that island where leprosy now is ravaging the small population. Let no stone be unturned, let every method be adopted which may help to stamp out leprosy in Hawaii, and incidentally Hawaii's wise Board of Health.
