

HAMAKUA DITCH SCHEME ADVANCES

PLANTERS AND PROMOTERS MEET

OF THE THREE PLANTATIONS INTERESTED ONE HAS ALREADY SIGNED A CONTRACT FOR WATER SERVICE, AND F. A. SCHAEFER & CO. ARE NEGOTIATING IN BEHALF OF HONOKAA AND PACIFIC SUGAR MILL—PLANS OF THE COMPANY.

The Hamakua Ditch enterprise is getting under way. It is expected that within a comparatively short time contracts will be signed with each of the plantations which is within the "sphere of its influence," and when this is done the work of financing will proceed and very shortly the actual work of construction. The Hamakua Ditch Company proposes to take the waters from the Bishop Estate lands at the head of Waipio Gulch, or rather, perhaps, from that part of the watershed on the windward side of the Kohala mountains which lies to the eastward of the region tapped by the Kohala Ditch, and carry it by suitable ditches to and above the cane fields of Honokaa, Pacific Sugar Mill and Paauhau, to be used on these plantations for irrigating and fluming. There are other plantations to the eastward which would be glad to have the water, but it is not yet known that there will be water enough to supply them after supplying those already mentioned. Although the rainfall has been gauged and the flow through the gulches and in the waterfalls of the upper part of Waipio Gulch has been measured by weirs, the element of seepage and evaporation is not fully known, and the exact amount of water procurable can only be determined with certainty by actual demonstration. A meeting was held yesterday at the office of F. A. Schaefer & Co. between the members of that firm and the representatives of the Ditch company at which the subject of contracts was talked over. F. A. Schaefer & Co. represented Honokaa Plantation and Pacific Sugar Mill, prospective users. J. T. McCrosson represented the Ditch people. No final conclusions were arrived at, though there is every reason to believe that negotiations were substantially advanced. The contracts, when made will be for a long period of years. The promoters of the ditch have already completed a contract with Paauhau plantation. There is therefore everything to indicate a speedy conclusion of agreement with Honokaa and Pacific Sugar Mill. The Kohala Ditch is expected to be completed by July 1. If everything goes well it may be expected that the force now at work on Kohala Ditch will be set to work on Hamakua Ditch after that date.

WILL CARTER RESIGN?

IF PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT REAPPOINTS JUDGE ROBINSON?—A QUESTION DISCUSSED BY LOCAL POLITICIANS.

"Will Carter resign if Roosevelt reappoints Robinson?" was a question that was debated today by sections of the political science club that used to meet at Martin's. It was also debated by others. In fact the question is one that seemed to have become quite popular among those who talk politics and political possibilities. It is not known that it was discussed either by Governor Carter, President Roosevelt, or Judge Robinson. The discussion which the Carter-Robinson affair, with its incidents of Scotch whisky, and its later incidents of hot cables to the President, has given rise to, seems to have been more general than the discussion relating to any other political incident for a very long time. NO HOPE FOR FILIPINOS

(Associated Press Cable to The Star).

WASHINGTON, D. C., January 16.—The House today sustained the chair in its action in ruling out or order, an amendment to the Philippine Bill, declaring that the settled policy of the United States was to grant the Filipinos independence as soon as they showed themselves to be capable of self-government. SAN DOMINGAN REBELLION CRUSHED. SAN DOMINGO, January 15.—The insurgents at Monte Cristo have capitulated to the government forces. The gunboat Independence also surrendered after her commander had escaped from his vessel to an American warship in the harbor. The revolution in the republic is now ended.

A GOOD START

DELEGATES HELD A STAR CHAMBER MEETING AND AGREED TO BE HARMONIOUS.

According to the official report handed out by Chairman Smith of the Washington delegation, Harmony, with a capital "H" is to be the watchword in the descent now planned on the National Capital. This is what Chairman Smith said and there is no reason to doubt that it is correct, though as the delegates chose to meet in secret session no complete report of the proceedings can be furnished. The meeting was held in the Hawaiian Trust Company's offices with Chairman Smith presiding. There were present also Secretary Galt, Delegates McNerny and Robinson of Oahu, Loebenstein of Hawaii and Case of Maui, Kauai was not represented. According to what was told after the meeting, the outside delegates were informed of all that had been done and were in perfect accord therewith. After a discussion along general lines, it was unanimously decided that the delegation should work as a unit, that whatever the majority decided upon should be worked for loyally by the minority after the decision had been made and that there should be no minority reports. It was further decided that the one and only aim of the delegation should be to obtain the three-quarters rebate of the revenue derived here and that there should be no side issues whatsoever. The meeting adjourned to meet at nine o'clock tomorrow at Governor Carter's offices for a consultation with him.

Nuuanu Met Hurricane

BARK HAD SEVERE EXPERIENCE ON HER RECENT TRIP FROM THIS PORT TO KAA NAPALI.

Evidently the recent trip of the bark Nuuanu from Honolulu to Kaanapali, which required six days to make, was a very trying experience. The following interesting letter telling of the run, was received in this city by Mrs. H. M. Dow from her son, Herbert, who is second mate aboard the vessel: "We dropped anchor here at just 4 p. m. today after a hard old trip of six days and six hours. I tell you it blew a gale ever since we left Honolulu or rather a hurricane from the northeast and it was a dead muzzler I tell you. Tacking ship every two or three hours and being called out in the middle of your watch below at night. The nights were very cold and rainy and I tell you it did not take long to wear a fellow out with so much pulling and such a little sleep. It was set the topgallant sails, and then take them in, in fact the vessel was on her beam end more of the time. "Last Wednesday morning about 10 o'clock a squall came up and it rained and blew like the very (D.) At last the captain said send down the royal yards being our watch on deck, it was up to me. Well in the midst of rain and wind and the ship on her beam ends I went up with one other and sent the yard down without any trouble. Well I tell you it was very interesting when the yard would swing away out and come in again with a mighty blow. I got between it and the rigging once and got a whack I shall not forget although not hurt much. "Captain Josslyn got the orders for the ship tonight, she is to go to Philadelphia to discharge. I expect we will be here, until next Wednesday."

COUNTY AND THE KUNST PROPERTY

OFFICIAL TRANSFER OF LEASE HAS NOT YET BEEN MADE—DOUTHITT NOT INFORMED. There seems to be some sort of a hitch in the arrangements for the taking over of the Kunst property by the County for the purpose of adding it to Kapiolani Park and obtaining public access to the beach. As will be remembered, Supervisors Lucas and Adams were appointed a committee to make arrangements with Harry Lewis to see if he could be induced to give up his years' lease if another place could be found him. He agreed to take Sans Souci, Judge Hatch's place if the judge were agreeable and the judge was cabled in Washington. Up to noon today no answer had been received. CARTER WILL NAME HIS MAN

GOVERNOR HAS NOT YET CABLED HIS CHOICE FOR SUCCESSOR TO JUDGE ROBINSON, BUT WILL DO SO—PROSSER AND CARL SMITH MENTIONED—A VACANCY IN THE POSITION WILL BEGIN NEXT TUESDAY ANYHOW.

Governor Carter said this morning in answer to a question that he had not yet made any recommendation to the President of a successor to Circuit Judge Robinson. He also stated that he intended to do so, and it is presumed that a name will be cabled to Washington before next Tuesday, when the judge's term expires. Just who will be the man is a subject of considerable speculation. There is some talk of Carl Smith of Hills and another report has it that the position may be offered to M. F. Prosser, the present deputy attorney general.

As usual with the local judiciary, there will be an interval with no judge at all, for it will be impossible, it is said to get an appointee qualified for some time. It is claimed that even the reappointment of Judge Robinson would not have prevented this, owing to the fact that Congress is in session, and a mere commission by the President would not be enough, as the term absolutely expires on January 23. It might take some time to get the Senate to act and some delay is regarded as inevitable. Judge Robinson is the presiding judge at the present criminal term, and has a large list of criminal cases on his

calendar. He will probably assign them all before his term expires, and either De Bolt or Lindsay will drop civil and chambers matters to take up the criminal work, which is very heavy.

Carter And Roosevelt

It is not very likely that Bishop Libert has sent to the President an absolute request for the reappointment of Judge Robinson. The Bishop's message is probably more of a testimonial to the character of the judge, who, it must be admitted, was assailed very unjustly at the start.

As the Advertiser says this morning, it is not likely that the President will depart from his well known policy of following the advice of Carter here as to appointments, and holding Carter responsible.

This one-man-responsible proposition is utterly wrong and un-American to the core, and as applied above all things to the Judiciary it is full of harmful possibilities, besides being unspeakably lowering to the dignity of the bench.

Tragedy In Real Life

The San Francisco papers contain accounts of one of those tragedies of the heart which read like fiction. A young man whose name was John August Miller, shot himself through the brain at the Ferry Building, dying instantly.

Telegraphic communication was opened with Dixon, Ill., and that community was informed that a man on whose body was found an envelope addressed to F. J. Millar had committed suicide.

A few days after all this happened the real F. J. Millar entered the Terminus Hotel in San Francisco and asked for his mail.

Millar was astounded, and quickly realized what must be the situation in his family and among his friends, and for a while he kept the telegraph wires hot. Then he set himself to unravelling the mystery.

A Competitor Of Standard Oil

The Union Oil Company, which is represented in Honolulu, claims to be the most effective competitor of the Standard Oil Company that there is. It has acquired one of the largest oil vessel fleets in the world.

It proposes, according to its officials, to reach out for a world wide trade, and to that end, will operate a large fleet of tank steamers on both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, some of which have already been purchased.

Concessions have been secured by the company for two pipe lines across the isthmus of Panama so that oil may be shipped from Californian ports and pumped directly into steamers on the Atlantic side of the isthmus.

The oil of California has long been recognized as having advantages over the oils of the east for fuel purposes, and the Isthmian pipe line may be the means of introducing the California fuel oil to the east and of greatly extending the market for it.

MRS. PERRY GETS SOME HOT SHOT

A WARM DESCRIPTION OF HER
IN HER FORMER HUSBAND'S
ANSWER TO SUIT.

Thompson & Clemons have filed a
joint answer for Antonio L. Perry and
Maria Augusta Perreira, to the com-
plaint of Mrs. Perry, divorced wife of
the former. In her complaint Mrs.
Perry made sensational charges of co-
ercion on the part of her husband to
force her to turn over to him certain
property, bought by Mrs. Perreira.
As to the charge that Mrs. Perry was
reduced to a condition of helpless dread
by her husband's threats of making
sensational charges against her, the
answer comes back with the following
description of her in addition to the
denials: "She was, at and before said
6th day of June, a bold, brazen, tem-
perous, strong willed woman, impervi-
ous to entreaties of friends, unmindful
of public comment, fearless of just en-
sure, with no thought of self, save self-
indulgence, and no thought of family
or friend, save for personal gain."

DELEGATION TO AID TEACHERS

SECRETARY TAFT'S REFUSAL OF
TRANSPORTATION WILL NOT
PREVENT FURTHER EFFORT.

Superintendent of Public Instruction
Babbitt, having received from Secre-
tary Taft a refusal of the request that
teachers be allowed transportation on
army transports, to attend summer
schools, has turned the matter over to
the Washington delegation, with a re-
quest that it try and do something.
Taft's refusal is based upon the lack
of room. It is thought, however, that
a special transport might be provided,
and Babbitt proposes to make further
efforts. Babbitt's correspondence on
the subject was turned over to the
governor yesterday with the following
letter:

"Honolulu, January 12, 1906.
"His Excellency, George P. Carter,
Governor of the Territory.

"Sir: Enclosed I beg to hand you
copies of the correspondence which has
passed between W. R. Farrington, one
of the Commissioners of the Depart-
ment of Public Instruction, and Presi-
dent Wheeler, of the University of Cali-
fornia, also E. C. Moore, president of
the summer school in Berkeley, relative
to the plan whereby the teachers of the
public schools of the Territory of Ha-
waii might be enabled to attend sum-
mer schools on the Coast.

"Copies of these letters have been
given the Commission about to start
for Washington, who have promised
their aid in the matter.

"Copies have also been sent to the
delegate in Washington, and to several
senators and representatives in Con-
gress.

"While the reply of Secretary Taft
to President Moore seems to indicate a
finality in the matter, the Department
is loath to drop it, and hopes that by
the aid of its influential friends, it may
still be brought about.

"May I solicit your aid in this mat-
ter, which will mean so much to the
teachers of Hawaii, and through them
to the children and parents of the Ter-
ritory. Yours very respectfully,
