MR. W. N. ARMSTRONG gives Mr. Dole a parting "kick" in an editorial on "calipers." The President, Adjutant-general and the "Majah" comes nearer to Mr. Armstrong's ideal than anybody else around town. They are all legs and heads (top-knots); all trousers and collars. But we don't see why Armstrong should call attention to the fact.

FOOLED AGAIN.

The "Heroes" See the New Year In.

Bloodshot eyes, weary looks and bad tempers were noticeable yesterday morning among the supporters of the Republic. And there was cause enough for the described condition. The attorney general and marshal had again been listening to ridiculous rumors, and "Marmontly" yarns and the result was, that it was dead sure, this time, that a royalist uprising would take place and to quell it the services of the army, citizens reserve, sharpshooters, etc., etc., were called upon. So instead of sitting comfortably at home among friends and hail the arrival of 1895 with a hearty toast in punch or gingerale, as the case and temperament of the man might be, the "braves" donned their belts and shouldered their guns and went on picket duty. They stood silently in the night outside the houses of the "royalists" and listened to the merriment going on. The station house was crowded with specials. The marshal staid there all night and no sleep visited the heads of the government. Yes, there was one sensible man among them and that was Mr. Damon. He was present at the wedding at the house of Mr. J. A. Cummins and seemed to enjoy himself very well. But then Mr. Damon never did take stock in Mr. Smith's "uprisings." That nothing happened or was intended to happen has been proven, and we can only hope that the "boys" didn't catch cold by watching the moon, and that they have found their tempers again.

The only serious question in the matter is that such ridiculous action of the authorities discredited, not alone the government, we wouldn't care a snap for that, but the whole country, and it is certainly injurious to the whole community. The *Advertiser* has said the same several times and we fully agree with it. Our morning contemporary, though, found the cause for such disturbances in the talk of "noisy" royalists, and claimed that the rumors emanated from royalists. That is where the *Advertiser* is wrong, and we have no doubt that if it had considered the matter carefully, it would have been able to discover the true culprits.

When a murder is committed, a clever detective always asks himself, who can be benefited by this crime? And the same principle should be followed in this instance. We ask then, who can be benefited by these contestant "scarees"? Certainly not the royalists. Surely not the army and citizens guard who are put to inconvenience and annoyance. The authorities, we are sure will rather sleep in peace than being in constant fear of bloodshed and insurrection. Who then are the gainers. The answer is simple enough. Mr. Hitchcock's spies.

The present government has surrounded itself with a perfect army of spies. It has selected the

toughest and most despicable characters in town to "watch and report." It feeds this gentry with magnificent salaries, but it expects something in return. If no reports come in the spy's services are no longer needed, and is it to be expected that the class of men selected for this service would have any scruples in making up reports or swear away the liberty of any man? H. von Werthern stated under oath in the Bush trial that the Marshal told him that he must bring in reports about the conspiracies of the royalists. When he answered that the dreaded royalists were doing nothing whatever, the great marshal answered that their inactivity was a sure sign of their conspiring; and whether they did or did not, reports must be sent in or no salary would be forthcoming. We have had numerous similar statements from spies now in the service of the marshal.

With such inducements what can be expected? It was pay day last Monday. The marshal's pets had been idle for sometimes and many of them were afraid of getting the "sack" when pay day came around, and consequently rumors were set a-flying and reports were as numerous as mosquitoes. The result was satisfactory to—the spies.

The marshal has evidently not very much discernment, he seems at least to swallow every report which comes to him about the wicked royalists. We are aware of one report brought in by an ingenious spy, which probably convinced the marshal of the existence of a "plot." The spy had scoured the town last Monday. He had watched the natives especially and behold! he had counted 200 imu in preparation for the cooking of the festive pig or dog. That clenched the matter. Soper donned his uniform and the guard made their wills and went on duty. That it was New Year's day yesterday and that the Hawaiians always feast themselves and friends on that day was immaterial. The 200 imu representing 200 pigs were suspicious and the heroes were badly scared.

And such is the manner in which Mr. Hitchcock runs the police department. The ex-autocrat of Hilo complained the other day to a merchant of this city, that he was prevented from declaring martial law. If the cabinet would only allow him to do so he should soon "fix" things. Poor "stable" and "strong" republic whose marshal needs martial law!

But is it not about time for the government to ring down the curtain on this farce. Vigilance is necessary to any government and should be observed. But abject fear of shadows (or imu) is a disgrace to any government worthy of the name. Let Mr. Hitchcock employ decent and respectable men who will tell him the truth and nothing but the truth, and the community will hear no more about the revolutions and the guard can sleep in peace.

The natives were much disturbed on New Year's Eve by repeated and unusual rumors of uprisings.—P. C. A.

Since when did the army, the sharpshooters, the citizen guards, the police, the authorities and the missionaries in general come under the category "natives"?

Arrived In Japan.

A note was received at the Legation here from Mr. Fujii the diplomatic agent to Hawaii who left for home in November. Mr. and Mrs. Fujii reached Japan on the 25th of November after a pleasant voyage. Mrs. Fujii did not prove a good sailor and suffered considerably from the mal-de-mer. The consul-general is now in Tokyo, and very busy greeting his many friends and acquaintances. His future moves have not been decided yet. The diplomat desires to be remembered to all his dear friends in Hawaii.

JOLLIFICATIONS.

New Year In Honolulu.

It was generally stated around town that New Year was very "quiet" this time. This may be owing to the proverbial hard times and to the foolish action of the "scared" government but it seemed nevertheless that most people enjoyed themselves immensely. A number of gentlemen made the regular New Year's calls and in every house the ladies were "at home." Queen Liliokealani received numerous callers during the day and Mr. Dole held a reception in the afternoon at his residence. In private houses the usual feasts, luau and jollifications took place even if the celebrants made less noise than do the heathen "chinese" on their New Year's day. But then our "devils" cannot be driven out with fire-crackers.

The Hawaiian Rifle Association held its eighteenth semi-annual "shoot" at the range on King street. John Kidwell won the Hawaiian Hardware Company's trophy with a score of 89. As this was the third time he won it becomes his property. W. E. Wall made the highest score for the Brodie cup. Fisher who has won the cup twice before was close after Wall. The score was Wall 46, Fisher 45. In the contest for the Cabinet's trophy W. E. Wall led with a score of 92. F. B. Damon took the H. R. A. second class silver medal by scoring 46. The H. R. A. Trophy was won by Fisher with a score of 90. For the President's Trophy W. E. Wall scored 223 and won the day. F. B. Damon scored 89 for Hall Son's sporting rifle and J. H. Fisher beat J. Kidwell 79 to 76 in the mid-Range Championship. There were finally an All Corner's Match and a Pool Target. The day as a whole was a success although the shooting wasn't extra good, which probably was due to the previous night's vigilance and anxiety.

The Young Hawaiian Institute held open house on New Year's Eve and yesterday the president Henry Smith gave a luau at which over 60 guests were present.
