HAWAIIANS abroad are always proud of their country, and take every occasion to manifest it. This accounts for the beautiful and very unique display made by the pretty belles mentioned on the first page as active participants in the Hawaiian booth at the Kirmess Bazaar in San Francisco, early in October. There was the grass hut and the taro patch, and Diamond Head and the pretty taro-patch fiddlers, singing their gay Hawaiian melodies, and attracting a crowd of spectators. It all helps to advertise Hawaii, and to let tourists know that it is a spot worth seeing.

KA LEO is unduly excited by the ADVERTISER's article on the importance of the sugar industry, and is howling for a more equal division of the profits. Now, we would like a little of the stock ourselves if we can get it for nothing, which is doubtless Ka Leo's sign, and we therefore await the unfolding of a detailed plan with greedy anticipations.

The undisguised hungry communism of the Leo article reminds one of some old English rhymes which run, if our memory serves us, about as follows: "What is a communist? One who hath yearnings, For equal division of unequal earnings, Idler, or bungler, or both, he is willing To fork out his penny and pocket your shilling."

PROPOSED POLYNESIAN SOCIETY. Through the kindness of Prof. Alexander we are in possession of a circular from Wellington, N. Z., proposing the foundation of a learned society to be called as above indicated. The term Poly-

nesian is understood to cover Australia and New Zealand, the Chatham Islands, Polynesia proper, Melanesia, Micronesia, Malaysia and Papua. The object of the society will be to establish a means of communication between those interested in the anthropology, ethnology, philology, etc., of the native races. Members would of course be recruited from all parts of the Pacific, and it is thought that with a membership of 250, each paying \$5 a year, the society could be started. Owing to the fact that the society would be so scattered, it would not be feasible at first to hold meetings, but it is proposed to establish a common organ of communication in the shape of a periodical to be called the Journal of the Polynesian Society, in which articles would naturally appear which now seek a publisher among the different periodicals scattered through Europe.

It is needless to say that this proposed society would be an admirable thing and that it could not fail to advance the cause of science. The native races of the Pacific have furnished very valuable material to anthropologists. They are a rich mine which up to date has only been very partially worked. Much information remains to be collected which if not speedily and systematically sought after will surely be lost, as the disappearance of the aborigenes and the modification of their habits is daily destroying invaluable material for the student of man.

We have a number of residents who are well qualified to represent Hawaii with honor in this new scientific council of the Pacific, and it is to be hoped that they and all who take an interest in the matter will hasten to connect themselves with it.

Supreme Court.

TUESDAY, Oct. 27. OCTOBER TERM—BEFORE JUDD, C. J. The Queen vs. Ah You, Ah Tong and Ah Lee; unlawful possession of opium. Appeal from Police Court. Neumann for defendants. Nolle pros. entered against Ah Lee; the other two defendants were fined \$50 each and costs. The Queen vs. Britton; unlawful possession of opium. Peterson for defendant. Nolle pros. The Queen vs. Wong Wai; assault and battery. Appeal from Police Court. The defendant did not appear; his bond was declared forfeited. The Queen vs. Mark Boni and Rosa Barboza; adultery. Appeal from Police Court. The prosecution failed to prove a case. The Court ordered the jury to acquit the defendants. The Queen vs. Ah Tong; receiving stolen goods. Defendant pleaded guilty and was sentenced to one year's hard labor and \$25 fine.

BEFORE DICKERTON, J. T. H. Davies & Co. vs. Wilders' Steamship Co. Tried by a foreign jury, who rendered a verdict for the plaintiff. A. S. Hartwell for plaintiff; F. M. Hatch for defendant. DIVORCES GRANTED—BEFORE JUDD, C. J. Marie C. St. Mare vs. Eugene St. Mare; libel for divorce on ground of failure to provide. The Court granted the divorce and awarded the children to the plaintiff. Almira W. Kahananui; divorce prayed for on the ground of failure to provide. Divorce granted by the Court. Mary Hook vs. Sam Hook. Divorce granted on the ground of adultery.

New Spreckels Steamship Company. Advice from Philadelphia of October 9th that C. A. Spreckels, Rudolph Spreckels, J. C. Uhler, Charles Watson, Wm. O. Hempstead and Louis Spreckels will make application next month for a charter for a corporation to be known as the Spreckels Steamship Company. The notice for application states that the object of the company is to engage in shipbuilding and transportation business and "whatever shall be incidental to the said business."

O. A. Spreckels, who is the Philadelphia representative of the sugar-refining firm, said to-day that it was not the intention of the company to engage in the business of building steamers at present, and that ships would be built simply for the use of the company. At the present time the firm is running two steamers a month to Hamburg. The Spreckels Steamship Company has been organized for the sole purpose of facilitating the transportation business of the refinery. At the office of the Spreckels refinery it was stated that additional vessels would be chartered as soon as possible, and that the firm would make additions to the line according to the requirements of the business.

THE SUGAR CONFERENCE.

Tenth Annual Meeting of the Planters' Labor & Supply Co.—The Secretary's Report.

SECOND DAY—TUESDAY, OCT. 27.

The meeting was called to order at 10:30 A.M. The minutes of preceding day read and approved.

Present: Messrs. W. G. Irwin, Marsden, Schaefer, G. N. Wilcox, W. W. Hall, Lowrie, S. B. Dole, J. O. Carter, Captain Mist, Austin, Horner, Baldwin, Glade, P. T. Tenney, T. R. Walker, C. M. Cooke, H. M. Whitney, Dr. Rogers. W. O. Smith reported for the trustees, recommending an appropriation of \$4373.39 and an assessment of 5 cents per ton on the stock of the Company. Adopted.

Hon. J. M. Horner read the report on cane transportation. No new methods of transportation had come to the knowledge of the Company, but Mr. Lydgate, by building a "wet weather" flume and combining it with his other system of transportation, had saved his company \$20,000. The manager of Paahau had performed a similar feat. The ox was not valued much now as a means of transporting cane. The head should be made to do the work of the hands and feet. This was the most effectual way of economizing labor. Report accepted.

Voted that Mr. Dillingham's report on live stock be presented and printed in Planters' Monthly. W. W. Hall presented report on forestry. He acknowledged for the Company valuable suggestions and aid from Mr. Dan Logan, who was well acquainted with the subject. The subject was one of great importance. The efforts of Messrs. Jaeger and Cleghorn should not pass without appreciation.

Much has been done by householders privately, as witness Kulaokahu. The Government had created a fine forest on the Makiki slopes. Organized public effort was necessary. Want of legal regulation was causing wholesale destruction of forests. The committee recommend that the Planters' Labor and Supply Company move the Legislature for creation of a sub-bureau for forestry and the appointment of a commission to consider means to the preservation of the forests. The committee recommends the consideration of a law in Victoria, which provides, with certain limitations, that any one cutting down a tree shall plant and care for two in its place. On Kauai, seven years ago, algebra planting on a large scale was done by Gay and Robinson. Fruit trees should be planted on a large scale. The report ended with a warm eulogy of Mr. Jaeger for his zeal in the matter of forestry and his inestimable services to the country in the matter of the "cottony cushion scale."

Moved that the report be accepted and printed in the Planters' Monthly. Mr. Schaefer moved also reference to the trustees as there were recommendations which ought not to be neglected. Carried.

Hon. T. R. Walker thought that the Company should make some practical acknowledgment of the value of Mr. Jaeger's services. The recognition which a good-natured man like Mr. Jaeger generally got was illustrated by a remark he had heard at the British Club, when he heard a member allude to the cottony cushion scales as "that confounded blight Jaeger brought here." Voted that the Company present Mr. Jaeger with a microscope as a grateful recognition of his valuable and disinterested services. F. A. Schaefer presented the report of the Committee on Coffee and Tea. Letters from J. M. Monsarrat, Rycroft and Suter on the state of their experiments were read, also a report by Mr. Miller on coffee planting. A report by Mr. Waite on tea cultivation was also read, describing a former costly failure with a tea plantation on Ceylon. Ceylon tea now topped the market. The first care in starting a tea plantation was to secure proper seed. Good plants should be obtained and cross fertilization practiced. Nurseries must be provided. At the end of the second year plants must be topped. The first crop should be only about 150 pounds of green leaves. Yield subsequently brought up to 1000 pounds of green leaves which would give 250 pounds of the dry tea. If tea paid in Ceylon it ought to do much better here, with labor of the proper kind. The British system of protecting labor was looked upon as a drawback, but it secured the best labor to the planter in the end.





Home-Made Souvenir Spoons.

Heat a sufficient quantity of beeswax until it is melted; dip your spoon into the liquid and a thin coating of wax will adhere to the silver. Let it get perfectly cold, and then draw your pattern with needles fixed firmly into a penholder. A darning-needle will make your heaviest lines and a "No. 9" will do for the finest. Now mix one ounce of sulphate of copper, one quarter of an ounce of alum and half a teaspoonful of fine table salt with one gill of vinegar and twenty drops of nitric acid. The depth to which the acid will eat into the metal will depend on the length of time the article is left in the solution, and it would be better to experiment with a bit of old brass or steel before immersing your silver.
