Report of the Minister of Finance to the Legislature of 1866.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE, April 25th, 1866.

Nobles and Representatives: The undersigned, in obedience to the command of His Majesty the King, and to the requirements of the 44th Article of the Constitution, has the honor to submit to you in the name of His Majesty's Government, the following Financial Report:

There was in the Treasury on March 31st, 1864, as per the report of my predecessor, \$22,659 29. And there have been received from various sources between the 1st of April, 1864, and the 31st of March, 1866, (see table "A," the sum of \$728,817 07.

Total available means for the period \$751,400 35. While the expenditures (see table "B") have reached \$582,241 02.

The public debt which, at the time to which the last Ministerial report was brought down, amounted to \$169,659 34. Now stands at \$16,325 51.

It will be borne in mind that those of the Executive Bills, U. and those R. D. (see table "C") were issued to the Commissioners of Crown Lands. These Bills, amounting to Twenty Thousand Dollars, were issued in obedience to the law passed at the last session of the Legislature, to relieve the Royal Domain from Encumbrances.

The amount of Public Debt falling due during the current two years, is \$48,850. Every effort has been made to carry out the intentions of the last Legislature in all respects. Board of Excise.—For particulars of the disbursements of this Board I would respectfully refer the Assembly to the report of the Board, which will be laid on the table simultaneously with this.

The Board of Immigration in following out the designs of the Legislature have caused to be imported 514 Coolies from China. There likewise have been one hundred and ten brought by private parties, with the approval of the Board.

They made an effort to obtain Polynesian immigrants, and in so doing expended for passages, etc., for certain Marquesans, \$502 25. There have been landed from the Caroline Islands by a private gentleman, by license of the Board, twenty men three women. These efforts have not been attended with success for the most of the Marquesans have returned to their native islands, and the Caroline Islanders are not as yet profitable laborers.

The salary of His Majesty's Commissioner to China and the East Indies has amounted to \$5,500. Other expenses for the coolies have amounted to \$58 30.

The Board has likewise devoted \$2,000 to the procurement of Fish Spawm, Silk-worms, animals, plants, trees, and the engagement of persons competent to manage whatsoever may be introduced, and to teach our countrymen. The amount not received from the coolies has been drawn from the appropriation.

The estimate of receipts for the current two years, for which members are referred to table "D," have been carefully made, and amounts to \$1,085,265 64. To which add cash in treasury \$169,659 34. Makes a total of available funds \$1,254,925 98. With which to meet expenditures "E" are estimated at \$823,823 58.

ROYAL DOMAINS.—The administration of the estate of His Majesty has been closed. There was found to be much larger indebtedness than was at first thought to have existed. The amount paid out by the administrator in liquidation of the debts of the estate was \$89,704, which was derived as follows:

As a part set-off to the bonds issued by the Treasury, there was a note due the estate for the sum of \$4,233, which could not be realized upon at the time and was assigned to the Treasury.
