# NOW PROSECUTING THE SUGAR TRUST

## JJI DISCIPLINED BY SNUB FROM ADMIRAL

LOCAL JAPANESE STRIKE ORGAN IS NOT INVITED TO HAVE ITS REPRESENTATIVE AT LICHU'S AREWELL BANQUET TO CONSUL UYENO ABOARD FLAGSHIP ASO LAST NIGHT—NEWSPAPER CALLS NAVAL OFFICER UNFAIR—FRIENDLY SPEECHES.

Diplomatic displeasure of the attitude of the Nippon Jiji, the local strike organ, was clearly demonstrated in a very official manner aboard the flagship of Admiral Ijichi's training-cruiser squadron last night, when His Imperial Majesty's high naval representative in these waters entertained at a festive board certain leading Honolulu Japanese, including the editors of the Hawaii Shinpo and the Japanese Daily Chronicle, and Editors Negoro and Soga of the Jiji were conspicuous by their absence.

That it was not an accident nor an oversight, this failure to honor the editor or some editorial representative of the Jiji, is made still more clear in yesterday's issue of the Nippon Jiji, wherein Admiral Ijichi is criticized as unfair and unpleasantly discriminating in not recognizing the Jiji. The Jiji criticism is something more than a casual remark and is quite evidently born of pique. For the snub handed out by the Admiral was intentional.

Managing Editor Sheba was invited by Admiral Ijichi to represent the Hawaii Shinpo, and Reporter Onodera by invitation was present on behalf of the Daily Chronicle. The Jiji had not been invited.

The fact that no gentleman of the staff of the Jiji had been invited is significant. The banquet was given

## One Alleged Rioter Set Free

A CONSUMPTIVE DEFENDANT IN THE WAIPAHU RIOT CASE GIVEN THE BENEFIT OF NOLLE PROSEQUI—SPILLNER JUNIOR ON WITNESS STAND—THE EWA STRIKE CASES ARE CONTINUED BY JUDGE WHITNEY TILL SEPTEMBER.

This morning Kinney and Prosser rained this morning and pleaded not for the prosecution in the Waipahu riot case, on trial before Judge Robinson, entered a nolle prosequi for Nagata, one of the thirteen defendants, and he was discharged. Nagata is suffering from consumption. Jotaro Mikawa has now but eleven others as co-defendants.

Judge De Bolt continued the trial of Soga, Makino, Negoro and two others for conspiracy, which has advanced to the point of having a jury sworn, until July 8.

## JUDICIARY JOBS ARE ALLOTTED

TWO LADY STENOGRAPHERS RETAINED AND ONE OF THEM RECEIVES INCREASE IN SALARY—LESLIE P. SCOTT RETIRES FROM ASSISTANT CLERKSHIP—TWO UNDER CLERKS MADE ASSISTANTS WITH MORE PAY—NO NIGHT LIBRARIAN.

Recommendations of the Chief Justice regarding the business of the Judiciary department were not adopted as a whole by the Legislature. Senator Coelho had the appropriation for that department made to correspond with his ideas of how the clerical machinery should be run. While one of the higher deputy clerkships was abolished, the chief clerkship held for a score of years or thereabout by Henry Smith was retained.

Chief Justice Hartwell, however, having the last say in directing the department, has arranged the salary list pretty much as he wanted it. Misses Kelley and Cook, the supreme court stenographers, are retained with some new duties and more pay for the latter. The following are their commissions:

## IS IT PUBLIC OR A PRIVATE HOSPITAL?

QUEEN'S HOSPITAL REJECTS A PATIENT BECAUSE THE PHYSICIAN TREATING THE CASE IS NOT A MEMBER OF ITS "HONORARY STAFF"—DR. O'DAY SAYS THE HOSPITAL IS NOT RUN LIKE A PUBLIC INSTITUTION.

The closing of the Palama General Hospital has resulted in a revival of a somewhat bitter controversy over the plan followed by the Queen's Hospital in handling cases. This morning a patient of Dr. O'Day desiring to enter the hospital for an operation was refused admittance, and the doctor is on the warpath. The patient in question was sent by him to the Japanese hospital.

"The statement in this morning's Advertiser that the Queen's hospital has opened its doors to all patients is not true," said Dr. O'Day. "Returning home from my morning calls, the article was called to my attention by my wife. I called up the hospital and asked if I could send Mrs. James Kanoho, whom I was about to send to the Japanese hospital, for an operation. I was told I could not send a patient because I was not a member of the staff of the Queen's Hospital."

"This hospital trouble has been brewing some time. When I first came here, I soon learned that there was trouble between the doctors and the Queen's Hospital. It appeared that only members of the honorary staff of the hospital were allowed to treat patients who were unable to pay \$2 a day or more to the hospital, and that in case I was made an honorary member of the staff, I must only bring patients able to pay \$2 a day for more. I took my patients to the Palama Hospital, realizing as I did that it is the privilege of a new doctor in a community to treat many of the poor and indigent.

FOR THE WEEK ENDED JUNE 19, 1909. Honolulu, June 21, 1909. GENERAL SUMMARY.

The greatest amounts of rainfall were reported from the Hilo districts of Hawaii, and on the 15th heavy to excessive rains were general over these districts. The total amounts of rainfall, in inches, in the several districts were: Hawaii—N. Kohala 0.12 to 0.82, Hamakua 1.12 to 1.35, N. Hilo 2.72 to 3.85, S. Hilo 2.24 to 5.91, Puna 1.45 to 2.32, Kau 0.08 to 0.52, S. Kona, 0.88, and N. Kona, 1.06; Maui—Makawao 0.81 to 3.30, Hana 1.21, and Wailuku and Lahaina 0.00, excepting 0.11 at Wailuku; Oahu—Koolauloa 0.22, Koolapoeko 0.32 to 1.35, Honolulu 0.36 to 1.63, and Ewa 0.04 to 1.45; Kauai—Hanalei 0.96, Lihue 0.29, Koloa 0.32 to 0.87, and Waimea 0.07; and Molokai—Molokai 0.68.

HEALTH PRESIDENT MOTT-SMITH FINDS MOST DEPLORABLE CONDITION IN OLD PLAGUE SPOT NEAR OAHU SUGAR COMPANY'S MILL—SURFACE WELLS CLOSE TO DRAINAGE FLUME—SHACKS, STABLES AND PRIVIES AMIDST DWELLING PLACES.

President E. A. Mott-Smith of the Board of Health on Tuesday afternoon looked into, on the spot, the sanitary condition of the Chinatown section below the Waipahu sugar mill. He found buildings and premises in most deplorable condition.

That place was a plague spot and focus of infection after the bubonic pestilence was driven out of Honolulu. Within a few days past a case of diphtheria has been found there. The inhabitants of the section are mostly Chinese and Japanese. Just below the place is a camp of strikers, at which Mr. Mott-Smith saw fifty or sixty eating together.

"Although cleaned up to a certain extent," Mr. Mott-Smith said in speaking of his inspection, "the place seems to me to be highly insanitary. It is situated on the slope of a hill, at the foot of which is a stream. There are surface wells in the midst of nests of buildings. These wells are enclosed in square boxes

The Matson steamer Lurline, coming here from Hilo, via Kahului, arrived this morning, reaching the railroad wharf where she will complete her cargo for the coast, at 8 o'clock. The Lurline, carrying a full list of passengers will sail for San Francisco tomorrow evening at 6 o'clock.

The Lurline's cargo is interesting on this trip on account of the fact that she carries the largest shipment of fresh pineapples that has ever left the island. This consignment consists of 2000 cases, the larger part of which is sent by the Honolulu Fruit Company, the new concern recently organized by Ginnac Brothers from the firms in the Pupukea section. In addition to this she will take 7,000 tons of sugar of which 6,550 is raw and 450 tons is refined, the latter coming from the Honolulu plantation. The other big shipments in her cargo consist of 1,000 bags of rice hulls, 100 bags of rice and 1500 bunches of bananas.

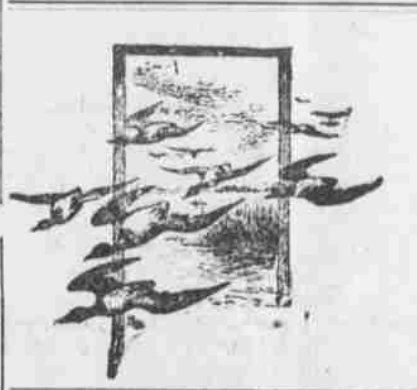

Surveyor Walter E. Wall drops from the headship of the Survey department to the deputy headship thereof under Marston Campbell, holder of the triple headship of works, lands and survey. E. Loomis, B. Lightfoot, E. Pardmore, G. F. Hyde, W. E. Herbron and F. E. Harvey, of the survey service, are dropped from the salary list. Mr. Harvey will be engaged on reclamation work at Kapa.

It is announced that the work of surviving positions will be increased and their pay reduced, excepting that Mr. Wall will retain his old salary.

The land bureau will have its quarters removed from the Judiciary building to the Capitol.

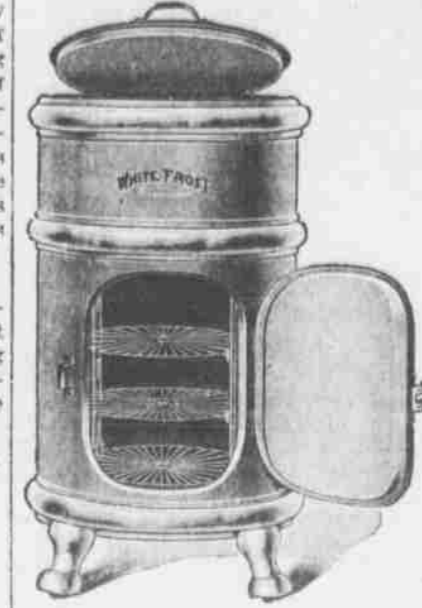

Last night the Board of Supervisors passed a resolution directing Dr. MacKall, city and county physician, to visit the Queen's Hospital today, make a list of indigents from Honolulu there and report within three days. It was orally reported that a joint committee of the hospital trustees and city health committeemen would determine on rules governing the admission of city indigents to the hospitals, which should be finally drafted by the city and hospital attorneys.

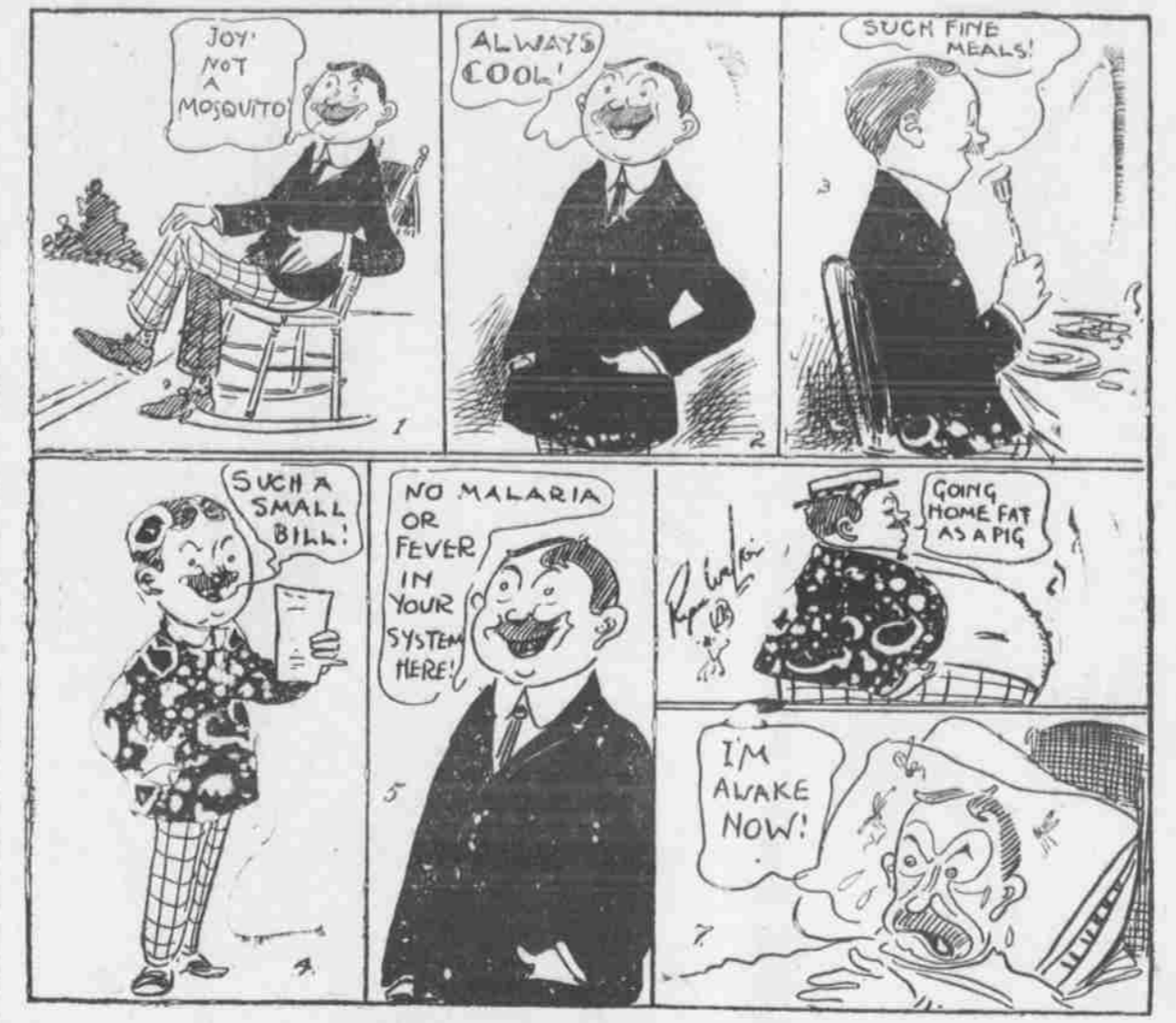

A stenographer's bill for \$19 for typing the plumbing ordinance, repudiated at previous meeting on account of Supervisor Aylett's offended dignity over not being consulted by his colleagues of the health committee, was reconsidered and by unanimous vote ordered paid.

Supervisor Aylett's resolution fixing the road department's salary schedule, laid on the table at previous meeting, was now put under the table by vote of indefinite postponement. A resolution fixing the pay of members of the police department passed.

On motion of Supervisor Logan the public expenditures committee was authorized to look to the protection of the grouped portraits of the first county board, which the mover was informed were being destroyed by insects. They cost something like \$40 and Supervisor Quinn said they would be valuable twenty years hence.

Some payrolls were passed and the Board adjourned till 12 noon today to pass the Koolauloa and Koolau-poko payrolls.
