## Court Term Is Pau

### Two Criminal Cases Take Much Time.

The March term of the circuit court of this circuit came to a close on the 26th instant.

The two cases that required the greatest time for trial were the Kuwahara murder case and the Kawano perjury case.

On Tuesday, the last day of the term four Filipino boys plead guilty to burglary. Owing to their age sentence was suspended and they were put in charge of attorney D. W. Burchard who has since placed them in care of local families.

Francis Armstrong of the barque Alexander Black and R. W. Howell were each sentenced to one year imprisonment for burglary. They plead guilty.

Dang Nam was before the court for burglary. He is the defendant who was recently defended by attorney Douthitt before District Magistrate McKay and about whom sensational articles appeared in the Honolulu papers.

Judge Kepoikai was appointed to appear for and defend the man. Judge Kepoikai asked for further time as he had not had time to prepare for the defense. Judge Kingsbury insisted. Judge Kepoikai asked to withdraw. Attorney Vivas was then asked to take the case. He declined on the same ground that Judge Kepoikai had done. Mr. Crockett was finally appointed but as he was not present at the time the case was called Mr. Prosser was substituted. The defendant was tried, found guilty and sentenced to imprisonment in short order. Ortos, whose face would pass muster at any state prison without question was handed his. The record of both of the latter is said to be exceedingly bad.

## Fernandez' Pictures Very Interesting.

On Tuesday and Wednesday of this week Ed. Fernandez, the moving picture man, showed at the Wailuku Town Hall, and on both nights had crowded houses. On Thursday evening he performed at Waikapu and the people of that locality were highly pleased.

Next Monday evening he will perform at Kahului at which place electricity will be used and the spectators will be able to see the pictures under the best conditions.

Fernandez' film of the last floral parade is a very interesting one as are also those of the volcano and of the marathon race.

Another film of great interest is that of the Passion play, in colors. This is a lengthy film and gives the complete history of the life of Christ, from his birth to his death.

He also has some very comical pictures which keep the audience roaring with laughter from start to finish.

Mr. Fernandez will give several shows in Puunene and Paia and perhaps in the upper country districts, the dates of which will be announced later. He has introduced on Maui a novel way of advertising, using large box kites, which hold up in the air a large banner announcing the date of his show.

## Makes Final Report

### Grand Jury Exonerates Fellow Member.

The grand jury which was recalled on the 20th instant finished its labor on Monday of this week at 2:30 o'clock p. m.

The report in full is as follows: In the Circuit Court of the Second Judicial Circuit, Territory of Hawaii, March 1910 Term.

To the Honorable Selden B. Kingsbury, Judge of the Circuit Court of the Second Judicial Circuit.

The grand jury of the Territory of Hawaii, duly empaneled and sworn in and for the Circuit Court of the Second Judicial Circuit beg leave to submit their final report in so far as concerns the business by them considered during this session.

True bills were found and indictments returned in the following cases:

Territory of Hawaii vs. Francis Armstrong and R. W. Howell, burglary in the first degree.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Dang Nam, burglary second degree.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Marcus Mancan, Ricardo Morales, Meliton de la Cruz and Lorenzo Danley, burglary in the first degree.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Kim Young Koo, burglary in the first degree.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Francisco Ortos, assault and battery with a weapon obviously and imminently dangerous to life.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Joe. Rodrigues, burglary second degree.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Jose Santiago, assault and battery with a weapon obviously and imminently dangerous to life.

Territory of Hawaii vs. Tam Chong, assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to murder.

Complying with the request of this honorable court we have thoroughly investigated the charge made that a member of this grand jury endeavored to influence the action of a trial juror in the case then being tried.

We find that there was no justification for such charge, and have completely exonerated said grand juror.

In the opinion of this grand jury Mr. H. M. Coke acted indiscreetly in referring the above matter to counsel for the defense in the case then being tried, instead of first bringing the matter to the attention of the court. This we leave to the discretion of the court.

We beg to report that we have made full investigation of the action of the police department in conducting investigations for crime, at certain stages of our investigation, even eliminating all persons from the grand jury room excepting such persons being questioned and we find from all the evidence before us that no harsh methods have been used by the police department in cases under investigation.

Your grand jury in a body visited the quarters and found same in a sanitary condition, nor have we had any evidence to show that they were insanitary at any time. We find that thirty-one people confined in jail either as prisoners or under detention with nine cells available for their accommodation. The jail contains thirteen cells of which the following are used for purposes other than the accommodation of inmates; No. 8 as a store room for property of the jail (this store room is even too small to accommodate items under

(the jailor's care.) Cell no. 11 is a sleeping room for the guards; cell no. 12 as an arsenal for Co. I.

In as much as we find the accommodations in the County jail inadequate for prisoners and persons held in detention, we recommend that the three cells above mentioned be used for the accommodation of inmates of the jail only, and that the attention of the proper authorities by this honorable court to the fact above and that proper quarters for the arsenal be provided, if possible.

The inadequate of present quarters is such that the only cell held in reserve for the accommodation of any new comer is the dark cell, and without reflecting on any one connected either with the police department or the jailors quite frequently had to be used, where a lighter cell would have been the ordinary receiving cell.

We have endeavored to fulfill our duty with dispatch, and are thankful to this Court and the Attorney General's department for assistance given us in our investigations. We feel that there has been no justification for several insipid newspaper articles, and trust that this report shall be given due publicity for the enlightenment of those not aware of true conditions.

## Fire Destroys New Residence

### Believe Origin of Fire of Incendiary Nature.

The new and up-to-date residence of Judge L. K. Kakani in process of construction in Hana for nearly two months past was totally destroyed by fire about 8 o'clock p. m. Friday evening, the 22nd.

The structure was being erected on the tract of land lying between and near the junction of the two roads leading from Dr. Deas' residence into Hana, and excited much favorable comment not only for its picturesque appearance and the added tone it gave the locality, but for the enterprise displayed in its erection.

Work on the new home had advanced so far toward the completion that the Judge and his family were nightly occupying it as a precautionary measure against accident. This precaution however, was neglected on the fatal night of the fire. In the late afternoon of that day after the carpenters had gone home, Judge and Mrs. Kakani saw that all was in order in and out of the building, and, taking their children left for the home of their parents, a scant quarter of a mile away, yet totally hidden from view by rising ground and intervening trees. When they again returned a few hours later at the hasty summons of friends to the site of their home, it was a mass of flaming ruins.

Earlier the same evening a young man passed by the vacant building heard some one moving in the brush in the vicinity; a little later, a policeman driving by saw a light reflected on the inner wall of the dining room, but, thinking that the Judge was on guard as usual did not investigate the cause of it; at the same time parties living at the sea beach a half mile away were able to see an unusual light in the house through an open door and hallway opening on the opposite side of the house, but noticing that the person who was driving by in a lighted conveyance not forty feet from the house found no cause for pause or apparent alarm they concluded that the Judge not yet having installed his stove had built an impromptu camp fire on the floor for the purpose of cooking supper and that there was no cause for alarm on their part, and thereupon reentered their own house and resumed their evening occupation; when they again looked out their door the building on the hill was wrapt in flames.

Much valuable material as well as the carpenters' tools were consumed in the fire. No insurance.

When the fact became known generally in the village that the Judge's new home was on fire many willing hands rushed to the rescue, but all too late to save. The deep sympathy of the community has gone out to him and his estimable wife and children, but it is hoped that the home will be rebuilt in the near future.

The fire inquest called by the Deputy Sheriff was held on the 25th and 26th instant, and resulted in a unanimous vote of incendiarism by some person or persons unknown to the jury.

**Florida For Home Builder.** The Technical World Magazine comments interestingly and instructively on the comparatively sudden demand for land in southern Florida. It is held to be due in part to the fact that the turpentine kings are now ready to release their grasp on the territory. They have obtained from it all that they can in their special line, and lands which they purchased at from 25 cents to \$1 an acre they are offering, in large tracts from \$3 to \$5 an acre. Of course, there is the inevitable middleman who take up tracts of from 5000 to 100,000 acres, subdivides them, and sells them to the settlers in small parcels at a profit. But the land may be had now at a low price—lower, perhaps, than it will ever be again—and this is also a leading factor in bringing about the present demand.

It is well that a warning has been sounded with regard to the danger that lurks behind this movement. Southern Florida offers undoubtedly splendid opportunities to the orange grower and sub-tropical gardener. But all southern Florida land is not fertile and investors and settlers should know something in advance about the character of the concerns or agencies they are dealing with. It will be wise on the part of the state of Florida if it shall at this time throw all the protection possible around the intending settlers. Florida needs them and cannot afford to have them disappointed.

**Laborer Is Killed**

Falls Over High Precipice Near Hilo.

Last week was a bad one for accidents in the vicinity of Hilo. The railroad construction work claimed another victim, and the criminal carelessness of some person who left giant powder caps about where they were accessible to children, caused the serious injury of two children.

The railroad accident happened Friday morning, the victim being a Japanese, named Zaisaki, who was working with a gang of laborers under the direction of a Japanese contractor. The previous night the gang had just completed the work on a tunnel at Waialea, constructed for the purpose of leading off the water in the gulch, and on Friday morning they went to work sluicing dirt at a point some distance above this tunnel.

Zaisaki had left his tools at the place where the gang had worked on Thursday evening, and at about 3 o'clock in the morning he went makai to fetch them. He stayed away so long that his absence caused wonder, and the boss of the gang went to the tunnel to look for him. He was unable to see anything which would indicate what had happened, so he returned and fetched the rest of the laborers makai. After some search these found the tools for which Zaisaki had gone, on the edge of the cliff, and the body of the unfortunate man was seen floating in the water below. Apparently the man and his tools had fallen together on the slope, but the tools had remained at the edge, while the man had tumbled on to his death. He had fallen some ninety feet into the sea, and must have struck the rocks on his way down. One of the laborers was lowered over the edge of the cliff by means of a rope, and he recovered the body of Zaisaki. Apparently death had been practically instantaneous, for the man's neck had been broken, he had received two severe cuts on the head, and one leg had been broken.

The deceased was about thirty-six years old and was single. Deputy Sheriff Fetter was immediately notified, and he went to the scene of the accident Friday forenoon. On investigation he found that the case was so plain that a coroner's inquest was unnecessary.

The accident in which the children were hurt was a most deplorable one in that it was caused by the miserable carelessness of some

Of Maui Aid Association Held.

The Annual Meeting of the Maui Aid Association was held on April 14th at the Baldwin National Bank at Kahului. The reports of the Secretary, Treasurer, Financial Committee were read and placed on file. The Treasurer's books for the period from May 1st to December 31st were audited by Mr. D. C. The exact manner in which the accident happened is still a mystery. There was a fire in the stove in the room in which the children were playing right by the stove, but whether the caps were exploded through the agency of the stove or in some other manner is not known. The stove shows no sign of injury.

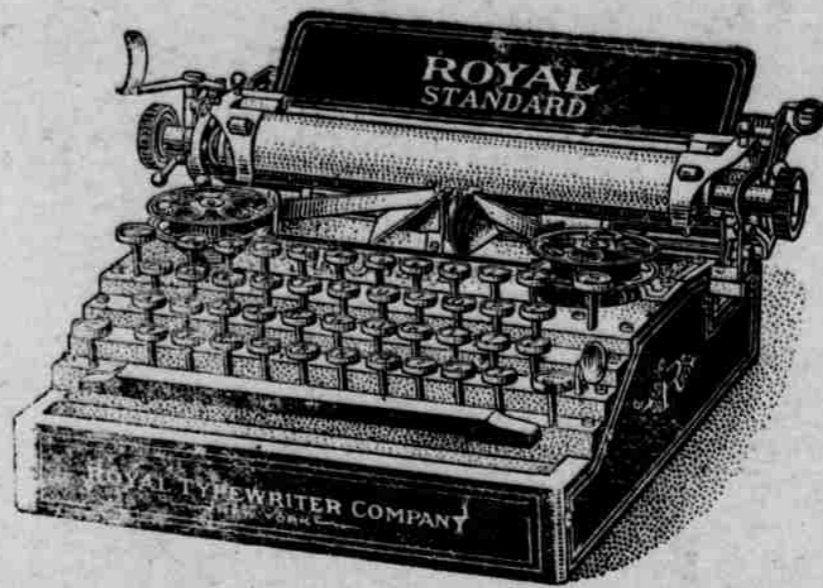
However, suddenly one of the caps which was held in the hand of the six year old boy, exploded with the result that the child lost two fingers and part of his thumb, and also received a cut on his head. His baby brother was also cut on the head. The police have in their possession several other caps with which these children had been playing, and these caps show such signs of rough handling that it is a wonder that they did not explode.—Hilo Tribune.
