THE SHOW.
The following is a list of what will be seen at the Show, so far as is known by the space for the same having been applied for: 20 head of cattle, 50 horses, 10 sheep, 7 swine, 20 specimens of poultry, 17 dogs, 1 firkin of butter, 1 cheese, a lot of German carp, 14 trees, a lot of flowers, 12 agricultural implements, machinery, carriages, &c. So far but little poultry is to be exhibited, and neither sugar, sugar-cane, rice, or bananas have been thought worthy enough by their cultivators to be sent in as an exhibit. A mere village in America or Australia could show more or better than what is on the above list. Why do not our agriculturists rouse up?

THE STORY
of the so called Prize fight is as follows as far as we can learn from the evidence at the court. On the day in question Paterson, an express driver, got drunk. Gourlay, another express driver, also took a glass or two of liquor but not enough to make him any way near as drunk as Paterson. They met in the Keystone Saloon kept by T. Walker and quarrelled. One proposed to fight or wrestle with the other. For the sake of his license Walker induced them to go out and have it out elsewhere, trusting, so he says, that when they got driving about the air would cool them down. According to the story told by the four principals they went to get a bath. (To do this they went to Kakaako when the tide was low and they would have to walk out some hundreds of yards as the water there is only up to their knees). When they got there Paterson got out of the carriage while it was going and Walker got out after him. Then Gourlay and Watson (another express driver who was with them) also got out. Paterson and Gourlay clinched and fell, Paterson underneath.

When Walker got Gourlay off from Paterson, the latter had his right leg broken, and a mark of teeth on his cheek, and his eye bunged and his face bruised. His head and clothes were covered with blood. Gourlay's clothes, face and hands were also bloody, but he had received no injury. They took Paterson to the house of a native near by, and washed the blood off him and then took him home. Now they claim that all this was the result of a friendly wrestling match. Of course, we, with all other sensible people, believe them.

POLICE COURT.

CRIMINAL CALENDAR.

Connelly, Iniha, and Nalole, the former two forfeited \$10 bail each, and the latter two were fined \$5 and \$1 costs each.

Tuesday, June 5—Drunks; Pili-po, T. Murphy, forfeited \$6 bail each. Kalepa, Kamakanila, Kahahana, forfeited \$8 bail each. Kape-la, Kamawai, Iwahauau, Kimokeo, Naole, remanded to 6th. Makalili, perverting justice *not pros.* Laami, and Liloa, affray, fined \$5 and \$1 costs each. Kani, disturbing quiet of night, fined \$5 and \$1 costs. J. Sullivan, and S. Ladd, furious driving, remanded to 6th. Kama-kala, fast riding, forfeited \$12 bail.

Paawalani, fast riding, fined \$5 and \$3 costs. Kanaaulua, assault and battery, (defendant is old and childish and unfit to take care of himself.) He is allowed to go to the Lanalilo Home. Iokea, remanded from 2nd, fined \$10 and \$1 costs. Ah Shen, and Kong Lau, remanded from 2nd. Ah Shen, *not pros.* Kong Lau, fined \$150 and \$1.30 costs, and sentenced to 3 months' imprisonment at hard labour. Appeal noted.

SHIPPING NOTES.

The bark Lady Lampson will sail Saturday for San Francisco.
Schr Lihöllho brought 1,400 bags of sugar.
Schr Kekauluohi brought 300 bags of sugar.
There are 951 packages of merchandise on the Madras for this port.
Schr Twilight took 3575 bags sugar, 1370 bags rice, and 127 bbls molasses.
Bark Kalakaua, Capt. Miller, arrived last evening, 15 days from San Francisco. Had fine weather during the passage. She brings 1 horse, 2 mules, and 700 tons merchandise.

LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

We understand that an unusually good base ball match will take place on the 4th of July.

We learn that the Hartford's challenge is to be promptly taken up. Possibly two other boats may compete at the same time.

A MEETING of Americans to make preliminary arrangements for the coming 4th will be called for Saturday evening at the Hotel.

TO-DAY 570 Chinamen from the Madras are to be landed at the Quarantine Station. About twenty Hawaiians who have had small-pox during former visitations have been engaged as guards etc.

Mr. Maccabe begins the series of entertainments, which he will give during his stay here, on Saturday. From personal knowledge we can assure our readers that they ought to go to every entertainment of the series.

AN advertisement in another column shows where you can get the daintiest meal in the city. From actual trial we can assure our readers that they could not want a better meal than can be procured at the Delmonico.

At a regular meeting held by the members of Pacific Hose Co. No. 1 last evening the following election of Officers took place.—Julius Asch, Foreman; vice M. D. Monsarrat, resigned, E. B. Hopkins, Asst. Foreman; vice Julius Asch, resigned, J. E. Wiseman, Delegate; vice T. F. Kennedy, resigned.

In former days it was the custom for the attendants of a dead chief to shave the round spot on the top of their heads. This custom has the Hawaiian name of *Maeavaeva*. The other day we noticed a man who had performed this operation out of respect for the memory of Her late Highness, Princess Ruth Keelikouani.

What we predicted the other day about that bridge, on the Waikiki road beyond Sunny South, has come to pass. A hole has been worn right through the boards, and any time we may expect to hear of some horse breaking its leg. Of course the Government have enough money left in the Treasury to repair it with.

YESTERDAY \$10,000 bonds were given to satisfy the expenses of Quarantine and this morning at day light the Chinese passengers will be landed at the Quarantine Station in boats from the Madras. No cargo will be landed. The vessel itself cannot come inside till another meeting of the Board of Health has been held and more redtape and formulas gone through.

THE total receipts during the past twelve months by the Treasurer of the British Benevolent Society have been \$1666.25, and his disbursements \$1457.35. During the year, 19 persons have been relieved, 16 men and 3 women. Of these four have been enabled to leave the Islands, and five have been sent to the Queen's Hospital, one of whom died and three recovered, while the fifth is still in the Hospital. There 7 names now on the relief books.

YESTERDAY at the Police Court the celebrated "Prize-fight" case was tried. A *not pros.* was entered against Paterson, and Watson, and Walker, and Gourlay, were charged with assault and battery on Paterson. The evidence was very conflicting, the parties who were engaged in the fight telling the same story with sundry contradictions, and the native witnesses who saw all but the actual tussle gave evidence that was wholly incompatible with the story told by the fighters. Gourlay was fined \$25 and costs. Walker was discharged as the Judge said that, whatever his own private opinion or belief might be, there was nothing in the evidence given that morning to convict him as an accessory or principal in the assault and battery.

INTER-COLONIAL NEWS

QUEENSLAND.

The Hon. P. Perkins, Minister for Lands, has received a letter from Connecticut, asking as a matter of information what prospects American immigrants would have in Queensland, and stating that there was a large number of mechanics and farmers who would like to emigrate to Queensland.

There is no agitation here about the annexation of New Guinea. The action of the Premier seems to have the tacit acquiescence of the public of Queensland. The pinch will be felt and the growl heard when the cost of governing the new acquisition comes on for Parliamentary discussion. If rumour be credible a very singular coincidence has occurred.

Mr. Romilly, Deputy-Commissioner under the Pacific Islanders Act, has arrived in Australia by the R.M.S. Carthage; he is said to be entrusted with a commission to proceed by a man-of-war from Sydney, and annex New Guinea. If this should prove to have been the case, Mr. Romilly must have been profoundly astonished to find that his commission was a supererogatory document, and that the achievement by which he was to have been distinguished in Pacific annals had been accomplished by another agent. The strangeness is that Lord Derby and Sir Thomas M'Ilwraith should have been simultaneously impelled to action by a corresponding conviction. Sir Thomas, being prompt and near to the scene of action, has carried off the palm.

VICTORIA

Sir John O'Shanassy died on May 5. He was one of the oldest and most famous of our statesmen having been in Parliament for over 30 years and Premier of the colony three times. His place in public life cannot be filled.
The National Gallery and Museum were opened for the first time on a Sunday on May 6; and, although the weather was very boisterous, there was a very large number of persons who took advantage of the new privilege, the number of visitors between the hours of half-past 1 o'clock and 5 p.m. being 5700.

stand all Jockeys will promptly bring their Horses out according to the Race Programme.
