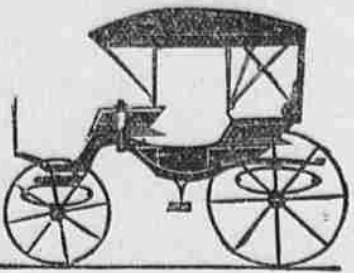

THE DAILY BULLETIN.

Two years and two months ago the DAILY BULLETIN made its first appearance as a little news and advertising sheet.

It then measured 16x10 inches, printed on one side only. Since the commencement it has undergone four enlargements, at four different times, until it has reached its present dimensions.

The belief that Honolulu needed a small daily paper induced the starting of the BULLETIN. The public support accorded to the little sheet, from the beginning to the present time, is evidence that the belief was not erroneous.

About three months after the BULLETIN began, the Daily Advertiser came into existence. Many disinterested parties, who believed there was room for one daily, doubted if the field were large enough for two.

However, the two, such as they are, have continued to exist. One—ourselves—by the most economical management has succeeded in simply paying its way, and nothing more.

The other—our contemporary—has succeeded in sinking considerable money.

One thing, however, has been gained by having the two dailies. Whatever their defects may have been, they have represented the two sides of almost every public question.

Although the field is too small for the successful operation of two dailies, in a monetary sense, yet the two are here, and here they mean to stay.

No doubt, our contemporary will be content still to plod on, with the hope of coining a fortune away in the future.

As for ourselves, we are so inured to economy that we can stand the siege of hard times and smile with complacency when others grieve over the lack of luxuries.

Hitherto these two dailies have been issued as morning papers. They are distributed around the town every morning about the same hour, and are seen and read side by side. Many people patronize the both, and find pretty much the same news matter in each.

As before stated, hitherto the BULLETIN and Advertiser have both appeared as morning papers; but henceforth they are to part company. After long and mature deliberation we have decided to make a change from the morning to the evening.

On Saturday morning it was rumored, in the precincts of the Police Court, that there was a "clean sheet," not a new case or a remand to be heard.

Another bundle of rags has been received for the Branch Hospital. Will somebody kindly call for it? No sugar kegs this time.

Messrs Lyons & Levey sold nearly two acres of taro land at Kailua, on Saturday, for \$205 to Mrs. Brewer.

Part of the bankrupt stock of J. W. Robertson & Co. will be sold by Lyons & Levey on Friday morning, and the remainder on Saturday evening.

The star Kinau was on the rocks at Mahukona for about 20 minutes. No damage is thought to be done beyond scraping a little paint off the steamer.

No. 1 sugar, slightly damaged by the Jennie Walker, was sold, to W. G. Irwin & Co. at 4 7-16 cents per lb., by Mr. E. P. Adams who also sold all the damaged matting.

MONEY orders for the United States were not issued after 11 o'clock on Saturday, as the Post-office Department had run out of forms. A fresh supply is expected by the Mariposa.

NEARLY all the Chinese immigrants, brought by the City of Tokio, were released from quarantine on Saturday. Another fever patient was removed to the hospital on Friday.

MESSRS J. M. Oat Jr. & Co. are making arrangements to fix their boards for telephonic news on the wall of their store. This will be more convenient for the public, and it is hoped also for Oat.

A visit to Messrs Hyman Bros. new store shows that they have benefited by their move, their Queen street premises being well lighted and better adapted for the display of the large and varied stock of goods that they possess.

It has been decided, in accordance with the recommendation of a jury, to widen Alakea street and to close Union street, from Beretania to Adams Lane. Owners of property, along the line of these streets, are requested to file their claims (if any) for damages, with Judge Bickerton, before 12th April.

Mr. E. P. Adams was rushed with sales on Saturday, and, in the absence of Mr. Ellis, Mr. James Morgan made a successful maiden appearance in wielding the hammer, Mr. Adams filling, *ad interim*, the more humble position of clerk.

A largely attended meeting of the Amateur Musical Society was held on Friday evening, and the following officers were elected: President, Mr. T. H. Davies; vice-president, Hon. A. F. Judd; treasurer, Mr. G. P. Castle; secretary, Mr. T. M. Starkey.

The two circus performances on Saturday were well attended and appreciated. Many novelties were introduced in the evening which the management would have been wise to have introduced earlier in the season. His Majesty was present, accompanied by Col. C. H. Judd.

The agents of the Oceanic S. S. Co. have been obliged to postpone the sailing of the Alameda till three o'clock to-morrow afternoon. This is done on account of the low tide at noon, as the steamer, being well loaded, would be then unable to cross the bar. The mail will not close till 1 p. m. to-morrow, and the late letter bags will be kept open till 2:30 p. m.

About 3,500 steamers pass through the Suez Canal yearly, and the gross revenue of the Canal Company is £2,000,000. Ship owners complain greatly of the excessive tariff charged by the company, and of the time taken by ships in passing through the canal. Thus, a ship of 8,000 tons register takes two days to traverse a distance of 93 miles, and is charged from £1,000 to £1,600 for its passage.—Aust. Paper.

New Spring Millinery Goods are being opened at Mellis'.

NOTWITHSTANDING the high rate of exchange it is not generally known that Messrs. Bishop & Co. only receive from 2 to 3 per cent. of the amount charged, the remainder going to the planters and their agents, which will, to a certain extent assist in compensating them for the low price of sugar.

His Excellency the Governor has appointed Robert Makahalupa as Deputy District Magistrate for Kaulopoko, and John Kalama has been appointed Magistrate for Makawao, Maui, vice Mr. W. F. Mossman resigned. Mr. Makahalupa will be able to attend to the duties of Mr. Kaulouk during the session of the Legislature.

The following tenders were received, by the Minister of the Interior, for the erection of a Police Court and Station House on Merchant street: Geo. Lucas \$19,987; C. J. Hardee \$19,974; Rhoads and Harrison \$18,491; C. J. Wall \$16,810; E. B. Thomas \$16,599; J. C. Garrett \$15,998. There is a difference of \$4,000 between the highest and lowest bids, and the average is \$17,976.50.

An assortment of Japanese goods has just been opened by Messrs. G. W. Macfarlane & Co., and is now ready for inspection. Among the embroidered silk bed spreads is one of cardinal and old gold, with pillow spreads to match, which is exceedingly handsome. The screens, vases and figures of porcelain, and tea sets made of china are both uncommon and good. There is a large collection of Japanese jewelry, besides parasols, mats, silk and erape handkerchiefs, fans and a quantity of odds and ends that are both useful and ornamental.

The new ice company is to be called the People's Ice and Refrigenerating Co. The promoters, Mr. Sass and Mr. Stevens, hope to manufacture ten tons of ice a day, and to contract for supplying their customers at the following rates: under 25 lbs. at 1 1/2 cents; from 25 to 100 lbs. at 1 1/4 cents; from 100 to 500 lbs. at 1 cent; from 500 lbs. upwards at \$18 per ton. A refrigerator is to be erected which will store 75 carcasses of bullocks, 125 sheep and 40 calves. The water supply will be from an artesian well; the cost, when complete, is estimated at \$40,000 and the projectors expect to supply their first customers on July 1st. Mr. Sass leaves, by the Alameda, to procure the necessary machinery.
