BOYD and WRIGHT INDICTED BY JURY

James H. Boyd, Superintendent of Public Works, stands indicted for the embezzlement of Territorial moneys to the aggregate value of \$3,950. Of this total \$1,700 is alleged to have been taken by Boyd three years ago...

Benjamin H. Wright, Chief Clerk of the Department of Public Works, is under indictment for embezzling \$8,271.63 of Territorial funds.

Another bill charges Boyd, while First Assistant Clerk of the Department of the Interior, of the then Republic of Hawaii, with, on the 7th day of July, 1899, embezzling certain moneys of the said Republic to the amount of \$1,700.

There are three indictments against the Superintendent of Public Works, who is designated as "James H. Boyd, whose full name is to the Grand Jurors unknown." In one bill it is charged that, on the 12th day of May, 1901, he converted a thing of value to the amount of \$50, of the money and property of the Territory of Hawaii...

Benjamin Haywood Wright is charged with having, while Chief Clerk of the Department of Public Works and Clerk of Market, embezzled money belonging to the Territory of Hawaii amounting to \$3,289.53; also, on the 6th day of September, 1902, and during six months thereto preceding, with having embezzled money belonging to the Territory of the aggregate value of \$4,982.10.

Still another bill charges that Boyd, as Superintendent of Public Works, on March 27, 1902, embezzled money to the amount of and of the aggregate value of \$1,650.

COOPER ADMITS POSSIBLE ERROR

He May Have Exceeded His Appointing Power.

MAY SUBMIT QUESTION TO SUPREME COURT

PROBABLY GOVERNOR SHOULD APPOINT THE BOARD OF MEDICAL EXAMINERS.

Treasurer Cooper admits that he may have made a mistake under the laws in his recent appointment of a new board of medical examiners. He held a consultation with Governor Dole on the matter this morning, when other questions relative to executive appointments developed.

Section 72 of the Organic Act, stating the functions of the Treasurer, says he "shall have the powers and duties of the Minister of Finance and those powers and duties of the Minister of the Interior which relate to licenses, etc."

No doubt it was the provision here emphasized which Mr. Hemenway, compiler of the Rules and Regulations, had in sight when he altered "Minister of Finance" to "Governor" in the section providing for the appointment of the board of medical examiners.

The question as now engaging the serious attention of the Governor and the Treasurer was mooted to a Bulletin reporter by a member of the board of medical examiners retired by Treasurer Cooper's action.

Captain Naopala, who for years has navigated in these waters, states that only once before has he experienced such weather.

On the way back to Honolulu the Lehua, prodded by the gale, leaving Molokai Point at 5:45 p. m., she reached this port at 5:55 p. m.

The delay of the Siberia in sailing from Newport News for this port will render it necessary for the Peru to make another round trip between here and the Orient.

The City of Peking will then be placed in the Central American trade, to be followed there by the Peru.

New York, Nov. 11.—With the President and a former President of the United States as its guests of honor, and with representatives of foreign Governments and other distinguished persons, the New York Chamber of Commerce formally dedicated its building in this city today.

The proceedings were opened with a prayer of dedication by the Rev. Morgan Dix, rector of Trinity Church. An address of welcome by Morris K. Jessup, president of the Chamber of Commerce, followed, and then the oration of the day was delivered by former President Grover Cleveland, who said in part:

"It need not surprise us if the popular estimate of this business organization should fall to take into account all that it has done to promote high and patriotic purposes, not always related, in a narrow sense, to commerce.

"Mr. President and Gentlemen:—As I am to speak to you this evening, I shall now simply say a word of greeting to you and your guests. I have been asked here as the chief executive of the nation, and so I can speak not merely on your behalf, but on behalf of our people as a whole in greeting and thanking for their presence here these representatives of foreign countries who have done us the honor and pleasure of being present today.

"I greet the Ambassador (turning to M. Cambon), whose approaching departure we so sincerely regret; the Ambassador to whom, on his advent, we extended such a hearty greeting and especially representatives of those great friendly civilized nations with whom we intend to be knit even closer by ties of commercial and social good-will in the future (turning to the Russian and British Ambassadors and Prince Henry von Pless).
