THE RIFLE COMPETITION.

W. E. WALL GETS AWAY WITH TWO TROPHIES.

Scores Made at the Semi-Annual Shoot of the Hawaiian Rifle Association—Citizen's Match.

Yesterday was the twentieth semi-annual shoot of the Hawaiian Rifle Association, and the range was crowded most of the day with contestants and on-lookers. W. E. Wall won the Brodie Cup and the President's Trophy for the third time and under the rules of the shoot, they are now his property. His score for the Brodie Cup was 44, and for the President's Trophy 93.

MINIST R BAYARD TALKS.

Has No Idea of Serious Trouble Between England and America.

LONDON, December 18.—The annual banquet of the Actors' Benevolent Fund at the Hotel Metropolis tonight was the occasion of a notable public demonstration of good feeling toward the United States Ambassador, Thomas F. Bayard.

The United States Ambassador seemed to have lost the depressed air which he wore this morning, and chatted with his neighbors at the table and smiled and talked with great animation.

After dinner, when the time came for Sir Francis Jeune to propose the toast to the "Actor's Benevolent Fund," he said in the course of his speech that he hoped the only rivalry between England and America would be a historic rivalry and that there never would be serious differences between the two nations, which were, after all, brothers.

Sir Edward Arnold, in proposing the "Stage and the Drama," said he laughed at the idea of any difference between England and America, and Comyns Carr toasted the friends across the sea.

By way of illustration he repeated the Bible story founded on the judgment of Solomon over the dispute of two women, both of whom claimed to be the mother of the same child.

These inferential references to the current affairs were greeted with repeated cheers and with the greatest possible enthusiasm.

Mr. Bayard concluded: "The time is seasonable to invite you to name my country and join hands across the swelling main."

The ambassador then resumed his seat amid a scene of unusual enthusiasm.

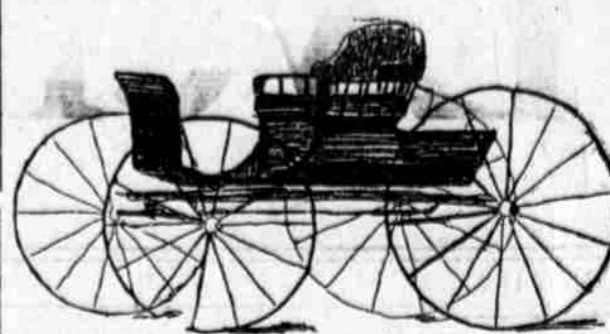

Notwithstanding their reputation for speed, the Indian racers of the Northwest and Canada have repeatedly been beaten by white men, while in wrestling they never attain the skill of the whites, and do not seem to learn boxing at all.

THE ILL-FATED STRATHNEVIS.

An Address Presented Captain Stott by the Miowera's Passengers.

The Miowera's passengers presented Captain Stott with the following address in recognition of his efforts to save the ill-fated steamer Strathnevis:

"To Captain Stott, R. M. S. Miowera:

"The passengers by your steamer from Vancouver, B. C., to Sydney, N.S.W., on her December trip, feel it their bounden duty to testify to the courageous and heroic endeavors of yourself, officers and crew to save the ill-fated Strathnevis.

"Although your efforts, for six days, were unavailing, owing to the unusual severity of the weather, they most sincerely believe that you are deserving of all commendation. They have been deeply impressed with the fearlessness and faithfulness displayed by you during this most trying ordeal, and feel confident that all that human energy and wisdom could devise was done with the characteristic daring of British seamen. They believe also that you continued your efforts until it became evident that any further sacrifice would have imperiled the safety of your own ship.

"In conclusion they join with you in what must ever be most painful regrets that such noble and self-sacrificing efforts should have been of no avail."

While those on board the Miowera seemed to have little hope that the Strathnevis survived the storm it must be borne in mind that it was 4 o'clock in the morning when the last of that steamer was seen and she was then only forty or fifty miles from land. If she kept afloat until daylight it would seem hardly possible that she would have been missed by the numerous vessels in search of her. According to the latest San Francisco dispatches there were on the 21st of December five big steamers searching for the Strathnevis: the steamship Danube, the collier Costa Rica, the steamship Tacoma, China bound, the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of China and the tug Mischief and others including H. M. S. Royal Arthur were to leave in a day or two. In addition every tug and pilot boat on the coast was on the lookout for the vessel.

The steamer W. O. Hughart, which recently passed through the Portage canal en route to Cincinnati via the Wisconsin, Mississippi and Ohio rivers, was tied up at Dekorra, Wis., on account of the low stage of the Wisconsin. It will proceed on the trip when navigation reopens in the springs.

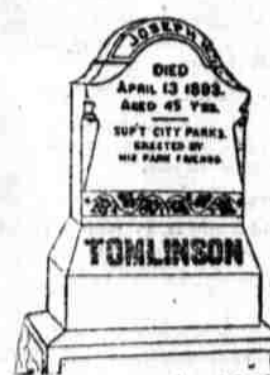

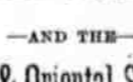

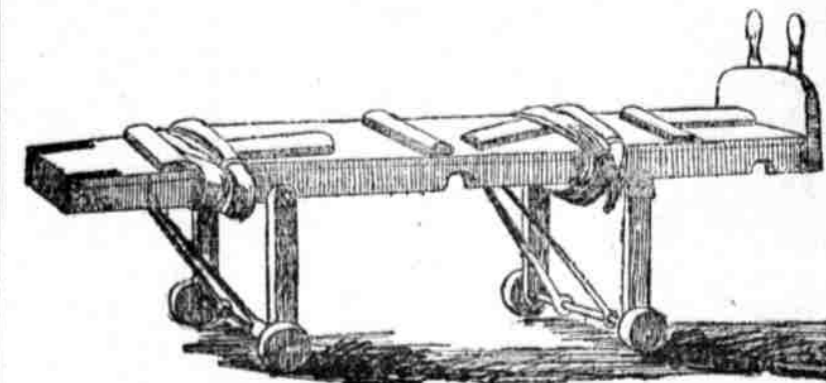
