The health of the Pope continues to improve and there are some who think that his life may be prolonged for some years to come. He certainly shows remarkable vitality. In the event of his death the election of a new pope would involve questions which would have a wide political significance.

The decree of the Dowager Empress of China that armed foreigners are not to be permitted to land in the Celestial empire, is not likely to deter any of the powers from doing what they choose in the matter. China is utterly unable to resist armed aggression, and the decree is only an empty threat that may cost the lives of a few Chinese, but it will not stop the occupation of ports, once it has been decided upon.

Professor Koebele is working hard at the problem of the cane borer and will doubtless find means to counteract the attacks of this insect. Though inoculation has not completely eradicated the Japanese beetle it has checked that pest considerably and roses are once more becoming a marketable commodity. But the loss of roses was nothing as compared to the attack upon our staple product. The professor suggests one means of lessening the evil and no doubt the planters will faithfully carry it out.

The question of having a cemetery on the top of Punchbowl met with another objector yesterday. There is evidently a great deal of feeling against the proposition and the objections come from people of widely differing thought and of totally different degrees of wealth and social position. Besides those who have written there are many who have expressed their objections orally. It is certainly not a popular move. Before any decision is made by the executive the mind of the town's people should be thoroughly understood and considered.

The fighting in the Philippines is costing many valuable lives and among them shines out the name of the gallant Egbert, who has found a soldier's grave at last. But the present condition of affairs must be brought to an end, and Aguinaldo must be crushed, whatever the cost may be. The gallantry and bravery of the troops is grand. They are establishing a record for fighting powers which is as high as any of their ancestors, from the time of Washington downwards. And the Filipino is no mean foe. He is brave, and he knows every inch of the country he is fighting in. Moreover he fights in a large measure from the shelter of thickets and not in the open. Next mail should bring us news of the end of the drama.

It is satisfactory to know that the Columbia sailors will get their pay at last. They have had a hard time and those who have advanced them money or given them credit, have also had a hard time, so the paying off of the men will send money circulating into other hands as well. The sailors' and firemen's unions have done the square thing by their members. In this case, had it not been for strong organizations like these, there would have been no one to take up the cause of poor Jack. The sailor has many safeguards thrown about him, but the case of the Columbia was one where the sailors' treatment was manifestly unfair, and where he had no redress. All well that ends well will be the sailors' remark when they pocket their cash and pay their boarding house keepers.

**ASSOCIATED CHARITIES.**

The meeting of those interested in the movement for associated charities must be a complete movement, in which all charities join, or it must be given up and things go on as they are. There can be no half measures, no tentative work, no two or three joining together and others coming in afterwards. It is one of those cases in which it is the whole or nothing. It is a thing to take or to leave. If the town is developed sufficiently, well. It will do a great deal towards economizing and towards putting an end to fraud, which all charities have to contend with. If it is not sufficiently developed, well, too. It is only a question of waiting till it is, and being imposed upon meanwhile.

Associated charities by no means imply the merging into one fund of all the charities of the place. Each charity whether based on religious grounds, or formed on national lines, or upon whatever plan it may be, will go on its path of good deeds, unfettered by any consciousness of what this or that body, having the same aim, should think or wish. It is not a scheme for putting funds into the hands of a central committee and leaving all the rest

to a few hard workers. The Roman Catholic societies will continue, the Protestant, and if we had them, the Mohammedan. The American, Hawaiian, British, Portuguese, Japanese and Chinese will each look after their special people.

What will be the gain then? There will be a central committee from all the charities who will examine all cases, and a person will not be able to draw money from the separate societies, as has been the case under our present unorganized system. The writer calls to mind one instance where a man obtained relief from the Roman Catholics and the Episcopal church at the same time, and finally obtained money from both for his passage back to the states. And the worst of it was he spent the money so obtained, and eventually got away with the assistance of entirely different people. This case is no isolated one. There have been many frauds of a similar character. Now under the associated charities such a thing could not happen, for the central committee would know at once that the case was being helped, say by the American Relief Society, and it could not therefore be entered upon the books of the Portuguese society.

Money obtained by fraud from any charitable society is a direct robbery of the indigent, than which there can be nothing more mean or disreputable.

Charitable organizations are forever short of funds, and to defraud the little store is to defraud some suffering fellow creature. Moreover it dries up the fount of charity, for many people hesitate to give because they know that frauds take place.

At the meeting to be held tomorrow, every charitable organization in the place should be represented by its president or a delegate. It must be clearly understood that there will be no attempt to act unless all can act together. There will be no combination of American and Hawaiian, leaving out the British and Portuguese, for instance. It must be all or it must be dropped. George R. Carter will explain more fully the workings and all interested in the noble work of charity should hear what he has to say on the subject of united effort.

**AGAIN, WAKE UP.**

Attention was called to the report of the Board of Health yesterday, but the subject is by no means exhausted. Indeed it is a subject which merits continual hammering at until something is done to show that the Board of Health is alive to the exigencies of the situation.

When we consider what the death rate is in other cities, and we look at our own death rate, there is certainly something radically wrong that should be inquired into. Death rates of 24 and 25 per thousand in England or the United States instantly demand investigation, but our death rate for the month of March was 33.94. The death rate of the Americans and Europeans resident here is by no means abnormal. A rate of 14.40 per thousand would be satisfactory in a temperate climate. It is no tropical atmosphere that raises the rate. But the rate for Asiatics is higher than it has been in either of the first two months. And there should be explanation for this.

Of the Hawaiians mention was made yesterday. A death rate of 53.22 per thousand is simply awful. There is no reason for it of an epidemic character. In looking through the detailed list of diseases one cannot put one's finger upon any particular disease which is sweeping away this portion of the population at this alarming rate. There have been seven deaths from bronchitis and seven from pneumonia. Is that the cause? No doubt the twelve deaths from consumption come principally from the Hawaiians. But these will lie among the adults, whereas more than fifty per cent of the deaths among Hawaiians occurred among children of five years of age and under, sixteen being one year of age and under.

There is need of the Board of Health facing the matter. It does not seem to strike the bulk of people, or the members of the Board of Health with the awful significance that it does a few thinkers. Seek the cause of it. If the sections of the town where these people live are dirty, clean them. If the parents are careless, hold inquests, fix the responsibility and punish those who allow their children to die. It is no case for arguing around a table, but it is a case which requires action. As suggested yesterday the authorities had better wake up.

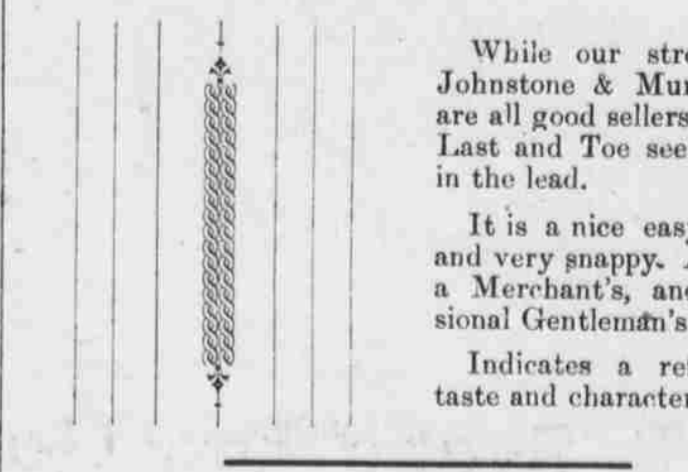

## SUES FOR AN ACCOUNTING

RUTH HORN VS. ATTORNEY GEO. D. GEAR.

Legal Action to Determine the Rights of Heirs to the Horn Estate—Matters in Court.

Mrs. Ruth Horn has begun proceedings in the Circuit Court against Attorney George D. Gear for an accounting of matters held by the latter in trust under a power of attorney uttered and filed last August. While the writ is nominally an action for an accounting, it is really brought to determine the question of whether under what the defendant claims to be a trust, the consent of all the beneficiaries is necessary to a revocation. Most of the children of plaintiff have refused to give their consent, which makes the legal action necessary.

The property involved is \$6,493.30 in cash, \$2,100 in mortgages, and ten shares of Mutual Telephone stock. Plaintiff executed a full power of attorney in favor of defendant and placed the estate in his hands. Two months later, while on the Coast, plaintiff annulled this power of attorney. As the children were mentioned in an appended will, and there was reference in the agreement to the amount to be drawn from time to time by the plaintiff, it became necessary to consult the heirs of the estate respecting a revocation of the trust. It is now for the court to determine the legal rights of the children in the premises.

The matter is made returnable in Judge Perry's court ten days after service.

It has been stipulated between the respective litigants that the matter of Ookala Sugar Company vs. John Wilson may be heard in vacation. Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for plaintiff; L. A. Thurston for defendant.

The ejection matter of A. Jones vs. Hanna L. Pooloa, et al., was argued in Supreme Court this morning and submitted.

**THE BENNINGTON'S FIGHT.**  
James Dodd received by the Rio a letter from Wm. McKay, chief master at arms of the Bennington, giving an account of the brush of the little gunboat with the rebels near Malabon and of the wounding of Lieutenant Winship. It appears that the fight was a sort of holiday event, the detachment from the warship having landed merely to see what damage had been done by the big guns of the Monadnock. Winship was on a converted tug, the Balanga, and was slightly wounded five times. The tug was shot through and through by the rebels. It was standing less than 300 yards from the shore at the time.

Ensign Bulmer was in command of the detachment that landed, though Captain Taussig also went ashore. Ensigns Whitted, Gelm and Wettengel were in the party.

A baseball ground is one of them.

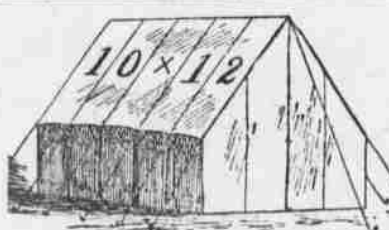
