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IN HIS ADDRESS PROPOSING THE PARLIAMENT, MAKE USE OF THE FOLLOWING:

The conditions of the contract for the mail service via San Francisco, which you have ratified, give promise that on this occasion the permanency and efficiency of that service will be secured.

The San Francisco mail service contract was brought up in the Assembly, and an animated debate took place on Sir Julius Vogel's motion in extending the terms of the resolution of the Legislature, by sanctioning an increase of the subsidy, and an extension of the duration of the contract.

The resolution introduced by the Colonial Treasurer, (and which was passed) reads thus: "That this House ratifies the joint contract entered into on the 19th July, 1875, by Sir D. Cooper, Bart., and Mr. Thomas Russell, on behalf of the Government of New South Wales and New Zealand respectively, with the Pacific Mail Steamship Company of New York (or their Messrs. Elder & Co., of Glasgow, and Mr. McGregor, M. P. for Leith, are sureties) for a four-weekly mail steam service between San Francisco and Sydney, and between New Zealand and San Francisco."

The following addition was then moved by the Hon. Major Atkinson: "That in the opinion of this House the annual charge imposed on the revenue of New Zealand for a mail steam service ought not to exceed £40,000, and that it is the duty of the Government immediately to make arrangements to procure such modification of the terms and conditions of the contract subject to ratification by this House as will effect that object."

The Hon. Major Atkinson's resolution was carried by 20 against 24. "Mr. Wales moved a proviso to the effect that such modifications should not extend the time of the contract, or alter the route of the steamers. Rejected on the voices. "Resolution reported to the House and agreed to."

THE ROUTE TO AUSTRALIA. An experienced shipmaster has handed us the following memorandum of distances, by Mercator's sailing, between the undernamed points: From San Francisco to Kaniava... 4500 miles. From Kaniava to Sydney... 6000 miles. From Sydney to London... 6000 miles. From London to San Francisco... 4500 miles.

IN OUR ISSUE of the 23d ultimo, in an article on "Trans-Pacific Steamers," we stated that it was the intention of the Pacific Mail Company to start a circular line of steamers, from San Francisco to China, Japan, Manila, Australia, New Zealand and back to San Francisco, touching at Honolulu. The Nelson (New Zealand) has just received by the last mail publishes a letter from Sydney, wherein it appears that a somewhat similar comprehensive enterprise is contemplated in the colonies, without reference however to San Francisco.

The principal capitalists and ship-owners here and throughout the Australian are contemplating the formation of a very large company to run large steamers between New Zealand, Australia, New Guinea, Manila, and China. The ports of call are to be as follows: Sydney, Brisbane, one or two ports in New Guinea, Manila, and Hong Kong, returning the same way to Sydney and to Nelson, New Zealand. There will be branch lines from Sydney and Melbourne to Adelaide. The second branch line will be from Perth, round the North-west coast to Cooktown, to meet the main line in some port in New Guinea. I was informed by one of the gentlemen connected in the scheme that Nelson is selected for the line end of New Zealand, from her central position and being easy of access, and New Guinea for the branch lines to meet, and it is supposed it will assist in developing that splendid country. The capital is spoken of as £1,000,000, in shares of £25 each. The Parliament of the different colonies are asked for subsidies, and the Imperial Government will be asked to allow a man-of-war to examine the route before the scheme is launched forth in proper form.

THE AMOUNT OF drunkenness among the natives on Tuesday last was the subject of frequent remark, coupled with the almost as frequent inquiry—where do they get the liquor? We are prepared to give the retail spirit dealers credit, latterly at least, of being extremely cautious in the matter of selling or furnishing to natives; (the symptoms are that the authorities will be in earnest in executing the law) and they are not far from the wholesale dealers, who are forbidden to sell in small quantities. But the fact remains that this, the largest portion of our population, gets liquor very freely.

Let us look at figures for a moment. The amount of spirits (exclusive of a few gallons of rum) which passed through the Custom House for consumption during 1874, was 15,660 gallons, the most of which was gin, brandy and whisky. The entire foreign-born population of the islands by the last census, numbered 5,000, men, women and children. Two thousand of these are Chinese, three-fourths of whom, being employed as laborers on plantations, are non-consumers of spirits. Add to these the foreign-born women and children, to the number of say 1,500, and we have 3,000 non-consumers, leaving 2,000 adult male foreigners who may be users to a more or less extent of the spirituous liquors, and who are to be put down about one and a quarter gallons of spirits each per annum. And if we further reduce the number of consumers by one third, which will fairly represent the number who from principle or otherwise do not use spirits as a beverage, the quantity per man for the consumers is not far from eight gallons. Of course we know that the foreign population do not consume spirits at this rate; and we are forced to the conclusion that a large portion—probably more than one half—of the consumption is among the natives. And this in the face of the law which forbids, under severe penalties, the selling or furnishing to them?

And the question recurs again—by what means do they get their supplies? We answer: frequently through the agency of low and unscrupulous foreigners—Europeans or Americans—who for a small gratuity or for the sake of indulging their own appetites will buy for the natives; but to a larger extent the native supply is obtained through Chinese peddlers from the wholesale dealers by the use of demijohns, and retail in the bottle to the natives. They are unscrupulous and exceedingly cunning. There is good reason to believe that where one licensed retailer of spirits is found to have broken the law and is brought to court by the police, a score of the unlicensed dealers in gin are carrying on a lucrative business in our midst. In his two specialties of cheap gin and opium, John Chinaman enjoys a cheap monopoly, and he undoubtedly chuckles immensely at our futile laws and our police.

AMERICAN THANKSGIVING DAY.

By request of His Excellency, Henry A. Peirce, U. S. Minister President, we copy the following Proclamation of a National Thanksgiving, by President Grant. In accordance with the recommendation of the President, all American citizens and others desiring to recognize the occasion, are invited to attend Divine service at the Fort Street Church on Thursday next, November 25th, at 11 o'clock a. m. A sermon will be preached by the Rev. Dr. Damon.

By the President of the United States of America: Amid the rich and free enjoyment of all our advantages, we should not forget the source from whence they are derived and the extent of our obligations to the Father of all Mercies. We have full reason to renew our thanks to Almighty God for favors bestowed upon us during the past year.

By His continuing mercy, civil and religious liberty have been maintained, peace has reigned within our borders, labor and enterprise have produced their merited rewards, and to His watchful providence we are indebted for security from pestilence and other national calamity.

Now therefore, I, Ulysses S. Grant, President of the United States, do hereby recommend that on Thursday, the 25th day of November, the people of the United States, abstaining from all secular pursuits and from their ordinary avocations, do assemble in their respective places of worship and in such form as may seem most appropriate in their own hearts, offer to Almighty God their acknowledgments and thanksgiving for His mercies, and in prayer seek for a continuance of His divine favor. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be hereunto affixed. Done at the City of Washington, this 27th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five, and of the independence of the United States the one hundredth.
