### SANITARY.

Sanitation is one of the old stock subjects of Honolulu newspapers, and, like many others, has become so musty by age and so threadbare by much handling and varied treatment, that probably many readers prefer not to have it served up again. Nevertheless, it is a subject in which we are all concerned, whether we feel interested or not, and this is sufficient reason for again recurring to it.

It may be remarked that the outset that although the monthly mortality reports of the Board of Health show a high death-rate for the whole population, the percentage of the white portion is the reverse. The mortality is mainly among native Hawaiians, for which there are special reasons not necessary to mention at present. The natural condition of the city and climate is in the highest degree favorable to health.

The same assertion does not apply to the conditions created by man. Pure air and cleanliness are essential to health. The first of these is provided for us in rich abundance by nature's hand, but the lack of the latter taints and sullies the other. The more thickly peopled portions of the town which are occupied by natives and Mongolians are conspicuously lacking in cleanliness. Neither do some parts where other nationalities are in the majority present a very high ideal. Filth in various forms, breeding disease and death, is too abundant.

By the vigorous and persistent enforcement of proper sanitary regulations, this condition may be gradually changed, and the general health be thereby bettered. In this direction decided improvement is within reach, and although it will necessarily cost money to effect, the expenditure is warranted by the results to be attained. Thorough and systematic inspection is the first thing required, to be followed by enforced cleanliness. The whole of one man's time, and perhaps more than one man's, is needed for this work. This is a matter deserving of the Board of Health's careful consideration.

SUPREME COURT—APRIL TERM.

DOLE, J., PRESIDING.

THURSDAY, April 5th.

Collector of Customs vs. W. S.  
Luce, assumpsit.

The Attorney-General for plain-  
tiff; A. S. Hartwell, F. M. Hatch,  
and W. A. Whiting for defendant.

Mr. Hartwell presented the de-  
fendant's points on demurrer as fol-  
lows:—

1. The Statute peremptorily re-  
quires that "there shall always be  
annexed to the petition a literal  
copy of the voucher upon which it  
is predicated, (if any there be)." Sec.  
1102 Civil Code.

The plaintiff's bill of particulars  
refers to "orders on file," as the  
basis for each item therein charged.  
Those orders or literal copies are  
required, in order that the defend-  
ant may be fully apprised of the  
nature of the charges, and that his  
counsel may be able to advise con-  
cerning his rights of defence. The  
failure to attach a copy of a vouch-  
er as required by Statute is ground  
for demurrer. Shawmut Mut. Fire  
Ins. Co. vs. Stevens, 9 Allen 332.

2. The only fact alleged in the  
declaration is, that "the said de-  
fendant withdrew and received from  
the Custom House in said Honolu-  
lu, without the payment of the  
duty thereon, the several  
amounts of liquor mentioned and  
referred to in said bill of particu-  
lars, which said liquor had before  
its said withdrawal and receipt by  
said defendant been imported and  
introduced into this kingdom from  
abroad." The other averments are  
not traversable, being merely con-  
clusions of law sought to be based,  
as all matter of law must rest on  
such facts as are pleaded. If the  
traversable facts authorize no such  
conclusions of law, the declaration  
is bad, and must be demurred to.  
The averments that the moneys  
here claimed were, "by law collect-  
able and payable and due from said  
defendant as duty upon and in re-  
spect of said several amounts of  
liquor," and that they "should have  
been paid or secured by said de-  
fendant to the Collector-General of  
Customs upon the respective dates  
when said amounts of liquor in re-  
spect of which they respectively  
became due were so withdrawn and  
received as aforesaid," are conclu-  
sions of law which cannot rest on or  
be inferred from the fact set forth,  
viz.: The defendant's withdrawing  
and receiving from the Custom  
House, without the payment of  
duties thereon, the said imported  
liquors.

There is not even an averment  
that the duties on those liquors had  
not then, or have not since been  
paid either by the defendant, or  
someone else, as for instance the  
importer.

There is no averment that these  
liquors were so withdrawn or re-  
ceived by the defendant for his own  
account, or to his own use. Such a  
declaration as this would be against  
any agent acting for another, or  
against any drayman or clerk taking  
out goods from the Custom House,  
or against an importer who had  
given a duty bond.

There is no duty on liquor which  
is all that the declaration mentions.  
Duties on "spirituuous" or "fer-  
mented liquors" or brandy, gin,  
rum, etc., are imposed. But this  
charge would lie against taking water  
or any other fluid liquor from the  
Custom House. To say that liquor  
is dutiable does not make it so. The  
facts must be averred, to which the  
law applies.

There is no averment negating  
the exceptions in the Statute, which  
provides that no import duties shall  
be levied upon goods imported  
for naval stores or supplies, for for-  
eign diplomatic representatives, for  
the King or Queen, or for the use  
of the Government. 1 Ch. Pl. 247,  
8 Term 597.

If such traversable and essential  
facts were averred, defendant's coun-

sel could then advise whether to  
plead to them or not.

No verdict or judgment for the  
plaintiff could be sustained on this  
declaration.

3. The declaration fails to show  
any right of action in the plaintiff as  
Collector-General of Customs. The  
Statute which imposes duties on  
imported goods provides the means  
for securing payment thereon, if  
they are allowed to be landed and  
placed in the charge of the Custom  
House officials without payment  
of duty, by a bond securing such  
duty, and for action on such  
bond. Sects. 518, 519, 522, Civil  
Code.

There also is a lien on dutiable  
imported goods for payment of  
duties which can be enforced by  
proper Statutory proceedings *in  
rem*. In such case the remedy  
pointed out by Statute is the only  
remedy which can be pursued. 1  
Ch. Pl. 161 n. (m).

This is not the case of an obliga-  
tion to pay duties created by Statute  
and resting upon the importer, in  
which case an action or information  
of debt lies against such importer in  
the name of the King, or perhaps of  
the Hawaiian Government.

This is an action of assumpsit  
brought by the Collector-General of  
Customs without Statutory author-  
ity, and when other Statutory reme-  
dies are provided for proceedings  
by such Collector to secure or obtain  
duties.

He was a bold man, some one has  
said, who first devised the action of  
*indebitatus assumpsit*. He would  
be a bolder man who relies on the  
fiction of an implied promise when  
no statute or contract creates the  
obligation, and when the mere with-  
drawal and acceptance of the goods  
(in this case) authorizes no such im-  
plication of legal liability.

The Statute creates no liability  
for payment of duties by any and  
every person who withdraws from  
the Custom House and accepts im-  
ported goods without payment of  
duties thereon, nor is there any  
such common law obligation or li-  
ability, on which an implied promise  
can rest, and as a necessary infer-  
ence, the Statute does not authorize  
the Collector-General of Customs to  
sue such person for such duties.

It is a fixed rule and principle  
that no Government officer can  
bring suit except by express Statu-  
tory authority. The Collector-Gen-  
eral of Customs may bring certain  
suits as provided in the Statute, but  
this is not such a case.

The fact that he brings this suit  
"in behalf of the Hawaiian Govern-  
ment" does not change the rule.  
He has no authority so to do, and  
the use of that form of words does  
not make this a suit by the Ha-  
waiian Government. Renton vs.  
Woolsey, 2 Pet. 27. U. S. vs. An-  
Bell Tel. Co. 32 Fed. Rep. 591.  
Atty. Gen. vs. Ramford Chemical  
Works, H. 608.

On the whole there is no cause of  
action shown, and no authority ex-  
ists for bringing this suit. It is  
not brought under Section 668 of  
the Civil Code for a violation of  
some provision in the revenue laws,  
no such violation is here charged.

The Attorney-General, for the  
plaintiff, took up and answered the  
points of Mr. Hartwell's argument.  
He said that the counsel for the  
defense had succeeded in establish-  
ing the fact, that this was a personal  
suit, but the statute provides that  
the Collector-General can bring suit  
in his own name, against any one  
for violation of the revenue laws.

If the revenue laws have been  
violated it is the express duty of the  
Collector-General to bring suit  
either in assumpsit or for debt.  
We do not declare on a bond, but  
on a promise. We have set forth  
that in consideration of the with-  
drawal of certain liquors from the  
Custom House, the defendant prom-  
ised to pay the duties. We have  
also stated that these goods were  
imported into this kingdom, and  
that such goods were subject to  
duty.

In regard to the assertion of op-  
posite counsel that this suit should  
be brought for debt, and not for as-  
sumpsit, we would say that duties  
are not a personal charge, and con-  
sequently are not a debt. (Here  
authorities were cited on the defini-  
tion of debt and assumpsit.) Ac-  
tion for debt can be brought against  
one who has incurred an obligation  
and fails to meet it, and assumpsit  
can be brought against one who pro-  
mises to pay. Therefore he sub-  
mitted that the declaration was cor-  
rect, and the defendant was respon-  
sible for the payment of the duties.

The Government should not be  
restricted or handicapped in the  
collection of its duties, any more  
than a private individual.

Our right of procedure is the  
same as in other countries, and if  
the counsel can show any statute  
that limits us in this action he is at  
liberty to do so. But I submit that  
we have a right to bring the suit  
under the common law, and should  
not be handicapped. I also submit  
that the action of assumpsit is prop-  
erly brought. We do not state that  
the defendant is the direct importer  
of the goods, but that he received  
them from the Custom House under  
the promise to pay the duties, and  
that we are at liberty to bring this  
action under any common law that  
is adequate. We argue that as

## UNEASY SAMOA.

A correspondent in Apia, Samoan Islands, writes as follows under date of February 29th:

We had quite a gala day on the 7th inst., when a man named Martin, calling himself Judge for the Samoan Government, with one-twelfth gross of his myrmidons, undertook to sell out the business of a French liquor dealer to pay taxes illegally imposed. Of course, a large crowd assembled in expectation of great bargains in liquors, and the publican had a smile on his face the size of a 4-dollar meat platter. The auctioneer mounted a box and commenced the sale, when one of the company asked by what law of the new Samoan Government he was about to sell the Frenchman's goods.

The auctioneer, an Englishman, called the man at head of the police force to one side, and after a few minutes' talk, again mounted the case and informed those present that as there was no existing law whereby a man's goods could be sold for taxes, he had to decline carrying on the sale. The crowd went home and the Frenchman's property was taken from beneath the tricolor and carried to the Court House of the rebels.

On the 13th inst., the Secretary of the German Consulate held a sale of the goods taken from the man's house. The auction, however, was of short duration, and the first case of liquor put up brought the amount claimed for taxes. It was purchased by an American for \$64.

The gentleman who was so grossly assaulted by Martin has since transferred his whole property to an American. He is a German, and having had this little trouble at the auction, was afraid they might seize his property and sell him out.

The following letter indicates that the trouble will be brought to the attention of the French Government:

APIA, SAMOA, Feb. 18, 1888.

MR. MARTIN MATAFELLE—Sir: I acknowledge reception of your letter of to-day, which I suppose to be an answer to mine of the 14th inst., and I beg to inform you that it is completely useless to communicate any more with me, except through the French Consul in Sydney, or through my Government, which is instructed and knows all about what has happened lately, and which, be sure of it, watches over my interests and will know how to protect them. W. J. LAFERRIERE.

A meeting at which vigorous resolutions were passed was held in pursuance of the following public notice:

"All persons who are interested in the maintenance of peace and order and of the rights of the European and American residents within the municipality of Apia, are hereby requested to attend a public meeting to be held in the Tivoli Hall at 8 p. m., on Thursday evening, February 9, 1888. By order of the Committee.

The following resolutions were adopted at a public meeting held at Tivoli Hall on Thursday, February 9, 1888:

Resolved, First—That this meeting protests against the illegal action of the de facto Samoan Government, in seizing and attempting to sell the goods of W. J. Laferriere, on Tuesday, the 7th day of February, 1888, to pay taxes illegally and improperly imposed, and further protests against the overbearing and aggressive conduct of Mr. Martin, the representative of the said Government, at the sale, and also against the auction of Mr. Laferriere's goods to the value of several hundred dollars, to satisfy a pretended claim of \$63.

Second—That this meeting desires to express its sympathy with Mr. Laferriere and considers that it would have been a more honorable course for the de facto Samoan Government to have pursued had they attempted to enforce the payment against some one who (refusing to pay taxes) was under the protection of a resident Consul, and in this way would have made a test case satisfactory to all residents here.

Third—That those present at this meeting pledge themselves to unite for the purpose of resisting by all lawful means the illegal demands and oppressive and despotic action of those persons who have illegally seized the municipal property and assumed to exercise jurisdiction over European and American residents.

Fourth—That those present at this meeting wish it to be clearly understood that their action is defensive and not aggressive, and that they purpose uniting together for the protection of the life and property of any oppressed and ill-treated person of any nationality within the municipality of Apia, should such person require their assistance.

Fifth—That copies of the foregoing resolutions be forwarded by the Chairman of this meeting to the resident representatives of all countries represented in Samoa.

Sixth—That those present at this meeting resolve themselves into a committee with power to add to their number to watch over the interests of the European and American residents in Apia, and to take such action as may, in their opinion, conduce to the general safety and protection of life, liberty and property within the municipality.

We, the undersigned, hereby agree to support and abide by the above resolutions to the very utmost

of our power: T. Crawford Johnson, Chairman; John Henry Denvers, M. Strutt, George Spencer, Thomas Mahoe, W. Julia Laferriere, J. P. Campbell, Will Blacklock, Robert Fletcher, Robert T. Chatfield, J. P. Harper, Herbert E. Rea, E. M. Gray, Peter Paul, F. Steinhoff, P. H. Krause, B. Beecham, E. W. Gurr, P. Douglas, A. L. Baird, Alex. Pritchard, Edgar Reid, A. Ormsby, Thomas Coffin, J. S. Alexander, Edward Hall, Wm. Hall, Barton Robson, James D. Young, Albert Mitchell, Alex. Creighton, George B. Martin, C. Streikney, C. Bonnellycke, T. Kenah, A. Tattersall, G. Sleson, Louis Garthier and G. Duseigneur.

London, March 20.—In the House of Commons yesterday afternoon Mr. Edgar asked when the papers relating to the Fisheries Conference would be brought down. Mr. Edgar has secured a copy of certain fisheries documents not published on this side of the Atlantic. Among them are the Queen's instructions to the British plenipotentiaries. After reciting all the circumstances leading to the appointment of Commissioners Lord Salisbury says: "While I have judged it advisable to offer for the subject of your deliberations the question of the fisheries of the Atlantic Coast, it is not the wish of her Majesty's Government that the discussions of the plenipotentiaries should necessarily be confined to that point alone. The question of the fisheries of the Behring Sea has not been specially included in the terms of reference, but you will understand, if the United States plenipotentiaries should be authorized to discuss that subject, it would come within the terms of reference, and that you have full power and authority to treat for the settlement of the points involved."
