BY AUTHORITY.



To the Inspectors of Election in the several Districts of the Kingdom:—

Inquiries having been made whether persons who are exempt from the payment of personal taxes by reason of being clergymen, teachers, pupils in High Schools, firemen, &c., or by reason of being over the age of sixty years or whose taxes have been excused by the Assessor on account of infirmity or poverty, are allowed by law to vote at the Election for Representatives.

It is my opinion that all such persons are entitled to vote. The Tax Collector should issue to each such person a tax receipt with the words "Qualified to Vote" upon it, which he must sign and in place of the amount of taxes he must write "exempt" or "excused." On the presentation of this Tax Receipt to the Inspectors of Election at their sessions previous to the election, the name of the voter must be put on the list of voters and the receipt returned to the voter.

At the general Election to be held on the 3rd February, 1886, the votes of such persons must be received, unless challenged for other reasons.

MUSIC IN THE AIR.

The electioneering methods of the Government party are neither new nor unique. They are, in themselves, the very strongest evidence of weakness, and no person of ordinary observation and intelligence can fail to have noticed how exceedingly shy the Government candidates are of their own or their masters' past record. There is an unmistakable determination to "fight it out" on every line except on the merits of the cabinet ministers individually, or of the policy of the Government collectively.

The howl of disloyalty raised and reiterated from day to day against the opposition candidates and their supporters is the historical war-cry of tyranny both in England and America. The people who, in the great crisis of English history, stood manfully for their own and the nation's liberty, were denounced as traitors and rebels. Similar dirt-throwing was indulged in by the foes of New England's liberties in pre-revolutionary years. The third edition of precisely the same book is now, in this year of grace, being issued, chapter by chapter, from the Morning Advertiser office, and foisted upon the Hawaiian electorate. But the absurdity of striving to synonymize the country's success with the success of the batch of political venturers controlling its affairs, is so palpably absurd that it requires some ten or a dozen repetitions every day to drill the minds of even the Government scribes into a sort of vague supposition that there must be something in it. Loyalty and patriotism, free opium and licensed gambling, are among the planks of the administration's platform. The first named are hewn out by themselves, cut and squared to suit the exigencies of the hour, and are of value only to the proprietors, on salary pay days. The next named, opium and gambling, they hope to have the electors accept on the 3rd of February, a hope that no well-wisher of this Kingdom desires to see realized. The policy of national debauchery by opium and gambling, attempted by the present Government at last meeting of the Legislature, but fortunately frustrated, does not harmonize with the assumptions of immaculate patriotism indulged in by the self-styled "national party" in their appeals to the support of their constituents.

And every voter who casts a ballot for the Government candidates, endorses those outrageous projects for the demoralization and ruin of the people. The duty of the hour is plain. To oust the present Government will be to prove before the world that the native voter has attained a sufficiently advanced stage of civilization to be capable of deciding what is and what is not for his own interests.

INTIMIDATION.

Below is given documentary evidence of the prostitution of the educational service of the kingdom to partisan purposes. It is a letter received by a Government school teacher from one of the Government tools holding the position of tax assessor. The latter threatens the former, "by authority," with deprivation of position and pay if he does not support the Government candidate. By such means an incapable, corrupt and corrupting administration seeks to maintain its grip on the nation's vitals:—

To my Dear Friend,

D. KERIOKALANI, Esq.

Salutation: A suitable time having presented itself I now address a letter to your distinguished self, and you take the good 'out of it and reply to me in writing.

Who are you going to vote for? I hear that it is C. Brown because he has given you \$40. I now put this question to you, which is the best: \$40 which lasts but a short time, or regular wages as a school-master that you and your wife can live on, and draw regularly at the end of every month until the year ends? The \$40 in which you now place your trust is for the present only; on the 3rd of February it will be gone, and do not flatter yourself with the idea that you will get anything more out of C. Brown after that time. I therefore place the matter plainly before you, are you willing to lose your subsistence from this time forward, and I make this statement to you with authority, and request that you will use your best judgment and think well over the matters contained in this letter and act accordingly, or time will show that your occupation will be taken away from you and your wife, and you will be very sorry to miss the regular monthly appearance of your pay. I do not think that you are a fool and are unable to select what is best for you, and I therefore recommend you to vote for me.

The letter on apostolic succession was rather lengthy for any time, but, unfortunately, we were committed to its insertion by having published shorter letters on the subject previously. The right of legitimate reply to criticism is one that we hope never to be compelled to deny to a correspondent. Anyhow, the BULLETIN is not a party hack, but discusses politics on their merits. If, however, it were designed to make this paper a mere campaign sheet on this occasion, we should be ashamed to have to fill up space with columns of foreign stereotype plates, as the Advertiser does. For instance, in to-day's issue, it has, among other eclectic matter of that sort, a disquisition on the "Characteristics of Camels." The camel is therein stated to be able to travel from twelve to fourteen days without water. In this respect, we may observe in passing, the camel differs from the Hawaiian Government party, that cannot go one day without gin.

Intimidation has been given by the Government weather bureau, of squalls at the Fish Market, at four o'clock this afternoon. The fishers for votes are as likely to "catch crabs" as anything else.

Mr. John Sheldon, one of the Government party's champions, mounted the Army steps at noon to-day, and tried to attract an audience of the native mechanics and laborers employed in that vicinity. The intelligent workmen would, however, have none of him or of

his party's "soft sawder," as Sam Slick would say. He therefore came down from his roost looking very crestfallen.

MR. THOMAS Stewart, lately clerk in the "Louvre of Brussels," left by the Victoria Cross for San Francisco, expecting to be back shortly with a drove of hogs.

A CHINAMAN caught in the act of robbing a fellow-countryman's house in Manoa Valley, yesterday morning, has been given a year's hard labor on the reef.

THERE was a gay gathering last night at the Yosemite skating rink's apple-pee. Everyone got an apple but

no bee. To-night the amusement will be repeated.

The bark Mount Lebanon, from Hongkong, is about 35 days overdue. The Chinese merchants in this city are in *pitiahi* for their supplies of goods, which they counted on for Chinese New Year's Day, February 3rd.

At the request of Mr. R. W. Laine, Vice-Consul for Spain, a Requiem Mass will be celebrated in the Roman Catholic Cathedral on Tuesday the 19th, at 10 A. M., for the repose of the soul of His Majesty Alphonso X H., the late King of Spain.

The regular meeting of Polynesian Encampment, No. 1, I. O. O. F., was held last evening, when the following officers were installed by Deputy Grand Sir W. E. Foster: C. J. Fishel, C. P.; R. H. Graham, S. W.; L. C. Ables, H. P.; W. O. Atwater, Seribbe; J. J. Lecker, Treas.; J. M. Monsarrat, 1st W.; W. C. Parke, L. C. Ables and E. C. Rowe, Trustees.

THE S. S. Alameda arrived this noon, 11 days 23 hours from Auckland, having left Sydney Dec. 15th. She has one passenger for this port, and forty-nine for San Francisco. Among her through passengers are two of the Merry-Makers, a gentleman and lady. The Alameda will take a considerable freight of bananas and sugar, and will sail at 10 o'clock to-night.

THERE was an audience of about fifty to hear Elder Healey, of the Seventh Day Adventist mission, in his unguarded tent last evening. An interesting address was begun on Nebuchadnezzar's dream of the universal kingdoms that should come after him, to be continued this evening. I repeat, then, without fear of being questioned in any good man's conscience, that "I have no pecuniary interest pro or con in the liquor business," and although confessing to enjoy a well-filled larder, I confess also that outside of my own house I have no recollection of feasting anywhere out of a two-bit restaurant, nor have I received anything out of any one's purse except in exchange for labor at my trade. The truth is, my narrow-souled friend, I don't mind telling you, that I have not been fed on the eleemosynary plan, now or heretofore.

Go then, thou rash and egotistical scribe, and view that pile of "mosses and glue" which the BULLETIN imp has prepared in anticipation of thy self-imposed penance! 
