FORESTRY.

The Legislative Assembly of 1876 passed an Act "For the Protection and Preservation of Woods and Forests." The preamble was in these words: "Whereas, it is an established fact that the destruction of forests in any country tends to diminish the supply of water, &c. The Act authorizes the Minister of the Interior to set apart and cause to be protected from damage such government forest lands as may be suited for the protection of water sources; to employ a superintendent of woods and forests; to lease crown lands that may be wooded; &c., &c. Nothing whatever has been accomplished, or even attempted to be done under this law, which has been one of the laws of the land six years. Section VI. reads—"The sum of —dollars is hereby appropriated for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Act;" but the blank was never filled up with any sum. Now the query: Have we been so absorbed, during the past six years, in the growing of sugar, that we have lost sight of the "established fact that the destruction of forests in any country tends to diminish the supply of water"?

Early in last month, at Cincinnati, Ohio, there was organized (the first in the United States) a "National Congress of Forestry," at which 2,500 persons were present from all parts of the Union and from foreign countries. Dr. Loring of Massachusetts, who delivered the address, concluded by urging on the Congress "the most careful consideration of the topics before it: The use of forests; the influences, injurious and beneficial, of forests; the educational means by which we may become acquainted with forestry work. To what extent can the land-owner enter profitably upon the business of tree-planting and forest culture? What legislation can the States best adopt for the increase and preservation of their forests? How shall the General Government provide for the planting of forests on its public lands? What is the precise extent of forest waste? What is the comparative value of various timber trees? How shall we secure wind-breaks on the prairies? By what chemical process can we preserve our timber used in building and fencing? What forest trees are best adapted to various localities? These are questions which should be answered as definitely as possible. They are questions which the American people are anxious to have answered, and before which all discussion of foreign legislation, all consideration of the value of wood products, all statistics of trade, all study of land tenure, sink into insignificance."

The brigantine Consuelo, Capt. Howard, arrived Thursday 12½ days from San Francisco. Following is the report of the passage furnished by Capt. Howard: May 26th, took my departure from San Francisco with a strong breeze from N.N.W. and continued the same until the 28th; from thence until the 5th June, very light winds from N.N.E., N.E. and East, blue sky, cloudy, accompanied with a moderate northerly swell, from thence to port fine trades from E.N.E. to East, weather fine during the entire passage. June 7th sighted east end of Molokai, bearing S.W. ½ S. magnetic, 34 miles; at 11 P.M. tacked ship off Honolulu light house.

Big Hazard and schooner Anna arrived on the morning of the 26th.

LEGISLATIVE.

Friday, June 9.—Petitions read and referred:
From Makawao, (the inevitable) that the Tax Assessor and the property owner together affix values.
From Honolulu, that the roads at Waikiki be repaired.

From Honolulu, that \$400,000 be appropriated for a railroad on Oahu.
Mr. Kapena, from the Commissioners on Codification, submitted their report, which was laid on the table.

Mr. Keau, offered a Resolution appropriating \$3000 for the extension of Queen Street to a point opposite the bridge on King Street.

Also one appropriating \$200,000 for dredging and improving the harbor of Honolulu. Both these resolutions were tabled, to be considered with the Appropriation Bill.

The same gentleman gave notice of intention of introducing a bill to amend Section 25 of the education of Act of 1864, relating to pay of school teachers.

Mr. Lilikalani, gave notice of a bill to provide a permanent settlement on Gov. Dominis.

Mr. Kauhane, a Resolution to appropriate \$500 to repair the wharf at Kaalualu, Kau.

Mr. Lilikalani, offered a Resolution that carriages be provided for members to visit the Hospital grounds at Kakaako, the Marine Railway, and the Queen's Hospital. Rejected, indignantly.

Resolution by Mr. Keau, for the extension of Fort Street to Pauoa valley, \$2000.

Mr. Nahunu, gave notice of a bill to regulate the sending of Hawaiian youths abroad to be educated.

The Assembly then took up the order of the day—the Appropriation Bill.

The items—King's Guard, \$38,901.50; Volunteers, \$10,000; Drill shed, \$5000; Band, flags and salute, \$33,365; arms and accoutrements, \$20,000; were passed, when the House took a recess.

The afternoon was occupied in considering the different items of the bill, which were passed with but trifling debate, down to salaries of employees in the Interior Department, when the House adjourned to this morning.

Interest.

The S. F. Bulletin of May 10th, has the following which is significant, to say the least:

The Directors of the Hibernia Bank, at their meeting last Friday, reduced the rate of interest to 6 per cent. per annum, the bank paying the mortgage tax, which amounts, one year with another, to over 2 per cent. This year it will probably amount to 2½ per cent., so that real estate borrowers will really only be paying 3¾ per cent. per year for money. This is a lower rate than now prevails in either Europe or at the East.

This reduction by the leading bank here is a most important one. If this reduction is followed by other banks and is maintained, it will have a very decided effect in advancing real estate prices, for even progressive real estate is still expected to pay 6 per cent., though it can now hardly be expected to do so much longer. The fact, too, is that money owners have for some time been forced to buy property, not from choice always, by any means, but from necessity—simply because there was nothing else to put their money in. United States bonds, at present prices, are out of the question, and so too are good real estate mortgages, except at a rate of interest that is far below what the very choicest of real estate yields.

This reduction of interest on real estate loans will tend to bring rates down on loans of all kinds, both here and all over the coast, and thus tend very much to encourage the growth of manufacturing and other enterprises that need the use of cheap money ere solid progress can be either expected or assured.

Steam in the Pacific.

There will be a steam line with the Hawaiian Islands soon, and one that will probably pay from the start. It will be operated by the Oceanic Company. The gentlemen interested in this enterprise are large owners of sugar plantations at the Islands, and able to control much freight.

They have already chartered the British steamer Suez, now on the way to this coast from Hongkong, and it is probable that the new line will be formally opened next month. The Company will perfect its plans as rapidly as possible, and will not rest until the route is covered with first-class steamers of their own. The idea is to make the route a pleasant one for excursionists from this coast and from the East, as well as to give improved freight facilities. The project of a line between San Francisco and the Society Islands, broached some time ago, has not been abandoned, as many have supposed. The promoters still feel confident that it is only a question of time when a steamer will be secured for that service, the trip to be made in twenty days. Such a movement would be of benefit to that group of islands.—S. F. Bulletin, May 17.

KAMEHAMEHA DAY, June 11th, occurring on Sunday, will be celebrated by authority on Monday. But there will be three races to-day at Kapiolani Park, commencing at 2 o'clock, sharp. Programmes can be had at the store of J. W. Robertson & Co. Mr. Dodd's Omnibusses will run every half hour to the Park Entrance. The races for to-day are—Kapiolani Plate, \$100; King's Plate, \$125; and Queen Emma Plate, \$100; for which there are respectively, three, two and four entrances.

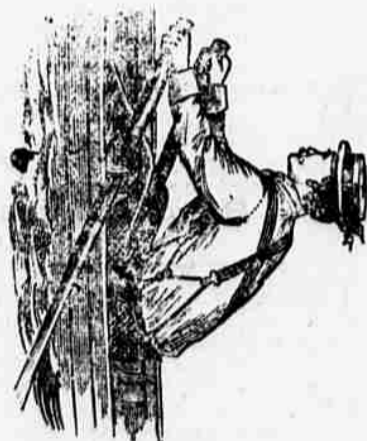

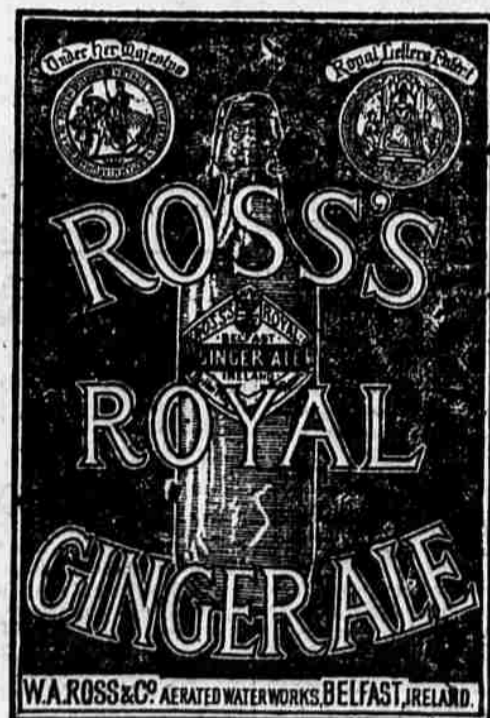
