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Session Laws of 1882.

AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE HOLDING OF AN ELECTION FOR REPRESENTATIVE TO THE DISTRICT OF KANAPALI, MAUI.

WHEREAS, the district composed of Kahakuloa and Kanapali, on the island of Maui, by law a separate election district and entitled to elect a Representative to the Legislative Assembly;

Section 1. There shall be an election for Representative held in the district composed of Kahakuloa and Kanapali, on the island of Maui, at the school house in said districts, on the 15th day of July next.

Section 2. The Minister of the Interior is hereby authorized and required to appoint three suitable persons, as Inspectors, to preside over and conduct the said election.

Section 3. The election provided for by this Act shall be conducted according to the law regulating elections, and the election, hereby ordered shall be valid and binding to all intents and purposes, and the tenure of office of the Representative so elected shall be the same as if elected at regular election.

Section 4. At all elections for Representatives hereafter to be held the Minister of the Interior is hereby authorized and empowered to establish a place for receiving the votes in the said District composed of Kanapali and Kahakuloa, Island of Maui, and to designate three suitable persons as inspectors to preside over and conduct the said election.

Section 5. This Act shall take effect and become law on the 1st day of July next ensuing.

Approved this 9th day of May, A. D. 1882. (Signed) KALAKAUA REX.
