## THE SPIRITUALIST.

The Cafe Jean was situated at the corner of a quiet street in Paris—remarkably quiet at all times, considering the near proximity of a noisy and much frequented boulevard, but particularly so after 11 o'clock at night.

Late one evening most of the habitués of this bright and comfortable cafe had taken their departure, raising their hats, as the manner is in France, to Madame Jean, the smartly dressed and dignified proprietress, who, still sitting at her post behind the marble comptoir, smiled and bowed in return as they went out. The blinds were already down and the doors closed in preparation for the night.

Madame sat a little longer, listening to the gossip of the neighborhood gathered during the day by the head waiter to retail for her special amusement when the day's work was over and one could indulge in a little relaxation. Then looking round and seeing that nearly all the well known customers who every evening played dominoes or cards, and sipped coffee or drank eau sucre or stronger mixtures under her vigilant but friendly eye, had left, she retired for the night, leaving the remainder to the care of her faithful Alphonse. There were only about a dozen people now, and everything was sleepily quiet in the cafe, when suddenly the stillness was rudely broken by a loud voice exclaiming angrily:

"It is a lie! I don't believe a word of it, and I defy you to prove it!"

All looked up, startled, from game or newspaper, as these words burst from one of the occupants of a small table at the furthest end of the room. The speaker seemed very much excited; his companion, on the contrary, remained cool and self possessed under the provocation, but his white face and peculiar glittering eyes betokened that outward appearance, and arrested attention when noticed.

The two had been engaged for some time in close and earnest conversation, without raising their voices, interrupted only now and then by subdued exclamations and incredulous remarks from the excited man, which evidently did not succeed in either shaking or moving the pale man, who continued talking to him and answering his objections quietly, until his opponent, losing all self control, sprang to his feet and violently disturbed the inmates of the cafe by the angry words quoted above.

Seeing that he had attracted general attention he looked around and said:

"Gentlemen, I appeal to you all. I am sorry if I have disturbed you with somewhat violent language, but you shall judge whether I am justified in refusing to believe the story I have just heard. We happened to sit at the same table, and naturally entered into conversation. Our talk drifted from one subject to another, until I made some joking remark about the so called scientific research into the mysteries of the spiritual world. I grant it is a fascinating subject even for an unbeliever like myself, and a good one for conversation and playful badinage, but to be told seriously and as an undeniable fact that the spirits of the departed can and do revisit this earth, when they have returned to do so, passes the bounds of credulity. My neighbor tells this most extraordinary story: That two years ago tonight he lost his dearest friend, a lifelong friend, who on his deathbed, seeing his despair, solemnly promised that he would appear to him on the anniversary of his death, which took place about midnight, if his friend invoked his spirit. He affirms that he has already seen him once since he died. Now I ask you, as men of sense, living in the nineteenth century, is it possible to believe such a statement?"

"The pale man had flushed angrily during this speech, but it was only a transient betrayal of feeling, for his face resumed its former pallor, although his eyes retained their strange light, and it was with a marked expression more of annoyance than anger that he replied calmly:

"It is nothing to me whether you believe or not; I have simply stated a fact, and it is the truth. You pressed me with questions concerning that great trouble of my life until I told you all—my despair when I lost my friend after years of mutual devotion and attachment, and his promise to return. I told you truthfully that he had already kept his promise once, but you did not believe me. I do not wonder. The spiritual world is a closed book to the majority; a glimpse is obtained now and then by some, but chiefly by conjecture and speculation only, whereas actual experimental knowledge is rare and not often communicated. I told you what my privileged experience had been, and I can prove it, incredible as it may appear to you."

## BY AUTHORITY.

HOMESTEAD LOTS IN PUNA, HAWAII

Notice is hereby given

1. That 16 Lots in Kaohu, Puna, Hawaii, have been set apart for the purpose of conveying to such persons as may wish to acquire homesteads upon which to live.

2. Maps of these lots can be examined at the Land office, Interior Department, Honolulu, or at the office of J. E. Elderts at Kapoho, Puna, Hawaii.

3. J. E. Elderts will point out the lots to any person desiring to see them, for which service he will be entitled to a fee of \$1 from the person applying.

4. Persons who may desire lots shall apply in writing to the Minister of the Interior upon a blank form, copies of which may be obtained free of J. E. Elderts.

5. No application will be considered from persons who already own land.

6. Every applicant must be of full age.

7. The applicant will be allowed ten years in which to pay for the land, during which time it will be exempt from taxes.

8. He must within one year build a dwelling house on the lot and begin to occupy the same and continue to occupy it for the remainder of the term of ten years.

9. He must within three years enclose the lot with a substantial fence.

10. He must pay quarterly in advance interest upon the unpaid purchase price at the rate of 5 per cent, per annum. The purchaser may pay the whole or any part of the purchase price at any time, which will stop interest.

11. The preliminary agreement is non-assignable and the land cannot be sold until all conditions are fulfilled.

12. Failure to comply with any of the conditions will work a forfeiture of the land.

A COLORED sailor, from one of the merchant vessels lying in the vicinity of the Fish Market wharf, was taken to the Queen's Hospital this morning in a precarious condition.

The report was made by a carpenter at work on the steamer Viva stranded off Waianae. Two white men and two Chinese were seen hovering around the place, as if carrying some packages supposed to contain opium.

THE funeral of the late Mrs. Hoopii Love took place yesterday afternoon from the family residence, King street. Quite a number attended the obsequies and the floral contributions were profuse. The services were conducted by Rev. Alex. Mackintosh, pastor of the second congregation of St. Andrew's Cathedral, and the interment took place at the Nuuanu Cemetery.

A NATIVE named Samuela, while coming to town from Maunaloa in a brake Monday afternoon, ran into a Chinaman's horse, the collision dismounting the latter's rider. The Celestial, Chin Pun by name, reported to the Police Station and preferred a charge of assault and battery against the native. After an explanation of the real facts by Samuela, he was discharged.

There is another treat in store for the music-loving people of this city. At the request of Mr. H. C. Lyon, manager of the Raymond Excursion Party now visiting the Volcano, Mr. Wray Taylor has arranged to give an organ concert at Kaumakapili church next Thursday evening, the 25th inst. On this occasion will be heard Mrs. A. V. Rice, a very gifted singer from New York city; Mr. Maurice A. Rothchild, of San Francisco, who has a beautiful tenor voice, and Dr. A. Marcuse, the violinist, who needs no introduction. There will also be a chorus of Hawaiian singers. The program will appear later.

GREAT LAND SALE.

Town Lots Booming at a Sale by Government.

To-day at noon, at the front entrance of Aliiolani Hale, were sold by Chief Clerk Hassinger, thirty-six lots of Government land at Makiki, Honolulu. The lots, nicely located, varied in size from 1 7/100 acres to 8-10 of an acre. A large number of people were present and the bidding by prospective homesteaders and capitalists was brisk. The different lots were sold under the following conditions:

Cash, or at the option of the purchaser, one-fourth cash, and the remainder in equal installments payable in one, two or three years, with interest payable semi-annually at the rate of 7 percent per annum.

HORRIBLE AFFAIR.

Man Burned to Death on Lanai—The Plunge of a Party's Debauch.

Somewhat startling news of a tragedy on Lanai was rumored around town yesterday. The news was said to have been brought by the steamer Mokoli, which arrived that day.

A BULLETIN reporter sought information at the Station House and was told that news had been received that the Deputy Sheriff of Lahaina had gone over in a boat to Lanai to investigate the matter. Pursuer S. Green, of the steamer Mokoli, when accosted gave the following account:

A party of natives (including wives and families) lived in a house near the beach at Awaloa, Lanai. On Friday a quantity of awa root was procured and pounded into a drink of which all began freely to partake. Toward evening they became hilarious and commencing to dance created considerable noise. They were all, in plain language, beastly drunk. One of the party, a woman, sat on the beach in a nude condition, and dug in the sand with her hands. The others were running to and fro, laughing and acting as if crazy. During the evening all went into the house, and it is presumed, while dancing one of the party accidentally set fire to the building.

In the confusion that followed a young man who was "too far gone," was unable to get beyond the flames, and, the others who were in the same condition being unable to extend him any help, he perished in the burning building. The extent of the whole-sale debauchery that caused the fatality can be judged by the fact that when the steamer Mokoli left on Monday, four days after this catastrophe, the survivors were still under the influence of the liquor. A woman of the party was running about the beach entirely nude, and the others were shamefully abusing themselves. Further news will be eagerly awaited.

ROBINSON WILL CASE.

Decision on the Questions Submitted.

Caroline J. Robinson Declared to be an Heir of John N. Robinson Her Deceased Husband.

The Supreme Court this day rendered a decision in the famous will case—Lorin A. Thurston and Caroline J. Robinson, executors of the will of John N. Robinson, deceased, and Caroline J. Robinson, vs. Mark P. Robinson, Mary E. Foster, Victoria Ward, Bathsheba M. Allen, and Samuel C. Allen her husband, Matilda A. Foster and W. E. Foster her husband, Annie Jaeger and Albert Jaeger her husband, Lucy H. McWayne and Albert McWayne her husband, and S. C. Allen and M. P. Robinson, executors of the will of James Robinson, deceased.

The case came before the full Court as a "submission of controversy under Section 1140, Civil Code." The opinion of the Court by Chief Justice Judd now rendered would fill this paper. It, however, declines to adopt the English common law, while the issues are covered by the statutes of this kingdom, and decides the main question as follows:

"Caroline J. Robinson is now entitled to one-quarter of the lands mentioned in the first and fourth paragraphs of the will of James Robinson, that is, one-half of John's half, and to one-half of the eighth, that is, one-sixteenth of the estate mentioned and described in the seventh paragraph of the said will as devised to John.

"Thurston & Frear, C. L. Carter and A. P. Peterson for plaintiffs; A. S. Hartwell, F. M. Hatch and Ashford & Ashford for defendants.

Following is the text of the syllabus, showing the principles underlying the decision:

"The testator devised land to his sons M. and J. for the term of their natural lives, to share and share alike, and after the decease of M. one-half to his heirs, and after the decease of J. one-half to his heirs.

"Held, M. and J. are tenants in common for life.

"By the rule in Shelly's case M. and J. would have the whole estate absolutely. But the rule in Shelly's case by virtue of its being a part of the Common Law of England is not in force in this kingdom—the Common Law as such not being in force here.

"Though free to adopt the rule, the Court declines to adopt it as the law of this kingdom.

"The intention of the testator should govern in the construction of wills.

"The intention of the testator was to give only a life estate to M. and J. This would be defeated by the operation of the rule in Shelly's case.

"The heirs of J. are whoever are entitled to his property by the statute of descent, if he had died seized of this property and intestate.

"J. died leaving a widow but no issue nor father nor mother; held, that his heirs are his widow as to one-half and his brother and sisters as to the other half.

"A devise of real and personal property to executors in trust, the income from the same to be paid to J. N. R. for the term of his natural life and after his death I give, devise and bequeath the said one-eighth to his heirs, creates a valid trust and J. N. R. has the income for life and at his death the eighth goes to his statutory heirs, who in this case are his widow as to one-half, and his brother and sisters as to the other half.

"A widow is an 'heir' by our statute of descent."

# AMERICAN LETTER.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6, 1892.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

The journals of Lisbon speak favorably of the proposition to sell some of the Portuguese colonies in preference to asking the creditors of Portugal to make any sacrifice that would involve the partial nonfulfillment of Portuguese obligations.

The drought is broken in Durango, the center of the drought stricken region of Mexico. It is the first rainfall in that portion of Mexico for four years. There is great rejoicing among the people.

The French government has accepted Bulgaria's apology for the expulsion of Choudouine.

News from Vienna tells of the trial of Frank Schneider and his wife Rosalie for the murder of eight servant girls whom they had lured to their den near the city, under the idea that they had obtained a place of employment. Schneider strangled them while his wife held their hands. Their clothing and jewelry were then taken and sold for what they would bring. Their ninth victim escaped and gave the information that led to their arrest. They have been sentenced to death.

The Spanish Minister of Public Works has declared that while the Government had heretofore been content with simply dispersing the Anarchists on May Day, they resolved henceforth to kill them.

The Emperor of Germany wanted to have Archbishop Kopp made Cardinal at the December Consistory, but the Pope, instigated by Cardinal Ledochowski, declined to appoint him. It appears that the appointment of Ledochowski as Prefect of the Propaganda would please neither France, Germany, Russia nor Italy.

The Royal Commission investigating the charge of corruption against the Quebec Government convened in Montreal January 29th. Brokers Daveluy and Senecal, who had acted for the parties having accounts against the Government, testified they usually got 40 percent commission for their services, and that portions of their emoluments went to a Montreal agent of the Government and ex-Premier Mercier's son-in-law, Gouin.

Emperor William of Germany has at last been brought face to face with his Parliament on the Education bill. It is his first check, and he finds that even his own Ministers do not support him. He will be obliged to fight out the battle alone or with only those servile Ministers who echo his every wish but can give him but little help. The nation has been profoundly stirred by the prolonged debate in the Diet, and Liberal Berlin in particular, being a close witness of these scenes, is wrought up to a pitch of intense excitement. The break-up of the parties which has followed up the pushing of the bill by the Emperor's supporters has produced a political convulsion. Caprivi, who did not desire a split in the union of Conservatives and National Liberals, made a speech in the Diet last Saturday, and during its delivery the scenes were unprecedented in the history of that body. The whole house was turned into a bear garden and the speaker was baited from every side.

The English anarchists are getting ready to have a big demonstration at World's End, Chelsea, the last Sunday in February. The object is to protest against the prohibition by Home Secretary Matthews of outdoor meetings for the furtherance of anarchy and socialism. It is probable a third of a million people will rally at Chelsea. The Government will likely issue a proclamation forbidding the demonstration to take place.

The theme of interest in London just now is "the great pearl mystery." Mrs. Ethel Elliott Osborne, who stole her cousin Mrs. Hargrave's old ancestral pearls from a cunningly devised cabinet and sold them, has surrendered to the London authorities in order that she might save her husband, Captain Osborne, from disgrace in the army.

Prince George of Saxony, as Inspector-General of the German Army and Commander of the Twelfth Army corps has issued an order calling upon the officers of that corps to stop the inhuman treatment practiced upon privates by non-commissioned officers. It will likely free the privates of the whole army from the brutal tyranny of law-grade officers. The matter was discussed by the Budget Committee of the Reichstag and it was resolved to favor greater publicity in the proceedings of military tribunals and the punishments ordered by those courts.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt in his address at Southampton, Feb. 5, denounced in vehement terms what he termed "Lord Salisbury's unjust reference to Catholic Irish." He pronounced the Premier's remarks as disgraceful and worthy of a drunken Orangeman, adding that such an appeal to the wicked passion of national hatred was not only shameful but mischievous on the part of a statesman in Lord Salisbury's position. He declared that if he indulged in such remarks in regard to Canada or Australia those dependencies would not remain twenty-four hours in allegiance to the Queen, unless the British claims were supported by cannon and bayonets.


