## SELECTIONS

DESPERATE FIGHTING UP ALOFT.

Locked in Each Other's Arms They Fell Seventy-five Feet to a Theatre Stage. Two men in a fierce tussle on a swaying bridge up among the flies, seventy-five feet above the stage of the Davidson theatre, locked in each other's embraces in midair, their unconscious forms, bruised and mangled, lying on the stage buried beneath the frail structure on which they had stood but a few moments before, were the exciting scenes which startled the "Crystal Slipper" company and caused several of the lady members to faint.

The men were T. V. Smyth, of Chicago, and George Montien, scenic artists, and they are at the Emergency hospital in a critical condition. The cause of the fracas between them, as told by an eye witness of the affair, was Montien's ungovernable temper. A boy was up on the bridge nearly seventy-five feet above the stage, and was doing something that aroused Montien's temper. He rushed across the bridge and caught the lad, administering blow after blow upon his head.

Mr. Smyth, who is assistant scenic artist at the Chicago Opera house, and came up to assist in renovating the scenery for the company before the Chicago engagement, is a young man of slight build. He stepped between Montien and the boy and attempted to pacify the former, offering excuses for the boy's conduct.

At this Montien, who is a big fellow, turned and struck Smyth across the face, at the same time attempting to throw him from the staging. There was a struggle, a mad effort to regain a firm footing upon the swinging stage, a muttered curse, a crash, and the two forms shot downward. The staging became unfastened in the struggle and came crashing down upon the two men. The "Crystal Slipper" company was about to have a rehearsal, but when the ladies saw the struggle and the bleeding forms of the two men many of them sickened and fainted away.

Mr. Smyth had his right knee cap and hip badly fractured, and the doctors think he may be injured internally. If he recovers it will be three or four months before he will be out again, and he may be crippled for life. When he regained consciousness he said that Montien was kicking the boy in the head when he interfered. Then he was struck in the head and remembered nothing more. Montien's left hip was badly wrenched and he was injured internally, blood flowing from his mouth continually. His condition is considered critical.—Milwaukee Cor. Chicago Tribune.

Four Years for a French Broker. Many devious devices are adopted by impudent stock jobbers who hang about the Bourse to influence the course of the market to their own pecuniary advantage, but when they resort to the dissemination of false telegrams the law steps in with a severe punishment. A broker named Arnould and an individual who described himself as a "musician" were charged at the Assizes of the department of the Neuirthe et Moselle with an offense of this description. Arnould sent the musician to Nancy and Toul, close to the German territory, whence he dispatched to his friend in Paris telegrams purporting to describe "frontier incidents" likely to cause complications between the two countries.

Not a shadow of foundation for the dispatches existed. Arnould showed them on the Bourse as confidential messages of undoubted authenticity, in the hope that they would affect certain stocks in a manner favorable to himself. The fraud was discovered and Arnould, along with his "musician," was arrested. In his defense the latter said he merely acted under the instructions of his employer, while the former excused himself on the ground that it was quite a common thing on the Bourse to arrange false messages, and that he did not know he was doing wrong. The court accepted the agent's plea and acquitted him, but it punished Arnould by passing a sentence of four years' imprisonment upon him. This salutary conviction very likely will put an end to many "frontier incidents" which were concocted principally by scheming dealers without financial reputation.—Paris Cor. London Telegraph.

The Joke on the Engineers. A good story is told at the expense of the engineers now working in the Howard street tunnel of the Belt railroad. When the builders had worked as far north as German street they struck what to all appearances was a spring of sparkling, clear water. It bubbled up through the earth and threatened to flood the whole tunnel. It was found necessary to procure steam pumps and machinery, and energetic measures were at once taken to drain the spring.

All efforts were in vain, and as quickly as the last head of the fountain was walled up the spring bubbled forth as strongly and clearly in another place. It was not to be exhausted. Thursday night it was discovered that the spring was nothing more nor less than a break in one of the mains which conducts the water from the reservoir in Druid Hill park to the southern section of the city. As soon as this was mended the spring disappeared. The builders do not like to speak of their discovery.—Baltimore Sun.

Dr. Talmage and the Reporters. Dr. T. De Witt Talmage is about to take a trip through the west. If ever a preacher was adored by the newspaper fraternity it is Dr. Talmage. He seldom takes pay for small literary services and never refuses himself to reporters, male or female. His Excellency John L. Stevens, U. S. Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary.

His Excellency Hon. John A. Cummins, Her Majesty's Minister of Foreign Affairs, presented to Her Majesty His Excellency John L. Stevens, who addressed Her Majesty in the following words:

MADAM:—

It is my official duty to offer to Your Majesty congratulations on your accession to the throne, in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of your Kingdom.

Turning from the funeral scenes through which we have just passed, I address Your Majesty words of hope as to the future of your reign. Standing on the borderland of Death and the future world, of which we have been so solemnly reminded by what has just transpired in our midst, and reverent towards the Supreme God, to whom all are accountable, the Minister of the United States expresses his earnest gratification that Your Majesty has taken the firm resolution to aid in making your reign a strictly constitutional reign, to maintain the constitutional right of your Ministers to administer the laws, and always to acknowledge their responsibility to the Legislature in the performance of their sworn obligations.

She shows the instinct of the mental and the slave to favor upon the masters, or those whom they believe to be the masters. After going over many affecting details, Dr. Woods spoke of the affectionate regard all army and navy men held for the late King, and spoke of his low, sweet, musical voice. The dowager queen was much affected by Dr. Wood's recital - particularly when he spoke of His late Majesty's beautiful voice.

Then, as a mark of her great consideration for the services rendered by Dr. Woods to her husband the King, she tendered a cane of great beauty, belonging to His late Majesty, to Dr. Woods, saying that whenever he came to Honolulu hers was the first home he must visit; and whenever he spoke of her husband to always say, not the King, but her husband with the low, sweet, musical voice.

Gambetta's Father.

M. Gambetta, the father of the great French statesman, after suffering long from cancer in the stomach, died lately in his seventy-sixth year. He was quite uneducated, but was shrewd and gentle mannered, with much half hidden fire and mother wit. He traveled a great deal as an itinerant dealer when he was young, and even passed as far as Turkey and Egypt. Though of simple ways he was not at all vulgar. He was much opposed to his son's choice of a profession, which was that of a professor of law and not, as his father wished, that of grocer in a country town.

Old M. Gambetta was a Genoese. He had a distinctly Italian physiognomy. The eyes remained black and bright to the end, but the face took a yellow waxen tinge. His hair was long and thick and quite white, and his beard, shaved at the chin, formed a kind of collar under the throat. Daily, with his head erect, he visited the graves of his wife and son in the cemetery at Nice to lay flowers on them. His housekeeper was an old Calabrian servant, Mottie, who nursed him in his long illness with devotion. His daughter, Mrs. Loris, arrived at Nice just as he had died. M. Gambetta would not suffer his son to be buried during his own lifetime anywhere but at Nice. The remains of the great orator will now, however, probably soon be removed to Pere la Chaise, and grand funeral honors be given them a second time. France still gazes on with grief at the death of a man who was a void which is yet unfilled. -Cor. London News.

About Carving.

A waiter in a downtown restaurant became communicative to some of his late customers the other night, and disclosed on a problem in division which is of particular interest at this season of the year - the division of a turkey by the knife of a carver. The waiter had seen a carving tournament in Paris, and he spoke as an authority. How many good sized portions, he asked, could be cut from a turkey of twelve pounds weight? None of his hearers could solve the problem, and so he had to answer his own question. His dictum was that ten portions in family practice and fifteen in restaurants could be obtained by a skillful operator. In other words, the man at a family dinner is entitled to 50 per cent. more turkey than is the one who risks his digestive apparatus in a restaurant.

Bachelors who are invited out to dine should bear this fact in mind, provided, of course, that turkey is to them the thing of joy it ought to be to all good Americans. The waiter gave another hint on carving, again putting it in the form of a query: What is the hardest bird to carve? At the tournament one chef waggled that he could turn out four symmetrical pieces from any bird. Another chef took the bet and produced a guinea hen. He won, too, for the first chef could do nothing with his subject. "Guinea hens," explained the narrator, "ain't built like other birds." -New York Times.

Count of Paris and the French Republic.

The Count of Paris is a very intelligent man. He is very learned; he is brave; he is patriotic; he is, in his private life, a man of irreproachable honor. He had gone to Frohsdorf, his first political act, to recall to the king that he was the heir to his rights. But this very step only proved the impossibility of resuscitating the Comte de Chambord. I do not accuse the Count of Paris, as is too lightly done, of having bought his royal claims of M. Boulanger. He is too much a Frenchman to take part in a coup d'etat, too honorable to put up with such an ally, and too shrewd to have believed that M. Boulanger had a crown to sell.

He simply put money in a "deal" for votes directed by the agency of Boulanger. He furnished the millions and Boulanger the popularity. He had stipulated that he would be given for his money the greater part in the products, that is to say, a conservative majority. The failure to that was suffered and the famous parallel march diminish his chances so much that he thought he was now no longer any enemies before him, or, if it was any, they are Republican enemies. -Jules Simon in Forum.

A Large White Owl Captured.

White owls, called arctic owls, have been seen frequently in New Jersey recently. They are not usually seen south of Hudson bay, and are believed to be harbingers of cold weather by the northern natives. Harry McIntosh, of Plainfield, N. J., succeeded in capturing one of the birds in Hunterdon county last week. It is mortally almost precisely as a Plymouth Rock chicken, only its face is white. Its eyes are large and bright, the pupils being encircled with a bright golden ring. Its wings, when spread, measure from tip to tip nearly five feet. Altogether, it is a beautiful bird and one not often seen. Its extremely heavy plumage makes it in size nearly as large as a turkey hen. This extends to its toes, and shows it to be a native of the cold northern regions. -New York Tribune.

Mice Eat Money.

Joseph Pelouquin, who lives upon Spring's island, had \$40 in paper money in a cup in a closet. Saturday he bought a lot of wood, and when he took down his money to pay for it he found that the mice had nibbled the greenbacks so that only about half of any of the bills remained. The rest of the money was in scraps around the cupboard. The numbers upon the bills were not destroyed, however, and Pelouquin will try and get the scraps redeemed. -Biddleford Journal.

In an Eagle's Talons.

The 4-year-old son of Charles Waller, a prominent citizen of Italy, Tex., was playing in the yard of his father's home when a large eagle descended and bore him away in its talons. Mr. Waller pursued the bird on horseback, and rescued the child in a deep ravine two miles away, where the eagle had alighted. The child was unhurt. -Cor. Cincinnati Inquirer.
