### GALLERY OF ART.

Short Time Left to See Hugo Fisher's Exhibit.

Next week the exhibition of paintings by Hugo Fisher will close. Therefore it is to be hoped that all patrons and lovers of art, who have not yet done so, will pay a visit to the art rooms of the Pacific Hardware Company while there is yet time. From descriptions of some of the paintings given in this journal, a fair idea can be gathered of the great range of Mr. Fisher's talent, in his selection of subjects as in their treatment. Both in oils and water colors the exhibition forms one of the greatest displays of real art ever seen in Honolulu. One should not conclude that genuine works of art are beyond his means until he has inquired the price of Mr. Fisher's works. Because wealthy people have been among his earliest patrons here does not prove that some real treasures are not available for persons of moderate means. A good picture is a valuable household asset that even great age will not impair but rather the contrary. It is besides an educating agency that hourly distills an artistic sense and taste into the minds of the young before whose eyes it is hung in their own home. Modern invention has given us a deluge of cheap yet really beautiful works of art made and multiplied by machines from the originals produced by the hands of artists. Yet the finest of these is not to be named in the same day for value with an original painting of which no copies are extant. One or two good original paintings will enrich the handsomest collection of reproductions in black and white and the artistic chromatic printings now so abundant.

## THE NEW FIRE STATION

HANDSOME BUILDING FOR FORT AND BERETANIA STREETS.

Two-story Brick with Stone Facing—General Description of the Department's Future Quarters.

Arrangements have so far progressed in regard to the new building for the Fire Department central station in this city, that bids will be asked for the erection of the building in a very short time. The lot on the corner of Beretania and Fort streets, owned by the government and set aside for fire department purposes is about 100x104 feet in extent. The building to be erected according to the plans shown a BULLETIN reporter today will be 58x103 feet, leaving a yard in the rear of the building 38 feet wide and extending the full length.

The new central station of the Honolulu Fire Department will be two stories in height and constructed of brick with stone facings similar to the pumping station on Beretania street. At the Fort street end there will be a hose tower 80 feet in height, the use of which will be explained further on. The corner of the building on Fort and Beretania will be semi-circular with large double doors opening into the main floor and a wide stairway leading to the upper floors. There will be no doorways on the Fort street entrance, but there will be a large gate leading to the rear yard. On the Beretania street side there will be four arched doorways 12x16 feet, through which the engines pass in going to a fire. In returning from duty the apparatus will be driven through the gates in the rear and through similar arched doors in the back of the building to the proper stalls, thus obviating the necessity of turning round.

The plan of the ground floor comprises one main room about 40x82 feet on which the engines and horses will be placed. The stalls for the animals are situated on each side of and just in the rear of the engines, and will be loose boxes open back and front. On the Fort street corner is the hose room so arranged that the carts can be driven into it from the yard and out in front. This room is 12x15, and is really the bottom of the tower. When the new building is ready for occupancy, there will be no more coiling up of wet and dirty hose. As the carts return from the fire the hose used will be washed clean, attached to pulleys and hoisted up in the tower, where it will hang in 50-foot lengths until it is required for use again, the carts in the meantime being loaded up with clean and dry hose. In this way much saving in the wear and tear of the hose is expected to be made, a not unimportant item. This hose tower is 80 feet in height from floor to top. Over the main entrance will be an ornamental tower 16 feet above the height of the second story, from which the flag pole will rise to a height equal to the hose tower.

On the main floor in the rear and adjoining the hose room are the toilet rooms for the men and the night watchman's room, occupying together a space of 12x16. Then comes a feed room 12x14, behind which is a backstairway leading to the upper floor. There is also a room 5x14 for the storage of fuel.

With all the space taken up in the foregoing description there yet remains a room 22 feet front and extending the full width of the building, 58 feet, which is designated as the repair shop, although as the department increases room can be spared for another engine and team in the front. In the rear of this room there will be a pit six feet long and four wide, in which workmen can stand in making repairs to

the boilers, the engine being placed directly over the pit. This is a much-needed improvement, as it is now necessary for a man to lie on his back in repairing a boiler.

Ascending the main stairway one reaches a hallway running to the chief's private office, situated over the main entrance on the corner, and connecting with a corridor running nearly the full length of the building. The corridor is eight feet wide. On the Beretania street side of this corridor there will be three large sleeping rooms for the men, 16x40, 22x40 and 22x40. On the rear side will be five rooms, each 10x22. The first of these is devoted to the men's bath and washroom. The second connects with a private bath and toilet room in the rear of the men's bath and is designed for the Chief's bedroom. The other three bedrooms are for the engineers. At the Waikiki end of the main corridor is the men's gymnasium 33x40 feet, and the library and reading room 17x18. In each of the three men's bedrooms is a well with sliding pole for the men to get down in a hurry, each of the rooms being exactly over the engine with which the men are connected, so there will be no confusion on getting to the lower floor at night. Each man will find himself close to his own engine. From the main corridor a passage way also connects with the rear staircase.

The hose tower will correspond in appearance to the main building but will be four stories in height instead of two. It will have a handsome mansard roof and will be surmounted with ornamental iron work. The main roof will also be of iron with ornamental ridge piece.

The second story will be provided with a pretty balcony of ornamental iron work, ten feet wide, extending along the Beretania street front only, and the drawings of the front elevations show a very prettily designed building which will be one of the largest and handsomest in town.

The material for the lower floor has not yet been decided on, but it will probably be of cement, with wooden covering where the horses stand.

On the Fort street side of the building there will be four large windows but no doors. The yard in the rear will be about 40x104 feet and will be occupied with sheds, extra stables for the horses and the general uses of a corporation yard.

Chief Engineer Hunt and the members of the department are to be congratulated on the fact that at last the central station shows signs of materializing and that they may soon get out of premises which have long been a disgrace to the city and the department and a menace to the personal safety of those employed about it.

Superintendent of Public Works Rowell says the new fire station building will be the next of the improvements authorized by the Legislature to be put under way and that bids will be asked for in a very short time.

### FOR STEALING PEARS.

Five Boys Get Two Years Each in the Reform School.

Six small boys named Joseph Loio, aged 10; Kahalewai, 14; Abraham, 16; Moses, 13; Daniel, 9, and Mahi, age unknown, were up before Judge de la Vergne this morning charged with stealing six dozen pears of the value of \$6 from George Carter. The boys all pleaded guilty and were each sentenced to two years in the Reform school, except Joseph who got off with three months.

### The Regimental Shoot.

Out of 215 men who took part in the regimental shoot just ended 126 are entitled to medals, 55 silver and 71 bronze. Corporal Sam Johnson of Company F and musician Bordfield of Company A succeeded in making the highest scores, 45 each. There were seven who made 44 and thirteen who made 43.

### HOSPITAL WATER SUPPLY.

New Windmill Found to be Necessary—The Aermotor Now in Use.

When the artesian well which supplies the Queen's hospital with water was bored, the trustees purchased a Gem windmill which was represented as being able to do the necessary work of pumping the water into the big tank. It did not come up to expectations, however, and it has been replaced by an Aermotor, which was put into operation yesterday for the first time.

The new mill is twelve feet in diameter and is raised on a platform about 80 feet from the ground. When seen in operation by the reporter yesterday it was pumping water into the 30,000 gallon tank at the rate of about 700 gallons an hour, although there was not wind enough to keep the pump going steadily. The pump has a 12-inch stroke. The new windmill does its work easily and in future the hospital will not have to depend on the city mains to keep its tank full, as of late.

The mechanism of the Aermotor wheel is extremely simple. It requires no attention whatever, beyond oiling, and never gets out of repair. The new mill is the highest on this island and the surrounding trees will never grow high enough to obstruct its supply of wind. The Hawaiian Hardware Company are the sole agents for the Aermotor wheels for these islands.

### JAPANESE LIFE INSURANCE.

An Agent of a Tokio Company Viewing Hawaiian Territory.

A new Japanese life insurance company, the "Ain Amereg Kaisha," of Tokio, is about to establish a branch here. The company is an old and opulent one, doing a heavy and conservative business all over Japan. The managing agent, Minashata Kuruya, now staying in town to look over the field, is a business man of wide experience, having traveled extensively all over the world.

In conversation with a BULLETIN reporter yesterday he said: "While not desiring to bring about any friction between our competitors in these islands, still we believe that we have a perfect right to secure what business we can here and we have a perfect assurance of its being very large."

"Our plan is a new one, very cheap insurance being granted. The company has about \$85,000,000 cash assets and is capitalized for \$70,000,000. We do a business in Japan and China of nearly \$90,000,000 per annum. Our rates are so low and our stability so well recognized that we are certain of getting a large percentage of the business here."

Thus the aggressive Japanese propose to enter another branch of business in these islands.

### Electric Frying Pan.

Theo. Hoffman has received a new and unique electrical device which will doubtless become a necessity here before long. It consists of a stew pan or skillet which at first glance looks like any other iron frying pan. Upon examining it closely, however, one finds that the bottom is double, between the two iron plates there being a small electric machine. Insulated flexible wires are attached to the utensil and by unscrewing a common incandescent lamp from its fastenings and inserting the cap which is at the terminus of the wire, enough heat is generated so that the pan is nearly red hot in a little over a minute. For getting up a quick meal, the invention takes the cake and can be utilized for many things in the line of cookery.

Sporting. By the Martha Davis which arrived this morning a complete line of sporting supplies for the coming season were received by Messrs. Castle & Cooke.

### AN ELEGANT RESORT.

Frank Pacheco's Recent Improvements to His Tonsorial Parlors.

Slowly but surely Honolulu is getting out of the old rut and adopting new ideas and improvements. And this is especially true of barber shops, although it cannot be said of street-cars. For a long time Honolulu barbers and their patrons were content with uncomfortable chairs, dirty towels and careless barbers who thought they were doing one a favor to give them a shave or hair cut. But all this has changed in the last few years and the city can now boast of some very respectable barber shops, although so far they cannot be termed tonsorial palaces.

Believing that it pays to have the best of everything, Frank Pacheco, the well known proprietor of the Criterion shaving parlors, has recently refitted his place in the latest style. An elegant piece of cabinet work takes up one side of the room, in which are drawers and other receptacles necessary for the business and three fine mirrors in which the patrons may view the operations performed on them. At the end of the room is an ornamental glass case in which are kept the cups, brushes and razors of the customers. On the opposite side of the room will be handsome marble washstands extending nearly across. These were ordered from Chicago and for some reason failed to connect with the last steamer. Three luxurious chairs of the latest pattern for barber's use make a man almost drowsy to look at them, so elegantly are they upholstered. There will be three good men employed in this shop, and patrons will not be kept waiting. No slipshod methods or poor barbers are allowed in Mr. Pacheco's establishment. Patrons will be scraped or shingled in the most artistic manner by gentlemanly, quiet and neatly clothed operators and none but the best of soaps and perfumery will be used.

Now that Frank has set the fashion for others, there is little doubt similar establishments will make like improvements.

### THE ROUTE OF THE PROCESSION.

It Will Include the Business Portion of Fort Street.

Several of the merchants on Fort street declined to decorate their buildings for the Fourth on the ground that the route of the procession as published in a contemporary did not include Fort street. COLLETT McLean was asked by a BULLETIN reporter today about the matter and said that the publication was entirely unauthorized. The route of the procession will be arranged this afternoon and officially given out by Colonel McLean tomorrow. The Colonel said, however, that it would surely include the business portion of Fort street and that he did not see any use in marching out Beretania street and back again, and that portion of the route will probably be stricken out.

### THE ZARAGOZA ARRIVED.

She is a Mexican Warship on a Scientific Expedition.

The Mexican warship Zaragoza arrived at noon today, 15 days from Santa Cruz, California. She is conveying an expedition of scientific discovery on a cruise around the world. The Zaragoza is an old-fashioned, bark-rigged, wooden, steam corvette of about 1500 tons.

Nobody but officials was allowed on board the Zaragoza, consequently a report of her voyage could not be obtained for this issue. She only fired four rounds in saluting the Hawaiian flag, and a consular official has gone on board for an explanation. There may have been an accident at the guns.

WHOPPERS TOLD IN ATHENS.

Jokes of American Athletes Published as Interesting Facts.

**THE JAPANESE TREATY.**

For a full quarter of a century ending the ensuing quarter Hawaii has had treaty relations with Japan such as no other western nation has enjoyed or yet enjoys. Various nations have lately concluded treaties of mutual commercial privileges with Japan, but the time has not thus far elapsed when they will become fully operative. Twenty-five years have Hawaiian subjects had the privilege of residence in any part of Japan, and of doing business in her cities and ports. Corresponding privileges have for the same time been accorded Japanese in Hawaii. The treaty under which these fraternal relations between Japan and Hawaii were established was concluded in 1871, the late Chas. C. Harris having been the Hawaiian Minister of Foreign Affairs who attested the ratification. Of late years, while Hawaii has been resting, serene, in this especial distinction, the diplomats of several of the great Powers have been tumbling over each other for precedence in gaining the intimate friendship of Japan, the rapidly growing giant of civilization in the Orient. Those nations are in competition for the trade of the "Land of the Rising Sun." Hawaii has for this quarter of a century been in a position to get all the trade with Japan that Hawaii's resources and enterprise could command. That this country has not in past times had a very considerable trade with Japan is beside the question. Perhaps not ten times in the twenty-five years have subjects of Hawaii availed themselves of the privilege of making business visits, or sojourning, or permanently residing in any city or port of Japan. That makes no difference. All Hawaiians have been welcome the whole time, under treaty stipulations, to the freedom of the territory of Japan, from which the citizens and subjects of greater nations were excluded. Japan has in the meantime become a great country, and is growing greater every day to all appearances. Is this a time, then, for people in Hawaii to start an agitation for the repeal of such a treaty of friendly commerce with Japan as the leading western nations have been seeking diligently to obtain and are now, in some cases,

close upon enjoying? It is more than folly, it is madness. The abrogation of the treaty would be a distinct act of unfriendliness, to a friendly Power—a Power that is respected today by the most powerful nations—an affront that would be unsafe for a country infinitely abler for offense or defense than Hawaii to offer. The only reason that is heard at the back of the incipient agitation is that of Japanese competition, existent and threatened, with skilled labor in this country.

Now, competition with free labor from the twelve thousand Japanese now in the country cannot be prevented by the abrogation of the treaty. None of them can be expelled excepting for criminality or vagrancy without giving cause of war. Neither would the absence of a treaty necessarily prevent the Government from aiding the immigration of more Japanese if they were wanted by the planters. The slap in the face to Japan would probably, however, prevent her allowing any more of her subjects to come to Hawaii. It might do more for this country, though, than was calculated, but the contrary of good. The wholesale introduction of Japanese immigrants that has been going on has been under the terms of a labor convention concluded with Japan ten years ago. It is this that the agitators are thinking about, in all probability, the abrogation of which would be a plain enough intimation to the planters that the people did not want any more Japanese labor immigration. If the planters wanted more, however, past experience goes to prove that they would have it, by hook or by crook. As it is, the labor convention does not make it obligatory on this country to receive any Japanese immigration. It simply provides safeguards in Japan for the economical procurement of a good class of agricultural laborers, and in Hawaii for their proper treatment and protection while under contract. There is therefore no need to abrogate either of the diplomatic compacts between these islands from the process of being Japanned all over. All that is necessary to that end is for the Government to stop importing Japanese. The country expects nothing less from the Government, and at next year's general election the people should upon this point give no uncertain sound.

Sir Audley Coote, on the eve of leaving Australia for China on business connected with a railway project, said he was going to Washington again in the interest of the Pacific cable, when Congress assembled after the presidential election. He spoke of the rival bills at the late session as if both were his own. If Sir Audley's concern can guarantee the favorable offer he said in Honolulu that he had made, he may get the franchise out of the coming Congress.

Whatever the Wilson tariff has done for the United States, it restored to Hawaii the benefits of reciprocity of which it was robbed by the McKinley tariff. It is therefore strange to see Hawaiian newspapers going into ecstasies over the prospects of McKinley's election on the St. Louis platform.

If the platform constructors at St. Louis meant "annexation" in their reference to Hawaii they were afraid to say it. They were very timorous about saying "gold," but they did say it.

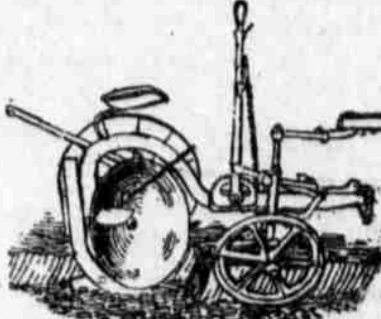

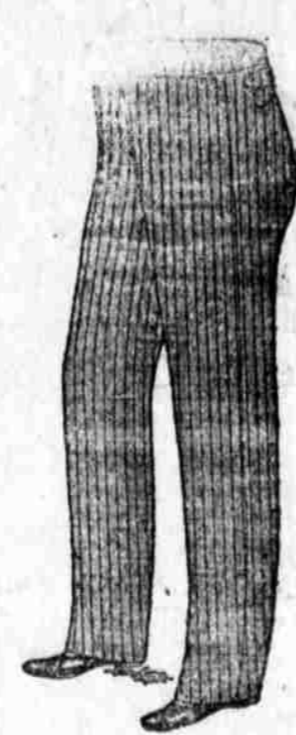

MARQUIS DE MORES.

Treacherously Murdered by His Own Escort in the Soudan.

The Marquis de Mores and several of his companions were massacred in the Soudan on June 8 by his own escort of Tueregs. He was on the march with eight companies, of Tunisians and Algerians, in addition to escorts of Tueregs and Schambasa, whom on the previous day he had armed with carbines. When some distance out the escort of Tueregs attacked the Marquis and four of his companies who were in advance of the general party. The Marquis defended himself with his revolver, but eventually succumbed.

The man thus treacherously done to death lived in the United States some years after his marriage in 1882 to the daughter of Baron Louis von Hoffman, banker, who brought him a large fortune. He brought the title to 15,000 acres of the "bad lands" of Dakota, and started a ranch 1800 acres in extent thereon. Then he began a scheme for sending fresh beef direct from his ranch to every large city in the union.

The stores did an immense business, but there was little profit, mainly because of the active opposition of other ranchmen, commission merchants, slaughterhouse owners and cowboys. They argued that if the Marquis' colossal scheme was a success their respective vocations would be things of the past. The most determined opposition came from the cowboys. Almost every week gangs of cowboys raided the ranch, killing and driving off the cattle, maiming the heaves and interfering with the work of the employees. The Marquis fought these raids in true Western style. So did his wife, who had learned to use the revolver and Winchester with the accuracy of an expert. The Marquis made a record for himself in these raids which made him a regular terror. He possessed the remarkable gift of being able to shoot accurately with a revolver in either hand. After a brave struggle, lasting more than three years, the Marquis was forced to give up the ranch, after losing \$1,000,000.

After the ranch failure the Marquis and his wife went to Paris, where he became a Boulevard crank until that craze was over. He lost an election and nearly killed an editor in a duel. For months past his tall, soldierly, familiar figure had been absent from Paris. It was vaguely known that he was scouring the remotest districts of Algeria and Tunis, some said for trading purposes. As the result of past expeditions he long had a number of friends among the Arab sheiks, who admired his roving spirit and indomitable courage. He formed the project of turning these relations to account, and by penetrating into the depths of the desert, speeding from one Arab encampment to another, he had been preaching a holy war among Mussulmans, urging them to rise in revolt against the Englishman and sweep him out of Africa. 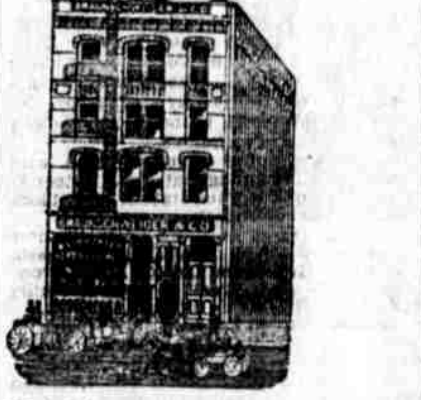
