AN EXTRA SESSION.

It is understood that the Ministry has under consideration the question of calling the Legislature for the purpose of passing a Chinese restriction amendment to the Constitution. As the session of 1888 adjourned and was not prorogued, it only requires a summons of the President to convene the Legislature at any time before the close of the period. The amendment intended to be submitted, according to assurances of its promoters, will place no restrictions upon the getting of Chinese labor for the sugar and rice plantations, except that account will have to be kept of Chinese entering the country for that purpose, so that they shall be deported when they quit work on the plantations. The main provision sought is the empowering of the Government to prevent the increase of Chinese competition in independent trade and industry. This is something that must be done, in the event of Chinese labor continuing to be admitted, if the institutions of civilization are to be maintained under free self-government in these islands. This is certainly the opinion of the majority of the electorate, and we fully believe it to be sound.

Whether a special session to rush a constitutional amendment through has sufficient justification of emergency or not is believed to be the question with the Government. A majority of the Cabinet has committed itself to a policy of protecting the enfranchised portion of the population against Chinese aggression. The Ministry as at present constituted would probably assume the responsibility of a constitutional amendment that would guard the planting interests against the danger of a scarcity of suitable labor. The planters themselves could not reasonably oppose an amendment that would not interfere with their labor requirements. It would indeed be an unwise policy on their part to put themselves in the way of a measure of the kind contemplated. It would be antagonizing their own protection, because, as matters stand, an anti-Chinese Legislature can at any time cut off Chinese immigration absolutely. Then, where would the planters be, in case of other elements of labor failing? It is no use saying that such a course would be suicidal from a national point of view—the killing of the goose that lays the golden egg. Such might indeed be its true characterization. But how are you going to bring conviction of the fact, if it be one, to those classes who can only see that, with no restriction at all of fatal Chinese competition with them in their direct interests, their indirect share in the custards and omelets of the aforesaid guided product will be snatched up by the chopsticks of their Mongolian suppliers? It really looks as if a constitutional amendment of the kind proposed should unite the planters in common cause with the complaining classes. In that case, it requires no argument to demonstrate that the sooner the amendment receives its initial imprimatur from the Legislature the better.

The case is simply that by utilizing the legislative power now in hand only one more favorable Legislature would have to be secured to ensure success, while the neglect of the present opportunity would necessitate the election of the two succeeding Legislatures upon this issue. Moreover, the former alternative makes it possible to have the measure take effect within two years, while the latter defers the consummation to at least four years.

The issue is certainly one that will stay with the country until it is finally settled. It could hardly be placed before the people at the elections in a more comprehensible shape than that of a constitutional amendment that had passed one session. There is no matter upon which native and foreign electors could more easily find identity of interests than this of Chinese restriction. Still we admit that on grounds of the broadest public policy an additional sitting of the present Legislature might not be desirable. There are considerations that might make the event appear one fraught with uneasiness to the country. It is not certain, in the first place, that this Legislature can be absolutely depended upon to pass the amendment. Secondly, when convened, the liability of members to dabble all round in affairs and get themselves muddled over incomplete exhibits of the period's administration would be dangerous. The rule forbidding any but the specific business for which the session is called would not apply, because this is not a special but a resumption of the regular session. With safeguards against such unfortunate results as those suggested, which could only be in the form of written pledges under the signatures of two-thirds of the members, we should rejoice if the Government decided in favor of the Legislature coming together long enough to pass the amendment. Otherwise the country must have patience and be resigned to making haste slowly in the cause of western civilization.

DEPUTY Marshal Creighton, Police Capt. Larsen, three mounted policemen, three native and one Chinese officers went to Moanalua yesterday to raid a Chinese gambling den. They found the gamblers full of their fan-tan business, and there was quite a scene for a few moments, queues and Chinese blouses flying around lively. The officers of the law managed to capture three Chinese and they are charged with gaming.

THIS morning Mr. J. T. Waterhouse, Jr., with his two sons and Mr. E. C. Damon with his two, went to Pearl River harbor in the famous banana sloop. The vessel was in charge of Bill Williams, the well-known Pearl harbor pilot. They took with them a boat load of harpoons and shark hooks and of course some grub. They left with great expectations, and it is hoped by their friends that they won't get "hoka."

ANOTHER trip of the train on the Oahu Railway was made this morning. All the assembled natives who could be crowded into the cars were given a ride. Then Mr. Dillingham warned everybody that the ground at the terminus and inside of the company's forty-foot right of way along the line was to be tabu against idlers. A notice to the same effect will be published and the warning made enforceable by the fencing of the line.

EXCURSION TO PEARL RIVER.

Yesterday the yacht Hawaii went down to Pearl River harbor with the following distinguished gentlemen on board: His Ex. L. A. Thurston, Hons. Henry Waterhouse and W. O. Smith, Messrs. P. C. Jones, E. A. Jones, George Carter, Luther Wilcox, Eddie Damon and Masters Waterhouse and Smith. Minister Thurston had left word with one of his colleagues that he was going to inspect roads and bridges, but the temptation of a boat sail was too much for him, and he changed his mind. THE BULLETIN made mention of his going on an inspection and finally the Advertiser copied from us. The Hawaii after reaching Pearl River sailed all around the lagoons, and came across five large porpoises. The boat followed them for some distance and at last Minister Thurston harpooned one, but the harpoon broke and the porpoise got away. It was a disappointed crowd on that boat and no mistake.

AFTER leaving the harbor, the Healani, with Judge Dole, Mr. F. M. Hatch, Prof. Brigham and Dr. N. B. Emerson on board, were in sight and the two boats raced home to Honolulu, the Hawaii just winning.

HURRAH FOR THE RAILROAD!

Contractor Dillingham Celebrates His Birthday according to Promise.

A sort of preliminary opening of the Oahu Railway took place yesterday. The contractor's new engine, from the Baldwin Locomotive Works, with a train of two third class cars, made a trial trip on the rails to the Palama rice plantation, a distance of about a mile. Although the track was unballasted, this trial trip had to be made in redemption of a promise.

Mr. B. F. Dillingham, promoter of the Oahu Railway and Land Company, on his birthday a year previous, was accosted by an acquaintance with the remark: "Well, Mr. Dillingham, you have got your franchise; when are you going to give us the railway?"

Mr. Dillingham replied that on his next birthday, that day one year, he hoped to treat his friends to a railway ride.

Since the giving of this promise many things have arisen to threaten the failure of its fulfillment. It was "touch and go" for the bark Deutschland to arrive in time with rails from Bremen. There were other critical circumstances attending the effort, but, with a strong company now at his back, the originator of the enterprise, having taken the contract to build the road, resolutely pushed operations to their present advanced stage.

When the appointed day arrived Mr. Dillingham was ready to celebrate. His engine had been set up some days. Two third class cars, the best passenger accommodation as yet on the ground, were put together. They were attached to the collision end of the locomotive, the bullseye headlight lamp glaring up on the passengers. Seated in the forward car were the following citizens: Hon. W. R. Castle, president of the Oahu Railway and Land Company; Hons. H. M. Whitney, H. A. Widemann, Paul Neumann, M. P. Robinson, A. Jaeger and Frank Brown; Marshal J. H. Soper, Dr. J. M. Whitney, Messrs. E. Muller, W. M. Giffard, H. Lose, Godfrey Brown, J. G. Spencer, W. A. Bowen, Marcus Colburn, Geo. P. Castle, J. L. Torbert, H. A. Parmelee, J. H. Fisher, C. Haumer, T. S. Southwick, John Grace, D. Logan of the BULLETIN, F. J. Festa, W. G. Ashler, secretary O. R. & L. Co., and B. F. Dillingham, with a few others. The rear car was crowded with natives.

With a shrill blast from the whistle and the bell clanging, the engine moved easily off with its load. Three rousing cheers were given by the passengers, and crowds assembled at the starting point responded. Groups of natives were scattered all along the line, the men shouting, the women waving salutations, and the children screaming with pleasure at the advent of the iron horse. The cars ran with most remarkable smoothness notwithstanding the absence of ballast from the track, showing very excellent work in constructing the permanent way as well as a superior article of springs under the coaches. Indeed, many of the passengers had often had rougher rides in first class cars on old established railways. The speed given the train was high under the circumstances, being estimated at about ten miles an hour. Mr. Kluegel, civil engineer of the company, manipulated the throttle valve and exercised the greatest care against accident.

When the engine started an affusion of damp soot fell upon the passengers in front, giving their faces the appearance of having met with a powder explosion. President Castle wore a fresh-laundered white linen suit, which was sooted to him in fine polka dot style. He regarded the baptism as a pledge of good faith from the road, similar to the ancient English practice of sealing land sales with the delivery of a sod from the property to the purchaser.

It was not deemed advisable to detain the passengers for the return trip, as the boiler flue of the engine developed some defect requiring a little time to remedy. The elated guests of the occasion, however, found it no hardship to make their way a few rods across lots to join the King street tramcars for town. All on the cars were jubilant over the success of the trial trip, and Mr. Dillingham was heartily congratulated on the redemption of his birthday promise.

In the course of a few weeks the line to Pearl Harbor will be completed and efficient rolling stock have arrived from the States. Then it is probable that the railway will have a grand inauguration.

BASEBALL.

The Nipsics Take the Kailuanis into Camp.

The game of baseball at Makiki yesterday afternoon between the Kailuanis and a nine from the U. S. S. Nipsic was exceedingly interesting in every respect, and was witnessed by a large crowd of spectators. The Nipsics looked very well in their uniforms of blue and white and they played a good game throughout. The coaching by Grupp, the first baseman of the Nipsics, was very amusing and caused roars of laughter. At one time when there were two men on bases, he said, "New boys, look out, the Kailuanis are talking kanaka, there's something wrong." During the fourth innings Grupp had the misfortune to have the nail of his little finger broken, but he went on playing just the same. W. Lucas of the Honolulu umpired the game. The Kailuanis at the end of their ninth innings were one run ahead, but the Nipsics went in and won the game amid much enthusiasm. Special mention must be made of the fine work of Brooke behind the bat for the Nipsics.

THE PLAY.

The game opened with the Kailuanis at the bat. Naukana, Cupid and Perry were all retired at first in quick order. Gallagher was hit by a pitched ball, stole second and went to third on a passed ball. McKarron hit for two bags, sending in Gallagher, got third on a wild throw and scored on a passed ball. McCaffy retired at first, Dixon fled to Kaee and Elsey struck out.

In the second Kaee made a safe hit to right field and stole second. H. Crabbe hit for one bag and reached second on a throw which failed to cut off Kaee reaching the center. Moses rapped a single to center sending in Crabbe, but was put out trying to steal second. Widdifield fled to McCaffy and C. Crabbe went out on a foul fly. Brooke retired at first from Kaee, Miller hit safely to right field, and then stole two bags. Carson got his base on balls. Gallagher fled to Widdifield by a double play retired Carson at second.

Third innings: Akina foud fled to Brooke. Naukana retired at first from Elsey. Cupid got first on Gallagher's fumble of a grounder but was put out trying to steal second. McKarron fanned the air in fine style three times, McCaffy retired at first from C. Crabbe, while Dixon after taking his base on balls was put out at second.

In the fourth, Perry fled to McKarron, Kaee was out at first from Gallagher. H. Crabbe got in a single to right and stole second, but Moses ended the innings by striking out. Elsey retired on a foul fly, Brooke took his first on a fumble by C. Crabbe, but was put out at second. Miller hit a fly to Widdifield, who muffed. Carson hit to C. Crabbe who threw to second, retiring Miller.

Fifth innings: The Kailuanis retired quickly, Widdifield and C. Crabbe at first, Akina on a fly to McCaffy. Grupp and McKarron both got first on C. Crabbe's fumble of grounders, and aided by a wild throw by Perry, a fumble by Moses and Dixon's base hit they crossed the plate. The outs were Gallagher on strikes, McCaffy and Miller on flies.

In the sixth, the Kailuanis scored four times. Naukana got first on Carson's miff of a fly, Cupid hit to Gallagher who threw to second to cut off Naukana, but McKarron fumbled. Perry hit to McKarron who again fumbled and the three scored on Gallagher's fumble and wild throw. Kaee hit safely for one bag but was put out at second. H. Crabbe fled to McCaffy. 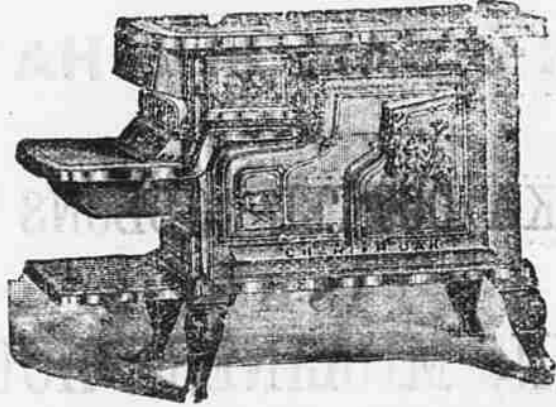
