### Attempted to Murder Succeeded in Suicide.

PASADENA, Oct. 8.—Jas. P Treadwell, son of the late J P Treadwell, the well known millionaire mining man committed suicide here this morning at 11 o'clock, after having attempted unsuccessfully to kill his handsome young wife. He chose as the scene of his terrible deed picturesque Rubio Canyon, at the foot of the world-famed Mount Lowe Railway, and passengers on the road arrived just in time to see Mrs Treadwell rushing away, blood dripping from her forehead, while her husband lay dead beside a little spring.

Mrs Treadwell will recover. She is the former Mrs Abigail Nay Driver, the Sonoma county belle, who married Treadwell in Petaluma in June. As the issue of her first marriage she has two children. Her year-old son, a flaxen haired little fellow, was at home in charge of a colored nurse at the time of the tragedy. The other child, a girl, is with Mrs Treadwell's mother in Petaluma. The family reside at 81 North Euclid avenue in this city.

Mr and Mrs Treadwell took the early electric car for Altadena this morning and got off at Rubio Canyon, a resort at the foot of the Mount Lowe incline. It is a picturesque nook in the Sierra Madre mountains, about five miles from here. At 11 o'clock the incline car was coming down. The passengers, among them Prof. Larkin, who has charge of the telescope and searchlight, heard a pistol shot just as the car neared Rubio. Looking up, they saw Mrs Treadwell running, with blood streaming from her forehead. They presumed that she had fallen and cut her head on a stone. She exclaimed that she had been struck by her husband, who, she feared, had shot himself, as she had heard two shots. She would not tell her name or give any particulars. They took her to a spring and washed her wound and then summoned Dr Charles D Lockwood and had him meet the car at Pasadena.

Treadwell was cold when the passengers reached him. Two bullets had pierced his head, one passing through the brain. On the ground were found a .32 caliber revolver, hairpins and signs of a scuffle. The revolver was broken about the butt and the trigger guard.

THE LEPER ISSUE.

The Republican candidates are still strenuously harping and pounding upon the leper matter as the main slogan of the campaign, and only incidentally make a touch upon the county and municipal plank in their platform as a mere make-believe to show the people that they too want these measures, but they are not in earnest with such a plank. We believe that their days are numbered, but they dare not shift for fear of laying themselves liable and open to severe criticisms. Their game is known and they cannot retract.

Much as we oppose the Wilcox leper bill introduced in Congress, we believe though that there is some merit in it. Even if a portion of the people oppose it, one thing is quite certain, and that is, it has received some notice and attention which has drawn forth comment and consideration, not only here in this Territory, but on the Mainland as well. And yet we earnestly hope that it will not pass, for according to present indications, there's no show whatever for such a final disposition.

Our position on this question is already known. We cannot for a moment believe that it is to the best interest of the unfortunate sufferers to have their care and maintenance go to other hands, those of utter strangers to them, who cannot have any feeling of sympathy and of love for them. They being wards of this Territory, it is incumbent upon the taxpayers to support them, not only as a matter of duty, but it is that of courtesy and of justice.

By a cruel fate, which is no fault of theirs, but a Divine visitation, we have, by laws which we deem unconstitutional, separated families, husbands from their wives, and parents from their children, and so forth. They have been ruthlessly separated and

the marriage vows, with the filial and parental duties as well, set at naught and in defiance of all justice. And furthermore, these unfortunates are not criminals, and yet they are somewhat treated as if they were. It is a duty we owe ourselves as well as to them to care and maintain them for the rest of their days in this life and they should, by all means, have all the comfort we can afford to give to them unstintingly.

If the Wilcox bill is intended to give them the benefits of science, we believe this Territory to be perfectly able to do it for them. And furthermore, we believe that this Territory should regulate it by law so to take it away from the control of the Board of Health. And again, we also believe that no man, if he is such, would like to see the care of his children, providing he has a heart and is capable of caring for them, go into the hands of an utter stranger, who has no love whatever for the least one among them. For these reasons, we are strongly opposed to the proposed transfer of the Leper Settlement under Federal control. And yet, it might be of some good, but we are blind to all reason and argument. Our politics has no sway whatever with our sentimental feelings in this matter. And we don't think that the Republicans are making good and competent physicians of themselves by using this matter of fact proposition to wield and to crowbar the people at this coming election, unless it is as a pure business proposition with them, which we think it is.

But in support of our terming the unfortunate lepers as ingrates, we will undertake to give our reasons for making the assertion. When C. B. Reynolds, the former superintendent of the Leper Settlement, was ruling them with an iron hand, their many appeals for a change and for his removal were utterly ignored and disregarded. Try whatever they may, it was useless. A change was strongly and urgently desired, but it was of no use. It did not come soon enough, and as a last extremity, they resorted by request and petition to the Delegate to find a remedy for them whereby they may get rid of the autocratic Czar that was ruling them. The result of their appeal was the introduction in Congress of the bill now being strongly opposed by the Republicans.

Let us now look about us and note the change that has come over their dreams of relief from thralldom and oppression. Mr. Reynolds was at last removed through his official negligence and carelessness, whereby a man imprisoned without trial was eaten by worms before his death. A new superintendent was appointed in the person of the present incumbent, J. D. McVeigh, which we are most happy to record that he has done and is still doing lots of wonders in making their lot much pleasanter, their burdens lighter and their sufferings easier. In him they have gotten an ideal official, of course, not quite perfect, but it was much better than formerly. And now they are content to stay as they have been and now are, and the ungrateful lot (we say this advisedly) are now opposing a measure brought about by their own demands.

Delegate Wilcox did what he thought was the best way of overcoming the difficulty, but they are now throwing him down personally. This state of

affairs is a lot they have made themselves and they should stay by it, and if they think they cannot very well do so, they should try to get out of it as nicely and as gracefully as they could, not in abuse and personal opposition of the Territorial Delegate to Congress, but in open-handed man fashion, free and aboveboard.

As voters, the voice of our unfortunate fellows should be heard, particularly when they are in the right and their demands are just; but as wards they are the children of the taxpayers, no heed should be taken of them, unless their cry is that demanded by justice and necessity—for water, food and clothing. Whatever else they are now demanding through political demagogues, mischief makers, disturbers and chronic agitators, they should be plainly told to mind their own business and to stay within their proper sphere, unless they have been urged in their present action by those in authority over them.

Gentlemen, if you think you will win out on this proposition, keep right on doing it in the track you have laid out for yourselves. We hope you'll succeed, but we have our doubts.

## WHAT? IT IS NEWS!

We understand that Geo. R. Carter told Governor Dole the other day that a Democrat was a Home Ruler. This was in the case of Julius Asche, an inspector of election in the seventh precinct of the Fifth Representative District, in which the Home Rulers demanded the appointment of one from that party, holding that Mr. Asche was a Democrat. Sure, Mr. Asche is a Democrat, and it is news to many to now know that he is a Home Ruler. But we now see, according to this morning's Advertiser, that the Governor yesterday appointed two Republicans and one Democrat on the Board of Inspectors for that precinct, which is a large Home Rule stronghold, but it is minus a Home Rule inspector. Is this fair, may we ask? We will answer—No. Each of the three parties should by all means be represented.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The Morning Organ of Dole's oligarchy has found another Pettigrew, this time probably in Burton, who has evidently displeased it and its gang.

Readers of the Star of yesterday are of the opinion that the Republican election outlook is not as encouraging as the "family compact" would have its followers to believe.

There was value in Judge Gear's action in allowing B. H. Wright to bail, but was there any in Secretary Cooper's conduct in permitting the defaulting treasurer, Wm. H. Wright, to escape from the clutches of the law as a fugitive from justice?

Is a Home Ruler a Democrat or vice versa? Nay, nay, not by a long-shot. Both are as distinct as oil is from water, but both are somewhat working in harmony to gain the desired end, and this in spite of Geo. R. Carter's decision.

When Governor Dole is examining the Superintendent of Public Works in relation to money matters, it may be pertinent to ask the Superintendent whether he contributed any public money, in his own name, to the "sur-

vivors of the Maine," or to the striking miners of Pennsylvania.

A report is current that should Prince Cupid be elected as the Delegate of this Territory to the United States Congress, our "great and good friend" W. O. Smith will receive the appointment as his secretary. Didn't we say so that the Prince will be a mere fool in the hands of some mature and shrewd politician of the missionary persuasion. Now, Republicans, it is up to you whether you still want the retention of the Dole oligarchy or not.

Yes, surely, Mr. Boyd has returned and the Advertiser has changed front. He may be "suspended" pending investigation, but he is still chief of his department, although Secretary Cooper may remain in charge. And for sure, he will be ready to say "something" and answer "everything" in a few days.

How comes it that the Advertiser expected the saying attributed to Senator Burton which it quotes this morning and which we produce elsewhere in this issue. Did it know about what was coming in advance? And Senator Burton was one of those Republicans it recently lauded to the people of this Territory. Evidently the Senator has found out something during his recent sojourn here.

## PLATFORM

Of the Democratic Party of the Territory of Hawaii.

The Democratic party of the Territory of Hawaii re-affirms the principles of the platform of the party adopted in convention in Honolulu, H. T., October 8, A. D. 1900:

And because the political history of this Territory since that time has shown the peculiar aptness and the wisdom of the position taken by the Democratic party on the issues local to this Territory, we repeat the following:

The Democratic party, as the pronounced and trusted friend of the laboring classes, declares itself to be in favor of an eight-hour labor law, and the giving of all Government work to citizens of the Territory of Hawaii, not, however, to the exclusion of male Hawaiian residents of European nationality who, because of their inability to speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian languages, are denied American citizenship.

We favor the appropriation, by the next Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii, of a liberal pension to the ex-Queen of Hawaii, as a just acknowledgment due her for her great loss.

We favor an appropriation by the Congress of the United States to compensate the ex-Queen in an equitable sum for the deprivation suffered by her of the Crown Lands.

We favor the payment of all proven and just claims resulting from loss by fire incurred through the suppression of the recent epidemic of bubonic plague.

We favor a revision and a modification of all existing license laws.

We favor the enlargement and comprehensive development of all the harbors of this Territory.

AND FURTHER WE DECLARE:  
- That we favor the immediate enactment by the next Legislature of laws creating out of the Territory of Hawaii, counties, towns and municipalities.

That we protest against the assumption of power and authority arrogated to itself by that creation of Governor Dole known as the Executive Council and declare the same to be absolutely un-American.

That we protest against the employment of Asiatics as laborers or otherwise, either directly or indirectly, by the government, or upon any work or contracts to be done, and paid for, by the Government of the Territory of Hawaii, or any government or board constituted thereunder.

That we oppose all efforts to disfranchise the Hawaiians.

That the powers of the Board of Health be limited and defined by legislative enactment.

On this platform with the ticket already nominated, the Democratic party appeals to the voters of Hawaii.

## Oil Law is Explicit.

The following letter from High Sheriff Brown to the secretary of the Board of Underwriters is self-explanatory:

HIGH SHERIFF'S OFFICE,  
HONOLULU, H. T., Oct. 14 1902.  
ALFRED R. GURNEY, Esq.,

Secretary Board of Fire Underwriters, Territory of Hawaii.

Dear Sir: I beg to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 13th in re keeping [and storage of gasoline, benzine or any oil the component part of which is petroleum, naphtha or spirits of turpentine, and in reply beg to state that section 1507, Penal Laws of 1897, provides that not more than ten cases, which I understand to mean 100 gallons, shall be stored at any one time on any premises except the government store house.

The law, it seems to me, is plain that ten cases is the limit of any one or of all of the above mentioned oils which can be stored at any one time upon any premises [outside of the government warehouse.

Section 1509 provides that the above mentioned oils shall be kept in air tight, metallic vessels, and marked in plain Roman letters with the name of the oil contained, and shall be kept at all times conspicuously in view near the entrance of the premises where kept, and convenient for removal therefrom.

Robt N Boyd presided at this meeting and introduced the following speakers: S F Chillingworth, W W Harris, Jonah Kumalae and Carlos A Long. There was nothing new that they there expounded, but the people were uneasy at certain remarks made by old man Chillingworth.

The Home Rulers and Democrats held two meetings last night. One was at

presided over by Jno A Baker, and the speakers were Frank R Harvey, now dubbed by the Hawaiians as the "Kalihi Cannon," Moses Kaikaia, Monwar, Huka, S K Kamaikaia, Wm Mossmao, E W Palau, Huka, Kaai, Keliheanalu and others. Of course, it was the usual stuff and nothing new. It broke up about 11 o'clock.

And another meeting was at Kewalo where

spoke to a good sized audience of native Hawaiian voters. It was presided by H P Haila and the speakers were Edgar Cayless, C J McCarthy, D Kama, J P Makainai, S K Kamaikaia, I Naahu, Moses Kaikaia, E W Palau, Umauma and others. It was nearly mid light when it broke up.

**KAAHI HOME RULERS.**

From reports received personally from Speaker Akina and J M Poepe, who both returned yesterday, it was the same as already given by THE INDEPENDENT. They held good meetings wherever they went.

At the meeting reported in this morning's Advertiser, C B Hofgaard is claimed to say that the people of Waimea were not in sympathy with Akina. But Akina says Hofgaard was not present, but there were there present such as E Omsted, Th Braudt, Aug Krue, E A Koudsen, W J Sheldon, Jas D Cook and others, who all attempted to raise a disturbance when he eulogised Wilcox. And when he saw the Waimea cowboys had their lassos out ready to nip them, he immediately adjourned the meeting. The police could not stop these disturbers.

Hanalei is strong for Home Rule. Their transportation from there to Haena and elsewhere was paid for by a strong Republican.

The wife of a Republican, who is a strong Home Ruler, has left her husband. She vows she will not go back to him until he changes his politics. We refrain from mentioning their names, for they are both Hawaiians and are well known. At their Hanalei meeting they permitted the Rev S Kaali, now a Republican candidate, but a Democrat at the last campaign, to speak to a Home Rule audience. He wound up by saying that he was also an "a'ohs aina" like themselves.

**Senator Burton on the Missionaries.**

TONGA, Kan., Oct 14—"The United States should furnish protection to the Hawaiians against swindlers," said United States Senator J R Burton, who has just returned from Hawaii.

"The natives are in hard lines just now," he continued, "because of the fact that a number of alleged missionaries from Boston have been trading them what they pretended were tickets to Heaven for their lands and property. The game has been worked quite generally among the more ignorant natives of the islands. Those who have discovered the fraud express resentment towards this country."
