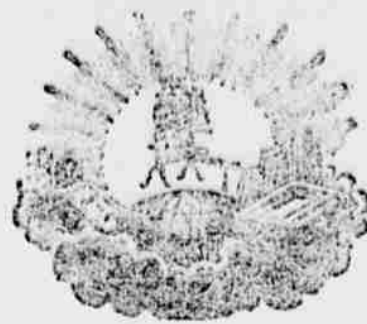

Election Proclamation!

In accordance with the Election Law of the Kingdom, notice is hereby given that a Special Election for Noble for the unexpired term of six years will be held on the Island of Oahu, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m., on WEDNESDAY, the 9th day of July, 1890, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of His Excellency Hon. John A. Cummins.

The Election Districts, Voting Precincts, Polling Places and Inspectors of Election are as follows:

1st DISTRICT, HONOLULU.

That portion of Honolulu lying Southeast of a line drawn from the summit of the Konahuani range of mountains along the crest of the ridge separating Manoa and Makiki Valleys from Nuuanu and Pauoa Valleys to the flag pole on the old battery on Puowaina (Punchbowl); thence direct to the junction of Kinau and Alapai streets along the center of Alapai to King street, center of King to South street, center of South street to the sea.

First Precinct—All that portion of said District lying East of Punahou street and a line drawn in extension thereof mauka and makai.

Polling Place—Government Nursery, junction of King and Waikiki streets.

Inspectors—E. G. Schuman, J. Lucas, J. M. Camara.

Second Precinct—All that portion of said district lying West of Punahou street and a line drawn in extension thereof.

Polling Place—Beretania Street School House.

Inspectors—J. A. Magoon, Albert Lucas, G. K. Wilder.

2nd DISTRICT, HONOLULU.

All that portion of Honolulu North of the First District and inside of the line drawn from the flag pole at the old battery on Puowaina (Punchbowl) to the junction of School and Emma streets, along the center of School street to Fort street, along the center of Fort street to Beretania street, center of Beretania street to the Nuuanu Stream at Smith's Bridge, thence up the center of said Stream to School street, center of School street to Liliha street, center of Liliha street to Judd street, along the center of Judd street to the crest of the ridge on the Northwest side of Nuuanu Valley and thence along the crest of said ridge to the peak called Lanihuli.

First Precinct—All that portion of said District lying mauka of School and Judd streets and East of Nuuanu street.

Polling Place—Water Office, Nuuanu and Pauoa streets.

Inspectors—A. W. Carter, David Dayton, M. Keliha.

Second Precinct—All that portion of said District lying mauka of Judd and School streets and West of Nuuanu and Fort streets.

Polling Place—Fourth House on the Ewa side mauka of the School Street Bridge, over Nuuanu Stream.

Inspectors—John A. Shaw, T. W. Hobron, J. P. Iwa.

3rd DISTRICT, HONOLULU.

That portion of Honolulu adjacent to the first and second Districts, bounded on the Waikiki side by Alapai and South streets, mauka by School street, on the Ewa side by Fort street from School street to Beretania street; along the center of Beretania street to Richards street, along center of Richards street to the sea and bounded makai by the sea.

First Precinct—All that portion of said District lying mauka of Beretania street.

Polling Place—Royal School House. Inspectors—Fred Terrill, John M. Vivas, J. Mahiai Kanekua.

Inspectors—Henry Smith, Barney Ordenstein, G. V. Peters.

4th DISTRICT, HONOLULU.

All that portion of Honolulu lying West of Districts Two and Three, bounded as follows: Beginning at the sea at the foot of Richards street; up Richards street to Beretania street; along Beretania street to Smith's Bridge; thence up Nuuanu Stream to School street; thence along School street to Liliha street; thence through the center of Liliha street to King street, along the center of King street to the bridge crossing the Nuuanu Stream and bounded makai by the sea.

First Precinct—All that portion of said District lying West of Nuuanu street.

5th DISTRICT, HONOLULU.

The partial suspension of general business which marked the interval between the resignation of the Thurston Ministry and its successor, the Cummins Ministry, is at an end, and the usual routine has taken its place. The Cabinet appears to be generally accepted by the moderate and conservative of both parties as satisfactory. The Administration is expected in the conduct of public affairs to sustain the motto, "The greatest good to the greatest number."

It is now positively known that the following gentlemen, for private reasons, could not accept Cabinet positions, although they were the strong choice of His Majesty, on different dates, during all Saturday and Monday, viz.: Joseph O. Carter, E. C. Macfarlane and F. M. Hatch. It is safe to assert that such conservative, able men, with their bright minds, would have commanded the respect and confidence of even both parties, as well as the entire country, and the Diplomatic Corps, a position which we also concede to the present Ministers.

A SAMARITAN SPEAKS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The Editor of the Friend sees fit to take up the defense of his associate, the Rev. Dr. Hyde. We do not envy him that defense; and he has evidently missed the essence of the whole question.

It is not necessary to deny any reports relative to our distinguished and well known friend, "Danien," but we are disgusted by the absence of that charity covering all things, which hideth a multitude of transgressions; which says to the poor woman, "Go and sin no more," also neglecting the plain injunction of our Lord—"Judge nothing;" and even of that of the heathen, "Nil nisi de mortuis bonum" (nothing but good of the dead).

The letter of Mr. Robert Louis Stevenson has made "a shining mark" and it will take more rhetoric than that of the editor of the Friend to remove him and his subject from their pedestal of pre-eminence and honor. We are distressed to write, that it appears very much as if religious jealousy and bigotry were at the foundation of this said correspondence. The Rev. Dr. Hyde may write, "the editor of the Friend" may write, but a poor pilgrim on the shores of time makes his humble prophecy, that the above-named are forgotten while Danien will be immortal.

THE HONGKAA HOMICIDE.

In the case of the King vs. J. R. Mills and others, Mr. Hatch, for the defense, this morning moved the exceptions be continued to the July term. There were long delays in correspondence with Hawaii and other difficult circumstances. He doubted if the case would ever come to a hearing but could not then speak positively as to that. Attorney-General Peterson said the Crown was ready but the reasons given by the defense for continuance seemed satisfactory, and he therefore consented to the action. The case was accordingly continued.

Our report of the jury trial at Hilo was interrupted in its publication by the legislative session, and the intention was to complete in a supplement as soon as possible. The long recess taken by the Legislature, however, enables us to complete the report in the regular issues.

BEFORE JUDD, C. J., M'CALL, BICKERTON, DOLE, JJ.

WEDNESDAY, June 13. The Court opens at 10 a. m. The retiring Attorney-General, Clarence W. Ashford, introduces his successor, Arthur P. Peterson (as fully reported elsewhere). Noon recess 12:18 p. m. till 1:30 p. m.

G. W. Macfarlane & Co. vs. J. S. McCandless, P. Neumann and C. L. Carter for plaintiffs; V. V. Ashford for defendant. Assumpsit. Defendant's appeal from order of Judd, C. J., affirming judgment for plaintiffs. Argued and submitted.

MINISTER PETERSON:

Reception of the New Attorney-General by the Just Bench.

The Supreme Court in Banco opened to-day's session at 10 o'clock. Present: Chief Justice Judd, Associate Justices McCully, Bickerton, and Dole. Of the Bar there were in attendance: His Excellency A. P. Peterson, Attorney-General; Mr. C. W. Ashford, retiring Attorney-General; Mr. Claus Spreckels, Deputy Attorney-General; Hon. Paul Neumann, Messrs. W. R. Castle, F. M. Hatch, V. V. Ashford, W. A. Whiting, and C. L. Carter. Marshal J. H. Soper and Deputy Marshal C. L. Hopkins also attended.

Mr. Ashford said--If Your Honors please, I desire to take the privilege this morning, and it is also a pleasure to me, to introduce to this Honorable Court my successor in the office of Attorney-General, Mr. Arthur P. Peterson. Mr. Peterson of course is familiar to the Court in his official capacity as Deputy Attorney-General which he has held for several years last past, and thus it is with pleasure to myself as I am sure it must be to all the members of the Bar and to the Bench, and to the community in general, to see that there has been recognized in this appointment of Mr. Peterson to this position the principle of promotion; and I am sure that all of his friends and all of those who have watched his career in the subordinate office of Attorney-General for the last few years will concede that the promotion has been well earned and that he has demonstrated an undeniable capacity for the position to which he has now been promoted. I do not propose to extend my remarks further, Your Honors, unless it be to say that in taking my own personal, or rather official leave of the Court, having been retired from the office after an incumbency of nearly three years, I desire to express to the Court my sense of gratitude and gratification that our relations have been as pleasant as they have been, and to express the hope that in my relations as a private practitioner before the Court there will be no diminution of that degree of cordiality which has previously existed.

Mr. Peterson said--May it please the Court, I would like to present my commission to the Court and say that it has pleased His Majesty to commission me as Attorney-General of the Kingdom. The Court, per Chief Justice Judd--Mr. Peterson, we receive you, or welcome you rather, to your new position with entire cordiality, and in behalf of the Court I would like to take the opportunity of making a few observations. The Attorney-General in the Legislature is in one sense the mouthpiece of the Court. The Court has no place in the Legislature of the Kingdom, and the interest of the Department as regards appropriations of money naturally would throw upon the Attorney-General the care and the duty of seeing that they are adequately provided for, and we look to you, Mr. Attorney-General, that the recommendations that are made in the report, if they are deemed wise, shall be made by the Legislature; and we look to you also as regards the Practice Acts which may be introduced from time to time, to see that they shall conform to the enlarged and liberal spirit of the present age. We also wish to say, that it is always a matter of great gratification to find that the Crown cases that are presented to the Court from time to time, either civil or criminal, have the advocacy and the personal efforts of the Attorney-General. It needs only to be said that the interests of all persons are better subserved by the personal attention of the head of the Department. Not only does the Attorney-General carry more influence with the jury than any deputy could possibly carry, but it ensures a more responsible and faithful presentation of the side of the Government in whatever case or whatever character may be brought for trial. And I wish to say further that naturally Judges see defects in the operation of our system, and we think that there could be some very wide and substantial improvements made, more especially in the previous preparation of cases for trial on Circuit. The funds which the Legislature has placed at the disposition of the presiding Justices for the expenses of the Terms of Circuit Courts and of the witnesses in criminal cases being dispensed by the Court, the law officer, that is, the Attorney-General's Department, does not feel so much the responsibility of keeping expenses down as the Court does. Now if there could be more consultation in advance with the local officers, the Sheriffs and the Deputy Sheriffs, so that cases that are unworthy of trial should be suppressed before the Circuit commences and cases that are to be tried more carefully prepared in advance of the term of the Court, we think not only the interests of justice would be better subserved, but large amounts of money saved the public treasury. We welcome you to your new position, Mr. Peterson, with satisfaction because you have acted for so many years as the Deputy Attorney-General and have attended so many of the Circuits of the Court. Each one of us has confidence in your ability and in your fidelity and in your patriotism, and therefore we expect and feel sure that your future career in this advanced position will be not only a credit to yourself, but will result in

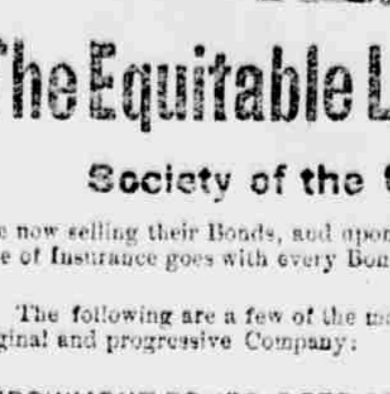

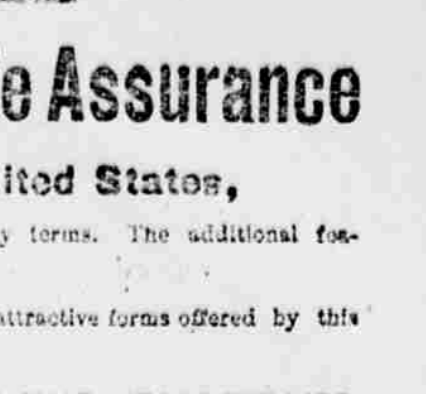

THE HILO COURT. May Term of Third Circuit. SEVENTH DAY. THURSDAY, MAY 13. AFTERNOON SESSION. GEO. HANBY, sworn—I live at Hoookaa, have lived there 35 or 36 years; know John Richmond, have known him about two years; know defendants; have heard Richmond use threatening language about defendants, it was when he was apprehended for stealing a watch; I was working for R. M. Overend at the time; Richmond used to go to prison every night, and in the morning go to work for Overend; one morning he said he was innocent of stealing the watch; he said he would be square with that "God damn Irish son of a bitch," and he said he would be square with the rest of them; I asked him one morning who he meant by those other "sons of bitches," and he said Blabon and Steele; Richmond would rather lie for nothing than tell the truth and be paid for it; I would not believe him under oath; know Lala, do not know his general reputation for truth and veracity. Cross-examined by Mr. Neumann—Richmond mentioned Steele's name in connection with his prosecution for stealing the watch; asked him what Steele had to do with it, and he didn't tell me; never knew Richmond and Steele to have any quarrel; remember these matters so well because I am well acquainted with them; have never spoken to anybody before about the evidence I have given now; don't know why I was subpoenaed. NAKIPU, sworn—I live at Hoookaa; have known Lala 12 years; about half the natives have no reliance on him for telling the truth; sometimes hear them talk about him, have heard his character discussed for some years; from his reputation I would not believe him on oath. Cross-examined by Mr. Neumann—Am a plantation constable; my reason for saying I would not believe Lala is because he has taken oaths to me and broken his promises under them; I did not swear him on the Bible, but he promised to break a horse for me, and he didn't do it; I gave him money for breaking the horse, and he never gave me back the money; I gave him five dollars; my boss gave me a mule to break in but I couldn't ride it, and I gave it to Lala to break it in, and my boss asked me where the mule was, and I told him Lala had it for breaking, and the mule got into a pound, and Mills asked if that wasn't the mule, and Lala said it was but he couldn't let it out of the pound without the payment of twenty dollars; have heard people in a crowd say Lala was not truthful, don't think I could remember any of their names; know Mills a great many years, we are not friends, I sometimes got things at Mills but not in my name, because I could not leave my work to go myself. Re-direct in answer to Mr. Hatch—There is nothing further to say about the horse; he promised he would bring me back the horse; I went after the horse but he never gave it back to this day. I have heard the horse is dead; went after the horse because I heard the horse was going to be sold. JOHN SHANE, sworn—Live at Kukui, work for J. M. Horner as a luna; knew John Richmond a little over two months, I think March and April two years ago; I was living at Horner's a couple of months first; think he was there a little over two months. Q.—Well, during the time that he was there did he make and establish for himself a reputation for truth and veracity? Mr. Neumann—I object to that mode of questioning. The witness—That's all right. Mr. Neumann—I am not objecting to you, sir; I am objecting to the counsel's question. The counsel asks the witness did Richmond establish a reputation for truth and veracity. (The witness, first looking at one counsel, then at the other, next at the Court, then addressing Mr. Neumann)—Who am I to answer, you or him? Mr. Neumann—I am not objecting to you, wait one moment with your answer. Mr. Davidson—Do you know the reputation of John Richmond at the place you speak of, where you are employed, for truth and veracity? A.—Yes, I know that (addressing Mr. Neumann)—Am I to answer that, Mister? Q.—What was his reputation? A.—Well, certainly for a liar, nobody believed anything he said. Q.—Would you believe him under oath? A.—No, sir, I wouldn't believe nothing of the kind—believe him! of course I wouldn't believe him, he is a liar, why should I believe a liar? Cross-examined by Mr. Neumann—I knew the man there two months. Q.—Is that all the knowledge you have of him? A.—Hey? I heard more about him in Hoookaa; I didn't speak very much about John Richmond; I spoke to Mr. Blabon and Williams about a watch that he had stolen. Mr. Blabon is the only man I spoke to about his veracity, spoke to him (Blabon) once about it; I spoke to a man named Murphy about his veracity.

Q.—Who is Murphy? A.—He is in Hoookaa, he is in Waimanalo—you know him, Mr. Creighton (laughter); Mr. Creighton knows him. Mr. Neumann—Of course Mr. Creighton knows him. How did Mr. Creighton know him, since he has prosecuting attorney? (Laughter). A.—Oh, nothing very bad; Murphy and me was two luns on the same plantation and so of course we were together; he heard what I said and we talked it together on the road. Q.—Is there anybody else with whom you spoke? A.—There is not, only those two just. Q.—On what those two told you and from his being there two months you swear you would not believe him under oath? A.—Of course I would not believe him, of course I would not. Richmond has spoken to me many times. Q.—Has Richmond ever lied to you? A.—He never told me the truth. Q.—Did he ever lie to you? A.—Certainly he lied to me all the time, sure he never told me the truth. Q.—Tell me what he told you? A.—Well he never told me any truth, so what am I to tell you? Everything he told me was a lie. Q.—Tell me what he told you that was a lie? A.—He lied all the time. Q.—Tell me what he told you? A.—I paid no attention to what he said, because a liar I don't believe. Q.—You are a very smart and witty fellow? A.—No I ain't. Q.—You say you don't believe the man under oath. State the instance where he told you a lie? A.—Yes I will. Now then there do you suppose a liar is talking to me and suppose 10 or 20 is sitting around there and he is spouting all his lies and when he is through I don't know what he has said, I know he is a damn fine talker that is all. Q.—How do you know he is a liar if you paid no attention to him? A.—I know. Q.—Do you know what a liar is? A.—Look at here since he left New York. Q.—Who? A.—Richmond, if he knows every man and shop and all the places where he says he was and has worked for every man that he says he did from New York to here he would be four hundred years old (laughter); why should I believe such a man? Q.—State to this jury in what instance he ever made a statement to you in which you found him to be a liar? A.—I will, I will, I will. He told me that Mr. Albert Horner, going one night—it is no matter where we was going—we were walking together, and I asked him for no news, I didn't want none of his, I didn't want a liar's news. When a man is telling lies it is easy to say yes or no to him, and I said yes or no going along; he told me that he had \$35 or \$40 a month for tanning which I know was a lie because no man gets \$35 or \$40 a month for tanning; you know it is as easy for a man to say yes as to say no, but some people wants to be contrary all the time and they can't. Then he told me that in the blacksmith shop he was getting five dollars a day, of all I said yes that is very good Jack, Jack supposed I believed everything that he was telling me. I supposed he was to be called four days a week, he was not called there two days a month, so I knew that he wasn't getting more than two dollars a day, and then there was a better man nor him. I have no better recollection than that. Q.—Is that your best recollection? A.—Yes; there is one thing but I won't tell you. Q.—Why? A.—I won't answer you that. Q.—You will. A.—You can't make me. Q.—How will it be if I ask the Court to tell you to answer? A.—Oh, well—[witness hangs his head and shifts about uneasily.] Q.—Why? A.—I could not tell the reasons. Q.—Why can't you, are there none? A.—It would not make any difference whether I did. Q.—It might? A.—I am no informer, I am beyond informing business; that would push in on informing business and I am no informer. He had a certain reason for that. Q.—Oh, you ain't an informer. Mr. Shane, have you never informed on anybody in your life? A.—No, sir, and I hope I never will. Q.—Have you never been prosecuting witness in a case? A.—Never. I never took an oath till two years ago in Hoookaa. What time? A.—A fellow got into a fight and he called me to prove he was not guilty, which he was guilty. The fellow got clear. Q.—They didn't believe you in that? A.—No; I didn't care if they believed me or didn't believe me. C. B. FISHER, sworn—I had charge of a store at Paunalo and at Hoookaa, have lived in the district nearly four years; knew John Richmond, he was a teamster on Kukui plantation; I know his reputation for truth and veracity; it was bad; I would not believe him on oath. Cross-examined by Mr. Neumann—I gained knowledge of Richmond's reputation from personal knowledge and from others; from Joseph Horner, Robert Horner, Shane, Murphy, and J. M. Horner; they spoke of him as a man, about his stealing of a watch. (Witness by request relates instances of lying by Richmond.) I have no respect for a man who lies like Richmond, but I hope I don't hate anybody; he owned an account at the store, we got our money from Mr. Overend. JOS. MARSDEN was called. Mr. Creighton objected to the witness being sworn. Mr. Davidson explained that when he said early in the trial that he did not expect to call Mr. Marsden, and on the strength of that statement the witness was permitted to remain in the room, he really did not intend to call him. The point he wished to examine him on did not relate to any evidence thus far produced. Mr. Marsden, sworn—The height of the telephone pole is about 15 feet, the length of the arm is between 3 and 4 feet; there are six wires on it; (shown rope) I tried to throw a rope over the arm of the pole, a smaller rope than this one; I tried several times and from different positions but could not throw the rope over, must have tried fifteen times. Q.—Could you throw the frayed end of that rope over the arm of the pole? Mr. Neumann objects. Mr. Creighton claims that witness should make it known whether he is an expert at throwing rope. Witness says he is clever at rope-throwing and lassos horses for pleasure, and is allowed to answer—I think it would be very difficult to throw this rope's end over; this rope would be harder to throw over than a smaller one because it will not coil so readily; do not think another man could do it, it would not be impossible; know that Mr. de la Nux threw a line over, but it was only a very small one, like a clothes line. Mrs. JOS. R. MILLS, sworn—Was at home at Hoookaa last October; knew a man named Lala; he came in one evening and asked if Mr. Mills would lend him \$15; I told him I would speak to Mr. Mills; Mr. Mills gave him the money; he returned it to me next day; I told Hart I put the money on Mr. Mills' desk; I heard about the hanging of Goto; the night of the 28th I was home writing letters, it was about 7 o'clock; Mr. Conrad came there that evening; came to settle up an account; was there till about half-past eight; Steele came that evening; he asked for Mr. Holmes, and asked for small change; has been in habit of getting change at the store for paying off hands; Steele spoke to me before leaving, asked why I didn't get a type-writer. (Cap and clock shown and identified.) I wore that clock working in the garden, used it in October, got mud on it while gardening; after Steele left Mr. Mills closed the store and went inside; I finished my letters; we sat reading from nine to ten o'clock, then went to bed; we slept in the same room; I was not feeling well and was restless, making me be up and down all night; Mr. Mills was home with me all night; next time he left house was in the morning between five and six o'clock; am sure he was not out of the house that night. Cross-examined by Mr. Peterson—Am positive Mr. Mills did not leave the house that night; don't remember him going out at all that day; am sure he was in the store after supper; up to nine o'clock he was in the office, I was in the store; Steele was there between eight and nine; he bought a package of tobacco and went out; he and Mr. Mills stood at the door talking; first heard of this murder on Tuesday morning, saw Lala passing that day; did not have conversation with Lala on the day after the murder; did not call out to him that evening and ask if he was going maaka; did not tell him that I wanted to see a woman named Kapiko; did not tell him I wanted to see the woman to find out if my husband was in pillika; did not say my husband had not come home till 3 o'clock that morning; know the woman Kapiko, she is Lala's sister; know the woman Poppo, did not see her Saturday, Nov. 2; did not ask her services as a kahuna to find out who set fire to the cane; can't remember whether I saw her that week; did not ask her to see if she could find out who would be implicated in the murder of the Jap; did not tell her on the Saturday to find out who killed the Japanese; do not recollect her coming on the following Tuesday to get a Bible; did not tell her that my husband had not come home till 3 o'clock, that he was talking the evening before the murder with Steele and Blabon, or that he left me that night at ten o'clock; do not recollect her coming the next day after the second visit, or my asking if she found out anything, or her saying it was my husband, or my asking her which husband, or my asking her if Mr. Overend was one of the foreigners who helped him. (Objected to, objection overruled, and exceptions noted.) Poppo did not tell me the verses of the Bible, or that God told her who did it, or that the whole matter would be out in seven days; I did not pay her three dollars, have not seen Poppo since coming to Hilo, do not know where she is staying here, arrived here Tuesday night of last week, did not tell her not to say anything about my husband not coming home till 3 o'clock in the morning, or I would have Judge Davidson get her arrested for perjury. At 3:10 the counsel for the defense was granted opportunity to hold a conference with defendants. Mr. Hatch, after recess, said the defense had nothing further to offer except the records, and would prefer to leave them till the morning.

JUDGE LYMAN, previously sworn: I conducted the preliminary examination of these defendants; these are my notes. Reads Uyenaka's evidence, which said the two horses passed between ten and eleven o'clock, 60 feet from where witness named was. Also, reads evidence of John Richmond, which contained the following: "Mr. Mills sent me after a rope, told me to get it at foot of telephone pole; I went and got it; Mills then raised the Jap's head and put noose round the neck; the rope was thrown over the arm of the telephone pole and the body was pulled up." Also, reads Uyenaka's testimony, which spoke of horses passing at 8:30. Mr. Hatch offers bond on which Lala was detained, also, warrant for arrest of John Richmond for murder; also, Judge Lyman's record of preliminary examination of Richmond, showing his being *nolle prosequi* on appearing as a witness against J. R. Mills and others; also warrants for arrest of defendants. The prosecution rests at 4:05 p.m. REBUTAL. DEPUTY SHERIFF LYMAN.—Have experimented in throwing a rope over telephone pole bar at Hoookaa; the rope was not so large as this one; succeeded in getting it over after two or three trials; next day put it over between narrow wires on first trial; again threw it over twice in succession, in the same place that the Japanese was hung; Mr. de la Nux threw a rope half this size over; that rope in the picture is the one I threw over; I threw it over for the picture. Cross-examined by Mr. Davidson—I don't know where the rope is that I threw over; didn't throw the one that hung Goto because it was in Hilo; the wires were the same as the day of the murder; there was no weight to the end of the rope; these efforts were all made in the daytime. CAPT. STEVENS.—I took that photograph myself; that rope was thrown over by Mr. Lyman; he tried twice or three times, and then I tried, and failed, then Mr. Lyman put it over on a second attempt. Cross-examined by Mr. Davidson—I tried till my arm was tired, nine or ten times; was accustomed to throw ropes, having been master of a towboat; rope was not as stiff as this one; consider a man would have more difficulty in throwing the rope at night. LALA—On afternoon after body of Japanese was found I saw Mrs. Mills; was going to Kamoli and Mrs. Mills saw and called me; she asked me if I was going up and to ask Mrs. Kapiko to come to see her; she asked me if her husband was in that trouble, and I told her he was in that work; she said: I think I know he is in it; my husband came back at three o'clock, and I spoke to him and he said nothing, I saw my husband talking with two white men in a low voice that night, the overseer and teamster, and then they all went together. PALAU, sworn—Am a mail carrier, last Tuesday evening was at my house, a white woman came to my house that night, she was on horseback, she didn't get off the horse, Palau who accompanied her asked for "mamama," meaning Palau's wife Kapiko, I went after Kapiko who lives in one side of my house, a woman named Kopo went out to see the white woman. Cross-examined by Mr. Davidson—It was between eight and nine o'clock if I am not mistaken; Kapiko came here from Hamakua on account of her brother Lala, don't know whether she is a kahuna; Kopo is also from Hamakua, have heard of her as a kahuna; these people are my friends, they do not pay for staying with me; they just arrived together from Hamakua. At 4:54 the Court adjourned till 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.
