POST OFFICE FUND SHORT

INCIDENTALS APPROPRIATIONS EXHAUSTED.

Immense Increase of Business the Cause—Minister Damon Comes to the Rescue—Advances Money.

The incidental fund at the Post Office has run out, and were it not for a friend who has come to the rescue the consequences might be quite serious.

Appropriations in all of the departments are made for specific purposes and no warping of the law can change them. In no way can an appropriation be turned to the relief of the incidentals account.

Before leaving for Europe Mr. Damon saw that the account would run short.

The cause of the shortage is the extraordinary increase in the business of the bureau. Attorney General Cooper, acting Minister of Finance, said: "The legislature gave us all the money asked for incidentals. At the time we thought it would be enough. But business in the department since then has increased beyond any expectation."

"The situation is something no man could foresee. Had the Government any idea of such increase in business more money would have been asked for."

"The action of Mr. Damon in stepping into the breach is a mighty relief. In no way save by a private concession of this sort could the trouble be bridged. While the Government has plenty of money, there is no law by which we might get at it."

MORE SOLDIER OUTRAGES

MANY PETTY CRIMES DURING LAST NIGHT.

Soldiers on Transports Now Here Get the Best of Chinamen and Japs—The City is Tired of It.

The outrages committed by the present batch of soldiers in this city will serve to make Honolulu glad when these transports are gone. In the past forty-eight hours complaints by the score have come from every part of the city.

The assault of the Chinese storekeeper at the corner of King Street and Union Square Monday night was the first serious affair reported. A soldier bought some bananas, paid the price and then took the money away from the Chinaman.

The shoemaker near the corner of King and Konia Streets came near being robbed by two soldiers. They had demanded money, and when it was refused, grabbed their man and started to rob him.

Yesterday afternoon there was a free-for-all fight near an uptown saloon. This formed an unseemly street spectacle. Later a soldier was caught robbing a Japanese and arrested.

Marshal Brown has a corps of men that would handle the situation if there were enough of them. The trouble is that there are not half enough.

It is impossible for the present force to guard the whole town. Citizens were wondering last night why Major Mills did not tender the services of a strong provost guard on occasions like the present.

Marshals and police are being called upon to guard the streets. The subject of the appropriation of money for additional temporary police force is also being discussed.

In justice to the local troops, the Sixth Artillery, it must be added that in no trouble of any description have they behaved or been concerned in any way.

About 12 o'clock last night two soldiers went into Hart & Co.'s and drawing a revolver ordered Charles Ramsey to give them a bottle of whiskey.

SOLDIERS FINED.

Two soldiers of the Thirty-fifth Infantry pleaded guilty in the Police Court this morning to offenses in connection with last night's escapades in Chinatown. A man named Felton was charged with common nuisance and was fined \$5. Another, John Boyer, name, who attempted to rescue the former, was fined \$5 for resisting a police officer. The men paid their fines and were taken aboard their transport by a sergeant.

ASSAULTED A POLICEMAN.

Mahoney, an employe of the Honolulu Iron Works, was yesterday afternoon fifteen days on the roof for assault and battery on Officer Frank Ferriera. The policeman had a man under arrest when Mahoney appeared and took the officer by the arm. Other policeman arrived and landed the second man in the cooler.

CHINAMEN TRY TO GET IN

IMMIGRATION INSPECTORS' WORK INCREASING.

Twenty-four Asiatics Ordered Back To The Orient On The Vessel That Brought Them Here.

During the past month twenty-four Asiatics have been refused entrance to the country by the immigration office at the custom house. All had affidavits declaring their right to land here.

Since the islands were annexed to the United States the desire of Chinese to get a landing here has increased, as it is thought that a footing here in the end means freedom to go to America.

Every Chinese or Japanese who wants to land has affidavits of the nature and sanctity of an oath given to a white man, and he swears to whatever is necessary with a cheerful abandon.

Inspector Shurt, who has left a customs inspectorship to become inspector of Chinese at the local bureau of immigration, stated last night that the office was having an unusually busy time and that a further rush of work was expected.

IMPORTANT PAPERS GONE

A NEW SNAG IN THE TRAMWAYS CASE.

Charter and Transfer Documents of Hawaiian Tramways Company Fetched From Interior Office.

There is considerable confusion, if not consternation, at the complete loss from the Interior Office, of all the charter papers of the Hawaiian Tramways Company.

A number of witnesses, have been called. Among them has been George H. Smith, who was a clerk in the Interior Office at the time the papers were lost.

The situation today is the same, in a way. Of course the company has a charter, which may convince the courts as to the filing of the documents referred to. Just how the papers were lost, however, is not clear.

STILL TALKING MINISTER

PUBLIC DEMANDS FILLING OF VACANCY.

Rush of Work in Interior Office Makes It Necessary That a Minister Be Supplied at Once.

The importance of an immediate appointment to fill the vacancy in the Interior Office caused by the death of Minister King, is still the subject of much discussion about town and in business circles.

The amount of business actually requiring the attention of a minister is enormous. Under the department is the bureau of public works, water works, road board, bureau of agriculture and fire department.

This week there are a number of things requiring the attention of a minister. Only yesterday bids were opened for a section of road on Hawaii.

The opinion about town that President Dole has the power to make an appointment and should do so at once seems to be general.

Attorney-General Cooper stated that the appointment would be made by Mr. Dole, as soon as the proper time arrived.

VEGETABLE FAMINE NOW.

Serious Shortage in All Lines in Town.

It is probably not generally known that a fruit and vegetable famine is imminent.

The cause of the shortage has been the fact that there has been no increase in the supply while the demand has multiplied. The city's demand, for reasons it is impossible to explain, has doubled in the past year.

"I have orders piled up in my store, right now which I can not fill. People abuse me, ring up the telephone at all hours to know why their orders are not filled and come to the store in carriages."

"Three days ago I received an order from the Rio de Janeiro for 2,000 head of cabbage. I replied that I could not fill the order. They instructed me to get anything that looked like cabbages, went out to the Chinese gardeners and to everybody else. Some of the heads I cut were not as big as a man's fist, but they said they had to have them and they took them willingly."

"Another big order from another transport was for beef. They had to have them, they said. I told them they would be very small, and they replied that I should bring anything, roots if nothing else. I went out and got all that the order called for. Some of them were miserable little roots. I showed them to the stewards and they said they were satisfied, for they had to have something."

The trouble seems to be that the Chinese are not able to handle the market. Moneyed men are talking today of bringing down practical Italian gardeners from San Francisco. D. G. Camarinos, one of the leading fruiterers, is favorable to this scheme and thinks he can supply the gardeners if the land can be procured.

A MAJOR IN DISGRACE

HE RESIGNS TO AVOID A COURT MARTIAL.

Trouble of An Army Officer on the Rio de Janeiro Said To Be Due to Too Much Celebration.

The Thirty-fifth Infantry left port this morning with one of its majors, J. C. Schulte, in his quarters in disgrace, as a result, it is stated, of too free indulgence in intoxicants. A court-martial is threatened to try the major for his alleged offense against the rules of the service.

Major Schulte is one of the best soldiers in the service and for that reason it is thought that he will escape severe punishment. He was the surgeon-in-charge of the vessel and for a time while in port here his place was taken, on Colonel Plummer's order, by Lieutenant Fry, Acting Assistant Surgeon.

Major Schulte has served in the English army in various capacities and different countries, and is recognized by all his fellow officers as a valuable soldier.

This morning the major is said to have been doing guard duty as a private on the Pacific Mail wharf, before the departure of the Rio. The officers on board were decidedly reticent in speaking about the action taken in his case, but the major is declared to have handed in his resignation rather than run the risk of a court-martial.

If President McKinley accepts the resignation all will be well, otherwise, the officers state, there must be a trial.

Major Schulte's difficulties began the first day of his arrival in Honolulu. Late at night he is said to have been brought to the steamer on a stretcher and it was this that led to the order sending him to his quarters. The major's wife is now on her way to join him at Manila.

TO CLOSE FOR REPAIRS.

The Orpheum will be closed for repairs after tonight's performance. New and comfortable seats will be placed on board, and the stage enlarged and improved. Work will be rushed to completion, night and day. The management will endeavor to have everything in readiness by the arrival of the Australia, on which a new company of actors will arrive. A good time is promised this evening as a fine closing program has been arranged.

MEMORIAL TO DR. HYDE.
Resolutions Adopted by the Trustees of Oahu College.

Hyde has, after months of suffering, been taken away from the scene of his earthly activities, and thereby Oahu College has been deprived of an able and efficient trustee, therefore it is Resolved, that the trustees of Oahu College hereby express their deep and heartfelt sympathy with the bereaved family, whose greater loss is shared in a lesser degree only, by this entire community.

In his death all good causes have lost an efficient and conscientious helper. His talents and rare executive capacity were ever and freely at the service of educational, religious and social progress. His kindly voice and helping hand never failed when others needed a calm faith in God, a clear and discriminating judgment to untangle the intricate web which often made living weariness.
Oahu College has lost one of its most faithful and willing servants. His aid and advice will be painfully missed in the important developments of the near future. But his example and the memory of his long and kindly service will not be lost.

KOHALA IRRIGATION.
R. R. Hinds, manager of the Hawi plantation, Kohala, has practically demonstrated the feasibility of irrigating Kohala cane lands by pumping from wells. Just now Mr. Hinds is irrigating 500 acres with water obtained from a well only ninety-nine feet deep, using a pump with a capacity of 750,000 gallons per day. He has ordered another pump with double this capacity. In Kohala they have a shaft down 150 feet and they expect to raise and irrigate 600 acres of cane land.—Hawaii Herald.

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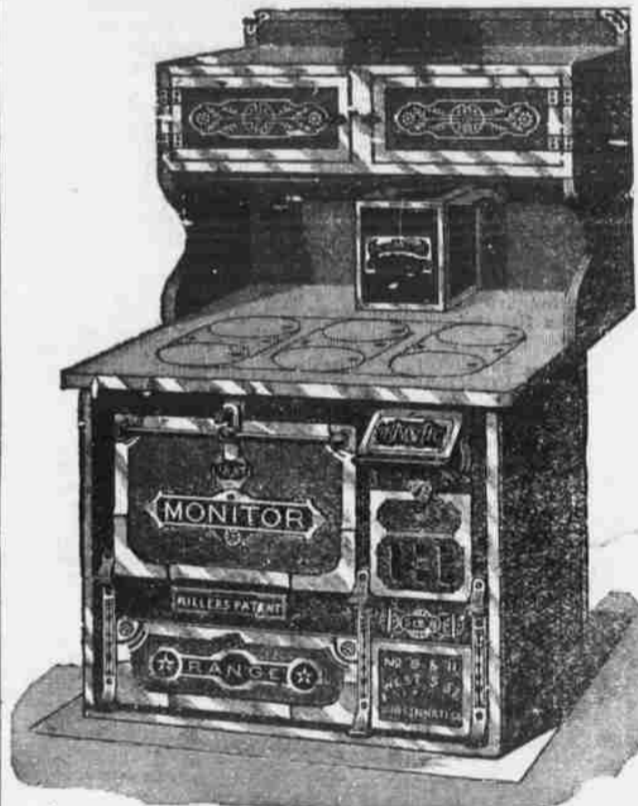

THE VOICE THAT FAILED

THE MAN WHO HAD A KICK THAT HE DIDN'T KICK.

Was On the Wrong Side of the Road and Wanted to Justify It But Did Not.

EDITOR STAR: I am glad the subject of the "Right of the Road" is arousing interest. With streets as narrow as those of Honolulu, street intersections at acute angles as some of them, and heavy tropical foliage obstructing the view, the general safety of all who use the road requires a strict observance of the rule to keep to the right.

A day or two ago three of us were riding in on King street on our wheels. I was a few feet in advance of the others nearest the car track. We saw a buggy coming toward us on our side of the road. As we were on the right side of the road and it was on the wrong, we supposed, as we had a right to, that it would turn out. Conversing with my companions I paid little attention to it, until I found myself right in front of the buggy, which was still on the wrong side of the road, and I was barely able to turn out in time to save myself from an accident. The driver of the buggy at once commenced shouting to me, his tone and manner indicating that he held me responsible though I could not hear his words. I at once dismounted and indicated that I was ready to hear what he had to say on the subject. But as soon as I did his voice seemed to fail him and he whipped up his horse and drove on. I don't know his name, but I know his face, and the next time I see him I am going to ask him what he wanted to say to me, and didn't.

MONTH'S METEOROLOGY.

What Thermometer and Barometer Showed During September.

Temperature, mean for the month, 77.1 F.; normal, 77.3; average daily maximum, 83.5; average daily minimum, 72.9; average daily range, 10.6; greatest daily range, 15.9; least, 6.9; highest temperature, 85; lowest, 6.9.

Barometer average, 29.967; normal, 29.969 (corr. for gravity); highest, 30.09; lowest, 29.82; greatest change in 24 hours, 0.14.

Relative humidity, mean of 9 a. m. and 9 p. m., 64.5; mean dew point, 64.5; both slightly below normal; absolute moisture 6.7 grains per cubic foot.

Rainfall, 3.90 inch; normal, 2.94. Total since January 1, 17.57; this is 7.59 inches below normal.

Trade winds interrupted only one half day; cloudiness, 4.5 (tenths of sky); normal, 4.0. The artesian well level fell during the month from 34.4 feet to 34.2 feet above mean sea-level; total fall since March 1, 1.5 feet.

The rainfall in Hilo and Puna, Hawaii, has been about 50 per cent of the normal for September. In Kohala, Waimea, the upper levels of Hamakua and in Kona, about the normal amount.

In lower Hamakua and Kau, also on Maui, Oahu and Kauai, about 40 per cent of the normal.

The rain periods for the month were on the 12th and 22d.

Rapid Transit seems now to be altogether in the courts where it is a hoary proverb that things move slow.

If the attempt made the other night to injure or destroy the Kinaiu is merely a practical joke, where does jocularity end and criminality begin.

It looks like the long drought was at an end. More rain has fallen in the past twenty-four hours than in a like period since March 12th. With the artesian well level a foot and a half lower than at the first of the year, rain is not only dollars, but great relief.

A strong provost guard from the local garrison when transports are in the harbor would largely prevent those outrages large and small which are inevitable when large bodies of troops are passing through any community. With these outrages eliminated there would be no strain on the welcome which Honolulu has always given the American soldier and of which the American soldier as a rule is worthy of.

The way the big piles of army coal scattered along the water front have melted away is graphic evidence of the big fleet of transports Uncle Sam has on the Pacific Ocean. Incidentally, too, it is proof of the importance of these islands to the United States. Without them for a naval and coaling base operations in the Philippines would be much more difficult than they are.

With less than three months of the biennial period, for which appropriations were made, remaining, and lots of public work still to be done, there is a splendid opportunity for the Government to serve the country well by selecting the highest capacity for the head of the Interior department. There is also a splendid opportunity for some man with that capacity to serve the country well by accepting the office with its uncertainties and giving the public the benefit of his capacity.

A statistical paper lately published gives the number of chickens marketed in the United States last year as 3,350,000,000, and of eggs, 12,000,000,000. The total value of the chicken crop is given as \$220,000,000. The value of the tobacco crop was \$12,000,000; of the potato crop \$80,000,000; of the barley crop \$30,000,000; and of the oat crop \$200,000,000. The output of pig iron amounts annually to about \$130,000,000, and of coal to \$200,000,000. This would seem to prove the adage that "eggs are eggs," and the importance of the hen. With the mongoose exterminated, poultry might rival sugar in these islands.

Much interest is being aroused in the subject of the law of the road. Wheelmen especially are becoming interested in it as, while having equal rights on the road with other vehicles, bicycles are not built to enforce those rights by their weight. As a correspondent points out it is especially necessary that the law of the road should be observed here where streets are narrow, street intersections at acute angles and the view often obstructed by foliage. But while bicycle riders should be the most interested in the observance of the law of the road, not all of them do observe it. Some of them are as great sinners in this respect as teamsters and others, but without the selfish warrant for it teamsters have in the probability that in case of accident it will be the other fellow's vehicle that is damaged. Marshal Brown and the hack inspector are in thorough sympathy with the movement to enforce the law of the road, and have promised co-operation in all efforts in that direction.

Something over 50,000 troops have passed through Honolulu. They all stopped here from two days to a week. That there has been some friction and some clashes between the civil and military authorities is not surprising. That there have not been more it can be fairly stated, has been due to the good temper and forbearance of the police, rather than to those qualities in the military officers. But the civil authorities have some rights which they cannot legally surrender, because duties are attached to them. There can be no justification of the action of the military officers on the city of Para refusing to allow a police officer to come aboard to serve process. The merits of the controversy which led to the issuance of the process has nothing to do with the case. Other versions of that controversy than the one given by the hackman interested, fully justify the officers concerned, even in the physical force they used, to the average man. But because they were in the right of that, if they were is all the more reason why there should have been no interference with the police afterward. The treatment

of Captain Parker when he went to the City of Para with a warrant is a matter of sufficient importance to be brought to the attention of the War Department.

A FRIGHTENED HACK HORSE

MAKES SPEED HE NEVER MADE BEFORE.

Lands On His Side Under A Plate Glass Window—Causes Wonder That He Didn't Break It.

A runaway which included several remarkable escapes from injury and damage, occurred just at 11 o'clock this morning. A horse attached to a hack was left by Robert Harrison in charge of a boy at the hack stand on Merchant street nearly opposite the building lately occupied by the Woman's Exchange. A mounted soldier came galloping along from the direction of the Judiciary building. The clatter of the galloping horse in the mud scared the hack animal and he started to run. The suddenness with which he started snapped the whiffle-tree in two, broke the strap that held the breeching, and left the horse free of the hack, scarcely moving the vehicle from the position it had occupied. The animal, thoroughly frightened ran at full speed toward Fort street. He tried to turn makai, but his momentum and the slippery street carried him on to the stone sidewalk on the Fort street side of the Honolulu Tobacco company's store. As he struck the stone flagging his feet flew from under him, landing the animal on his side on the sidewalk just under the big panes of heavy plate glass forming the show windows. He was crowded up so close that he could not struggle. A mounted policeman assisted by by-standers took him head and tail and pulled him out so that he could get up. This corner is a usually crowded one and the wonder is that no one was hurt. Another wonder is that the plate glass window of the tobacco store was not smashed. The mark of the horse's shoes are on the stone sidewalk and on the window sash within an inch of the glass.

SCALDED TO DEATH.

Ah Dip, a small Chinese girl, 8 years of age, was scalded to death on Saturday. An investigation has been made and the facts appear to be these: An older sister of the child was going up the narrow stairs of the house with a bucket of hot water. Near the top she was run into by the victim of the accident. The water spilled all over the child's breast and stomach and she died in great agony.

'STAR SPANGLED BANNER'
FAREWELL TO SOLDIERS OF THE
THIRTY-FIFTH.

The Rio and Sikh Ordered to Keep in
Sight of One Another From Here to
Manila.

The Rio de Janeiro and Sikh, two
transports carrying the Thirty-fifth In-
fantry, left together this morning for
Manila. The former had orders to keep
the Sikh in sight all the way from Hon-
olulu to the Philippines and she wait-
ed after she was ready for sailing until
the Sikh was in the channel, before cut-
ting loose from the wharf. The Sikh is
a much slower boat than the Rio, hav-
ing been beaten by a day and a half in
the trip down from Portland, so that
the Rio has a slow job in keeping in
sight of the Sikh. The reason for the
order is that the Sikh is regarded as a
not very safe vessel in far Eastern wa-
ters, as she stands very high out of the
water and as the two have troops of
the same regiment no advantage would
be gained by the Rio arriving ahead of
the other.

The Rio had a send-off this morning
that exceeded any given to a transport
here for some time. Her officers made
many friends on shore and there was
a larger crowd on the dock. The Ha-
waiian band played for two hours, while
the Sikh was getting ready to go, the
boys on the Rio cheering each number
with enthusiasm. At the last moment
a provost guard arrived with the two
watermen who had been arrested the
night before. Marshal Brown had re-
fused to release them without a trial
and they were fined \$5 and \$6 by Judge
Wilcox. Captain Robertson of their
company paid the fines.

As the Rio left the dock the band
struck up the Star Spangled Banner.
Instantly every hat was off on the ves-
sel. As she slowly drifted from the
wharf hats remained off, from the deck
where Colonel Plummer and Captain
Ward stood, to the lower decks crowded
with privates. The vessel was a beau-
tiful picture as she slowly moved away,
with nearly a thousand men standing
at attention with their hats off, while
the band gave them the great national
song as a farewell. The Sikh was al-
ready outside of the channel and the
Rio soon got up speed to start after
her and stay by her through the long
journey.

LOVE LED HER TO DEATH

AN INDIAN TRADITION OF THE ADIRONDACKS.

A Place Where Moose and Deer Seek Mineral Waters to Cure Their Ills—Other Traditions.

There is a tradition in the neighborhood of Massena Springs, which the Indians called Kan-awa-stak-ema on Raquette river, in the Adirondack region, that deer, moose and other native animals were wont to use the waters for medicinal purposes. The early surveyors have recorded that when a copious volume of clear, cold water was thrown up, strongly charged with sulphur, the earth around there would be trodden into a mire hole by deer and moose, which frequented the spot on account of the saline qualities of the water. The Indians, too, used the waters as a curative for various ills.

The Indians called Moose river Te-kakun-dan-do, which means "clearing an opening." It is in the Moose river region that the noted Old Forge settlement lies. There is a belief, handed down from generation to generation, that the first forge established by the hand of a white man in the North woods was located here more than a century ago. An old anvil and piece of scrap iron which are imbedded in the lawn in front of the Forge House are today pointed out to the inquiring tourist as the sole remnants of the original and primitive forge.

Kushuaga, which is Indian for "beautiful resting place," has a romantic tradition. Here is the original deer track along which a beautiful Indian maiden followed her darling lover to death. There is an interesting haziness in the tradition as to what the darling lover was doing when summoned to the happy hunting grounds, but there is no doubt as to the existence of the romantic deer track or of the silvery lake or of the moss covered stone on which the beautiful Indian maiden sat and mourned and starved her life away. Near Lake Kushuaga is On-ohi-o-ta, the Indian name for "rainbow," and Rainbow lake is not far away.

Natural Bridges is a picturesque place situated on Indian river (Indian, Ojocquack, "Nut river,"), which runs under the ground in two different places and emerges a few rods below, forming a natural bridge 6 feet above the water and 15 feet wide, a curiosity of considerable interest. Dr. W. Seward Webb has located his extensive Ne-ha-sa-ne park in the Beaver river region, the name Ne-ha-sa-ne being the Indian term for "beaver crossing on a log."—New York Times.

MISSIONARY PRIESTS COMING.

They will Labor in the Islands of the Pacific.

Three missionary fathers, members of the Order of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary, familiarly known as Picpus friars, from the fact that the mother house of the order is situated on Picpus street in Paris, and in San Francisco at present as guests of the Marist Fathers. Father Jean, the oldest of the missionary priests, spent twelve or thirteen years laboring in the missionary fields of the Marquesas islands. He is resting after years of labor. He will leave for the Hawaiian islands on the Tropic Bird, and will there renew his religious work.

The other clergymen, Father Noailles and Father Amadee, who will sail by the same vessel, are to go to the Marquesas islands. They are young men just ordained for the missions of the South Pacific islands.

SOLDIERS GET ASHORE.

About a dozen soldiers got away from the transport Valencia at Irmgard wharf yesterday morning by climbing down a rope to the schooner Ada, which lay alongside.

"A SOUTHERN GENTLEMAN"

MR. CLEMENT IN HIS FAVORITE PLAY.

Written By Him—Is Faithfully Interpreted By Himself and Company at the Hawaiian Opera House.

"A Southern Gentleman," a play written by Clay Clement, was the bill at the Hawaiian Opera House last evening. This is a drama, with a tinge of what may be called the heroic and a thread of humor. It is well written faithfully portraying certain phases of Southern life, the main feature being the interpretation of the Southern gentleman.

The play begins with a prologue, showing a duel between a Confederate officer and a citizen on the banks of the Mississippi in which the former is killed. This, of course, is an affair of honor. The incident becomes the base of happenings twenty-two years later, for the successful duelist becomes engaged to the beautiful daughter of his victim. She discovers through a Captain O'Malley this bit of history and immediately scorns her father's suitor, and gives her hand to General Joseph Carrol, the Southern gentleman, who is old in years but young in heart and spirit.

The really superb feature of the play is the portrayal of staunch, honest, courageous character, Mr. Clement had the title role and certainly did good work. His interpretation was undoubtedly his own ideas, as felt when writing the play, and was immensely satisfactory to the audience. Mrs. Clay Clement, as "Arzella Thompson," daughter of the Confederacy, was very clever, and Miss Bertha Foltz was an excellent "Grace Standish." Miss Margaret Marshall, as the dignified "Mrs. Sterling" was in her element. It is thought that she did some of her very best work. Mr. Lonsdale was satisfactory as "Mr. Durant" and Mr. Norfleet, as "Ensign Heartwell," pleased everybody.

The scenes are laid in South Carolina, the first and second being on General Carroll's plantation, and the third on Mrs. Sterling's plantation. This is the first time the play has ever been presented here.

TAX APPEAL CASES.

In the appeal for reduction of taxes upon the lands of Niuli, Halaia and Hawaii plantations the government fared badly, the total reduction from figures made by the assessors being \$62,500, divided as follows: Niuli, \$29,000, the valuation being reduced from \$250,000 to \$220,000, Halaia reduced from \$125,000 to \$125,000, Hawaii from \$287,500 to \$225,000. In the case of Niuli it appeared from the evidence that Judge Hart, the owner had sold this place during the promoting boom for \$1,000,000, but afterwards the deal was declared off.—Hawaii Herald.

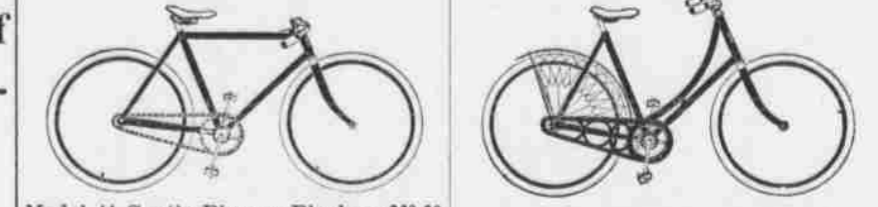
