More delay seen for ports improvement

The improvement of Saipan's seaports by the Commonwealth Ports Authority remains on a stand still, as certain financial issues still has to be addressed.

"The CPA is doing its very best to get the Saipan Harbor Improvement Project back on track...but before proceeding, certain issues regarding financing must be resolved," according to CPA's Executive Director Roman Tudela.

Tudela's remarks is in re-

sponse to an earlier communication made by Sen. Juan Torres, who told the ports authority to push through with its plan to develop the port docking facilities.

The CPA head then, sent a letter to Sen. Torres, explaining the restraints behind the delay in the project.

Tudela in his letter, provided that the CPA "would like to develop the needed facilities as soon as possible and avoid lawsuits on delays caused by prior poor planning."

The letter noted that two years has already passed since members of the Commonwealth's Legislature agreed to appropriate \$13.5 million, to be used as partial funding for the rehabilitation of the harbors.

It added that the US Congress, likewise, "saw fit" to appropriate \$10 million, to also partially fund the project. Based on earlier reports, total rehab of the port is placed at more than \$50 million.

"After considerable time was spent on developing the plans and specifications for the project,

the ports authority solicited invitation for bids in 1989, where several are received," the letter stated.

According to the letter, a continuous negotiation went on with the prospective bidders, but the CPA, "decided to reject all of the bids on the grounds that they were nonresponsive and that they deviated from the terms of the bid proposal."

"Past experiences regarding the bidding process indicated that bidders were mostly concerned regarding financing schemes, like the CPA's repayment ability and etc.," Tudela said in the response letter.

A bidder, during those days, even insisted to either have gov-

ernment or bank guarantees..." which the CPA was unable to provide due to restrictive method of bidding...we hope to avoid these pitfalls in the future," it specifies.

Due to the cancellation, the Board, with the assistance of the US Army Corps of Engineers and a consultant decided to just go on with the original plan. The letter did not specify or give details on what the 'original plan' was.

With the original plan in mind, the CPA now has to request for proposal and not invitations to bid.

According to the communi-

CUC supports sewer funding resolution, provides plans

The Commonwealth Utilities Corporation expressed its support to a recently passed Senate resolution urging the need to appropriate the bulk of the \$34 million supplemental budget for sewer improvement.

Members of the Senate passed early last week a resolution indicating that there is a need to immediately address the sewer problem that the CNMI is currently facing.

The resolution, introduced by Senator Juan S. Torres, provides that the amount of \$27 million should be spent to treat sewage deficiency.

CUC's Sewer Division Advisor Bill Hogrewe, wrote then a letter to Sen. Torres, informing him of the various sewage aspects that needs immediate

funding.

"The highest priority sewer facilities project at the CUC is currently the rehabilitation and expansion of the southwestern areasewer system..." Hogrewe's letter said.

He specified that an estimated amount of \$16 million, is needed since other places in that area still needs to be sewerred.

The money will be used, it further added, to include a study of the existing system "already overloaded and inadequate", the present and future needs of the southwestern area and the identification of alternative solutions.

It added that the design and construction of the sewage facility is already included.

His letter further said that the San Vicente-Dandan area needs 2 million gallons per day of collection system, a treatment

plant and an ocean outfall..." with its design and construction is estimated at \$18 million."

Hogrewe's communication explains that there is no existing system in the area and that "continued use of on-site sewage disposal threatens the groundwater quality of one of Saipan's most valuable aquifers."

Kagman area, according to the letter, is placed in the same situation as that of San Vicente and Dandan where the aquifer is in danger due to the "continued and expanded" utilization of the on-site sewage disposal.

The correspondence, likewise, estimated that an amount of \$18 million is needed if a 2 mgd collection system, a treatment plant, and an ocean outfall system is developed in the Laulau Bay area to treat the problem.

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Earthquake epicenter on Saipan; but rocks Guam

An earthquake, centered at 23 miles off Tinian and 18 miles off the Southern tip of the island, jolted Guam early Monday morning, Disaster Control Officer Felix Sasamoto said.

The quake, registered at 5.7 in the Richter scale was recorded at 12:16 a.m. in Saipan. In Guam, the quake was recorded with a magnitude of 5.8 at about 12:15 Monday morning.

Sasamoto said that although no reports of aftershocks have been reported to the DCO, his staff will continue to monitor any activity within the next few days.

The DCO has not yet received any calls from the public and government agencies on damages as a result of the quake.

Reports from Guam indicate that although there were no immediate reports of injuries or structural damages, several items reportedly fell off shelves.

Sasamoto said that it is "kind of strange" that people from Guam felt it while most of Saipan did not. Reports from Civil Defense personnel on Rota and Tinian indicate that the tremors were not felt there, Sasamoto said.

"I was really surprised when the Federal Emergency Management Agency informed me that the quake was really felt in Guam," Sasamoto said.

The DCO official said that it is normal for Saipan to experience tremors occasionally since the island is situated in a volcanic chain.

More than 50 tremors have been recorded by the DCO since several seismic instruments have been installed in one of the Northern islands in September last year.

Sasamoto said that Monday's tremor was not related to any seismic activity related to the Northern system.

The DCO currently has only one monitoring system that can detect any seismic activity. DCO's seismometer can detect major to mild quakes but cannot pinpoint the location of the quake. It is also not as sophisticated as those found in the Denver, Colorado or Honolulu stations.

Sasamoto said at the time the quake was recorded, Saipan's seismometer was tuned to the activities in Alamagan which is situated a 190 miles north of Saipan.

As of this time, the DCO is busy preparing a brochure that will inform the public about earthquakes and its hazards which will be used as an educational material.

"We do not have the ability to forecast when the next earthquake will occur so it will be of help if the people knew about certain things they can do in the event that one occurs here," Sasamoto said.

Hawaiian plan project boost to lure travelers

Honolulu (AP) - The state is hoping "peoplepower" will bring more people here and end the tourism slump.

State officials, the Hawaii Visitors Bureau, business and labor leaders gathered Sunday in Waikiki to announce "Project Boost," a plan designed to lure travelers to Hawaii.

The number of visitors to the islands has fallen off dramatically following the outbreak of the Persian Gulf War. Also, the future bookings are down as both Mainland and foreign travelers take a wait-and-see approach.

Travel agents have reported a 10 percent drop in bookings from the Mainland and a 19.5 percent decline from Japan for the first

four months. The loss could add to more than \$400 million.

Tourism is the state's largest industry, accounting for about \$6 billion of the state's \$20 billion economy.

The plan calls for an emergency \$1.4 million advertising campaign by the HVB to supplement the agency's \$17.6 million marketing program; a request for more emergency funding from the Legislature; and a call to residents to spread the word that visitors are welcome in Hawaii.

Most of the program already had been announced. The new facet is the request for people to make use of their personal relationships to lure visitors here for

vacations, business meetings and conferences.

It's a part of the plan that shouldn't be overlooked, according to Murray Development and Tourism.

"It's really valuable and useful in making sure the same message is being delivered at many levels," Towill said in a telephone interview. "We're trying to engage the entire community to use personal contacts. Travel to Hawaii is very welcome."

J.W.A. "Doc" Buyers, chairman of the HVB Board, said the community needs to come together to make the program work. "The visitor industry is hibernating and we need to give it a

boost," he said.

The plan also is designed to tie in to federal efforts to get foreign governments to let their people know travel plans to the U.S. shouldn't be delayed or cancelled because of the Gulf War.

"The groundwork is being laid at the national level and we're trying to tie in on a local level," Towill said.

Gov. John Waihee said he told federal officials during his recent problem, the government will be letting Iraq succeed at hurting the American economy.

While in Washington last week to attend a meeting of the nation's governors, Waihee also met with the Japanese ambassador to the

U.S., Ryohei Murata; U.S. Commerce Secretary Robert Moshbacher and Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner.

Waihee said he also helped to draft a letter sent to the nation's top 200 companies, asking them to loosen travel restrictions imposed since the war started. Waihee says if the companies permit more travel, it may set the tone for other travelers to follow.

"In Hawaii we feel that we should carry on with economic activities in spite of the war, otherwise we would in effect be held hostage by Saddam Hussein's action in the Middle East," Waihee said.

Negotiator: U.S. still be Pacific power with no soldiers in RP

Manila (AP) - The United States can remain a Pacific power without a single soldier in the Philippines, the chief U.S. negotiator said Sunday as he arrived for talks that could resolve the negotiator said Sunday as he arrived for talks that could resolve the future of U.S. bases here.

But keeping bases in the Philippines would allow the United States to continue aiding its financially troubled ally, said Richard Armitage, head of a delegation trying to work out a new agreement on the future of the U.S. installations.

A Philippine panel spokesman, Rafael Alunan, said the country doesn't want U.S. installations.

Some U.S. Congress members had suggested the United States could keep soldiers in the Philippines by

renting the facilities on a commercial basis.

Armitage made the remarks after arriving for the sixth round of talks on the future of Clark Air Base, Subic Bay naval base and four smaller facilities. Foreign Secretary Raul Manglapus, the chief Philippine negotiator, said Friday that Washington and Manila may reach an agreement during this round.

"The United States, as a Pacific power, can survive, prosper and, when faced with aggression, prevail without having to station a single soldier, airman or sailor on Philippine soil," Armitage said.

He added that the longer U.S. forces can remain at the six Philippine bases "the better we are able to provide security and economic assistance to the Philippines."

"The Philippine has the right to expect economic and military assistance from the U.S.," Armitage said. "It is neither charity nor a mere real estate transaction."

The talks are expected to resume Monday although the date has not been confirmed for security reasons.

Alunan reiterated Philippine desires to take over Clark when the current agreement expires Sept. 17 and to phase out U.S. use of Subic in no less than five years. Philippine negotiators have said they want the bases converted for commercial use.

The United States has proposed a 10 to 12 year transition to full Philippine control.

sentiment is strong.

U.S. officials claim the bases pump about \$1 billion a year into the Philippine economy through compensation, spending by the 40,000 base affiliated Americans and salaries to Filipino workers.

The continued presence of the bases has wide support among elements. Others want them closed because they believe they infringe on national sovereignty.

During the talks, which began last May, the Philippines has pressed for a guaranteed annual compensation for use of the bases, among the oldest and largest U.S. bases on foreign soil. Washington says constitutional requirements preclude any guarantees.

In 1988, the Reagan Administration agreed to seek

\$960 million in aid over two years in return for using the facilities until September 1991.

But Congress reduced overall aid figures, and the White House made cuts in Philippine aid for last fiscal year. Last month, the United States said it would increase overall aid to the Philippines by \$4 million over last fiscal year's allocation to \$473 million.

Security has been stepped up for the talks because of fears of terrorist attack by Communist rebels who oppose the U.S. presence. On Saturday, the U.S. Embassy banned its employees from visiting Manila's tourist district or travelling to U.S. military facilities in advance of the talks.

Civic Center beach park completes pavillions

DPS; One tourist drowned, 3 robberies and 2 fires

A 44-year old Japanese tourist was found dead several hours after he was reported to have drowned in one of the beaches in Tinian.

Capt. Frank Duenas of the Department of Public Safety said that Chihiro Yoshitaka's body was discovered at 3:15 p.m., less than two hours after it was re-

ported, at the lagoon area of Tachogna Beach.

Duenas said that Yoshitaka's body was found floating in about four feet under water by two local residents. He was pronounced dead by a doctor from the Tinian Health Center at 3:30 p.m.

Yoshitaka's body was later flown to Saipan. Duenas said that Yoshitaka was snorkeling with two other companions when he

was reported to have drowned.

In other police news:

*Someone broke into one of the rooms in Ocean View Hotel and reportedly robbed approximately \$400 from the drawer of John L. Arriola of Guam.

According to police reports, Arriola left his room at about 7:30 Sunday morning and when he returned thirty minutes after, he saw that the drawer where the money was kept was tampered.

*A Japanese tourist who went swimming at the Micro Beach early Sunday evening became the victim of a robbery when his bag was stolen from him.

Hidoshi Yaegashi's bag containing a watch, necklace, a walkman and a camera all valued at \$2,500 was stolen after he left it to go for a swim.

The incident was reported at 7:12 p.m. Sunday.

*An unidentified individual broke into the OCK apartments

in As Lito and robbed two Chinese nationals of jewelry and more than \$5,000 in cash.

Duenas said that 36-year old Xiang Zang was awakened by his sister who said that one of the rooms in their apartment had been burglarized.

Zang then saw that his wallet containing approximately \$5,000 in cash was stolen.

Hui Jian Lin, also of the same apartment, reported that two gold rings was also missing from her room. No suspects have been arrested.

*An old storage house in As Gonno in Koblerville was gutted down by a fire after several children were seen playing with a lighter beside the house.

The house, owned by Lisa P. Rios, contained old clothes and several garden tools. The fire was reported to the police at about 11:18 p.m. Saturday.

Cause of the fire is still undetermined and the case is still under investigation, Duenas said.

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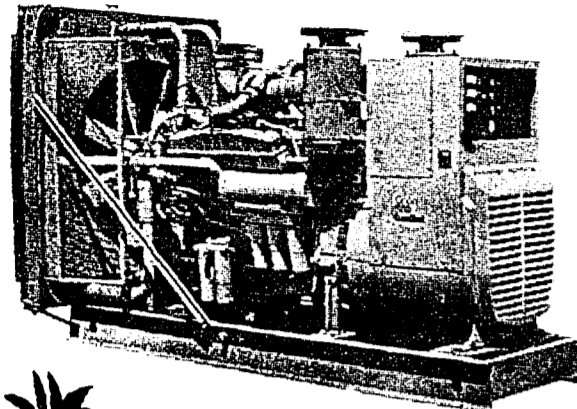
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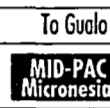
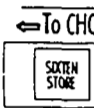


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Yellow ribbon tying events planned for Valentine's day

It said that presently, the stevedoring and terminal operations at the Saipan Commercial Port are being handled by a private firm, on an exclusive

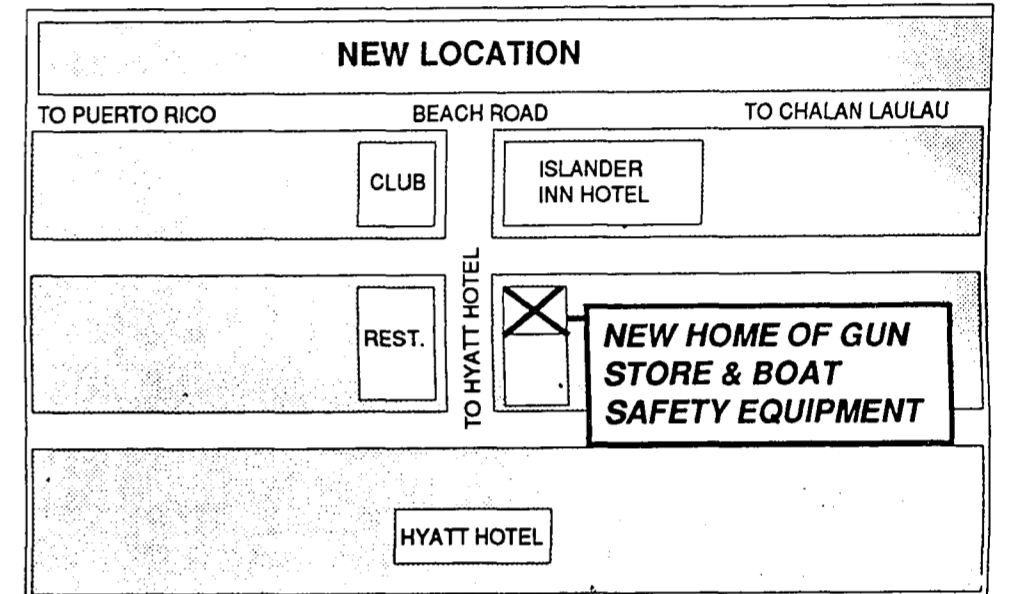
contract basis.

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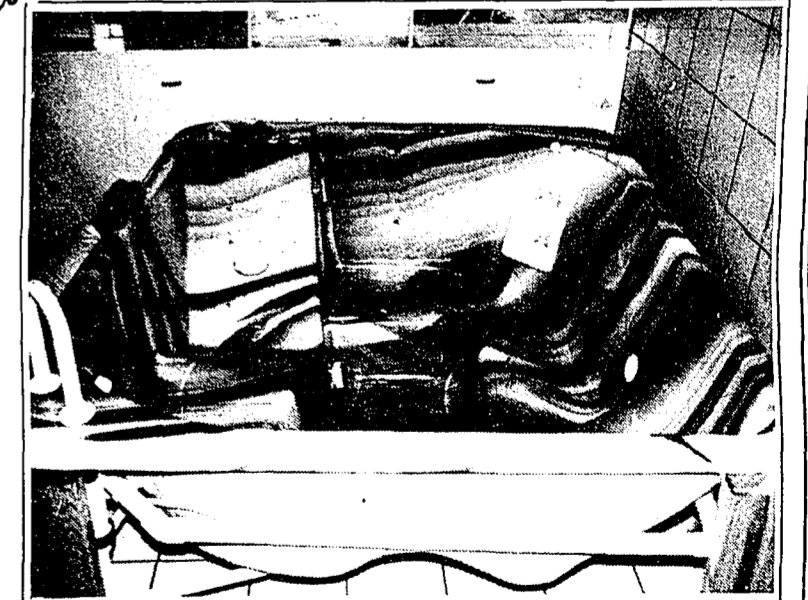

Cong. Reyes justifies \$50,000 funding to Farmer's Market

Cong. Juan S. Reyes has defended his strong support of the CNMI farmers against critics of the move to have the Legislature appropriate \$50,000 for collateral equipment for the Saipan Farmers Market in Chalan Kanoa.

Earlier, Governor Larry I. Guerrero, together with several members of the House of Representatives and the Senate, provided that the appropriation of such an amount is "illegal, because the Farmers Cooperative Association, which will receive the money, is a private organization and can not receive government funding."

"In the United States, individual farmers and their organizations receive annual federal assistance in the form of outright grants, loans and subsidies," according to Reyes' press release.

The release further mentioned that the \$50,000 is a grant to the farmers that is going to be used appropriately.

The release did not specify whether the amount will be used as a collateral for the farm equipments or how it is going to be used. Attempts were also made to clarify the issue, but the Democratic Minority Floor leader can not be reached.

It further stated that the House Legal Counsel's opinion provides that the appropriation is

"appropriate and legal, that the Legislature was within its powers to do such thing to help the farmers."

Reyes' release pointed out that farmers are important to the Commonwealth for two reasons—they provide fresh food to the CNMI and their business keep the dollar circulating in the local economy far longer compared to other economic sectors.

It further said that the representative plans to introduce a legislation that will establish an advisory board composed of individuals from the farmers association, the hotel industry, Commonwealth Development Authority, Marianas Public Land Corporation, Department of Natural Resources, and the Northern Marianas College.

Reyes said that the board's principal duty is to make recommendations to the Governor and the Legislature on ways to build a viable farming and agriculture system in the CNMI.

Local farmers should visit other small communities in the Pacific and Asian countries "to learn about new and successful agricultural technologies, techniques and crops, so they can improve their farming business and feed our people," the release concluded.

The priest was born on March 16, 1932, whose parents were Pedro Martinez and Tan Maria Torres Martinez.

He was survived by his sisters: Mrs. Annie M. Mummert, Sister Marie Pierre Martinez, R.S.M., Sister Mary Mark, R.S.M., Mrs. Antonia M. Pereyra, Mrs. Connie M. Benito, Mrs. Carmen M. Benito and is predeceased by John, Pedro, Jose, Mrs. Ropsa M. Mallan and Luis.

Monsignor Martinez received his secondary education at the Father Duenas High School, in Guam and attended the St. Joseph College Seminary; California, USA and graduated from the St. Patrick's Major Seminary also in Cal., US.

On April 16, 1958, he was ordained to priesthood at the Cathedral of Dulce Nombre de Maria in Agana, Guam, by the late Bishop Appollinaris Baumgartner. He was appointed as a Honorary Prelate or monsignor, by Pope Paul VI in 1974.

Subsequent to Martinez' ordination, he distinguished himself in the priesthood by serving as the pastor of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Toto and assistant at the Agana Cathedral until 1983.

He also served as pastor for St. Anthony's parish in Tamuning until 1975; and was transferred to Santa Teresita Church in Mangilao, and served as the Rector of the Agana Cathedral from 1976 through 1978.

Martinez moved to the Northern Mariana Islands on April 28, 1980 and continued his distinguished and dedicated career in the priesthood by being appointed to serve as pastor of the San Antonio and San Vicente parished on Saipan and to the recent establishment of the Saint Jude Mission.

When the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa was created in November of 1984, Martinez assumed additional responsibilities within the Diocese by being appointed by Bishop Tomas Camacho to serve as Vicar-General of the Diocese and also served as Judicial Vicar of the Diocese.

According to a resolution that was passed by members of the Senate, to honor his death, Martinez was also responsible for the construction of San Vicente and St. Jude churches and the Chalan Kanoa Diocese as well as the new Mercy Sisters Convent in San Antonio

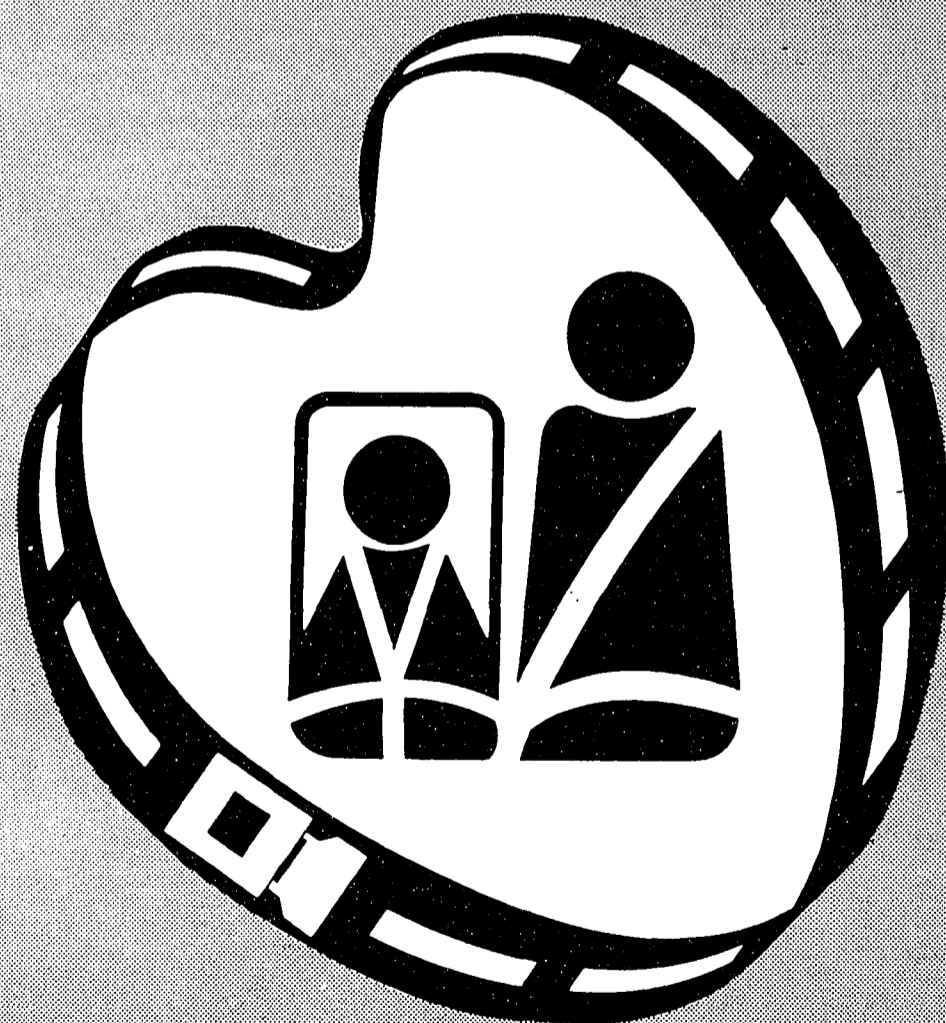

Halapua named as director for PIDP

Sitiveni (Steven) Halapua has been appointed director of the East-West Center's Pacific Islands Development Program (PIDP) by the Standing Committee of the Pacific Islands Conference of Leaders.
Halapua, a specialist on trade, finance and economic development in the Pacific islands, has been serving as interim director of PIDP for a year, said a press

release from EWC.
The announcement was made by Geoffrey Henry, prime minister of the Cook Islands and chairman of the Standing Committee, at the conclusion of the group's two-day meeting at the Center.
Before joining the EWC staff, Halapua was a senior lecturer in monetary economics and a research fellow at the University

of the South Pacific in Fiji and consultant to the Central Planning Office of Tonga. He was born in Tonga and graduated from the University of Auckland in New Zealand. He earned his doctorate in economics from the University of Kent in England, according to the EWC release.
The Standing Committee is composed of the leaders of 10 Pacific island nations and the

governor of the State of Hawaii. It reviews the research and training activities of PIDP, which serves as the research arm of the Pacific Islands Conference of Leaders.
PIDP conducts research and training on issues affecting Pa-

cific island nations, including the need for increasing the role of the private sector in development, the social costs of tourism, disaster preparedness and problems associated with modernization and social change.

Sakovich swim sweep in Florida

Jon Sakovich and teammate Bob Utley came close to winning individual events from the opponent team, during a swim competition in Florida.
According to a news report, Sakovich turned in a personal best in the 500-meter free-style,
