Miscellaneous.

"Where were you last Sunday, Robbie?" asked the teacher of one of the brightest scholars in her Sunday school class. "My mother kept me at home." "Now, Robbie, do you know where the little boys go when they play truant from Sunday school?" "Yes, ma'am." "Where?" "They go fishin'" exclaimed the boy.

The musical composition known as the oratorio gets its name from St. Peter Neri. He, a devoted priest, in the full tide of the Renaissance period, with the aim of attracting young people and keeping them out of mischief, more especially on Sunday, gave at his oratory performances of original sacred music, to which he gave the name of oratorios. Many of these early oratorios still exist.

The thumb was formerly called "thumble," from thumb and bell, being worn originally on the thumb. It is a Dutch invention, and was brought to England in 1795 by John Lofting, who manufactured them near London. Originally they were made of brass and iron only, but of late years silver, gold, pearl and ivory are used.

The new glass invented in Vienna seems to have proved a success in the qualities claimed for it—that is, it is transparent and more brilliant than common crystal, can be cut and polished, and when fused, adheres to iron, bronze and zinc. Singular enough, the glass differs from all others, new or old, in that its composition includes none of the usual ingredients—silica, potash, soda, lime or borax.

The first attempts to introduce gas as an illuminator in the United States were made in Baltimore between 1816 and 1820. They failed, but it was successfully introduced into Boston in 1822. The next year the first gaslight company was formed in New York, the "New York Gaslight Company." They began operations with a capital of \$1,000,000. But the people were so slow to adopt the new illuminator that the company was not in full operation till 1827 when the population was about 160,000.

The two tiny satellites of Mars, which were discovered by Prof. Asaph Hall in 1877, have diameters of less than ten miles each, and are the smallest celestial bodies known. The outer one—12,000 miles from the planet—completes a revolution in its orbit in about thirty hours in a direction from west to east, and the inner moon—about 3,500 miles from the planet—goes round in the same way in about seven hours and a half. Mars turns on its axis in twenty-four and a half hours from west to east. One moon therefore travels slower than Mars, and rises for him in the east, while the other outruns him and comes up in the west.

A statistician, Dr. Feer, we believe it was, recently stated that if one could watch the march of 1,000,000 people through life, the following would be observable: Nearly 150,000 would die the first year, 53,000 the second year, 28,000 the third year, and less than 4,000 in the thirteenth. At the end of forty-five years 500,000 have died. At the end of sixty years 370,000 would be still living; at the end of eighty years, 97,000, at the eighty-five, 31,000; and at ninety-five years there would be 22, at the end of 108 years there will be one survivor.

The sugar trade question is occupying as much attention in Paris as in London, only under a different form. While meeting of London working men are protesting against the French sugar bounties that ruin the English refiners, mass meetings of French politicians are suggesting, in addition to the sugar bounties, an extra tax on English sugar and an import duty on beet root, each to be equivalent to a further premium of 20,000,000 francs for the French manufacturers. One thing is very obvious; however dead the English sugar trade may be, the French are determined to kill it again, regardless of expense.

A PERFECT MAN.—Huxley gives the following table of what a full-grown man should weigh and how this weight should be divided: Weight, 151 pounds. Made up thus: Muscles and their appendages, 68 pounds; skeleton, 24 pounds; skin, 10½ pounds; fat, 25 pounds; brain, 3 pounds; thoracic viscera, 3½ pounds; abdominal viscera, 11 pounds; blood which would drain from body, 7 pounds. This man ought to consume per diem: Lean beefsteak, 5,000 grains; bread, 6,000 grains; milk, 7,000 grains; potatoes, 3,000 grains; butter, 600 grains, and water, 22,900 grains. His heart should beat 75 times a minute, and he should breathe 15 times a minute. In twenty-four hours he would vitiate 1,750 cubic feet of pure air to the extent of 1 per cent; a man, therefore, of the weight mentioned ought to have 800 feet of well-ventilated space. He

would throw off by the skin 18 ounces of water, 300 grains of solid matter, and 400 grains of carbonic acid every twenty-four hours and his total loss during the twenty-four hours would be 6 pounds of water, and a little above 2 pounds of other matter.

ENGLAND'S PATENT IRONCLAD.—The latest English first-class armored vessel, the *Rodney*, is named after the noted Admiral who seized the Dutch American possessions in revenge for the relations of the republic with the United States in 1781. The *Rodney* is 9,470 tons burden, and though but three-fifths as long as the new Cunard steamer *Umbria*, has seven feet more beam. Built entirely of steel, with armor 18 inches on the sides and 16 inches at the ends, she carries four 63 ton breechloading barbette guns, six six inch breechloaders, twelve six-pounder quick-firing shell guns, eight Nordenfiet and two Gardner guns, and is provided with twelve Whitehead torpedoes. With her twin-screw vertical compound engines, supplied by eight boilers, she is expected to attain a speed of sixteen knots an hour.

A SUBSTITUTE FOR MATCHES.—The *Greenock Advertiser* has the following account of an ingenious contrivance to take the place of matches and which it says is now used by the watchmen of Paris in all the magazines where explosive or inflammable materials are kept. Take an oblong vial of the whitest and clearest glass, and put into it a piece of phosphorus about the size of a pea. Pour some olive oil heated to the boiling point upon the phosphorus, fill the vial about one-third full and then cork it tightly. To use the novel light remove the cork, allow the air to enter the vial and then recork it. This empty space in the vial will become luminous, and the light obtained is equal to that of a lamp. When the light becomes dim its power can be increased by taking out the cork and allowing a fresh supply of air to enter the vial.

Mutual Toleration.

"That's because you wear shoes two sizes too small for you."
Then the trouble began once more.

CONTAGIOUS BALDNESS.—A German physician contends that premature baldness is usually a result of contagion. He claims that the hair is destroyed by a fungus which is communicated from one head to another by means of combs and hair brushes. The remedy recommended is washing the scalp daily with tar soap, afterward bathing it with warm water for some time, and then drying the hair and applying a weak solution of carbolic acid. A one or two per cent solution is of sufficient strength. The wash should be continued six or eight weeks, and is said to be successfully employed when the hair first begins to fall out. —*Scientific Press.*

The Chinese Empire.

The area of China proper, measures 1,318,870 square miles, being about half the size of Europe, seven times that of France and fifteen times that of Great Britain. Each of the eighteen provinces therefore, is on an average almost as large as England. Though not so densely peopled as at one time supposed—mistaken estimates having been circulated by travellers who had not penetrated the country away from seaboard or river—it is yet thickly populated. The population of China probably exceeds 200,000,000 of "Celestials." —*Pittsburg Dispatch.*

ATLANTIC-MEDITERRANEAN CANAL.—Respecting a scheme which excites lively interest in Spain, a Spanish newspaper, published on the northern frontier, states that a canal from the Atlantic to the Mediterranean, which is to convert the Iberian Peninsula into an island, appears now to be in a fair way to become an accomplished fact. Starting from the Gironde, the proposed canal is intended to touch Toulouse, continuing through Languedoc and joining the Mediterranean near Narbonne. As the site for a commercial emporium, Narbonne holds a position second to none in France, being placed at an angle of the Gulf of Lyons, and in the valley of the Aude. According to the journal referred to, the contract for the works is signed between the founders and the contractors of the Suez Canal for a canal capable of taking vessels of the largest size. The canal, if made, would constitute a new line of defence for France, which, it is hoped, would remove the objections made by the French military authorities to the perforation of the Pyrenees at the points most convenient for Spain—Canfranc, for instance. It would not only bring some of the Spanish ports nearer to those of England and Northern Europe, but would connect those of Catalonia with the Biscayan provinces, Asturias, and Galicia. The canal, it is thought, will affect unfavourably some of the southern ports, for what reason is not very clear, and the importance of Gibraltar, from a strategical point of view, is expected to be considerably reduced.

QUEEN VICTORIA'S APPEARANCE.—Queen Victoria I saw twice while in England—once on the platform of a railway station, and a second time walking in the grounds of Windsor Castle. The Queen looked just as do her pictures, with the exception that her color and her eyes, her mouth and her gross figure, all give her a very common appearance. There is nothing regal, or even dignified, in her manner or walk. She wears very large shoes, and dresses in deep mourning, with a widow's cap. She has no grace of figure or outline, and, in short, her whole appearance goes to disprove the theory that patrician birth is evidenced in appearance.

The population in Ireland is now very nearly the same as it was in the year of the Union, 5,100,000, the greatest increase up to 1841, when it reached 8,199,000, having been entirely lost. But whereas in 1832, on the passing the reform bill, Ireland had 32.32 per cent. of the population of the United Kingdom, it has now but 14.81 per cent. and its electors, who were 11.31 per cent. of the whole in 1832, are now but 7.43.
