Congress, while permitting the repairing of Farragut's old flagship, allotted no money for the purpose. Work will therefore drag along on the Hartford from time to time as the department has spare funds.

There is but a slim chance that the reported agitation for disarmament in Europe will amount to anything until the present military captives have had a chance to make heroes of themselves at the expense of rivers of human blood and mines of treasure.

In the course of a plea for a cable to the Hawaiian Islands, the Pacific Coast Marine Record wisely says: "The Hawaiian Islands are admirably situated as a place of rendezvous both in times of war and peace, and whether they remain a Republic or again become a Kingdom the commercial interests must increase."

Mr. Loub has introduced a bill in Congress providing that all second, third and fourth officers of sea-going passenger steamships shall be licensed. This bill has been introduced at the request of Captain James Carroll of San Francisco.

A strong or unscrupulous people might overcome a weak and carry them into slavery, but if they made them work they at least fed them well.

You feel no compassion for the relatively poor man, Diogenes said not remarkably wealthy, but from all accounts he was remarkably comfortable. The world still contains many savage and semi-savage nations whose inhabitants, though relatively poor in the main, neither expect nor desire sympathy.

Ex-U. S. Consul General Severance is now a dealer in surcharged Hawaiian stamps.

Fourteen tourists took passage by the steamer Kinohiwa this afternoon for the volcano.

Miss Krout, correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean, left for Hilo on the Kinohiwa to-day.

A lithograph of the new Hawaiian stamps is on exhibition in the Hawaiian News Co.'s window.

The Union steamship Monowai should leave San Francisco on Thursday next for Honolulu.

The Anglican Church Chronicle for February is well filled with appropriate, bright and newsy matter.

Mrs. G. E. Thrum was a passenger on the Kinohiwa to-day. She goes to join her husband at Papaikou, Hilo.

The Misses Albu and their manager, M. L. M. Plunkett, left on the Kinohiwa this afternoon for the volcano.

F. W. Macfarlane, acting Danish Consul, advertises for claims against and debts due the estate of the late William Hansen.

Captain Smith of the bark Mauna Ala expects to make a fast trip to the Coast. The clipper has been re-coppered and painted.

The annual meeting of the German Benevolent Society will be held to-morrow at 2 o'clock p. m., at the office of H. Hackfeld & Co.

Pinau and Malina were found guilty in the District Court this morning of assault and battery on another native on Friday night and sentenced to pay a fine of \$3.

Capt. R. A. Andrews, who is in command of the C. R. Bishop when she went ashore off Hauamau, Kauai, will go as chief officer of the steamer Claudine this afternoon.

Merchant street in the upper part, which used to have the worst, is coming to get the best sidewalks in town. Granite blocks are being laid to connect with each end of the Bulletin office pavement.

One Chinaman was arrested to-day for common nuisance in letting off firecrackers on the street. As no limit has been made for time of firing crackers and bombs, the lads from the Flowery Kingdom are having a gay time. The Marshal overlooked the restricting of the pastime to certain hours.

Rev. Henry Parker has caused to be issued a summons requiring the appearance in the District Court, of Jonathan Shaw, Tax Assessor and Collector of the Island of Oahu, to answer a charge of illegally collecting \$200 as taxes on certain land owned by complainant at Waialeale, Koolaula. The respondent is alleged to have valued the property at \$4000, whereas the complainant says it is worth much less.

Class in Theosophy.

Since the opening of the free Theosophical Library in Foster's block, Nuuanu street, so many enquiries have been made about Theosophy—also expressing a wish that opportunities should be offered for its practical study, that it has been decided to start a trial A. B. C. class, free of charge, in the above library. All students wishing to join this class, one evening a week, are hereby requested to notify the librarian at their earliest convenience, so that the study may be started as soon as twenty adhesions have been received.

A Seizure of Opium.

J. Casiero, the cook, and J. Lario, cabin boy of the bark S. C. Allen were arrested late last night in Chinatown with thirty-five pounds of prepared opium unsteamed in their possession. The opium was confiscated and the prisoners were taken to the County Jail.

The officers believe that the men were about to secrete the opium aboard the vessel, which will sail to-morrow for Honolulu, where the stuff would be smuggled ashore. The seizure is valued at \$700. —S. F. Chronicle, Jan. 25.

Disturbed a Funeral.

An elderly native, employed by Dr. Tronson, died on Saturday and the funeral took place on Sunday afternoon. The services at the grave at the Makiki cemetery were much disturbed by the target practice of members of the P. G. guards in the new shooting grounds, close to the burial ground. There was much indignation over the disturbance, but it was deemed advisable not to make a protest, as it was known no notice would be taken of it.

Strange Fund.

A gentleman, walking on the beach at Hanalei on Sunday, found two bundles of clothing. Scattered within a small circle along with the bundles were sundries, containing fishing gear, a tin box and steel, in short a whole lot of knick-knacks. The finder is wondering if any native fisherman is missing.

JUDICIARY JOTTINGS.

Opening of the February Term of Circuit Court.—The Norton Deed Holds Water Jury Term Trials.

The February term of the First Circuit Court opened Monday morning, Judge Whiting presiding. All forenoon was occupied in calling the calendar. G. K. Wilder, Deputy Attorney-General, is prosecuting criminal cases.

In the afternoon Kealoa was put on trial by a native jury on his appeal from conviction of liquor selling in the District Court. Kauiha for defendant. He was found not guilty.

Prosecution of the following cases was dropped: S. W. Mahelona, opium in possession; Jas. Sherwood, liquor selling; Geo. Lycurgus, disorderly house.

Judge Cooper was still hearing argument in the Banning case.

Judge Cooper has rendered a decision in the case of E. A. Jones, assignee of Geo. K. Norton vs. Elizabeth K. Norton, a bill to set aside a deed. It is a long and somewhat interesting document, ending as follows: "I therefore find in conclusion that the defendant must be held to have taken the deed upon a valuable consideration, having paid therefor the sum of \$1200, and that the transaction was not tainted with fraud, and that the plaintiff has not made out a case entitling him to the relief prayed for. The motion is sustained and the bill dismissed."

The case has often been described in this paper. Norton was the defendant in this case. He had not been proved that Norton was insolvent when he made the transfer.

W. R. Castle for the plaintiff; J. A. Magoon for the defendant.

Kahole, defended by Kauiha, was tried and acquitted this forenoon, on appeal from District Court for selling liquor without a license.

J. Naniakua is on trial this afternoon for violating the gambling law. Kauiha defends him.

J. Leoki has withdrawn his appeal from the District Court for assault and battery. Achi for defendant.

A demurrer has been argued and submitted in the libel case against J. M. Vivas and J. M. Teisaira. Neumann with prosecution; Kinney for defendants.

THAT ASSAULT CASE.

Magoon Admits He Struck Luning Twice and No More.

The Magoon-Luning assault and battery case came up in the District Court this morning. J. W. Luning, the complainant, and his wife testified for the prosecution. According to their evidence the trouble arose over a certain bill of sale J. A. Magoon held. A certain party owed another \$150 for rent, and Magoon as agent took a lien on the furniture and a garnishee on the debtor's wages. Luning also held a certain account against the same party. On January 31st, Magoon called at the office of the complainant and had a few words tending to the amicable settlement of the debtor's accounts, owing both parties. Some misunderstanding occurred between Messrs. Magoon and Luning and the latter would not give up the bill of sale. Magoon stepped behind the counter and Luning retreated, and while the latter's back was turned Magoon struck him twice with his fist. Mrs. Luning, who was present, grabbed Magoon by the back of the neck, and pulled him off. Magoon was about to make a second attack on Luning when he was prevailed upon by Mrs. Luning not to make a fuss. Luning was laid up in consequence of the assault.

Magoon admitted he had struck the complainant, but not on the back of the head. It was done in the heat of passion, defendant believing that Luning was going to tear up the paper.

Judge Robertson reserved judgment until to-morrow morning.

LOUD TALKING PHONOGRAPH.

It Will Be Exhibited on Next Saturday Evening.

The Y. M. C. A. hall has been engaged for next Saturday evening by E. Nestor Edison and E. C. Canoll, two expert phonograph operators, who have lately arrived in the city. JIM POWELL IN LUCK

After a Wait He Gets a Little Bill.

Jim Powell, a colored member of the Annexation Club, who has been waiting for his reward for signing the rolls, has got a job at last, and is happy in consequence. He has been awarded the position of water tender to vessels. The former incumbent was Dan Mahuka, a Hawaiian popular among both foreigners and fellow-countrymen. Dan was unfortunately taken down with illness about two months ago, and is up to the present time confined to his home. In his absence, John Mahuka, a brother, undertook his duties and until a recent date filled the position with satisfaction. One day Captain Ashe of the schooner Bangor notified Mahuka that the tanks on his vessel needed filling. The substitute water tender went down and requested the captain to have a man stationed at the tanks to notify him (Mahuka) when each was filled, so that he could turn the water off. Captain Ashe answered that his men were all busy, and he could render no assistance. Mahuka told him that it was impossible for one man to attend to both duties, the key to the water being some distance from the ship. If any of the tanks were to overflow it would cause some damage to the sugar cargo, and this would fall on the water tender. Anyhow, the tanks were filled and a few days later Mahuka was told to turn over to the hose cart and keys to Jim Powell. The latter like a good many more had been biding his time for a whack at the spoils.

BURDENS OF PEACE.

The Idea of Disarmament Hailed With Great Delight.

LONDON, January 21.—A momentary change in the political weather vane has set Europe talking about a new alternative for war. The gloomy prophets of the past few weeks seem to find all the charm of novelty in the suggestion that the time has come for a peaceful disarmament in Europe. Mr. Byles happened to ask Mr. Gladstone a casual question in Parliament the other day, embodying the idea that the war burdens of peace have become almost as heavy as those of open hostilities, and that therefore the moment is opportune for a general disarmament. Mr. Gladstone's reply was rather non-committal.

The question and answer attracted little attention in England, but throughout the continent, except France, the question is being vigorously agitated. The strongest expressions of sympathy with the idea are coming from all classes. It is strange with what eagerness the suggestion is being seized upon. It has long been the universal conviction of Europe that disarmament is only possible as a result of an exhausting general war, and that it is impossible to postpone war after the limit of preparatory resources has been reached. There is a widespread feeling that certain nations are already beginning to pay the penalty of over-training, while others have attained their maximum fighting power.

This is the real explanation of the prevalent war scares. It is not surprising, therefore, that the possibility of the peaceful attainment of the desired object is earnestly considered.

As regards the continental situation the talk of the week most concerns Italy. It is again reiterated that she for some time has been seeking friends outside the Triple Alliance. Crispi is even credited with a desire to come to a better understanding with France, with a view to end the financial war.

The impression is strong in London that an Italian naval alliance with England in the Mediterranean may be had for the asking, and this is regarded as the greatest safeguard against the penalties which the inadequacy of the British navy threatens.

Humors of the Pulpit.

One does not look to a prelate for frank fun, but the Bishop of Wakefield, unasked, has vouchsafed some genuine humor on the subject of preaching. He has clearly made a study of the art, and he divides the modern into seven species. Thus we have: "The Sesquipedalian: big words hiding little thoughts. The Wispy-washy: no explanation required. The Pyrotechnic: blazing with brilliant metaphors and illustrations, and finishing with a faint odor of gunpowder. The Anecdotic: teeming with stories—some of them good enough once, but gone bad by keeping. The Flowery: in which rhyme is of more importance than reason. The Melifluous: with calm, unbroken flow. The Paragoric: against which the powers of wofulness fail; like a roll of ribbon, so much alike at all points that a yard can be cut off anywhere. Who does not know each and all of these? This is a form of pastoral which congregations, as a rule, will not disapprove." In connection with this severe episcopal utterance there is a story on the other side going the ecclesiastical round. A clergyman prepared to preach two Sundays since and gave out as his text, "The devil, like a roaring lion, goeth about seeking whom he may devour." In the same breath, before beginning his discourse, he continued: "My friends will probably have heard that the Bishop of Manchester has announced his intention of visiting every church in his diocese, and consequently I may shortly expect to see him among us."

New Method of Execution.

COLUMBUS (O.), January 15.—A remarkable bill was introduced in the Legislature to-day by Rowlen of Stark county, at the request of a physician who is one of his constituents. The bill abolishes hanging as the means of inflicting the death penalty and provides that all murderers sentenced to death shall be put off of the way by means of anesthetics, which are to be administered under the supervision of the Board of Physicians and Scientists.

The condemned man, having been placed in a painless sleep, scientists are to be permitted to take the top of his skull off and watch the action of his brain, or lay bare his heart and other vitals and study life there.

The author of the bill has flooded the State with circulars in support of the measure, arguing that its passage would give scientists an opportunity to study the currents of life as they have never been studied, and would undoubtedly result in most wonderful and beneficent discoveries in the interests of humanity.
