ANOTHER TRUST.

A HUGE CORRUPTION FUND.

The Latest Scheme of the Sugar Barons.

Our leading planters, or at least a coterie of them, have been pursuing a still hunt, with the object of forming all our sugar planting corporations and individual planters into a huge Sugar Trust, under the name of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association. It is proposed to assess each member of the trust \$1.00 per ton per year of its sugar output, for a period of years, with a provision for raising the tax to \$2.00 per ton. The fund thus raised is to be placed in the hands of nine "Trustees," to be by them "invested" in their discretion, "for the protection of the planting interests of the members of the association," which in plain English, means, that the assessments will constitute a huge corruption fund, to be placed where it will "do the most good," in the maintenance of lobbies in Congress, the subsidizing of newspapers, the suborning of officials, and other projects best known to our planter purists. Each subscribing producer of sugar obliges himself or itself to dispose of his or its crop, during ten years, only as instructed or permitted by the Trust. There are some vague suggestions of the purchase or building of a refinery thrown in by way as moral floaters, to facilitate the floating of the pretty scheme, but the open and obvious purpose of the deal is the collection of a corruption fund, and the corraling of the sugar crop where the Trust can levy blackmail upon the producers before allowing the owners to sell their product. Very nice, and very sweet, and, as usual, with such nefarious plots in Hawaii, it is being engineered by some of the holy deacons of Central Union Church. The small stockholders will, if this plot succeeds, see the money that should come to them in dividends, diverted into the hands of the Trust, for use in their most peculiar and moral ways. More later.

A CONUNDRUM SOLVED.

We have in our last issues taken occasion to mention the mission of Mr. Thurston who at the expense of the tax-payers is making a bridal tour of Europe. The community has been somewhat puzzled as to the true reason for this remarkable extravagance of a government, which is nearly bankrupt, and many guesses have been made in regard to the "whys" and "wherefores."

It has been suggested that Mr. Thurston was not a *persona grata* in Washington, and that it would be impolitic to send him back to his post.

It has been insinuated that he was too dictatorial and too officious to get along in Hawaii as a Cabinet minister, and that the administration was only too glad to get rid of him.

It has been rumored, that he like Mr. Dole has "got'em" and that his gigantic brains needed rest and under all circumstances it was understood, that he is a pensioner of the Hawaiian treasury because, he conveniently got another attack of pneumonia when the heroes laid down their lives and bled for the cause, and was absent when the irrepressible "Americans" in Hawaii were ready to stand on the wharf and prevent blue-jackets from landing (after the government had been officially notified that no landing would take place.)

All these suppositions, suggestions, rumors and insinuations are wrong. The conundrum is solved in a much easier manner.

The Minister plenipotentiary and envoy extraordinary (decidedly so) and special labor commissioner travels with his wife to London for a purpose of his own. The *Cyclorama* is there!

Yes, fellow-citizens, the dime museum is in London and has only waited to be opened until the show-man turns up. The Hawaiian Government, the immaculate men who call themselves a cabinet have sanctioned the departure of an employee who draws the biggest salary in the country under circumstances which place them and him in a most peculiar light. The labor question is rot. The ministers know as well as we do that there wasn't a ghost of a show for Thurston to get laborers from England. And no one knows better than the minister of finance that, if Portuguese laborers were to be obtained Abraham Hoffnung is the only man in England, who can get them.

The government which is unable to build bridges and wharves, which hardly knows where to go to borrow sufficient money to pay its hirelings, its soldiers and its spies. Which leaves the country districts in a most disgraceful. Which needs every cent that the unwilling tax-payers can dig up in these hard times. That government, we say, deliberately spends a large sum of money to allow Mr. L. A. Thurston and his wife to go to London to run a show at which he will be the manager and she the cashier—as before.

How long will such iniquities be tolerated? Can men like Hatch, King, Smith and Damon look their fellow-citizens in the face and defend such infamous squandering of the hard earned money of the people? Can men like Jones and Cooke and Murray and other capitalists go on the rostrum and excuse or defend such an outrage? We doubt it very much!

If there is any honor and any conscience left among the men who run the republic let them notify Mr. Thurston that he either must earn his salary in Washington doing the duty for which he is paid or he must resign and devote his whole time to his dime museum or any other private enterprise into which he feels inclined to go.

If he is allowed to stay at government expense in London running his cyclorama the government here becomes his accessory and if there is one honest man in the coming Legislature his voice will be heard in denouncing the corrupt and infamous conduct of the ministers who appear to be only toadies to that much over-rated "diplomat," L. A. Thurston.

The Czar.

The usual sensational reports are being circulated in regard to the causes of the illness of the Czar of Russia. It has been insinuated that he has been poisoned by the Nihilists and numerous other reasons have been assigned for the disease which undoubtedly will prove fatal.

There is certainly very little sense in trying to find unnatural reasons for the malady to which the autocrat of Russia must succumb. He is well up in the fifties and his race is in spite of the magnificent physique characteristic of it, not long lived. If we remember the strain on the man's mental and physical powers since the day when the shattered remnants of his father were brought to his palace it is not difficult to understand that even the gigantic frame of the emperor must give way at a comparatively early age. His life has been a hell since that memorable day. Only in the secluded forest of Fredensborg or when carping in Esrom lake did the great man feel at rest and peace and safety surrounded him. No living man could have stood the strain to which the great ruler of Russia has been submitted without going to his grave or an insane asylum.

The Czarowitch, who will place the Russian crown on his young brow lacks the physique which distinguishes his father and his uncle Sergius. He takes after his mother the intelligent and beautiful Dagmar and possesses the persistent energy and wonderful shrewdness of his grandmother Queen Louise of Denmark, the cleverest diplomat of the century. More liberal ideas will hold sway in Russia but we predict that the vast empire will be ruled as firmly and wisely under the young man who may become a constitutional monarchy, than it has been under the iron hand of the dying autocrat.

American League Gratitude.

Mr. J. Alfred Magoon has been one of the staunchest supporters of the cause which resulted in the establishment of the Republic of Hawaii. He has fearlessly espoused the cause and has made a mark for himself in the history of the rebellion. We differ from him in opinion and we have frequently used the strongest strictures against his actions and attitude, but we must admit that the treatment to which he has been subjected from the hands of the American League fills even us with indignation and disgust for a political body so devoid of gratitude as Murray's gang has proven itself to be.

While Mr. Magoon as a whole concurred with the League of which he has been a most valuable member he differs from it as far as annexation of these islands to the U. S. is concerned. We should imagine that he would be entitled to his private opinion but no; Mr. Murray drives him forth from the sacred precincts of the League. And the other members lift their voices and yell "stone him, stone him, he is not one of us."

Mr. Magoon evidently places little importance on his membership in the League and he refused positively to retract one inch from the position adopted by him. He was bounced by his "grateful" co-workers in the cause of the republic and he is now entitled to the hearty congratulations of the whole community.

THE WHITE CZAR.

The Ruler Of All Russians Is Dying.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 20. There is less bad news about the Czar's condition, which is however, still very serious. The swelling is rising above his knees. It was tapped yesterday, which seemed to relieve the Czar for a time.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 20. 11 p. m. The Emperor slept a little today. He is in the same condition as to his strength and the activity of his heart. The nights of the 19th and 20th were less bad.

Biarritz, Oct. 20. A telegram was received here last night from the Czar himself by Princess Gouronski, better known to the public as Princess Dolgorouki, the morganatic wife of the late Czar. It was as follows: "Je me trouve tres faible, mais j'espere encore retenir."

"ALEXANDRE." [I feel very weak, but still hope to recover ALEXANDRE.]

Paris, Oct. 20. The Czar's struggle with death continues. The political life of Europe is hanging in suspense upon what is taking place in a little Crimean village, where lies dying the absolute ruler of 120,000,000 human beings. The origin and progress of his disease seems so strange, that the report that he has been poisoned circulates with persistence. It is not probable that this is true, but all extraordinary events are possible in Russia.

For two days past all those who have access to the Czarowitch have been questioned about him. According to all the information obtainable, he is a young man of average intelligence, and inclined to liberal ideas, especially in religious matters. For a long time he manifested a liking for Germany, but in this respect he seems to have changed. His chief adviser will be General Domlovitch, of whom he is very fond. The general is an energetic soldier of absolutely Slavonic ideas.

The marriage of the Czarowitch to Princess Alix of Hesse will certainly take with a brief delay. He will break off his liaison with the Polish Jewess Danseuse, who has had a great influence on him. This danseuse was the first love affair of this young prince, who, until he made her acquaintance, had maintained great reserve, and was inclined to solitude. The future young Emperor of Russia is very fond of his uncle, Grand Duke Sergius and, above all, of the Grand Duchess, who is a very beautiful woman. She was born a Princess of Hesse, and is a sister of the future Empress of Russia. It is said that the influence of the Grand Duchess was the only thing which has proved powerful enough to bring the Czarowitch to consent to the marriage arranged for him.

The future Czar is very Russian in his habits and morals. In this he is not like his father, who is very reserved. During his stay in London last spring, the Czarowitch went to all sorts of places where princes are not in the habit of visiting.

In order to meet the expectations of Europe, it would be necessary for the young prince to have all possible talents and virtues. He seems disposed to rule alike with prudence, and it is not likely that he will, at least for the present in any way change the policy followed by his father. It is not reasonable to ask anything more of this unhappy Prince, who, at the age of twenty-six years, is called on to undergo the terrible slavery of being chief of the vastest empire of Europe.
