The native newspaper, Elele, which, like the Ka Leo, prints one page of English with three pages of Hawaiian, startled the community on Saturday last, with its attacks on leading citizens—public and private, uttered in language that should leave no doubt of its publisher not being in his right mind. His arrest and the closing of his office followed as measures of necessity. The Ka Leo has not yet reached the same depth of personal malignity, except perhaps in its malicious and uncalled-for attacks on the Queen, but the case of the Elele should serve as a lesson, that there is a point beyond which forbearance ceases to be a virtue.

THE DARDANELLES QUESTION.

The war cloud now again threatening all the great powers of Europe proceeds as usual from the re-opening of what has long been known as the EASTERN QUESTION. What this Eastern Question actually is, and how and by whom it will be answered is a conundrum to which no two States in Europe would give the same reply, but still it may be possible to form an idea as to how this perplexing question may appear to the rulers of the various countries most interested.

To Russia it means aggression pure and simple, the possession of the whole of the Black Sea littoral, the free passage, for the present, and final possession of both shores of the Bosphorus, Sea of Marmora, and Dardanelles, and thence to the confines of Greece, the Mediterranean coast from the Dardanelles to the Suez Canal, the absorption of the recently erected States of Roumania, Bulgaria and Servia which of course means present preponderance in, and future possession of, all South Eastern Europe and Asia Minor. Of Russian plans regarding Asia proper we need not speak here they too may be defined by the one word, aggression.

To Austria the Eastern Question means Russian control of the mouths of the Danube, the enveloping of the south eastern frontier by Russia, by means of the extinction of the Balkan States created by the treaty of Berlin expressly as a check on Russian aggression. It means constant intrigues with and discontents and possible revolution in her Slav provinces, and the extinction, in case of Russian success, of her chance of ever reaching the Aegean by the Gulf of Salonica, or extending her seaboard on the Adriatic in the direction of Montenegro and Albania.

To Greece the success of Russia means the acquisition of Epirus, Thessaly and a share at least of Macedonia, prior to the whole being swallowed by the great Northern Power.

France at present looks forward more to the withdrawal of England from Egypt than to any other object direct. The withdrawal of England would at once reduce Egypt to its old chronic anarchy, which would of course have to be corrected by France, and this great power paramount in Egypt, possessed of Algeria, administering Tunis, would soon cast its protecting mantle over Tripoli, and the idea of the "French lake" would be largely accomplished. Russia knows her place too well to talk of the Mediterranean as a "Russian lake." If she touch on French susceptibilities in that direction, France "stamps her proud foot" and Russia's game is off for half a century.

Italy does not like the idea of either French lake or Russian lake, but is content with the "status quo;" is conscious of being painfully vulnerable, and feels bound to throw in her lot with that State or combination which seems to offer the greatest guarantee of safety. Germany does not wish to see her eastern borders uncovered by the disruption of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, and at the same time to keep armed watch over her western frontier and her Baltic coasts, but is at least as well able to bear the strain as her neighbors, and is contented to strive to maintain peace on the basis of the status quo.

England has nothing to gain and much to lose by any disturbance of the peace. She knows too well by repeated and costly experience how much faith to pin to parchment and sealing-wax and the most solemn undertakings on the one hand, and the chance of aggression on the other, on the part of Russia.

Less than 120 years ago Russia owned not a foot of the Black Sea shore. Less than 40 years ago Russia solemnly agreed that the Black Sea should be open to the merchant ships and closed to the warships of all nations, her own included. As lately as 1878 this undertaking was again signed and sealed at Berlin, in the presence and with the joint signatures of Turkey, Germany, Great Britain, France, Austria and Italy, and now Russia, by constantly worrying and threatening Turkey, claims the right of abrogating such clauses of these treaties as she pleases, without reference to the rights of the other signatory powers, and hints that she has bribed France by the offer of a freehand, or a moral and may-be material support in any ulterior designs on Egypt and Alsace-Lorraine.

When the Emperor Nicholas, in 1854, proposed to the British Ambassador the dismemberment of Turkey, the British Minister of Foreign Affairs replied that his government declined to entertain any such proposition; similar proposals made to France met with the same reply. France, as a republic, is as honorable as under the Second Empire, and it is not likely that she can be cajoled, nor possible that she can be frightened into anything dishonorable.

The intrigues of Russia, not only on the northwest boundary, but throughout British India, are as well known as are those carried on in the Balkan States. It will be as well, perhaps, for even Russia to let the sleeping dogs (of war) lie.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 7, Per S. S. Australia.

SUGAR—Western Refinery prices continue unchanged. The demand from interior points has been unusually heavy. Cuba basis—No change occurred until the 19th ult., when it advanced to 3.47, and 2d inst. declined to 3.7-16c. Since the 2d there have been no sales of Cuba centrifugals in New York, and consequently the basis for island sugars continues as above.

Eastern and foreign markets—There are no new features of particular interest, and since mail advices, per "Alameda," August 21st, nothing new has transpired. Our mail advices of September 1st state that refiners have come into the market again for supplies, and negotiations are pending for various grades, holders being very firm at 3c. for Muscovados and 3.7-16c for centrifugals.

The demand for refined continues very heavy, so much so that the A. S. R. Co. are oversold on fine granulated, and consequently advanced that grade 1-16c. Louisiana crop—The prospects now point to a considerably smaller crop this year than last.

The spring plant cane continues small. Under ordinary conditions the bulk of the sugar is made from the plant cane. It now seems likely that the total crop will be cut down some 20 per cent. Cuba Crop—The drought complained of the past few weeks has ended, and there has been plenty of rain in all the sugar producing districts, which has much benefited the growing cane. Beet crop will be later than usual.

The roots have gained materially in weight and contents of sugar the past few weeks. The weather this month is likely to decide the size of the crop. Total stock of sugar at four ports U. S. August 27th was 157,688 tons against 170,711 tons last year.

Total stock at four ports U. K. August 22d was 106,188 tons against 111,380 tons last year. Total stock in all the principal countries at latest uneven dates to August 27th, 871,306 tons against 673,632 tons same time last year.

Beets 88 deg. test were quoted August 31st at 13s. 1d., September 1st advanced to 13s. 3d., and since have remained unchanged. Rice—On arrival of the Australia price of island rice dropped to 43c cash. At this price offerings were easily sold and market seems to have reached a settled price. The largest importer is holding for higher figures, but with very large amount of Japan near at hand it is doubtful if higher price can rule.

Lumber tonnage in limited demand. EXCHANGE—London, 60 days, 48.8 1/2; sight 48.5 1/2; New York, regular, 6c; telegraphic 10c.

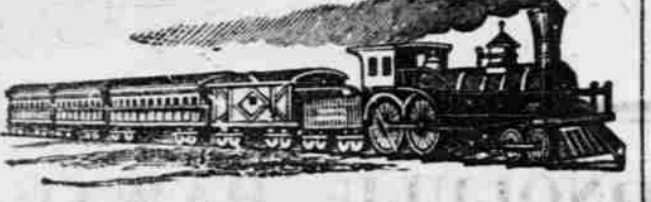

This truly enchanting location for suburban homes must be seen to be appreciated; a lovely grove of algeria trees covers the entire grounds, streets 80 feet in width are laid out, and 6-inch pipes are being laid to conduct water from a 10-inch artesian well which is pronounced by McCandless Bros. to flow the sweetest water of all the wells they have bored on this island. The Railway Co. have constructed two reservoirs with a storage capacity of over two million gallons, and built a flume extending 3 1/2 miles into Waiawa Valley, which in years of ordinary rainfall will supply an abundance of pure water for a large population; to guard against such droughts as we have experienced during the present year, the Company have ordered a Blake Pump with a capacity of 450,000 gallons per day, which will be replaced by one or more of larger capacity when needed.
