AN OUTRAGE.

"Is the Board of Health the supreme power in this country," was the question asked this morning by many citizens, who had perused the morning papers, and in them read the following "scare headed" article:

"A Japanese woman named Iwami Yei died at the Japanese hospital about 8 o'clock last night after an illness of six days at the Japanese Hospital under circumstances that indicate a possibility of plague. It is impossible at this writing to demonstrate whether the case is one of plague. The Board of Health was convened about 1 a. m. and is having cultures made.

If the members of the Board of Health are in the newspaper business, as reporters, let it be known at once, and the Legislature will show its appreciation of the fact. The two morning papers were called anything, not known in an English Dictionary by the community, but the newspapers are not to be blamed, while a censure of the useless Board of Health is in order.

When we picked the papers up this morning to see, whether the shears had been at work more than usually, we noticed the plague paragraph, and then we wondered what was up. We always look for a motive, and we candidly admit that up to 10 a. m. we could see no "nigger in the fence." It was a puzzle to us, why we should have another "plague" when the treasury is empty, no tax-bills or appropriation bills passed, and the President of the Board of Health on Maui. Then we were at sea, as to why the very honorably men of the Board of Health from the Pork man to the "Stand-by," should desire to create a most uncalled for scare in Honolulu and do thousands of dollars of damages to the country by, at midnight, sending their idiotic report to the newspapers.

If a reporter from the Advertiser had picked up the news in regard to the matter, it would have been his duty to report to his editor, who undoubtedly would have used his blue pencil, and delayed a report, until further facts were at hand. But in this instance the Board of Health took upon itself the role of the newspaper reporter, and says in a statement signed by them that "it is impossible at this writing to demonstrate whether the case is one

of "plague." Why then give out the damnable, damaging, disastrous declaration? Are these men of the Board of Health not aware of the fact that few people, comparatively speaking, read newspapers, and that articles are never quoted correctly? When the writer came into town this morning thirty eight people, one by one, from Hobron's drug store to the Hawaiian News Company store, stopped him and said: "Say, we have got the plague again, the morning papers have the official statement from the Board of Health."

The writer is a meek and modest man, and humbly asked, whether the thirty eight gentlemen had seen such a sweeping statement in the morning papers, and in fact, whether they had read the papers themselves, it was 7 a. m. and none of them had; but one had been told about it, when he took coffee, the other had heard of it, when he had his shoes shined; and then again some had their information from the men who dispensed their morning soda water

There is only one explanation to the outrageous action of the Board of Health in publishing such a statement, as that which appeared in the morning papers in regard to the alleged plague, and that is that the members, among whom we have several personal friends, should not be allowed away from home after midnight, and then after a quiet "jackpot" use the morning papers to explain their late home-coming. Let us drop the curtain.

It is true that the Territory will soon borrow one million dollars, that our credit is good, but until the cash comes, don't let us have more costly pages. Seriously speaking, the action of the Board of Health is an outrage.

BY WEEK AND EASTER

The week before Easter, consecrated by the memory of our Blessed Lord's Passion and Death has always been observed in the Church with the greatest solemnity. The special sacredness attaching to the whole week is shown by the appointment of a special Epistle and Gospel for every day in the week, as well as special lessons for matins and evensong each day. Subjoined are the hours of the different services during the week. For the sake of those whose business keeps them from attending at other times, there will be a short service at 12 m., at which the Gospel for the day will be read; the Gospels from Monday to Friday being so arranged that the entire history of our Lord's Passion as given by the Evangelists is read through:

Monday to Thursday—7 a. m. Celebration of holy communion; 11 a. m. Morning prayer; 12 m. Reading of the Gospel; 4 p. m. Hawaiian service; 5 p. m. Evensong and address; 7:30 p. m. (Wednesday only)—Evensong.

Good Friday—7 a. m. Antecom munion office; 11 a. m. Morning prayer, litany and sermon; 11 m. Reading of the Gospel; 1:30 p. m. Addresses on the Seven Words from the Cross; 4 p. m. Hawaiian service; 7:30 p. m. Evensong and sermon.

Easter Eve—7:30 p. m. Evensong.
Easter Day—There will be a celebration of the Holy Communion at 6 a. m., and choral at 7 a. m., and after morning prayer. The rest of the services as on other Sunday.

They Don't Like His Bill.

The following petition was circulated yesterday morning among the business men and mercantile and banking houses protesting against the passage of the bill which has passed its second reading in the House of Representatives of the Legislature relating to the exemption from execution and forced sale of the property of debtors:

"To the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii: We, the undersigned, do hereby protest against the passage of the bill now pending in the House of Representatives relating to the exemption from forced sale of the property of debtors, on the ground that said bill is unfair to the merchants and a detriment to the poor man."

The petition met with instant commendation on the part of the business men and was quite generally signed. After being circulated for about an hour it was well filled with the names of such representative business houses as Hanford & Co., Davis & Co., Allen & Robinson, Hawaiian Hardware Co., Pacific Hardware Co., First National Bank, Bank of Hawaii, Lewis & Co., Manufacturing Sash Co., Wahiuanu & Co., Von Hamm Young Co., Holtzer & Co., Metropolitan Merc Co., Honolulu Merc Co., Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., Lewers & Cook, Moxley Printing Co., H. H. Schaeffer & Co., and many others.

Representative A. G. M. Robertson has the petition in his hands for presentation to the Legislature, and it will be read when the bill comes up for its third reading.

Honolulu May be Bombarded.

Washington, March 29.—Among the duties assigned to Colonel Joseph P. Sanger, who will leave here for Manila in a day or two to become inspector general of the Department of the Philippines, is an inspection of the military post at Honolulu. Orders were to stop there long enough to make a thorough examination of Camp McKinley and report to the War Department. This will be the first formal inspection that has been made since the post was established. A more important action than this, however, is contemplated by his plan to examine Honolulu and the region immediately surrounding with the view of ascertaining what steps may properly and most economically be taken by the Government for defending the city and the island. His report on this subject will, of course, not be regarded as final, for an engineer would have to examine the situation before any conclusive step could be taken to fortify the place, but Colonel Sanger's opinion will be regarded as valuable from the standpoint of an expert in military science. It is probable that within a comparatively short time the War Department will take measures to improve Hawaii as a military base of value in time of war, and Colonel Sanger's visit will be a definite move in this direction.

Who Wouldn't be a Fake

Yang Wei Pin, Chinese Consul for the Hawaiian Islands, has issued a proclamation in which he demands that every Chinese Reformer, member of the Bow Wong Wai Society or other associations not in conformity with the present form of Government in China shall present himself at the Consulate within the next thirty days and swear fealty to the Government, with the alternative threat that the families in China of those who fail to respond will be arrested, imprisoned, punished and beheaded.

No Dispensary For Lahaina.

LAHAINA, March 28—A public meeting was held in Lahaina court room Tuesday evening, Judge Kahalelio presiding. The meeting was called by request of Senator Baldwin, to learn the sentiments of the people in this district in regard to the proposed Dispensary Act. A few sections of the Act were read and interpreted into Hawaiian, and a general discussion followed. Judge Peter Noah, Philip Pali, the chairman of the meeting, Mr. McCann and others expressed their views, Judge Richardson acting as interpreter. A majority of the speakers were strongly opposed to the bill as it now stands. A vote was taken, all present signifying by rising that they were opposed to the bill. A committee was appointed to report the action of the meeting to Senator Baldwin.

AN OUTRAGE.

"Is the Board of Health the supreme power in this country," was the question asked this morning by many citizens, who had perused the morning papers, and in them read the following "scare headed" article:

"A Japanese woman named Iwami Yei died at the Japanese hospital about 8 o'clock last night after an illness of six days at the Japanese Hospital under circumstances that indicate a possibility of plague. It is impossible at this writing to demonstrate whether the case is one of plague. The Board of Health was convened about 1 a. m. and is having cultures made.

If the members of the Board of Health are in the newspaper business, as reporters, let it be known at once, and the Legislature will show its appreciation of the fact. The two morning papers were called anything, not known in an English Dictionary by the community, but the newspapers are not to be blamed, while a censure of the useless Board of Health is in order.

When we picked the papers up this morning to see, whether the shears had been at work more than usually, we noticed the plague paragraph, and then we wondered what was up. We always look for a motive, and we candidly admit that up to 10 a. m. we could see no "nigger in the fence." It was a puzzle to us, why we should have another "plague" when the treasury is empty, no tax-bills or appropriation bills passed, and the President of the Board of Health on Maui. Then we were at sea, as to why the very honorably men of the Board of Health from the Pork man to the "Stand-by," should desire to create a most uncalled for scare in Honolulu and do thousands of dollars of damages to the country by, at midnight, sending their idiotic report to the newspapers.

If a reporter from the Advertiser had picked up the news in regard to the matter, it would have been his duty to report to his editor, who undoubtedly would have used his blue pencil, and delayed a report, until further facts were at hand. But in this instance the Board of Health took upon itself the role of the newspaper reporter, and says in a statement signed by them that "it is impossible at this writing to demonstrate whether the case is one

of "plague." Why then give out the damnable, damaging, disastrous declaration? Are these men of the Board of Health not aware of the fact that few people, comparatively speaking, read newspapers, and that articles are never quoted correctly? When the writer came into town this morning thirty eight people, one by one, from Hobron's drug store to the Hawaiian News Company store, stopped him and said: "Say, we have got the plague again, the morning papers have the official statement from the Board of Health."

The writer is a meek and modest man, and humbly asked, whether the thirty-eight gentlemen had seen such a sweeping statement in the morning papers, and in fact, whether they had read the papers themselves, it was 7 a. m. and none of them had; but one had been told about it, when he took coffee, the other had heard of it, when he had his shoes shined; and then again some had their information from the men who dispensed their morning soda water

There is only one explanation to the outrageous action of the Board of Health in publishing such a statement, as that which appeared in the morning papers in regard to the alleged plague, and that is that the members, among whom we have several personal friends, should not be allowed away from home after midnight, and then after a quiet "jackpot" see the morning papers to explain their late home-coming. Let us drop the curtain.

It is true that the Territory will soon borrow one million dollars, that our credit is good, but until the cash comes, don't let us have more costly plagues. Seriously speaking, the action of the Board of Health is an outrage.

BY WEEK AND EASTER

The week before Easter celebrated by the memory of our Blessed Lord's Passion and Death has always been observed in the Church with the greatest solemnity. The special sacredness attaching to the whole week is shown by the appointment of a special Epistle and Gospel for every day in the week, as well as special lessons for matins and evensong each day. Subjoined are the hours of the different services during the week. For the sake of those whose business keeps them from attending at other times, there will be a short service at 12 m., at which the Gospel for the day will be read; the Gospels for Monday to Friday being so arranged that the entire history of our Lord's Passion as given by the Evangelists is read through:

Monday to Thursday—7 a. m. Celebration of holy communion; 11 a. m. Morning prayer; 12 m. Reading of the Gospel; 4 p. m. Hawaiian service; 5 p. m. Evensong and address; 7:30 p. m. (Wednesday only)—Evensong.

Good Friday—7 a. m. Ante-communion office; 11 a. m. Morning prayer, litany and sermon; 11 m. Reading of the Gospel; 1:30 p. m. Addresses on the Seven Words from the Cross; 4 p. m. Hawaiian service; 7:30 p. m. Evensong and sermon.

Easter Eve—7:30 p. m. Evensong.
Easter Day—There will be a celebration of the Holy Communion at 6 a. m., and choral at 7 a. m., and after morning prayer. The rest of the services as on other Sundays.

They Don't Like His Bill.

The following petition was circulated yesterday morning among the business men and mercantile and banking houses protesting against the passage of the bill which has passed its second reading in the House of Representatives of the Legislature relating to the exemption from execution and forced sale of the property of debtors:

"To the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii: We, the undersigned, do hereby protest against the passage of the bill now pending in the House of Representatives relating to the exemption from forced sale of the property of debtors, on the ground that said bill is unfair to the merchants and a detriment to the poor man."

The petition met with instant commendation on the part of the business men and was quite generally signed. After being circulated for about an hour it was well filled with the names of such representative business houses as Hartfield & Co., Davis & Co., Allen & Robinson, Hawaiian Hardware Co., Pacific Hardware Co., First National Bank, Bank of Hawaii, Lewis & Co., Manufacturing Store Co., Wichman & Co., Von Hamm Young Co., Holbster & Co., Metropolitan Merc Co., Honolulu Merc Co., Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., Lewis & Co., Mercantile Printing Co., Hoffschlager & Co., and many others.

Representative A. G. M. Robertson has the petition in his hands for presentation to the Legislature, and it will be read when the bill comes up for its third reading.

Honolulu May be Bombarded.

WASHINGTON, March 29.—Among the duties assigned to Colonel Joseph P. Sanger, who will leave here for Manila in a day or two to become inspector general of the Department of the Philippines, is an inspection of the military post at Honolulu. His orders were to stop there long enough to make a thorough examination of Camp McKinley and report to the War Department. This will be the first formal inspection that has been made since the post was established. A more important action than this, however, is contemplated by his plan to examine Honolulu and the region immediately surrounding with the view of ascertaining what steps may properly and most expeditiously be taken by the Government for defending the city and the island. His report on this subject will, of course, not be regarded as final, for an engineer's inspection will have to examine the situation before any conclusive step could be taken to fortify the place, but Colonel Sanger's opinion will be regarded as valuable from the standpoint of an expert in military science. It is probable that within a comparatively short time the War Department will take measures to improve Hawaii as a military base of value in time of war, and Colonel Sanger's visit will be a definite move in this direction.

Who Wouldn't be a Pake

Yang Wei Pin, Chinese Consul for the Hawaiian Islands, has issued a proclamation in which he demands that every Chinese Reformer, member of the Bow Wong Wui Society or other associations not in conformity with the present form of Government in China shall present himself at the Consulate within the next thirty days and swear fealty to the Government, with the alternative threat that the families in China of those who fail to respond will be arrested, imprisoned, punished and beheaded.
