A NEW LITERARY LIGHT. Sketch of the Rise of Richard Harding

Davis.

[Special Correspondence] NEW YORK, Jan. 29 .- At my right at the Clover club dinner the other night sat a slender, dark complexioned young gentleman whose name I did not catch at first. When in the fullness of time it pleased the chairman to summon this particular victim to the crucial test of addressing the club, he proved to be too cunning to make a speech. He went to the piano, and after strumming for a minute or so to get a simple chord he began singing the wierdest thing I ever heard, outside of the keening of Irish

women at a wake in the coal regions

after the Molly Maguires were hanged.

It was Rudyard Kipling's "Files on

Parade," set to music that was com-

posed by the singer, and the singer was Richard Harding Davis. Next morning it was announced in the newspapers that John Foord, formerly editor of the New York Times, had resigned his position as managing editor of Harper's Weekly, and that the 26-yearold boy whom I had heard at the Clover club, singing in a way to astoniah the company, had been engaged to take Mr.

Foord's place. It is no great wonder that Mr. Davis admires Kipling, for he is a good deal of a comet himself. He was born in Philadelphia, and comes honestly by his talent, having inherited it. His father is L. Clark Davis, a veteran newspaper man whom George W. Childs long ago retained on The Ledger, and his mother is Rebecca Harding Davis. Arthur Brisbane, of The New York Evening Sun, who claims the honor of having helped to start young Davis, tells me this about

He went to two colleges—the Lebigh university and the Johns Hopkins, but did not graduate at either-preferring newspaper work to college routine. Beginning at 10, he went to work as a reporter on The Philadelphia Press and did some notable writing. Among other things he went to live for five or six weeks among the thieves of the Quaker City, and landed six burglars in Moyamensing besides writing some startling copy. Drifting from paper to paper, as reporters will, he made his mark in all the Philadelphia offices. Together with "Mort" McMichael he started a small sheet called The Stage, which soon died. In 1888 The Press sent him to London with the American cricket team, and

while there he wrote in addition to his

prominent American newspapers. On his return he obtained a letter from Mr. Childs to Joseph Pulitzer, and came to New York to go to work on The World, but on his way to a hotel he met Mr. Brisbane, who proposed that he should go instead to The Evening Sun. Davis was nothing loth, and walked on up the street with a hatbox and a bundle of walking sticks in his hands. On his way to the hotel he was met by Sheeney Mike, the famous bunco operator, who, judging by Davis' very British garments that he was a stranger, proceeded to take him in.

Davis went with him joyously, making an excuse, however, to run away for a few minutes. These minutes he utilized by going to The Evening Sun office and asking if they wanted a bunco story. They did. He returned, was "played for a sucker," and picking out the chief of the gang told him that he had plenty of money at the Astor House, and would go and get it. They started, and when they were on Broadway Davis collared his man and called for a policeman. In half an hour he had his prisoner in the Tombs, and an hour later his first story was written for The Evening Sun.

Since then he has done great quantities of most excellent work for that paper and much outside work. A special fac-ulty he has is for rapid writing. Some of his "Van Bibber" and "Travers" stories have been turned off inside of an hour, and have been specially praised for their high finish. He has also written much verse and a few notable magazine stories. Among these the two which have attracted most attention are "My Disreputable Friend Mr. Reagan" and "The Cynical Miss Catherwaight." He has also made a name in the leading sporting papers as the best descriptive writer on football of the present genera-

One of his earliest stories, caffed "Gallagher," attracted the attention of Mr. James R. Osgood, the veteran Bostonian. now the London representative of Harper Bros., and he, making inquiries as to the author, declared that if Davis should write a book he would be glad to publish it in London, for he was sure it would make a hit. Similar recognition by others led to the offering of the place of managing editor of Harper's Weekly to him when the veteran Mr. Foord was compelled by ill health to resign it. Mr. Davis will assume charge on the 1st of February, and in the mean time is traveling, partly on business and partly for pleasure.

Our morning contemporary quotes largely from the Washington Star, a rabid party newspaper, in order to get in a sarcasm or two on the last American Congress. There seems to be somewhat of a "free-trade" ring to such editorial nonsense, which has somewhat of an "over-the-pond" flavor. The severest critics of the fifty first Congress have mostly been located in London. We hope this trans-atlantic craze, for criticising American institutions without first investigating the facts, has not thus soon reached Hawaii. Our planters, and the country generally, have too much to thank the administrator of the Republican party of the United States for, in the past, to unnecessarily indulge in little international flings under cover of editorial news, so called.

The opera troupe now playing in Honolulu have proved a blessing to us in more ways than one. The good average work done by the company has been commended upon all sides, especially by our music loving people, having more or less of critical appreciation. Passing over defects, the effect of the present season of opera has been to raise our local estimate of music generally, when combined with the force and feeling of the dramatic art.

In judging of music in the abstract we of the mid-ocean kingdom are not behind the rest of the world in critical ability. Professor Henry Berger has raised us from the depths of discord to the highest reach classical music may obtain. As a leader and composer he has few equals and perhaps no rival in the sweet adaptation of music to the necessities of plete in Honolulu Harbor, and in the tropics. Berger, however, has always given us the sound without the sense. We have had many attempts at opera here, but never until the arrival of the present troupe have we had clear, musical tones turned to dramatic action, hard to equal-never before excelled in Hawaii. For this we are first indebted to Mr. Levey, of Honolulu, and secondly to Mr. Hamilton, who organized the troupe now playing

> There is no hesitancy in saying that the excellent work done by Miss Mouri and Mr. Langlois has made the present season of opera a deserved success with all classes of our people. We sincerely hope the Honolulu public will not demand that such musical ability as was last night displayed by Mouri and Langlois, in the somewhat somber, but magnificent opera of "Di Lammermoor," be too far diverted to the singing of popular strains.



THE NICARAGUA CANAL.

Interesting Lecture by Captain Taylor, U. S N.

Before the Geographical Society of Japan.

Probable Influence Upon Japan.

Notes and Facts Relating to the Inflaence of an International Cable Upon the World And Upon Commerce in the Pacific Especialty.

From Lock No. 1 to Lock No. 2, 14 miles, the Canal occupies this valley which is flooded by the construction of embankments, and thus reduces the amount of dredging to be done. Lock No. 2 has a lift of 31 feet. Lock No. 2 to Lock No. 3, 2 miles, continues in the valley of Deseado, which is flooded by dams and embankments, and but slight excavation being necessary. Lock No. 3 has a lift of 45 feet. This brings us to the summit level of the Canal. For 24 miles beyond this Lock, the same system of embankments avoids the necessity of any excavation, the flooding of the valley producing depths of from 30 to 70 feet. The Canal then enters a rock cutting in the Eestern divide, 3 miles long, and of an average depth throughout these 3 miles of 110 feet. This cutting contains 21 per cent. of the total excavation needed for the whole Canal. Emerging from this cut the Canal line enters the basin of the Canon (valley) San Francisco. Dams and embankments are used to impound the water of this stream, and to form a long and narrow lake, whose length is in the direction of

the Canal line. Passing thus through the San Francisco and adjacent valleys, the Canal enters the River San Juan just above the dam in that river, at a distance of 12½ miles from the Eastern divide cut. The canal line then proceeds from the dam in the River San Juan, up to the lake a distance of 644 miles, thence across the Lake Nicaragua, a distance of 561 miles. From the lake to the Pacific, the distance by the capal line is 17 miles, of which 114 miles is in exeavation, and 54 through a basin in the valley of the small streams Rio Grande and Rio Tola.

Of the two terminal harbors, Greytown on the Atlantic side has been. in its time, an excellent harbor, but its mouth has been closed by a sand bar, caused by the sand in the vicinity drifting across the entrance. A pier or jetty has been built lately, into the sea, at right angles to the shore on the windward side of the old entrance to prevent this drifting of the sand, and has already caused the harbor to open, permitting the company's dredges to pass in and is becoming deeper every day. Dredging is being carried on to assist the forces of nature. Brito, the point on the Pacific Coast where the entrance to the canal is to be, has no harbor, and the deep water on that coast prevents long breakwaters. Putting the tolls at two dollars per ton, we have receipts of sirteen million dollars or, allowing liberally for operating expenses, a net revenue of fifteen million, or 5 per cent. upon three hundred million dollars.

The cost of the construction of this great work, under liberal estimates, is seventy-five million dollars. and it is quite safe to say that one hundred millions will cover all contingencies.

Having stated these facts I should add, that these figures are not based upon cursory or superficial examination, nor do they rest upon the unsupported opinion of those interested in the enterprise. Many years have been spent in elaborate, detailed surveys, which have manned the contours of the land to a degree of aceuracy and closeness of detail equal to that of the suburbs of our great cities. Depths of the lakes, velocities of the river waters, records of the rainfall, have all been absolutely determined. Numerous borings have shown the amount and quality of

rock to be encountered in our exeavations. In fact, every point of detail has been thoroughly worked out. A

board of eminent engineers, possessing no interest whatever in the Canal, has been assembled, and after months of careful consideration of the finished plans and surveys, bave submitted their estimate of cost, allowing in their calculations liberal increases in the prices of labor, tools, and material of all kinds.

It is, therefore, safe to say that the cost of this work is practically established. Large percentages of increase have been made, to allow for all possible contingencies of accident, while no reduction in cost has been allowed for the improvement and added economy of the new machinery constantly being perfected, for excavating, dredging and the building of breakwaters, jetties, and bridges. There is no reasonable probability that the cost of the completed work will exceed the estimate, and it is quite likely that it will fall

The financial question may, therefore, be thus stated :- The canal can be built, ready for use, with every convenience, and of dimensions suitable for the commerce of the whole world, for one hundred million dollars, while the canal when completed represents a property instantly worth three hundred millions, and paying 5 percent interest on that amount

from the day of its completion. It has been my endeavor to avoid possible exaggeration, and for this reason nothing has been said as to the increase in the tonnage, which will be a direct result of the existence vessels already plying, use it, but the canal will build up a traffic in commodities which, up to the present, have had no market, owing to their distance from those fields which require them.

It will be when the canal is open, that we shall first learn how great is the demand for the timber of Alaska, for the guanes and nitrates of Peru and Chili, and for many of the products of Japan and Northern China, which now are prevented from reaching a market by the long and costly freight transportation which they must undergo before reaching their destinations. The fact was noticeable when the Suez Canal was opened, and a glance at the map of the world shows that the Sucz Canal, though of vast importance, opened communication only between sections of the world, while a canal connecting the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans may be said to establish communication between separate and distinct commercial worlds. We may, therefore, expect, with reason, that this annual revenue of \$15,000,000-net, will rapidly increase, even with diminished tolls, to \$30,000,000-net, after which, questions of increasing the capacity of the canal or building another one in another portion of the

Isthmus, may be considered. Let us consider now the effect of a finished Nicaragua Canal upon the commerce of the Pacific and the




