WHO OWNS THE SPRAY?

MORE ABOUT THE MYSTERIOUS CRUISES OF THAT VESSEL.

Curtis Textiles That Underwood and
Morrow Were Looking for Places
to Land Troops and Arms.

In the District Court this morning the trial of Patrick Curtis for larceny in the first degree by unlawfully and feloniously stealing, taking and carrying away one mainsail, two jibs, one topsail, one spinnaker and one padlock and staple, the same being part of the apparel and furniture of the sloop Spray, and alleged to be the property of W. P. Morrow and of the value of \$200, was commenced.

The defendant pleads not guilty and admits that the sails and other property produced in court are part of the equipment of the Spray and that he took them from the vessel.

W. P. Morrow, sworn for the prosecution, testified: Know the sloop Spray. I own her. Bought her from Dr. Underwood. On July 3d, 4th and 5th she was my property. Was on board on those days. Have owned the vessel since May 27th. The mainsail and jib were bent but the other sails were down in the cabin. On the afternoon of the 3d started to go on board and found Curtis and his wife there. He was armed with a hatchet and warned me not to go on board. He was unbending the mainsail. Did not go on board but went to the police station to get out a warrant. Did not get one. Went to boat landing, found the mainsail there and took it home. On the evening of the 3d the cabin had been broken open. The lock belonged to the vessel and I had the key. The value of the articles taken was about two hundred dollars. The lock was worth \$1.50. When I bought the sloop Dr. Underwood gave me the keys.

Cross examination—Bought the sloop on May 27th. The price was in the neighborhood of \$400. We had money transactions so we made the consideration \$10. He owed me other money. I loaned him this \$10. Loaned Dr. Underwood something like \$400 and took a bill of sale of the boat. Did not know the bill of sale to Dr. Underwood was in the nature of a chattel mortgage. Curtis did not tell me it was a mortgage. He said he had some kind of a claim and asked me to give up the key several times. Underwood said she was clear.

Dr. Underwood, sworn for the prosecution, testified: I at one time owned the Spray. Bought her from W. L. Wilcox and also got other papers belonging to the vessel, three bills of sale. Took possession at that time. On May 27th sold her to Morrow. He took possession. Had new gaff topsail made at expense of \$10. It was in the cabin, which was locked. Have used the vessel once in a while for a cruise.

Cross-examination—The money was paid Wilcox in my presence. Never borrowed any money from Curtis. The bill of sale from Wilcox to me I can't say what it was. It was not in the nature of a mortgage. Never said to Wilcox or to Curtis it was a mortgage.

Prosecution rests.
In his own defense Patrick Curtis testified: Know Underwood and Morrow. Underwood got a bill of sale of the Spray. Underwood and Morrow said to me they wanted to get the Spray and cruise around the islands and select places to land troops and arms. I borrowed money from Wilcox and gave Underwood four \$10 gold pieces. They got money at last and paid Wilcox. They said they would fix the boat, cruise around the islands and then give me the boat back again. We started on the cruise and had to come back. Then we started

for French Frigate shoals. She leaked and we came back. I then demanded the keys of the boat. The agreement was they were to have the use of her for six weeks. They gave up the cruise so I demanded the possession of the boat which was refused. I waited a while and then took possession of the boat because I considered they no longer had any right to use her. She is my property and I took possession. I went on her each time they took a cruise as owner. I do not owe either Underwood or Morrow anything.

Curtis was represented by A. S. Humphreys and Underwood and Morrow by Creighton & Correa.

At 1:30 the case was postponed till tomorrow morning on account of civil business.

Close of Fisher's Art Exhibition at the

Again, the tranquil, silent marsh and moor, where wild fowl sport and sluggish waters flow, secure from the bustle of the active world around. The cool, green forest, the magnificent distances of mountain scenery, the lazy summer air of warm, mellow plain and valley, all are portrayed graphically to the visitor.

AUSTRIAN HOSPITALITY

BRILLIANT RECEPTION ON BOARD S. M. S. SAIDA.

Decorations of Rare Beauty—Naval
Uniforms of Three Nations on
Deck—Music and Feasting.

Honolulu is the debtor this time. With all the Hawaiian capital's reputation for hospitality, the Empire of Austro-Hungary has invaded the preserve and carried off the laurels for that virtue. Captain Spieller of His Majesty Francis Joseph's ship Saida and officers, not having the fear of the Monroe doctrine before their eyes—at least as regards that touch of nature that makes the whole world kin—bethought them that before their brief stay at this port ended they should give Honolulu society a taste of the princely hospitality from the ancient days of the Old World, when people of this rushing age suppose those of that day had nothing else to do than eat, drink and be merry. Accordingly, although they considered it as playing the invitations a trifle abruptly as to time, they solicited the aid of their Consulate for the distribution of cards at an early hour yesterday morning. Honolulu is nothing if not modern, however, and foreign consulates, if they would preserve comity with this queen of the Pacific, must get on the car of progress and ride with the procession. Therefore the Austrian Consulate, presided over by Mr. J. F. Hackfeld, utilized that most handy find of the modern age, the telephone, and invited all Honolulu quicker than Mercury could have done with wings on all his toes as well as on his heels.

The response was all that could have been desired. Anything more general would have required a squadron of this particular member of the Dreibrund to accommodate. The decks were crowded with the manhood, grave and gay, and the beauty of this fair city of the sea. And they never have had a more brilliant welcome. The gallant ship was transformed into an elysium of tropical verdure and bloom, relieved in what would else have been too unmaritime splendor by an artistic concomitant of universal colors such as could not be surpassed by a committee of all the world's navies. "Flags of all nations" is a conventional phrase reportorially applied to a display of whatever is handy in national bunting, but in the case of the Saida's decorations on this occasion it was surely a rule without any exception required to prove it. In the middle of the deck was a garden, its center piece being the ship's initial "S" in red carnations. A fountain shed a cooling spray over the improvised lawn and banks of ferns and flower beds.

An awning of sails over the main deck covered such a congeries of colors as never has been surpassed in this meeting place of all nations. First of all must be mentioned a magnificent imperial standard of Austro-Hungary. This was placed at the head of the ballroom, as one would say in terpsichorean parlance, and at once riveted the eye of the guest coming over the top of the richly carpeted gangway. The opposite end was screened chiefly with the grand white elephant of Siam. Near this splendid beast was the defiant lion of Persia, holding in its paw the sword of ancient renown, with a sunburst connecting mane and tail. Amidst a wealth of western hemisphere symbolism, overhead, one of the prettiest although wonderfully commonplace flags was that of Bolivia, its emblems being a park of cannon and a troop of its own flags, surmounted with a tobacco plant topped with a liberty cap.

Dancing began soon after four o'clock. It ended in the vicinity of midnight. Delightful music

for it was furnished by the ship's band and Kawaihau Quintette Club, which, by the way, contemporaries persist in calling the "Kawaihau," although it has no connection with either the church or seminary of that name. Our reporter not being a musical critic, although knowing when music pleases him, was entranced by the playing of the Austrian musicians but would be half afraid to praise them had not Professor Berger expleted the comment in his ear, "That is grand!" They played several national airs between times, including "Hail Columbia" and "Hawaii Pono," and the famous "Prayer before the battle," composed by Koerner, a Prussian officer, before the battle of Leipsic in 1813. The native boys sang their rollicking songs along with their instrumentation, to the intense gratification of the foreigners. Uniforms of three distinct national navies mingling with the generally white dresses of the fair guests and the sober apparel of the civilian sterner sex made up a scene of cosmopolitan splendor.

On the second deck a fine banquet was laid out, served to groups containing ladies at tete-a-tete and messroom tables distributed around. There were rare salads, caviar sandwiches, fish, flesh and fowl dishes, of the finest continental cuisine, while Bavarian and bock beer and champagne wine, together with tea and coffee, were on hand in unlimited supply. The officers of the ship were untiring in their attentions to the guests, not only in the hospitalities of the table but in showing everybody so inclined all the principal equipments of the ship. These, though the Saida is old-fashioned herself, are of the most modern description. They include two powerful search lights, an ice-making plant, electric appliances, etc. The ladies appeared to be immensely pleased with the gallant demeanor and polite ways of the officers, many of whom speak English fluently and about all to an understandable extent.

WAS CHINA'S REAL RULER

DOWAGER EMPRESS OF THE FLOWERY KINGDOM EXPIRES.

Sold Into Bondage by Her Starving Parents, She Rose to the Imperial Throne

PEKING, June 21.—The Dowager Empress of China, Tsi Tshi, the adopted mother of the present Emperor, died on Friday. She was born in 1834.

The Dowager Empress of China, who for years past has been the practical ruler of China, was originally but a slave. She was the daughter of a poor family living on the outskirts of Canton, China. When she was about 15 years old the great Ming rebellion during the time of Emperor Hein Fung was at its height, and the rich were becoming wealthier and the poor being dragged down to deeper distress and poverty. Finally, when the family of the future Empress was on the point of starvation, it was decided to sell her.

Accordingly the girl, Lin Ying by name, was taken to Canton and sold into the richest family in that city. The head of the great household was the Tartar Tidoo General, who commanded the troops of the province and who was distantly related to the Emperor, Hein Fung.

The wife of the Tidoo was delighted with the new addition to her household, and so pleased was she with Lin Ying's appearance and gentle manners that she at once appointed her as favorite maid, whose only duty consisted in serving tea in tiny cups and bowls on trays worked with ingenious designs in gold.

Lin Ying was soon adopted by the General as a daughter. She was placed under a tutor engaged especially for her and, although much was expected on account of her exceptional intelligence, her rapid progress astonished every member of the family.

In the fall of 1851 the General was highly honored by the Emperor for his services in suppressing the rebellion, and it was decided that Lin Ying should be made a present to the Emperor upon receiving his new titles, for no officer ever receives honors at the hands of the Emperor without presenting in turn some rare gift. Hein Fung was not merely charmed with his new bride; he seemed fascinated by her glowing eyes, which sent messages of love from beneath the silken canopy of sweeping fringe, her gentle manner and her noble bearing, and ere a month had sped she was honored by the title Que Fay (exalted auxiliary).

The imperial palace awoke one morning three years later, early in 1854, and rejoiced at the news that spread even in the courtyards where the gardeners were at work. To the heavenly Prince a child had been born. It was his first son, and Que Fay was the mother. He was christened Tshi Chuen, and to his mother was given the title Tsi Tshi, which conferred upon her the rank of Empress, second to that of Tsi An, the principal and titular Empress.

In 1861 the Emperor died, proclaiming on his deathbed his son Tshi Chuen, as heir to the throne. The Dowager Empress, overturning the Board of Regents, to which the Emperor had temporarily given control, with her son of 7 years virtually in her arms, ascended the throne, claiming for him the title of Tung Che, Ruler of the Celestial Kingdom. She at once placed herself at the helm of the ship of state and succeeded in crushing out the rebellion. Until Tung Che attained his eighteenth year the joint regency of the two widows and Prince Kung continued harmoniously and unbroken. Then, in 1873, came the crowning glory to Tsi Tshi, when her son ascended the throne and became in truth the Emperor of the kingdom. The temporary withdrawal was of short duration,

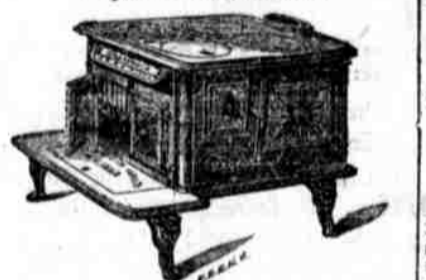

for in 1875 death ended the young Emperor's brief reign.

Then Kwang Su, next of kin, son of Prince Kung, was declared Emperor, but all China knows that he was under the advice and counsel of Tsi Tsi and his father, for the titular Empress, Tai An, died in 1881.

Such is the romantic history of one of the most remarkable women of the present age. It is nothing new to students of Oriental history to read of a woman ruling a vast empire with more than masculine vigor, but the extraordinarily successful record of the Empress Dowager of China has never been equaled, in the records of feminine statecraft in the East.

She found China, in the words of one eminent writer, "with the prestige, resources and peace of the realm reduced to their lowest ebb;" with the most fruitful provinces a desert; with three great and apparently successful rebellions raging simultaneously in different parts of the empire; with a load of debt, caused by an unsuccessful foreign war, during which the capital was in the hands of the invader—she found all these when her husband, the Emperor Hein Fung, died in 1861.

The world knows how all this was changed, when she handed over the reins of government to the young Emperor in 1889. Profound peace reigned over the eighteen provinces and the vast regions outside them, and there never was a time in the history of China when she was greater in the eyes of foreign powers or more respected by them.

A Town Under One Roof.

There exists in Wieden (borough of Vienna) an immense house called "Freihaus." This colossal building has thirteen courtyards, thirty-one staircases and 2112 inhabitants. It has its own postman, and the letters, if they would reach their destination, must bear the Christian name, surname and also nickname of the addressee, the number of his room, staircase and courtyard.

The princely entertainment given its society last night by the officers of a national vessel of Austro-Hungary, which certainly never meddles in New World affairs nor bothers itself a little bit over the Monroe doctrine, is in evidence. The United States will not be jealous a particle over such Old World coquetry.

No romance was ever written more interestingly remarkable than the simple story of the life of the late Dowager Empress of China. It will be found in this issue of the BULLETIN, and is copied from the San Francisco Chronicle.

Real estate is not in anywise dull in Honolulu. Its inhabitants have hope in the country.

MR. WALDRON'S RUFF.

Secretary Gear Presents the Law and Facts of the Case.

EDITOR BULLETIN: Mr. Fred. Waldron having seen fit to air his grievances against the directors of the Healan Yacht and Boat Club, in this morning's paper, I take this opportunity, for the benefit of the members and friends of said club, to correct the misstatements made by Mr. Waldron in his communication. Sec. 3, art. 13, of the bylaws of the Club, has no application whatever to the meeting of the third instant, as this meeting was not a so-called "special meeting of the Club," but was a special meeting of the Board of Directors, which may be called at any time by the President, or by any five of the Directors.

The statement of my having entirely disregarded sec. 3 of art. 13 of the bylaws, is thus seen to be without any foundation whatever.

The captain of the Club is, in accordance with the by-laws appointed by the Board of Directors, has full control over the boats and houses, subject to the supervision of the Board of Directors, being directly responsible to them, and having to report to them all matters appertaining to his office. At the special meeting of the Board on the third instant, from which only one member was absent, a number of the rowing members who desired to enter the crew for the Fourth of July race were present to request permission from said Board to make an entry of a crew for the six-oared sliding seat race, as Captain Wall would not permit such an entry, deeming it inadvisable.

A resolution was passed by the Board of Directors declaring it to be the sense of said Board that a crew be entered for the 4th of July race with but one dissenting vote, that of Mr. Waldron, and Captain Wall tendered his resignation in justice to the position taken by him, which was done in the most gentlemanly manner and with the kindest feeling, and since his resignation as captain he has evinced as much interest in the affairs of the Club as before. In a conversation held with Mr. Waldron on the forenoon of the third he stated to me that it was a difficult matter to decide upon the best course to pursue as to the Fourth of July race, and his subsequent action has been considerable of a surprise. A little more study of the bylaws would have been advisable on his part before rushing into print.

**THE GLORIOUS FOURTH,
TRIBUNE WHEELS AND
BLUE FLAME OIL
STOVES.**

This is the time of the year when we naturally expect the eagle to scream and flap his wings over the great and glorious American Republic across the water. This is all right and a very proper proceeding for an old bald-headed rooster eagle which is one hundred and twenty years old and is supposed to have attained years of discretion and to know a thing or two.

An effort is being made to get a scream or two out of the Hawaiian eagle, but it is such a short time since he was hatched out that his scream will not amount to much in comparison with the older bird's, and as for flapping his wings he can't very well do that until they get beyond the pinfeather period.

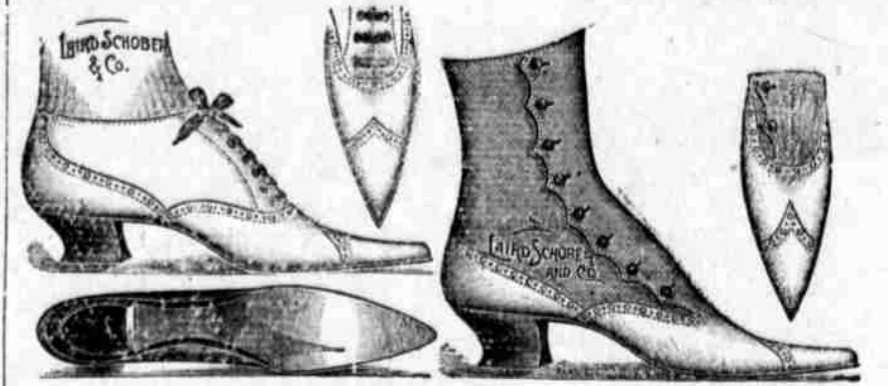

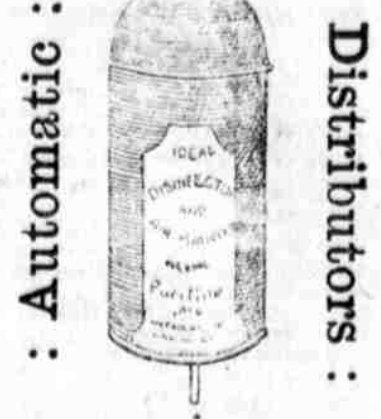

The one on Hotel street next to the Arlington is a notable exception, and in consequence is a source of wonder and delight to visitors who have never before seen this tree in bloom. King Bros. have made several excellent sketches in oil and water colors of this subject, which are meeting with ready sale.

CHANGES AT KAMEHAMEHA.

Handicraft Moralizes on the Evanescent Tenure of Teachers.

Handicraft, the journal of Kamehameha Schools, for June contains the following editorial and news:

The "ceaseless law of change" is commonplace enough with or without Evolution,—so called. The progress involved in specific stages of change does not always show on any one year of surface. Probably the backward steps, as we interpret them, are really essential to progress. So it may be with the ever-recurring providence of change in our teaching force. We can hardly be expected to rejoice when two successive years hardly find us with the same set of teachers. It would be weak for us to attempt to give reasons for this fact and would look like a local apology: it is all too universal throughout the Islands. It has been humorously suggested that the only safe anchorage for teachers in a foreign land lies in matrimony, which in its turn, does not, unfortunately, always lie in expediency.

Mrs. S. J. Anderson, whose services as matron cover a period longer than that of any one now at Kamehameha, leaves this June. What she has done for boys and teachers during that time would fill a volume of Kamehameha's most vital statistics—never likely to come to light through her instrumentality, yet none the less enduring in the hearts of those for whom she worked. Now that ill health has forced her resignation the sorrow is as real and universal as it is natural among the Hawaiian boys to whom she has found it her pleasure to be a mother—firm and unruined, wise and warm-hearted. Her successor is not yet appointed.

Mr. R. B. Anderson, who leaves to pursue a course of medicine in an Eastern university, has been with us nearly five years. During this time his rare energy has displayed itself unremittingly in various departments of the school. As school registrar and instructor in mathematics he closes his faithful services at Kamehameha. His successor will be Mr. Arthur A. Macurda of Brown University. Miss A. S. Snow leaves for her home in Mass. after a service of three years in her present position. A businesslike preciseness in the conduct of the faculty "minutes" and a conscientious attendance upon school duties serve to characterize her work at the school. Her successor, Mrs. Flora E. Wolfenden [in all probability], a graduate of Chicago Music College and late of McMinnville, Or., will teach music at Kamehameha besides other branches.

Mr. F. W. Maby, a graduate of Kamehameha in the class of '94, who has been an assistant instructor to Mr. Lyman in various mechanical lines, goes to pursue his studies in Pratt Institute, Brooklyn. Mr. Maby's growth and industry have won him the respect of teachers and students alike. His own frugality enables him to take this step and he will carry with him the hopes, nay the expectations, of all for his success.
